Recreation Plan Sought

County Manager Resigns

Lincoln County Manager Les Olsen told the County Commissioners at their recent meeting that he was resigning his position effective April 16 to begin a position as Eddy County Manager.

Olsen was asked the final minutes of the meeting if he planned to resign. He responded he would send a formal letter of resignation.

The statement came at the end of a meeting which dealt with various county business.

Kim Richards, Natural Resources Development Department, Santa Fe, reported he was working on a State Outdoor Recreation Plan for New Mexico as a tool to be used when funding projects. He reported the problems and needs established by county representatives and suggested the county request assistance in master planning for outdoor recreation. A department member, paid with federal funds, would be available.

Gail Stackpole requested the county hire a student from the Zia training program on a 20 hour per week training basis. The student would do grounds maintenance and other custodial work. She stated the student was trained in these aspects and was now in need of a real-life working situation in which to test his training.

"It would be no longer than a year's commitment. After a year we will know if he can adapt to a real-life situation," she said.

She explained his salary would be met 50 percent with CETA funds under the National Association for Hiring Retarded Persons.

The Commission approved hiring Jackie Priev as a good way to support the Zia program.

The county was told the state is establishing a standardized computer format for voter registration. Keith Hennigh of the Automated Voter Registration Service told the commission every county must be able to deliver to the Secretary of State a computer magnetic tape, within a designated code (800 VPI), of the voter-registration list.

"Should you lose your computer the tape can assure you can conduct elections, or collect taxes," Hennigh stated.

He said the county's use of magnetic discs was a problem because the discs have not been approved. "I will consider presenting to the committee a dual standard which will allow both disc and tapes," he added.

The suggestion of making duplicates of data discs and then placing those discs in storage was based on the value of the data as compared to the value of the computer.

He also told the commission the

tape could be made in Alamogordo at the Otero County Courthouse.

A correction to the County Road Certification on the number of miles of road maintained by the county brought a question of whether money may be cut back. Olsen admitted his was a possibility because the error was a 60-mile difference.

Deletion of county road C-003, entrance to Johnson and Cocker Ranches was approved. The deletion had been included in the certification which will now be sent to Santa Fe.

Other road problems included a report on the Carrizo road in Ruidoso. The road which connects Ruidoso to the Mesalero Reservation was recently approved by the state for a co-operative agreement. The county will be responsible for sub-base work and the state will surface and provide a crew.

An argument about Ruidoso wanting the co-op agreement transferred to them brought considerable discussion. "If we rebuild the road, why should we take it off?" questioned Chairman McKnight.

A similar problem with Ruidoso concerned the Cedar Creek Road. It was reported the road itself belonged to Ruidoso but the roads stemming from it were county. A suggestion to not touch Cedar Creek road until the legality is worked out dropped the matter.

Another road problem was presented by Fred and Bobby LaMay, who stated a road now being maintained by county crews was not a county road but was on their property.

The commission agreed to send Road Supervisor Guy Henny to check the problem thoroughly before working the road any more.

Approval of mailing the inventory certification to the state auditor was made after Olsen explained the process being used this year. The inventory will form the basis of going on the computer. Once everything is tagged and numbered and programmed the inventory will be maintained on a working basis. The inventory also includes what Sheriff Sanchez has signed for.

A request by Magistrate Sally Ortiz for free copy services was denied. The denial came after the commission considered the possible setting of a precedent for all other magistrates in the county.

"If you let one, you let them all," McKnight said.

A budget review for the 1979-80 fiscal year was broken into four upcoming meetings. The first will be on revenue sharing and general review of the rough draft on April 10. May 1 will involve final adjustments, May 22 the final hearing and draft approval and June 12 will be the final approval. The items and dates will be published prior to the meetings.

Don Hoover, director of the Mental Health Program of Lincoln County reported on the program. Presently about 116 families are being served. Counseling services are provided for family and alcohol problems by a staff of five. Two offices are now open part-

time, one at Zia Center in Carrizozo and the other in the 4-Seasons Mall in Ruidoso.

Hoover was informed to submit a formal request after he asked if the commission wanted to contract the Mental Health program for the coming year.

A request to purchase a new ambulance for the Alto area was approved. This was based upon the need in the Alto area and upon money budgeted last year for an ambulance that was not purchased. The \$27,000 in the ambulance fund will be used to purchase the Alto Ambulance.


Concern for storage sparked comments about ambulance storage in other communities. Capitan was reported storing theirs in the fire station, but the Commission felt a separate shelter was more desirable.

Approval to send out bids was made and Bud Payne stated he would begin as soon as possible.

Commissioner Hightower expressed concern of how the town of Carrizozo appeared to those traveling Highways 54 and 380.

"Carrizozo is the county seat and is representative of the county," he stated. "A bad image for the town is therefore a bad image for the county." He moved to ask the Carrizozo mayor to clean-up the garbage dump and the town.

"It's a disgrace the way they handle their garbage here in this town," Hightower added.

New Chairman Selected

Zozo School Board Reorganizes

The reorganization of the board was on the March 13th Carrizozo School Board agenda. Other items included teacher employment, which required an executive session that lasted about an hour.

Ray Wells turned the meeting over to the new chairman, Sterling Spencer promptly following the reorganization. Wells, who has served as a board member in Carrizozo for 16 years, has served as chairman at one time or another for approximately 10 years.

Wally Ferguson was selected vice-chairman; and Gail Stackpole, secretary. Spencer, Ferguson and Stackpole will serve in their new position for 2 years until the next election.

Following the Board's executive session, it was announced that Larry W. Wilkinson, principal withdrew for consideration for 79-80 employment.

Twenty-six out of twenty-nine certified personnel for 79-80 were recommended for re-employment.

Motion was passed for 25 uniforms requested by Mike Hogeboom, band instructor. Band student, Lisa Cantrell modeled a rough draft of the proposed uniform, complete with plume, hat, over-lay, and rubber overshoes. There are presently 18 students in band but Hogeboom anticipates a 5 to 7 student increase next school year.

Next on the agenda was the reading of the student recreation area agreement. It was presented that evening by Student Council president, Doug Whittaker; secretary, Philip Payne; and their sponsor Mrs. Willa Stone. The Board expressed confidence in the project and moved to approve the request.

The student recreation area will be open to high school students grades nine through twelve, to be used before school, during break and lunch hour. Student behavior will be monitored by staff members. The Student Council will elect a disciplinary committee, to handle discipline problems occurring in the recreation area.

School will be dismissed for the March 22 In-service training for personnel. Educationists Mike May, administration and Robert Knighton, (elementary education) will be here to conduct the 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. session.

Gail Stackpole who served on her first regular board meeting that evening, gave a report on the New Board Members Conference that she attended on March 2-3. Eighty-eight New Mexico districts attended the conference at the Hilton in Santa Fe. Thirteen areas were covered by persons skilled in that particular department. They included; finance, policy development, evaluation, administration, legal, curriculum, testing, personnel, activities, boardmanship, purchasing, transporting, students Gail added that the conference was open to all board members not only to new ones.

The football field problems were discussed. Wally Ferguson is to look into the situation and to report his finding at the next regular scheduled board meeting in April.

The Invitational Track meet was approved for April 11 at 1 p.m. Lincoln County Schools will be participating.

Discussion was held on official votes in the New Mexico Activity Association. The proposal is that the school change the N.M.A.A. official votes to the Athletic Director. (At present the Principal has the official vote.)

Strong opposition to proposal was voiced by Gail Stackpole. She emphasized that there are 14 other school activities besides athletics represented in the Association. She feels that the principal more than an athletic director would be able to represent all the school activities.

Sterling Spencer and Gail Stackpole made plans to attend the April 2 and 3 Budget Workshop to be held at the Four Seasons in Albuquerque. Superintendent Jim Steinpreis and secretary Helen Lock will also be there.

A special 7 p.m. meeting will be held March 21 for the purpose of interviewing 2 applicants for the position of superintendent. They are Raymond V. Reyes, principal in Alamogordo and Raymond Shaw, principal in Magdalena. Shaw was a teacher in Carrizozo about 1958.


AAU Track Club Forming

With a menu of favorites at reasonable prices, students have a place to go for lunch or after school hours. There is a play room with pinball and football and the Burch's have plans for an added dance room.


Burches, lifetime residents of Capitan saw the students having no place to "be with the kids."

There will be a special meeting of the Capitan School Board of Education Thursday, March 29, 1979 at 7:00 p.m. in the board room, the purpose of the meeting is to renew the architect's schematic drawing of new building.

Recreation Plan Sought

County Manager Resigns

Lincoln County Manager Les Olsen told the County Commissioners at their recent meeting that he was resigning his position effective April 16 to begin a position as Eddy County Manager.

Olsen was asked the final minutes of the meeting if he planned to resign. He responded he would send a formal letter of resignation.

The statement came at the end of a meeting which dealt with various county business.

Kim Richards, Natural Resources Development Department, Santa Fe, reported he was working on a State Outdoor Recreation Plan for New Mexico as a tool to be used when funding projects. He reported the problems and needs established by county representatives and suggested the county request assistance in master planning for outdoor recreation. A department member, paid with federal funds, would be available.

Gail Stackpole requested the county hire a student from the Zia training program on a 20 hour per week training basis. The student would do grounds maintenance and other custodial work. She stated the student was trained in these aspects and was now in need of a real-life working situation in which to test his training.

"It would be no longer than a year's commitment. After a year we will know if he can adapt to a real-life situation," she said.

She explained his salary would be met 50 percent with CETA funds under the National Association for Hiring Retarded Persons.

The Commission approved hiring Jackie Prieve as a good way to support the Zia program.

The county was told the state is establishing a standardized computer format for voter registration. Keith Hennigh of the Automated Voter Registration Service told the commission every county must be able to deliver to the Secretary of State a computer magnetic tape, within a designated code (800 VPI), of the voter-registration list.

"Should you lose your computer the tape can assure you can conduct elections, or collect taxes," Hennigh stated.

He said the county's use of magnetic discs was a problem because the discs have not been approved. "I will consider presenting to the committee a dual standard which will allow both disc and tapes," he added.

The suggestion of making duplicates of data discs and then placing those discs in storage was based on the value of the data as compared to the value of the computer.

He also told the commission the

tape could be made in Alamogordo at the Otero County Courthouse.

A correction to the County Road Certification on the number of miles of road maintained by the county brought a question of whether money may be cut back. Olsen admitted his was a possibility because the error was a 60-mile difference.

Deletion of county road C-003, entrance to Johnson and Cocker Ranches was approved. The deletion had been included in the certification which will now be sent to Santa Fe.

Other road problems included a report on the Carrizo road in Ruidoso. The road which connects Ruidoso to the Mesalero Reservation was recently approved by the state for a co-operative agreement. The county will be responsible for sub-base work and the state will surface and provide a crew.

An argument about Ruidoso wanting the co-op agreement transferred to them brought considerable discussion. "If we rebuild the road, why should we take it off?" questioned Chairman McKnight.

A similar problem with Ruidoso concerned the Cedar Creek Road. It was reported the road itself belonged to Ruidoso but the roads stemming from it were county. A suggestion to not touch Cedar Creek road until the legality is worked out dropped the matter.

Another road problem was presented by Fred and Bobby LaMay, who stated a road now being maintained by county crews was not a county road but was on their property.

New Chairman Selected

Zozo School Board Reorganizes

The reorganization of the board was on the March 13th Carrizozo School Board agenda. Other items included teacher employment, which required an executive session that lasted about an hour.

Ray Wells turned the meeting over to the new chairman, Sterling Spencer promptly following the reorganization. Wells, who has served as a board member in Carrizozo for 16 years, has served as chairman at one time or another for approximately 10 years.

Wally Ferguson was selected vice-chairman; and Gail Stackpole, secretary. Spencer, Ferguson and Stackpole will serve in their new position for 2 years until the next election.

Following the Board's executive session, it was announced that Larry W. Wilkinson, principal withdrew for consideration for 79-80 employment.

The commission agreed to send Road Supervisor Guy Henny to check the problem thoroughly before working the road any more.

Approval of mailing the inventory certification to the state auditor was made after Olsen explained the process being used this year. The inventory will form the basis of going on the computer. Once everything is tagged and numbered and programmed the inventory will be maintained on a working basis. The inventory also includes what Sheriff Sanchez has signed for.

A request by Magistrate Sally Ortiz for free copy services was denied. The denial came after the commission considered the possible setting of a precedent for all other magistrates in the county.

"If you let one, you let them all," McKnight said.

A budget review for the 1979-80 fiscal year was broken into four upcoming meetings. The first will be on revenue sharing and general review of the rough draft on April 10. May 1 will involve final adjustments. May 22 the final hearing and draft approval and June 12 will be the final approval. The items and dates will be published prior to the meetings.

Don Hoover, director of the Mental Health Program of Lincoln County reported on the program. Presently about 116 families are being served. Counseling services are provided for family and alcohol problems by a staff of five. Two offices are now open part-

time, one at Zia Center in Carrizozo and the other in the 4-Seasons Mall in Ruidoso.

Hoover was informed to submit a formal request after he asked if the commission wanted to contract the Mental Health program for the coming year.

A request to purchase a new ambulance for the Alto area was approved. This was based upon the need in the Alto area and upon money budgeted last year for an ambulance that was not purchased. The \$27,000 in the ambulance fund will be used to purchase the Alto Ambulance.

Concern for storage sparked comments about ambulance storage in other communities. Capitan was reported storing theirs in the fire station, but the Commission felt a separate shelter was more desirable.

Approval to send out bids was made and Bud Payne stated he would begin as soon as possible.

Commissioner Hightower expressed concern of how the town of Carrizozo appeared to those traveling Highways 54 and 380.

"Carrizozo is the county seat and is representative of the county," he stated. "A bad image for the town is therefore a bad image for the county." He moved to ask the Carrizozo mayor to clean-up the garbage dump and the town.

"It's a disgrace the way they handle their garbage here in this town," Hightower added.


Sister Jan thanked all who made the first year possible.

Burches, lifetime residents of Capitan saw the students having no place to "be with the kids."

Open 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday

through Saturday, Carmen Burch attributed the reason for staying open late to the students waiting to practice in the gym. Since the fire in the old gym, boys and girls basketball practice has been limited to the one gym. They alternate in using the gym, leaving either the boys or the girls to wait.

"Now they can come out of the cold and have a place to enjoy themselves at the same time," Mrs. Burch said.

"We are co-operating with the school. We aren't a place for the kids to hide in order to get out of school. I've already had to call the principal about it," she added. "I think the kids like our place and I feel we'll be very successful."

Twenty-six out of twenty-nine certified personnel for 79-80 were recommended for re-employment.

Motion was passed for 25 uniforms requested by Mike Hogeboom, band instructor. Band student, Lisa Cantrell modeled a rough draft of the proposed uniform, complete with plume, hat, over-lay, and rubber overshoes. There are presently 18 students in hand but Hogeboom anticipates a 5 to 7 student increase next school year.

Gail Stackpole who served on her first regular board meeting that evening, gave a report on the New Board Members Conference that she attended on March 23. Eighty-eight New Mexico districts attended the conference at the Hilton in Santa Fe. Thirteen areas were covered by persons skilled in that particular department. They included; finance, policy development, evaluation, administration, legal, curriculum, testing, personnel, activities, boardmanship, purchasing, transporting, students. Gail added that the conference was open to all board members not only to new ones.

The football field problems were discussed. Wally Ferguson is to look into the situation and to report his finding at the next regular scheduled board meeting in April.

The Invitational Track meet was approved for April 11 at 1 p.m. Lincoln County Schools will be participating.

Discussion was held on official votes in the New Mexico Activity Association. The proposal is that the school change the N.M.A.A. official vote to the Athletic Director. (At present the Principal has the official vote.)


AAU Track Club Forming

Local Controversy Over Movie Ratings by polly chavez

Amid the local controversy of the rating of movies being shown at the Lyric Theatre there was a recent safety inspection by an official from the State Fire Marshall's Office in Santa Fe and by the Carrizozo Fire Chief for possible fire-safety violations.

Tom Ward, President and charter member of the inactive Carrizozo Association for the Performing Arts (CAPA) has shown concern that some people in the community may not know of the dreams and ideals CAPA originally had in mind when the community group first formed.

Les Olsen, Chairman of Building fund for CAPA, stated that he welcomed the fire prevention inspection resulted in having more obvious fire conditions to be corrected and a report is forthcoming from Santa Fe to the Fire Chief as to any other fire hazards, if any, and recommendations for handling.

Olsen remarked that the Lyric Theatre doors were closed for approximately 15 years prior to the forming of CAPA. As a CAPA member and involved individual, he worked with CAPA members in the restoration of this historical landmark. The Carrizozo Woman's Club, assisted CAPA in a fund raising activity in which proceeds were given for equipment at the Lyric Theatre. After members ceased to volunteer because of other commitments in the running of the theatre itself, Olsen continued to keep the place open for as long as he could. Currently, the Lyric, in agreement with CAPA, is under individual management. This was done so that youngsters in the community would have an alternative in recreation activities available.

There are mixed feelings and opinions within the community if some movies shown are offensive and if youngsters, not accompanied by a parent or guardian are allowed to view movies that are objectionable for their age limit.

CAPA is a non-profit organization originally formed on January 22, 1974 for the purposes of promoting and encouraging talent in the performing art in Carrizozo, to present quality cultural programs, and to procure a building for housing and presenting these programs. Officials were appointed.

Sometime later, CAPA officials approached Lyric owner, Mr. Sitton, requesting to purchase the vacated theatre for community use. Mr. Sitton offered CAPA a good price, subsequently he contacted them and offered the theatre to CAPA for whatever CAPA could pay for it. Mr. Sitton then let CAPA retain half it's money to put it to use in the restoration of the Lyric. CAPA gratefully made the transaction and took possession.

Many culturally oriented projects were headed by various CAPA officials and CAPA members in the community. Examples of fine productivity resulted when the community worked together for the welfare of it's community in a loving fashion.

Among the classical productions from a wide range of professional amateur talent were the following presentations, given in Carrizozo: Vos Vaqueros, the Singing Men of Las Cruces, Joan Ballenger, concert pianist; Antonio Mendoza, Mexican stringed instrument artist; a German Lieder presentation by Professor and Mrs. Kenneth L. Ballenger (Prof. Ballenger is a well known baritone of University of Arkansas); Alamogordo High School Choir under the direction of Don Thorpe. The long list also included, on different occasions and locations a melodrama and candlelight dinner, a Ragtime River Boat Revue and ice cream social; square dancing; a box

lunch auction, and a fiddling contest. The CAPA Board of Directors were community and vicinity residents: President-Mr. Thomas C. Ward; First Vice President-Mrs. Robert Shafer; Second Vice President-Mrs. Billy Stephenson; Secretary-Mrs. Thomas C. Ward; Treasurer-Mr. Paul Payton. Directors for CAPA were Mrs. Albert Snow and Mr. Archie Witham.

CAPA felt fortunate to have acquired the Lyric Theatre because of its past history and that is a community asset.

Hollywood became the movie capital of the world between 1910 and 1920. Here in Carrizozo, the origin of movies began in a small way. Albert Roberts remembers a tent-like structure where silent movies were shown in the vicinity where Whites Auto Store now exists. Ben Sanchez recalls

the structure to be a wooden corral-type enclosure. This part of Carrizozo was a busy area.

Where White's Auto and Laundry is now located there used to be Steven's livery stable. John Harkey kept a horse there for about one year. Next to the livery stable was a commercial hotel. Adjacent to the livery stable was the Headlight Saloon.

Lincoln County Sheriffs who saw much law enforcement duty at the Headlight Saloon were C.A. Stevens, term in office 1909-1912 and Profiro Chavez, term in office 1913-1916. Next to the saloon, in the tent-corrals, movies were first seen. Mr. and Mrs. George Dingwall were the managers of this initial movie business. Dingwall was a brakeman and later conductor for the El Paso-South Western Railroad. (This may have been in the 20's.)

Rachel West recalls the wedding of a local couple, Vera Rowland and Ernest Henley at the Crystal Theatre. A Baptist minister performed the ceremony there. Rachel recalls the event as "the grandest thing they (youngsters) ever saw."

Alvin Carl recalls his work as projectionist at the Lyric, a position he held for 15-20 years mostly under the ownership of R.A. and Birdie Walker, who purchased the property in October, 1928. Talkies (sound movies) became popular almost immediately after "talking pictures" developed. Alvin ran the first talkies in Carrizozo. He moved from Carrizozo in 1942.

Many area people remember well the movies at the Crystal or Lyric, the owners, managers and employees. Roberto Nava, Roy Dow, and George Sanchez were some of the more recent Lyric employees.

The long list of theatre owners and managers included Dingwall, Sterling, Brickley, Bowdle, Walker, Blaylock, Sitton, Skelton, and Sitton again. It is not known at the time of this writing when the Crystal became the Lyric.

The Sittons deeded the property to CAPA on October 7, 1975 and CAPA is the current owner.

To the present day, the Lyric Theatre bring back many nostalgic memories of days gone by. This building may one day be restored, but this can happen only through CAPA, community involvement, and joining

forces. Then someday our children, and our children's children, may remark "I remember the great times at the Lyric in Carrizozo!"

Soon after that the Dingwalls moved downstairs in the Masonic Temple. The building also housed the Exchange Bank, one of three banks in busy Carrizozo.

The best known stars of the silent era included Mary Pickford, Charlie Chaplin, Theda Bara, Fatty Arbuckle and Rudolph Valentino. "The Birth of a Nation," directed by D.W. Griffith in 1915 marked the beginnings of modern movie making.

On December 11, 1918, H.S. Campbell purchased the lots the Lyric Theatre is situated on from Carrizozo


Townsite, a corporation. Around this time Mr. Ira O. Wetmore, who was in real estate built the Crystal Theatre (known as Lyric today) and the other buildings on the same block corner.

Ford Garage and El Cibola Hotel (now Belco Industries). They may have been known by other names then. The Crystal was originally used as an opera house-vaudeville type of building, complete with band pit and stage.

Mr. and Mrs. Dingwall later moved from the Masonic Temple into the Crystal Theatre. The Westerns galloped along with such cowboy favorites as William S. Hart and Tom Mix. Lots of comedy films the Crystal included films featuring actors W.C. Fields and the Marx Brothers.

Lincoln Logs

Approximately 225 cattlemen attended the Livestock Research and Cattlegrowers Short Course February 19-20 at NMSU. The short course was sponsored by the NMSU Agricultural Experiment Station, Cooperative Extension Service and the New Mexico Cattlegrowers Association.

Discussed during the two day meeting by Nelson Adams, Livestock Specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service - were the proposed changes in the USDA feeder cattle grading standards. Adams explained that the proposed standards would involve the three grades - Large, medium and small - and three degrees of muscling designated by terms No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3. The new grading system would have nine possible grades, with one additional grade designated as U.S. Inferior, for the feeder cattle.

The proposed grade changes would be published in the Federal Register before going into effect. If any cattlemen or others wish to express their opinions they will have 90 days after publication to do so.

Dr. David Zartman representing the Animal and Range Science Department of NMSU enlightened the cattlemen by discussing the new innovations in the cattle industry. He also commented on management problems cattlemen face which include:

- (1) achieving a high pregnancy rate for the herd
- (2) successfully delivering at least one calf per pregnant cow

- (3) raising calves to market size and
- (4) re-impregnating mother cows efficiently and quickly

Dr. Zartman speaking on research projects said - estrus synchronization, automated temperature detection, automated cow identification, micro-processors improved animal proof-of-ownership procedures and castration by calcium chloride injection all have a high likelihood of successful development for future implementation. He also said there are a few research projects still in the making and these include sex control, dystocia relief with cloning, parthenogenesis, selection techniques based on tissue culture and genetic engineering.





STUDENTS ENTERING READING OLYMPICS


Elementary students from both Hondo and Capitan are participating in the March of Dimes Reading Olympics, during the month of March.

Leota Pfingsten Inducted Into NEA-Hall of Fame

On March 3, 1979, Leota Pfingsten was inducted into the NEA-New Mexico, Southwest District Hall of Fame at Alamogordo, New Mexico. On hand to present Leota to the Hall of Fame was fellow teacher Ofelia Salas, with whom she had been associated for many years. Others who journeyed to Alamogordo to help Mrs. Pfingsten celebrate this occasion were: her cousin, Mr. Simpers; Tularosa, her sister, Mrs. Putney, from Denver, her husband, Fred Pfingsten; Mrs. Myrtis Pfingsten; fellow teachers and members of Alpha Delta Kappa, Angelina Province, Louisa Ferguson and Myrtle Williams, of Lincoln County.

Mrs. Pfingsten started working toward a degree at New Mexico State University, after receiving her B.S. Degree from New Mexico Western University. She continued working, in education, at Eastern New Mexico University, University of New Mexico ending her formal education at Northwestern University, Evanston, Illinois, from which she received a Certificate of Merit in 1976.

Mrs. Pfingsten began her teaching career as a substitute teacher in Hondo. After two years at Hondo she moved to Capitan, entering the Capitan School system in 1954. She retired in 1978.

Mrs. Pfingsten was a teacher with an insight into the needs of children. She accepted the theory of growth through self-expression and self-activity. "Every child enjoys exercising his or her natural impulses to create through investigation and communication. If I can stimulate a child, in some way, to see the world about him - things, people, events, - freshly and clearly, I will help enrich every day of his or her life and create a thirst for knowledge," she stated when asked her philosophy. "The law of life is toward expression. People alone may express themselves in ideas; and in proportion to their ideas, they find satisfaction in life. We must help our little people realize their potentials," she continued.

That she practiced her philosophy is evidence by this statement from a fellow teacher, Ofelia Salas, "I never missed an opportunity to drop into

Leota's classroom; it gave me such a lift and inspired me to renew my own efforts to reach each of my students. The moment one entered her room, one felt the reflection of her enthusiasm, concern, welfare, & interest in each little individual under her care."

Maurildia Perry, a high school teacher, writes, "Leota was a never-ending source of inspiration to me. She did not limit her activities to primary grades. Through the years, we high school teachers, the FHA girls, the Honor Society, the Athletic Club, the junior and senior classes, have benefited from her musical talents and her artistic ability in high school activities, such as our plays, proms, banquets, homecoming festivities, talent shows, etc. I have no hesitation in highly recommending Leota for the Hall of Fame for she surely deserves the recognition for her contribution to education and to the students through the years."

One of Leota's former superintendents, W.W. Hall, writes, "The field of education will always be indebted to Leota for her untiring efforts, and the Village of Capitan, County of Lincoln, and the State of New Mexico will always be better places to live because of her having been in their midst."

CVFD Scheduled to Attend Fire Fighting Sessions

Recreation Center area residents may have been surprised when they looked out their windows last Thursday evening and saw three pumpers (fire trucks), hoses all over the street, and firemen in bunker boots and coats.

Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department were going through a phase of their second session of their fire-fighting program presented by David F. Rubio, Sr. Fire Protection Instructor.

Prior to this, Rubio showed the firemen an excellent film on fire-fighting, followed by diagrams and descriptions of pumps, maintenance of pumps and results of negligence. The firemen were shown diagrams of gauges, priming devices, relief valves and their functions.

Fire fighting has come a long way.

The first fire fighters probably carried water to fires in buckets or other containers. During the colonial period in North America, bucket brigades struggled bravely to fight fires. One row of volunteers passed buckets from a source of water to the fire and another row passed the empty bucket back.

The first self-propelled fire engine appeared in Cincinnati, Ohio in 1852. This steam engine was replaced in the early 1900's with gasoline engines. Firemen could dash to the fire without waiting for steam pressure. The gasoline engine also provided power to pump great quantities of water at high pressures.


The practice session (relay session) at the Recreation Center with the three pumpers was similar to the bucket brigade in that fire trucks are used instead of buckets. This method is useful for rural areas, forest, fields and where ever water may be scarce or unavailable.

The Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department is scheduled to attend two more fire fighting sessions in Carrizozo. A special two day program of Flammable Liquids will be conducted at Holloman Air Force Base on March 25 and 26. David F. Rubio, fire protection specialist and instructor, will conduct the program, which includes a propane exercise with a "propane tree" and 1-2 million BTU of heat. Among the fire departments in this part of New Mexico to attend the special program are Alamogordo, Tularosa, Alamo West, La Luz, and Oregrande.



Game and Fish News

SANTA FE, N.M.—Hunting, trapping and fishing licenses for the 1979-1980 season in New Mexico are being distributed to approximately 350 vendors throughout New Mexico by the state Department of Game and Fish.

The current licenses, good for another two weeks, will expire at midnight, March 31. The new season license will extend from 12:01 a.m. April 1 through March 31, 1980.

Cost of the general hunting and fishing license (deer, bear, fall turkey, squirrel, game birds and game fish) is \$21 for state residents. It is not issued to nonresidents.

Fishing licenses will be available to residents at \$7.50. Trout-water validation at time of purchase of the license will be \$4.

Cost of the fishing license for nonresidents will be \$15.50, and trout-water validations are \$5.


One-day fishing licenses will be \$3.25 for both residents and nonresidents, with trout-water validations at \$2.

Five-day fishing licenses will be \$8 for both residents and nonresidents, with trout-water validations at \$3.

Fishing licenses for persons 12 to 14 and those 65 and older will be \$1.25 for residents, with trout-water validation \$2.

Don Hollis Completes First Year As Grizzly Basketball Coach

Almost everybody likes sports. Next to the weather, people probably talk more about sports than about any other topic. What is sport for one person may just be hard work for another. Sportsmanship demands honesty, fair play, cooperation, competitive spirit, respect for authority and rules, acceptance of responsibility and respect for others.

Sports to Don Hollis comes naturally, especially when it comes to basketball. Hollis, head basketball coach at Carrizozo schools is also assistant football and baseball coach. Hollis enjoys coaching and teaching the young athletes sportsmanship. He helps where ever he is needed in the athletic department.

Looking back on his first year of basketball coaching in Carrizozo makes him feel good about the Grizzly team. Although experience was their problem, he felt the team was in the top 10 in the state. He takes this stand because the Zozo team defeated Mountainair and they made 5th or 6th at State; Zozo defeated Lake Arthur twice, the first time by 20 points when they were 6th in the state and the second time in the District Tournament. All his boys played a big part, with only 2 or 3 on the benches.

Coach Hollis stated that for a good basketball team, you need to start building in your grade schools. Occasionally a coach will "inherit" a good team, but a real rebuilding program takes at least 4 years. For a great team it takes longer than that.

Basketball was invented in 1891 by James A. Naismith, seeking a sport that could be played indoors on winter evenings. Two old peach baskets and a soccer ball were the beginnings of the sport.

Don Hollis began his basketball career in 1962 in his Sophomore year of high school in Plainview, Texas and continued in his Junior and Senior years. The Plainview Bulldogs won district, but got defeated at state during his Junior year. In his Senior year the Bulldogs went to state and were defeated in the semi-finals. His high school scoring average was 28 points a game, average assist was 8 and he averaged 6 rebounds a game.

In his high school they had what was called a "tandem pole" (high-low post), Hollis played at the top of the key. The team played man-to-man defense. Hollis was Runner-up All State in his Junior year and All State in his Senior year. The 1964 LaVern Roach Memorial Award was given to Hollis in his Senior year by his district. The annual award is given to the most outstanding senior athlete, for good sportsmanship and clean living. (Coach was a professional boxer, who excelled in all sports.)

All five of the Plainview High School starters received college offers, as did the 6th and 7th players. A fellow Bulldog, 6'8", Ronnie Parrot signed up with Texas A&M, then on to a pro contract with the Los Angeles Lakers.

Hollis chose to attend a junior college so that he could play ball, he was given a 2 year no-cut scholarship to Fort Worth Christian Junior College. The 6'2", 179-pound freshman started with the 'Fort Worth Falcons'. The team was in the top 10 in the National Junior Colleges. They were defeated in the Junior College Champion National Tournament by Ranger Junior College and Dodge City Kansas Junior College. While in Junior College, Hollis was honored to receive All-American, All-Conference and All-Southern. He was president of the Student Body and was named Mr. Fort Worth Christian Junior College.

The next 2 years Hollis attended Abilene Christian College and started with the 'Wildcats' as guard. Hollis recalls being the shortest man on the court most of the time. Hollis, not too fondly, recalls an incident when they played Arkansas State. Bad feelings between the teams resulted in a fist fight between 2 players.

"Time Out" was called. From out of the stands, an Arkansas fan walked up to Hollis as he stood watching the fracas on the court, and smashed a fist into his jaw, blindsided, that sent him sprawling at the feet of the 2 fighting players. The bruised Hollis missed a couple of games as a result. This was his only real injury in college basketball besides the foot and ankle injuries, now and then.

During his combined 4 year college basketball, his teams had 113 wins, 15 losses, at least an 80 percent win record. As a college player he averaged 22 points a game, highest game scored was 38, he averaged 12 assist per game and on account of his height, 1.8 rebounds per game.

His ambition of playing in the pros was realized. The strenuous practice sessions included running 5 miles a day, twice in pre-season. During regular season not much practice was accomplished due to the 4 to 5 games held per week and the air travel involved.

Hollis played guard position 2 years with the Dallas Chap's (Chapperals), now called San Antonio Spurs. The pros had a 50 percent win-lose record. Jerry Cleek, of his team reached national recognition with the pros. Pre-season and regular season outstanding men Hollis played against were: Elvan Hays, Baltimore Bullets; Walt Frazier, N.Y. Knicks; Jerry West, L.A. Lakers; Kareem Abdul-Jahar, Milwaukee Bucks and Gilmor Kentucky Colonels. The season lasted from September to March.

While in the pros Hollis did not get to play as much as he did in college. This was hard for him. Because of his height, he considered himself a 'Professional Bench Warmer'.

His most memorable experience while in the pros was when he realized that there was something more besides playing ball. God became a big factor in his life. He rearranged his values. He felt God had a special place for him, when he found about Fellowship Christian Athletics. The high ideals of F.C.A. inspired him and he became very active in the organization. (Hollis would like to see the non-denominational F.C.A. become a part of the Carrizozo schools.)

Hollis was traded to the Denver Nuggets. Because of a leg injury, he did not get the chance to play for the Nuggets and that halted his pro career.

In addition to coaching in Carrizozo, Hollis is working in the Title I Room under the supervision of Mr. Richmond, elementary principal Hollis soon hopes to pick up the hours he lacks to obtain his B.A., which was interrupted by the transfer from Junior to Senior college and pro ball.

Hollis and his wife, Maria have 3 children, Renee, Rusty, and Robin. Two month old, Robin sleeps soundly through the steady stream of young people visiting at the Hollis home. Hollis' players, students and the children's friends feel welcome at the Hollis residence.

Asked what kind of a year he is looking forward to, Hollis answered that he is still rebuilding and with the right breaks, the Zozo team could win district or come in 2nd. He added, that as any other coach he wants to win State, he believes in time it can be done.

There are 12 drills that he learned in college and the pros, called the 'Daily Dozen' that he has been incorporating into the Grizzly basketball program. The Daily Dozen is a serious fundamental drill of the game to improve skills. It's author, Coach Jim Gudger, one of the most knowledgeable coaches in international basketball, states that it is only through the mastery of the "little things" such as passing, jumping, dribbling, faking, footwork, agility, body balance and shooting that we can have a good basketball team.

In addition, Hollis would like to be a part of building a well-rounded athletic program in the Carrizozo schools, not in one sport, but all sports.

Does he have any advice for high schoolers hoping to play college ball? "First of all," Hollis said, "it doesn't hurt to put the Man upstairs (God) as the leader of your life." He continued, "then comes self-confidence, desire, hard work, and aggressiveness."

When questioned if he would like to return to the pros in any capacity (coach, trainer, etc.), Hollis remarked, "I would like to coach the San Antonio Spurs one day!"


