You know, we had kind of a tough winter this year, but I am told that it has been worse. Ol' Anonymous Johnson, writer and historian of Lincoln County gave me an account that he wrote in 1970 for some people in T or C. But I'll explain more after the story—

"The Cow That Jumped Over The Moon —Well, Almost."

"If you have ever visited in the Big

or Little Bonita Canyons of Lincoln County, New Mexico, you will know this is the purtiest mountain country this side of that range of mountains over there - just after you cross through the Pearly Gates.

As a child on the Bonita, my Mother used to tell me this story, "About the cow that jumped over the moon—WELL, Almost," with variations depending upon how long it took you to go to sleep.

In the spring of the year, after the baby calves had been branded, the cattle were moved from these two valleys out onto the mountaintops, up into the meadows and on the mesas of the headwaters of the Big & Little Bonita, and in the fall they were moved back down into the valleys. Except one year, old Goggle-Eyes, our family milk cow that had dried up and was up there with the range cows, failed to show up when it came time to bring the cattle down for the winter months.

The winter of 1919 was a rugged season, in the valleys and canyons of the Bonita region, up high the snow reached depths of sixty to seventy feet. The miners used ice cycles for crawbars and the snow had an icy crust that couldn't be penetrated with a diamond drill. Old Goggle-eyes waiked out the that storm in a mine tunnel high up on the sides of the mountain and had walked out across the icy crust of this snow to where the top of a giant fir tree barely showed, out of curiosity or hungry enough to eat some of the green needles. Near the tree, the wind had moved the branches enough to weaken the snowy crust and down went Goggle-Eyes to rest in the top most branches. My father, on his snow shoes & with a small sack of feed on his back discovered her fate. And so it is written my tenderfoot friend, when you reach this particular area of the Big Bonita and see high above you in the limbs of this magnificent fir tree, the remains of old Goggle-yeeyes, there hangs the story of "the cow that jumped over the moon,—Well Almost."

Precious Metal Values In Lincoln County

As geologists came and geologists go, mineralogists, chemists and geochemists expound upon their brilliance, a strange and astounding phenomenon does exist in the Jicarilla Mountain area and other parts of Lincoln County, New Mexico.

Quoting from the publication, "Mineral Deposits of Lincoln County, New Mexico" by Mr. George B. Griswold, 1959:

HISTORY

"The earliest mining in Lincoln County probably was done by the Spaniards; unfortunately, little information is available on these early operations. It appears that the first deposit worked on a significant scale by Americans was the gold vein at the Helen Rae and American mines, in 1868. Placer gold was worked in the gulches below the lode as early as 1865. It is said that the early prospectors in the area were harassed by Mescalero Indian raids.

In 1882, the Rockford mine was discovered south of the American and Helen Rae mines. The following year, a small mill was erected to treat ores from the Rockford; this was probably one of the first ore concentrating plants built in the county. Soon afterward, mills were built at the American mine, and at the newly discovered Parsons mine in Tanbark Canyon.

By the early 1880's, the White Oaks district was the focus of attention in the area. Lode gold was first discovered in that district in 1879 by a party consisting of Wilson, "Old Jack" Winters, and George Baxter. The location of their discovery, a score of other mines sprang up in the area, most notable of which were the Old Abe, South Homestake, Lady Godiva, Little Mack, and Rita mines. Mills were soon erected

to treat the ores from the various properties. Jones (1904, p. 175) states that five such plants were operating in the district at the turn of the century.

The Gallinas Mountains district, now considered a fluorspar, rare earth, and iron district, was originally mined for lead, copper, and silver. The Red Cloud and Old Hickory mines are believed to have been worked for these metals as early as 1885. Sketchy reports indicate that ore from the district was shipped by wagons to a smelter located at Socorro, some 100 miles distant.

The period from 1885 until shortly after the turn of the century was marked by the discovery of such other deposits as the Vera Cruz (gold), Renowned (lead-silver), gold placers and lodes in numerous others.

The period from 1885 until shortly after the turn of the century was marked by the discovery of such other deposits as the Vera Cruz (gold), Renowned (lead-silver), gold placers and lodes in the Jicarilla Mountains, Oscuro district mines (copper), and numerous others. This same period of mining operations was probably the most active in the county's history, but the activity rapidly decreased thereafter. By the time Graton (Lindgren et al., 1910, p. 170) visited the county in 1905, little active mining was being done in the White Oaks district, except by lessors. The Helen Rae and American mines continued to operate intermittently until the early 1930's, and the Parsons mine produced in a similar manner until about 1920.

Mining was revived for short periods after the turn of the century, notably the mining of iron and tungsten, the latter from old dumps in the White Oaks district. Red Cloud mine made several shipments of high-grade lead-copper-silver ore during the period of 1920-23, but these were to be the last important shipments of such ore from the county.

Among the last deposits to be worked were the fluorspar and rare earth occurrences in the Gallinas Mountains. The demand for fluorspar during World War II led the U.S. Bureau of Mines to carry out an extensive exploration program in the district. Although several promising discoveries were made as a result of this program, little in the way of actual fluorspar production ensued. Bastnaesite had long been recognized in the Gallinas district, but important shipments of the rare earth mineral were not made except for a brief time during 1954-1956.

MINING IN Lincoln County is almost at a standstill at the present time (1958). Several individuals are investigating prospects in the area, but the immediate outlook is rather dim for an active revival of mining.

Although coal mining is not discussed in detail in this bulletin, it may be appropriate to give a brief outline here of this once prosperous industry of Lincoln County. Coal was mined in the vicinity of White Oaks, beginning around 1880 to supply fuel to the various mines in the same area. In 1885, the extensive coal deposits near Capitan, which had supplied small quantities of coal for some years, were first mined on a large scale. From this date until 1906, a considerable quantity of coal was produced, making Lincoln County the third-ranking producer in the state during that period. The coal beds of the Capitan district are interrupted by numerous faults and dikes, which caused the closing of most of the Capitan mines shortly after 1905. The White Oaks district continued to produce a small quantity of coal for local use, including the generation of electric power for the town of Carrizozo, until 1953. A small amount of coal also was produced from the Willow Hill area, south of Carrizozo, but the period of operation is not known.

As mentioned in the foregoing history, the placer and lode mining in the Jicarilla Mountain district was started shortly after the turn of the century. Among the early operations in this area was one started by Wisconsin Mining and Milling Co. which operated the Sally, Apex and Spring (Gold Stain) mines. This company operated a small mill located in the NW 1/4, Sect. 27, T5S, R12 E, for a brief period around 1905.

For numerous reasons, this operation was terminated and much later, in the early 1930's was attempted again by some of the principal officers of the old company but failed for a second time for reasons known as complexities of the ore composition. In 1934, Mr. Walter A. Hubbard gained possession of the old Wisconsin Mining and Milling property and moved to the property where he spent many years developing and evaluating that property until his death in 1970.

As early as 1938 Massachusetts Institute of Technology confirmed the values as being a rare "Gold Selenide" which at that time was considered extremely difficult to save.

In the ensuing years, Mr. Hubbard pursued the problem of efficiently reclaiming the values from this reasonably rare gold compound. And as the mine was extended to a greater depth over values were encountered as Selenides, Tellurides, Arsenides and Sulfides. Among these are copper, zinc, chrome, nickel and cobalt, which to date have not been drilled to a sufficient extent to either prove or disprove the existence of an economic ore deposit.

From the early days of placer mining in the Jicarilla Mountains, periodic reports of platinum occurrence have persisted and assay reports on this element varied to such an extent that no great excitement was ever created.

In the recent past, certain local conditions dictated the need to either prove or disprove the existence of platinum in economic quantities in the area and having had experience in the field of engineering, mining, and mineralogy, the writer undertook this task. Within a few months it became evident that due to the fact that analysis for platinum is a somewhat rare occurrence in the average analytical laboratory and the further fact that the analytical procedure is complicated greatly by the presence of at least some of the other five elements in the Platinum Group, and above all else by the presence of iron, varying results came in an identical samples from many laboratories.

This lead to research locally to determine the reason behind the varying results, and after considerable frustration, it was finally determined that all six of the Platinum Group elements exist in the area in commercial quantities extended over numerous square miles.

Relative to the research on the Platinum Group of minerals, it was also found that the aforementioned gold values in both lode and placer deposits exist in an extremely fine state of particle division, and to date have totally eluded both, the miner and the analyst, and some 78-83 percent of the values have gone undetected since much of the gold and platinum value exists in particles sizes down to or approaching micron size.

It is somewhat amazing when one realizes the state of the art in the analytical field in the United States, and if it is pursued in depth, the realization appears as to why this country was never considered as a major producer of the Platinum Group of minerals. Invariably with the exception of a very few, when an analytical laboratory is approached for analysis of the Platinum Group, the answer is either:

1. We are not equipped to determine the Platinum group.
2. We cannot determine other than the group as a whole.
3. We are not accustomed to Platinum analysis but are willing to try (for a price.)
4. We can determine by atomic absorption methods.

The cruel reality of the foregoing is the simple fact that the average analyst has had very little if any knowledge of the complexities of determining the Platinum Group or in distinguishing between the six.

A fire assay, normally, is worthless in view of the fact that the average analytical furnace is incapable of attaining heats great enough to even bring the material to a melting point and one has only to hope that some of the material will be physically entrapped by another metal that has melted and is migrating downward in the crucible.

An atomic absorption determination, while good for many elements can be of very little value for platinum and palladium if these elements are in the presence of iron or some other element that can or does

cause interference. From the research that has been done to date, the writer has found no atomic absorption unit that can distinguish between the six elements and when one realizes that three of the six are rather highly volatile, the problem becomes even more complex.

With the present state of the world economy, the ever increasing demand

for the noble metals in the Platinum Group by a progressive technology and other factors, a small fraction of the answer to that demand just may be found in Lincoln County in spite of the fact that the area was allowed to remain as a "sleeper", and understandably so, for these many years by the "technological geniuses" of our modern times.

Sense & Nonsense

U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici

WASHINGTON, D.C. — A balanced federal budget by 1981?

It can happen, if the Senate Budget Committee's recently calculated formula is followed.

A balanced budget is certainly good news, but that silver lining does have a cloud attached.

America's taxpayers will finance that balanced budget with almost \$60 billion in additional taxes.

Presently mandated Social Security taxes will add \$11 billion to the bite on taxpayers in 1980 and another \$17 billion in 1981. The so-called "cash management proposals" of the President will add another \$4.7 billion in new tax collections.

Add to that \$25 billion in new taxes because of inflation kicking you (perhaps literally) into a higher tax bracket and the total additional tax by 1981 will be about \$8 billion.

While Congress can crow about balancing the budget, John Q. Citizen isn't fooled — he'll be paying the largest tax tab in America's history.

Some of us on the Budget Committee came close to turning things around this year. Indeed, the fact that we cut some government spending in FY-1980, moved toward a balanced

budget in 1981, and left some room for a tax cut in 1982 represents a step forward.

But it's a bit much to paint a rosy picture of a balanced budget without telling taxpayers that they will pay for the easel.

President Carter's recent proposal to remove price controls on domestically produced oil was a bold, albeit overdue, step to loosen the stronghold the OPEC nations have on us.

Although few people, within or without Capitol Hill, are totally happy with all aspects of the President's proposal, he has at least taken the initiative to come to grips with our energy problem.

And make no mistake about it, we are in an energy crisis. It's somewhat amazing to me that many Americans continue to maintain that the energy crunch is a fabrication by the government or oil companies or both.

Concerning the President's request for a "windfall profits tax," a classic confrontation could be brewing between the President and Sen. Russell Long, D-La.

Sen. Long is almost certain to write into that profits tax a provision for a "plowback" of tax revenue to the oil industry for additional energy exploration.

With the oil industry fighting the profits tax and Congress leaning toward a "plowback" provision in that tax, the night could become heated.

Hopefully, though, the American taxpayer will emerge the winner in the long run.

SANTA FE—New Mexico might not be too good at doing away with crooks, but it sure can dispose of policemen.

Take John (Pete) Donahue. He's an old New York City cop, who became deputy director of the Governor's Organized Crime Prevention Commission. Most of the law enforcement folks who worked with him felt he was extremely skillful at what he was called

on to do.

Then he and his boss, Harris Hartz, had a disagreement (of what kind always referred to as "philosophical") and Donahue bit the dust.

Not very gracefully, either. We could assume that Hartz wanted him to resign (that's the more graceful way to do things in government), but he evidently wouldn't, so Hartz fired him.

I all happened over a week-end, and Brother Cypryan Luke, who runs the College of Santa Fe and is chairman of the Crime Commission, said he "couldn't locate the Governor" to tell him about it. That left Governor King looking a little foolish on Monday, when he was still talking about Donahue as though the execution might not take

place.

It had. The show was over—leaving the Governor mumbling something like "Well, we'll have to see about that."

Also going at nearly the same time was Sam Papich, ex-FBI man who founded the Crime Commission. He's been a consultant to that group, but when they fired Pete he decided he didn't want to play anymore.

Then there was Steve Lagomarsino, deputy to Chief Martin Vigil of the State Police. He didn't exactly get axed. He was just told that he has been reduced to captain and shipped off to Raton to close out his 25-year career in peace and quiet.

That one was a little sudden.

After all, when the Legislature took the State Police out of the Criminal Justice Department and made them independent again, they said the effective date wasn't till July 1 of this year. But Chief Vigil and Mahlon Love, reinstated by Governor King as chairman of the State Police Board, just couldn't wait till then. They rushed right in to bust Lagomarsino (who reportedly thought little of Love's compulsion to dress up and act like a copper, and said so vehemently). The reason they gave was that Lagomarsino wasn't "loyal."

Outside of the fact that you never make enough money, it seems there are other reasons not to become a cop these days.

Then, out in sunny California, there's an FBI man named Melvin Flohr who will soon be out of work if ex-Governor Jerry Apodaca or Albuquerque attorney Bill Marchiondo have anything to say about it.

He's the one who intercepted the phone calls in which some two-bit hood bragged about having "taken care" of Apodaca, for whom he said Marchiondo was "bag man."

Apodaca called him a naughty name, right in front of the TV cameras. Wants him investigated and fired, etc., etc.

It was Gilbert and Sullivan, wasn't it, who wrote the rousing song about how "A Policeman's Lot Is Not a Happy One"?






