Recreation Committee Filled

The regular meeting of the Town of Carrizozo Board of Trustees held on April 9, resulted in two thumbs-down agreements. A proposal by Mayor English to meet twice a month and the purchase of a solar blanket for the local swimming pool.

Mayor English suggested one monthly meeting for routine business, bill paying and bid opening. A second meeting, he said, would be scheduled for a regular meeting so as to avoid the "midnight jobs" often necessary to carry out the lengthy items of business on monthly agendas. The board expressed opinion that they meet as usual and for any special meetings that may come up.

As to the solar blanket for conserving pool water heat, much amusement was shown on the faces of those present as to the various methods on how such a device would stay in place and the man-hours required for the feat.

The first order of business on the agenda was the acceptance of the low bid on a \$2,477.00 tank sprayer for the golf course. Henry Vega, golf course superintendent, was present. Kilbe Equipment of Albuquerque was the low bidder.

Chief of Police Conception Morales was on hand to hear the Trustees accept the low bid of \$5,733.28 for a patrol car from Horizon Ford of Roswell.

Mayor English submitted three names to the board to fill up the required persons needed on the Recreation Committee. The board accepted the nomination of Betty Howell, Carrie Magee and Linda Gibson who were present. They join Marcos Barela, Pat Vigil and Ken Means on the Committee, which meets once a month at the Rec Center for lunch and business.

The Board turned over to the Recreation Committee which met April 10, the proposal of Stan's Electric to take care of all the electrical maintenance at the Rec Center. The offer

includes inspection, adjustments and part replacements when needed. The maintenance would avoid costly repairs later on.

April 23 is the deadline for Town folks to "completely get rid of 55 gallon drums used for trash". Town Foreman Emilio Beltran stated their are "quite a few still around". Red tagging will start immediately and come April 23 if residents still persist on using the drums, a warning and fine will be handed out by city police. The drums allow easier access to dogs and wind for scattering of trash.

County Commissioner John A. Hightower announced during the audience participation portion on the agenda that he represented the Lincoln County Commission in expressing concern of the appearance of highways 54 and 380, resulting from trash coming from the landfill. Hightower offered the assistance of the County Commission in aiding in a solution. He recommended that the Trustees present themselves at their meeting for help. Hightower questioned if the Town has been contacted by the Environmental Protection Agency regarding the situation.

Trustee Roy Harmon mentioned that part of the problem was the existing landfill and that the Town is running out of space. Five acres of land are needed. Hightower recommended

to Town Attorney Payne that he (Payne) contact the Soil Conservation Service for advice before he reach the State Land Office again, as the abstract office did not have the information needed concerning another landfill.

Much discussion was centered on the Carrizozo Municipal Airport contract with Ben M. Morris and "Yellow Bird". Morris was present to discuss a letter he received in regard to the removal of his personal belongings within 30 days from the airport, as his contract would be terminated.

Morris stated that he would like to continue to keep the airport in operation as agreed and he did not feel he had broken any rules of the contract. Doug Jarrard, a local school teacher has been helping out at the airport, along with the city police in aiding pilots to obtain fuel.

Morris said that having a man on call 24 hours had not been feasible before but he proposed that Jarrard be allowed to move to the airport. Morris added that he later would move his operations here. He has a hanger at Mid Valley. Mayor English moved to table the airport matter to the next regular meeting at which time he requested that Morris be available to

New Superintendent Hired

The Carrizozo School District has a new Superintendent, as of Tuesday Night. Mr. James Miller Jr., of Albuquerque, was selected by the Board of Education unanimously. Eighteen people applied for the position, and the Board narrowed the selection down to just six before deciding on Miller.

Mr. Miller was selected after 25 minutes of executive session to discuss the merits of each applicant.

Mr. Miller will take over the \$24,000 position starting July 1st. At present he is at the University of New Mexico completing his doctoral studies.

An armed forces veteran, he has been a teacher with the Albuquerque Public Schools along with being an administrative consultant for UNM.

Jim Miller isn't the only school man in his family, as his father, Dr. James Miller Sr. is the Superintendent of Schools for the Santa Fe School System.

The Lincoln County News joins the rest of the community in welcoming Mr. Miller to Carrizozo.

SO LONG, VOLUNTEERS
I had a dream the other night that every volunteer in this land had set sail for another country.

I stood smiling on the pier, shouting, "Good-by, phone committees. Good-by, disease of the month. No more getting out the vote. No more playground duty, bake sales and three-hour meetings."

As the boat got smaller, I reflected: "Serves them right, that bunch of yes people. All they had to do was to put their tongues firmly against the roofs of their mouths and make an "o" sound-no. It would certainly have spared them a lot of grief. Oh, well, who needs them?"

The hospital was quiet as I passed it. The reception desk was vacant. Rooms were devoid of books, flowers and voices. The children's wing held no clowns, no laughter.


The home for the aged was like a tomb. The blind listened for a voice that never came. The infirm were imprisoned on wheelchairs that never moved. Food grew cold on trays that would never reach the hungry.

The social agencies had closed their doors—unable to implement their programs of scouting, recreation, drug control; unable to help the retarded, crippled, lonely and abandoned. Health agencies had signs in their windows: "Cures for cancer, birth defects, multiple sclerosis, heart diseases, etc., have been canceled because of lack of interest."

The schools were strangely quiet, with no field trips and no volunteer classroom aides. Symphony Hall and the museums that had been built and stocked by volunteers were dark and would remain that way.

The flowers on church altars withered and died. Children in day nurseries lifted their arms, but there was not one to hold them in love. Alcoholics cried out in despair, but no one answered. The poor had no recourse for health care or legal aid.

I fought in my sleep to regain a glimpse of the ship of volunteers just one more time. It was to be my last glimpse of decent civilization.

M-Y T-I-M-E

For more than forty years, the Congress of the United States has been dismantling our free society and turning back the clock toward 1776. Slowly at first, but with ever-increasing rapidity we find our daily lives restricted and our pocket books raided by the government that was supposed to be our servant, not our master. More than 200 years after the signing of the Declaration of Independence, a big government, now headquartered in Washington instead of London, is again intent on taking over our lives.

Free enterprise is being destroyed, personal freedom is severely limited. Spurred by inflation, regulation and government waste, taxes take an increasing share of our income! An army of bureaucrats, unelected and unresponsive to us, control more and more of our daily lives at our expense—government without representation. Local government has once again become weak and in many instances is nearly bankrupt; power has shifted to Washington and Washington has become as hard-of-hearing as London in 1776.

The result is a government so expensive that most people work from January to mid-June each year just to pay local, state and federal taxes. Nevertheless, those taxes do not cover the costs and governments go into debt to such an extent that even if all of us sold everything we own and gave the proceeds to the government, the proceeds would not liquidate all indebtedness. Of course, to pay its debt, the central government has regularly "stolen" from its citizens by inflating the currency, so the dollar you had forty years ago is worth less than 18 cents today.

If the government continues to grow at the rate it has for the past few years, by the year 2000 taxes will claim more than 60 percent of what we earn while inflation further erodes the purchasing power of our dollars.

The danger is not merely economic. Incentive, productivity, personal choice of work, of education, of literature and beliefs, and ownership of private property all disappear when government confiscates that much of a citizen's wealth. Personal freedom and economic freedom are inseparable.

Like the founders of our country, the people of this generation will be roused to action by the realization that their personal freedoms are being denied. They will not publish a new Declaration of Independence but will insist upon a return to the principles of 1776 as the basis for all actions, individual and governmental.

A specific program for putting representation back in government should include the following: Limit the terms of all elected officials to eliminate the professional politician who will do anything to get re-elected, and substitute the citizen politician who takes his or her turn and relinquishes the office to another citizen. Enact "sunset" laws to require review of all government programs and bureaus every four years. Limit taxing authority of government to a fixed percentage of state or national income. Place a spending limit on the federal budget to be based on percent of gross national product or some similar criteria. Apply cost-benefit analysis to all legislation before it becomes law. Institute regional testing of all new government programs before they are widely implemented. Decentralize taxing authority to state and local level and make it subject to approval of the electorate. Establish zero budgeting procedures at all levels of government. Balance the federal budget.

Thomas Jefferson said, "The natural progress of things is for liberty to yield & government to gain ground". It is happening again, and only the

present for the board's approval, a site selection for a proposed hanger. Meanwhile English said operations would stand as is. Morris will keep the runway clean and he has been looking into the radio service breakdown. Jarrard will give a monthly report to the board as Morris suggested.

The old city hall which houses the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce and the Mary Rich Real Estate was discussed. Ms. Rich had requested an option for a three year lease before she invested any money for repairs. The board will go along with that and will include an agreement that would state that the building will be restricted to the use by the Chamber of Commerce and the real estate business only unless notified otherwise.

The board moved to adopt an ordinance to annex the Municipal Airport and the Industrial Park into the town limits in accordance with the advertisement in the NEWS.

Town clerk Christine explained to the board that she and another city employee, Mrs. Ray Roper, had been carrying the work load of several persons the vehicle dept. and a CETA employee were laid off. Ms. Chavez's co-worker, Mrs. Roper were present, when Ms. Chavez requested the board consider an increase in their salaries by July.

Roy Harmon, Joe Orsak and Phillip Ortiz were the Trustees present. Manuel Hernandez was absent. A special meeting is to be held April 23 for unfinished business, which includes the main item of using money available for improving the town water system.

Mrs. Calude Foster spent the weekend with her sister, Mrs. Lawrence Hefner, and Mr. Hefner in Socorro and attended to business.

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



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
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Easter Concert Features Variety

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
