## Capitan School Budget Approved; Elementary Plans Reviewed

Three resignations, approval of a \$15,000 operational budget, hiring of personnel and a review of elementary plans occupied the Capitan School Board before a capacity crowd.

Resignations from Principal T.L. Brooks, teacher Gerald Heade, and cook Lynne Story were approved. Superintendent Clifton recommended hiring Glen Crane. The board approved the hiring for principal 1979-80. Approved for rehiring were 16 teachers.

An operational budget, audited by Hager, Holloman and MacKay, Clovis, for \$15,000 was approved. Concern over a state recommendation that lunch and activities funds be included in operational budgets was discussed. The

purpose of this, Clifton stated, was to provide a standard format for all state schools. The proposed budget will not be officially approved until it is by the State Auditor.

Calendar for 1979-80 was approved after discussion on when to make-up snow days. Board member Phillips was not in favor of make-up at the end of the year but preferred make-up during spring break.

Architect Ron Hutchinson discussed the operational plans. These were based on recommendations given by the board earlier this month. One item of interest was the elevation of the building. Hutchinson stated a fall of three feet was determined after

elevations had been taken. To accommodate this, the building will have two levels, the difference handled with ramps.

The new school will be 18,403 square feet and a cost estimate figured by a private estimator was put at \$48.12 per sq. ft. Hutchinson stated the estimator had averaged a 2-5 percent error in previous estimates.

A proposed enclosed kindergarten play area and folding partitions in three classrooms were eliminated. A cut of \$3,400 will be made from the cost by deletion of the play area. One folding partition was approved, allowing if one as opposed to three are used then then one can be better quality.

Doubled glazed windows, recessed sixteen inches, exterior split rib block and, budget allowing, exposed laminated wood beams were explained. The double glazed windows will decrease heat loss, split block will eliminate the need for stucco and is low maintenance. The beams were added for architectural design.

Hutchinson stated about \$60,000 was needed for remodeling the intermediate building which will tie onto the new building. But he added, \$15,000 would probably be minimal.

Discussion about bids, scheduled for August 1979, cleared some uncertainty about refusal of bids. The board was told that a bonded company with a low bid must be accepted or all bids must be refused. It costs about \$2,000 each time bids are taken.

The board gave the architect the go ahead on the construction document.

## The Quiet Splendor of a Past Age — Paden's Drug Store

U.S. 54 goes right by the Gift Gallery on "E" Avenue, former Paden's Drug. Many tourists stop to stretch their legs, buy a postcard to mail a friend, or buy a souvenir to take back home. A souvenir of Carrizozo, county seat of historic Lincoln County.

Tourists sit at the old-fashioned soda fountain counter enjoying a drink, a cope or just a plain dish of vanilla ice cream. They notice the elegant back bar with elaborate mirror and other fine cabinet work.

On one side of the drugstore they see sixty (60) drawers with procelain knobs. Words are written on each huge knob, like: insect powder, syringes, sulph. sublim., corks, piltula, sassafras, canary seeds, linum, camphora, pumex, resina, heretum, ammon. mur.

The atmosphere of the place reminds them of days gone by. They almost expect an apothecary to appear and prepare a drug prescribed by a country doctor. A druggist or pharmacist was once called an 'apothecary'. Although no prescribed drugs are available today, the local folks enjoy a stop at the Gift Gallery to sample the fountain service and browse. The place brings back nostalgic reminders. This building changed owners three times, but still remained 'Paden's Drug' to towns people.

The building was closed for 2 years before Roy Dow, present owner, bought the place and relocated his first Gift Gallery from down the street, into Paden's Drug.

As the years rolled by, every generation recalls their times at Paden's Drug. E.S. "Red" Eaker,

pharmacist, (who passed away in '78) was the second owner. He and his family lived upstairs. Dolly Ward and teen-age daughter, Betty Lou, were employed there. Others who worked for Red were Louie Sandoval and Bobby Lenard, local youths. Red remarried and retired.

Alamogordo pharmacist, E.S. "Curly" Burns, who now lives in Hobbs, N.M., purchased the building from Red. He and his family also lived in the quarters upstairs. Dolly Ward was still the friendly woman who waited on customers and wrapped gifts.

Pharmacist Ray Sanchez, the next owner commuted from Alamogordo to serve the community. Three local ladies dispensed cokes, coffee and clerks: Yolanda Hernandez Roper, Belinda Hernandez, and Rita Sanchez Narvaez.

Some people ask where did the name "Paden" come from? It was Melvin G. Paden, M.D., the doctor-pharmacist-surgeon and on occasion, dentist, that sold the place to Red.

Talking to area people about Dr. M.G. Paden brought back many happy memories of the original owner of the drugstore. How did Paden's Drug come about? The story begins in White Oaks.

In 1879 gold was discovered in White Oaks. This event resulted in the White Oaks gold rush and the establishment of a post office on June 4, 1880. The White Oaks Post Office was named for the trees at the old spring and John M. McCutcheon was the first postmaster.

Dr. M.G. Paden came to Lincoln County in 1890, locating at White Oaks,

and practiced his profession in his home. (Mr. and Mrs. Robert Bohks live in that house now.) Western frontier life marks one of the most exciting chapters in American history. The search for gold attracted miners to the western mountains. The western frontier produced many colorful figures such as Billy the Kid, who symbolized outlaws who "died with their boots on."

It is in this era that Dr. M.G. Paden established his profession at White Oaks. Dr. Paden later owned and operated a drugstore in this booming gold camp. Today the foundation of this drugstore still exists and a few of the corner bricks remain.

From the White Oaks Eagle-1900 . . . "Dr. M.G. Paden went to Nogal, Monday, where a Game Warden, he went to prosecute A.C. Storm for a violation of a fish law. The charge against Storm was destruction of fish in Eagle Creek by allowing sawdust from his mill on that stream to dispoist in the river . . . The defendant was fined \$25,000 and costs of suit."

Among the many buildings in busy White Oaks that saw much activity was the Exchange Bank, whose second story housed three lawyers: W.C. McDonald, later the first governor of New Mexico; H.B. Ferguson, delegate to Congress, and John I. Hewitt, a politician of territorial days. During the two decades when White Oaks was at its peak, Madame Varnish, dealt roulette and poker.

The slow down of mining operations and the closing of the Post Office in White Oaks marked the end of a community which started as one of the

most promising in New Mexico. (The Post Office was closed May 30, 1954. Roberts.)

The 'Iron Horse' came as the first great transportation achievement of the machine age. As railroads were built across the United States, they opened up wide farming and ranching areas. Towns sprang up along the tracks. Railroads played a leading part in the development of the western United States.

Carrizozo had its beginnings with

the coming of the El Paso and Northeastern Railroad in 1899. With the construction of a roundhouse and shop, many men were employed. Carrizozo became a supply center and shipping point.

Dr. M.G. Paden moved to Carrizozo in 1906 when he was appointed division surgeon of the El Paso and Southwestern Railroad. Many of the furnishings of his White Oaks drugstore are in the Gift Gallery. Dr. Paden's first drug store in Carrizozo was a small

wooden structure that still exists today. (See photo, compliments of Albert Roberts.) In 1909 the doctor constructed a brick building, and in 1913 added a second story. Downstairs was the office and drugstore, upstairs housed a hospital.

Laura Sullivan Scharf was the registered nurse in this Carrizozo business. Dr. Paden had a pharmacist, Ross, who assisted him in town as the

doc was the railroad doc and often traveled by freight train to hurt or ill railroaders. Many times he went by horse and buggy to make house calls to patients in Carrizozo and surrounding areas.

Dr. Paden was a dedicated man in his profession. He was said to take post graduate courses at Rush and John Hopkins to keep informed of new ideas in his line of work. He was not a 'Take-two-aspirin, call-me-in-the-morning' type of physician. He had a wonderful philosophy on life. He had many friends.

John A. Haley, prominent in education, political, fraternal and newspaper life of the County and state, had a close friendship with Dr. Paden. Haley was the original owner, publisher and editor of the 'Carrizozo News'. Haley's daughter, Aileen Haley Lindamood, remembers the tonsillectomy performed by Dr. Paden.

On one occasion Dr. Paden, who raised pigeons, presented Aileen's aunt with a squab, that he advised she cook and feed to little Aileen "to whet up her appetite". Dr. Paden, the Haley family physician attended John A. Haley in his terminal illness until his death in 1932.

Dr. Paden, according to friends and patients was a wonderful person. He told the most interesting stories, some that could "keep you in stitches".

Albert Roberts (who was delivered by Dr. Paden) recalled the time Dr. Paden told him of his adventures at sea before he left Virginia to come to Lincoln County. Paden twice sailed around the "Horn" in sailships, which carried loads of grain. Sometimes the ships would be at sea for six months.

Before arriving in White Oaks, Dr. Paden told Albert about an interesting campsite incident near Fort Sumner, New Mexico. Paden was introduced by a fellow camper to "a William H. Bonney." Paden recalled that this was the closest he came to Billy the Kid, New Mexico's number one bad man.

The mention of Dr. Paden to local folks brought back much reminiscing:

Mrs. Sabino Vidaurri recalls that Dr. Paden delivered two of her children. In those days, what supplies were not available to her family at 'Vidaurri's Grocery' could be found at Paden's Drug.

Euda McMillan Roberts, whose dad Henry Walter McMillan worked at the White Oaks Power Plant, remembers coming to Carrizozo and going into Paden's where she would see the stuffed heads of wildlife on the drugstore wall. With a twinkle in her eye she recalled that, "...we kids used to give him (Paden) a time."

Leandro Vega remembers the doctor had a "beautiful personality". Paden traveled by horse and buggy to 'doctor' the family of Jose M. Vega and his wife, Josefita, Leandro's parents, who lived on the old Vega Ranch near Nogal.

Juanita Pacheco Gallegos fondly remembers that she would purchase her school text books at Paden's, along with a soda. Luciano Gallegos, who later became her husband, said two of his cousins had died of diphtheria, but he escaped death from the dreaded disease with Dr. Paden's help. Luciano remembers mischievously eating an apple or two from Dr. Paden's orchard. Dr. Paden had a family home where the Racher place is now located.

As a young 'un, Larue Lane Wetzel of White Oaks, her smaller brothers and sisters and their parents, Allen and Eillan Lane, would drive over a bumpy wash-board dirt road into various Carrizozo businesses for groceries, farm supplies and ended with a treat to the Paden fountain. Larue still has the 'rhythmic' text book she purchased at Paden's.

Dr. Paden delivered many babies,

among them Johnson Stearns, Larue Lane Wetzel, Albert Roberts, and Cecilia Vidaurri Ortiz and many more. The kindly doctor set many bones, performed many tonsillectomies, made ointments and prepared his own prescriptions for his patients in Carrizozo and surrounding areas.

Bill Nickels and Alvin "Shorty" Carl were two clerks at Paden's in later years. Shorty recalls one incident when Dr. Paden was both patient and doctor. When Paden got a severe case of food poisoning and nearly died, Shorty slept over for several days to assist the Doctor in his illness and give medications as directed by the patient—Dr. Paden.

'Mansanea' an herb, was often sold to his customers of Mexican and Spanish ancestry, who would prepare and use it as calamine lotion. The store stocked mainly herbs and other drugs, but household and farm 'potions' would be available along with school supplies, personal items, and the now extinct 'penny candy'. A trip into town for 'provisions' usually included a stop at a mercantile to purchase calico for clothes and quilt making.

Dr. Paden was a man of many interests. Until his concern of the lack of safety of careless hunters, he was an avid hunter. "Shorty" would often accompany the doctor on hunting jaunts when business was slow. Turkey, quail, deer, wildcat and wolf were some of the heads on the drugstore wall. Paden did his own taxidermy, the art of preparing, stuffing and mounting animals so as to appear lifelike. Roy Harmon agreed that the fascinating Dr. Paden was a well-liked and respected man in the community. The doctor remained as a consultant to Dr. Johnson in Carrizozo after retirement, although some think he never retired for good. In his old age, Paden, moved to White Oaks with family friends for a spell. They were Ellyn Queen Cady's parents, Ed and Mae Queen. (Ed Queen was a miner who worked the mines about 1902 with two partners, Allen Lane and D.L. Jackson.

MELVIN G. PADEN M.D.

Is a native of West Virginia, born in Paden's Valley, that state. He received his early education at the local public

schools, and his medical schooling at Louisville, Kentucky, graduating in 1886. He came to Lincoln County in 1890, locating at White Oaks. He married in 1886 Miss Belle Williams of Paden's Valley, W. Va. (deceased 1910.). He has two sons, Morgan Brent Paden, 26, (bookkeeper at Carrizozo Trading Co.) and Dr. Melvin G. Paden, Jr., 23, house surgeon at Nassau Hospital, Nassau, Long Island, now on vacation in California. Dr. Paden, Sr., devoted several years to post-graduate work at the Hudson Street Hospital, New York City, and did special work at the New York Post-graduate College. Since graduation he has practiced his profession at his home in White Oaks, moving to Carrizozo in 1906, when he was appointed division surgeon of the El Paso & Southwestern R & R, which position he has since held. He is a member of the Surgeons' Association of the Southwest, and county health officer for Lincoln County, 1916-13. Address, Carrizozo, N.M.

Roy Dow's Gift Gallery has an interesting background. Roy will soon have the soda fountain in complete operation, and plans to make authentic 'old fashion' ice cream treats. Although prescribed drugs are no longer available, Roy offers a wide variety of items, (leather goods, onyx, velvet paintings, school supplies, novelties, sewing and hair care notions. Roy has started a paperback book exchange and has on hand 45 RPM records, cassettes and 8 track tapes of the top 50 sellers or will order on request.

The Gift Gallery belongs to the AFS Floral Wire Service and deals in flowers, plants, dried and fresh flower arrangements. Customers are able to send and receive telegrams and money orders, as a Western Union Agency is located there. Roy even serves as an agent for electrical repairs and supplies through Stan Shields of Tularosa.

Roy's ancestors date back to the Lincoln County War and Billy the Kid days. Roy's grandfather was George W. "Dad" Peppin, who was a Lincoln Sheriff in 1878, appointed by Governor Axtell to replace John Copeland. Eugene and Jennie (Peppin) Dow were born in Lincoln, N.M. The Dow couple moved to Carrizozo in 1931. The Dow's family included eight sons and three daughters. Seven sons and one sister served in the Armed Forces during WWII. The oldest son, Ben who recently passed away in California, was a veteran who was a prisoner of the Japanese for 37 months when he served for his country.

Roy was born in 1932 and attended grade school in the old Carrizozo School building, which he remembers as a grand place with a wide staircase to the second floor and the auditorium. Sometimes he was fortunate to help in ringing the old bell. The old courthouse grounds was a place Roy and friends spent many happy hours, playing game, and roller skating. Their favorite hangouts were at Paden's Drug or Rollands' Drug stores. At one or the other they would meet for cherry cokes or cherry tyme candybars.

The old railroad depot and other buildings once located on the Southern Pacific grounds were the scene of many long hours of play for young Roy and his friends. They played among the railroad cars until the stationmaster would chase them off. They used to meet all the troop trains during the war years and mail letters or run errands for the soldiers.

Roy's first job in Carrizozo was for Mrs. Era Smith, publisher and Editor of the 'Lincoln County News'. He worked there after school and Saturday mornings setting type. One experience he has never forgotten was when the publisher's daughter, Catherine (Cornett) introduced all the new employees to their first glimpse of 'type lice' (louse).

Youngsters were fortunate to have a job that paid \$3.00 per week and a free pass to the picture show on Saturday or Sunday afternoons. Another job Roy had was with the J.G. Moore Insurance Agency. Operating the Western Union telegraph service was among his duties.

Later Roy worked for Mr. and Mrs. Sitton at the Lyric, as usher. Roy also popped the corn and recalls Mrs. Sitton being a little upset when she would see the popcorn coming out too yellow because of Roy's free hand in the oil. Still Roy sold all the popcorn. The Sittons were great people to work for, Roy fondly remembers.

At the Carrizozo Hardware, Roy gathered much experience as a bookkeeper. In 1943 Roy's sister Esther Lewis was the manager of the Western Union Office in town. Here Roy worked as messenger and also learned about operating a teletype.

By the time Roy graduated from Carrizozo High in 1950, he had already had much experience in the business world. He was in the Air Force from 1951 to 1955, stationed in Albuquerque; St. John's Newfoundland and Kelly, AFB, Texas. Returning home he worked at nearby Holloman AFB,

Alamogordo, later transferred to Walker AFB at Roswell.

In Lubbock, Texas, Roy attended Draughon's Business College. He started work in Dumas, Texas in 1957 for Western Union, where his sister Esther Lewis was again a manager. In the following years he was employed for many years for Western Union in many positions, some in management. Locations included Alamogordo, Las Cruces, Lordsburg, Carlsbad, Albuquerque and into Colorado. As relief manager he traveled in New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas. 



## County Commission Narrows To Five For Managers Job

The Lincoln County Commission narrowed the list of applicants for the job of County Manager to a final five names. The commission has decided to conduct interviews with Christopher Hagg, Rick Island III, John S. Kormanik, Santa Fe; David House, Labadieville, La.; Thomas M. Faughn, D'Land, Florida; and Spencer Bert Atkins from Alamogordo.

The county manager's job has been vacant for several weeks after the resignation of Les Olsen. Mr. Olsen took over the County Managers job for Eddy County at that time.

In the interim, each county commissioner has been the acting manager on a rotating basis for a week at a time.

In other commission business, the Lincoln Historical Commission appeared before the County Commission in regard to their amendment to their town ordinance number 17, which defines the boundaries of Lincoln.

The Joint Powers agreement with the Extra Territorial Commission ended with the body recommending that the existing subdivision ordinances were

sufficient in the Ruidoso to Capitan area. The group disbanded after their recommendation.

Walt Wilson was appointed to the Planning and Zoning Commission to fill the unexpired term of John Allen Hightower.

Ursula Chavez, from the Hondo area was appointed to the Health Systems Agency, Sub-area Council.

The Commission also voted that they would like to increase the Road Tax on Subdivisions, but decided to take no action until public hearing could be arranged.

Corona School System and their school buses received permission from the commissioners to use the County Frequency so that in bad weather the buses can be in contact with school officials if an emergency arises.

## Citizens State Bank Provides Scholarship

Citizens State Bank of Carrizozo has agreed to provide a scholarship to the Roswell Campus of Eastern New Mexico University for a Lincoln County high school senior interested in one of the vocational courses offered on the Roswell Campus.

Seniors at high schools in Capitan,

Carrizozo and Corona are eligible to apply, according to Johnson Stearns, president of Citizens State Bank who authorized the scholarship. The scholarship is worth \$200 per semester for two semesters or \$412 per year. The Roswell Campus offers over a dozen vocational courses as well as two years of academics in most majors.

The Roswell Campus is one of the few two-year institutions in the Southwest to have dormitory and cafeteria facilities for students who must reside on campus.

Stearns said he is hopeful that students using the scholarship will obtain job skills and then return to the Carrizozo-Capitan-Corona area to work. The Citizens State Bank scholarship will be administered through the ENMU Roswell Foundation, a non-profit corporation dedicated to furthering the progress and image of ENMU-R. The foundation offers several scholarships each year on its own.

Students enrolled in vocational courses attend classes or arts in labs 30 hours per week. Courses range from nine months to two years in length.

Counselors at Capitan-Carrizozo-Corona high schools have full information on the scholarship for interested students.

## M-Y T-I-M-E . . . . .

We can learn from nature, if we want. I was reading the other day of a biological experiment involving the common everyday frog. Most times the frog knows when to move to avoid danger, but as it would seem almost human like, the frog loses every time in one test of his ability to recognize danger and do something about it.

If a frog is placed in a pan of warm water, the frog most times will contentedly sit there. Now if you very gradually raise the temperature of the pan of water, the frog every time will remain seated. The frog will show no inclination to escape danger, boiling to death. He could easily hop his way to safety, but he is apparently thinking about something else. He will just sit there, contently peering over the edge of the pan while the steam curls around his nose.

Eventually the boiling frog will pass on to his reward, having fallen prey to a misfortune that he could easily have avoided.

If you set a frog in a boiling pan of water, zap, he jumps out of there quicker than you can say, "Jack Robinson".

Alas, though, if you turn the heat up very slowly, you can send his saddle home, because it will never occur to the frog to move.

Americans seem to fall victim to the same inadequacy. In a period of a few years, we have seen the decline and fall of almost every aspect of our lives. The moral fiber of our kids, the economic stability of our country, the military might of our nation, and many more areas.

These things have happened slowly so that the American public could be lured into staying in the pan of water. Starting with the growth of our bureaucracy, note that while the U.S. population multiplied 60 times from 1789 to 1974, the size of the government bureaucracy in the same period of time multiplied a whopping 8,170 times. In just 80 years the federal budget has increased, a frog strangling, 15,885 percent. From 1952 to 1972 the public payroll grew from \$35 billion to \$150 billion.

Today one in every six Americans works for the government, and since 1960, 236 new Federal agencies have been created.

Mind you this is us turning up the fire on ourselves. The government spends \$1.26 billion per day, \$2 million per hour, \$871,000 per minute, and \$14,600 per second. Now comes the biggest hoax. The government tells us that we are 600 billion in debt and we shudder. When was the last time that the government and the elected have admitted that we are 3.4 TRILLION dollars in debt in our social security system.

We have elected the ones that say them magic words, "free" until the fire is burning briskly.

Also we have accepted a slowly deteriorating "youth scene" without uttering a croak of protest.

Narcotic and alcohol usage by America's youth is an indescribable shame. The "Playboy" philosophy has been accepted as the banner of the new generation.

Many of our difficulties with the present generation of your people began in the tender years of their childhood. There is a critical period during the first four or five years of a child's life when they can be taught proper attitudes. These early concepts became rather permanent. If it is important to produce respectful, responsible young citizens, then we should set out to mold them accordingly. The point is obvious, heredity does not equip a child with proper attitudes; children will learn what they are taught.

Respectful and responsible children result from families where the proper combination of love and discipline is present. An absence of either is disastrous.

The central cause of the turmoil among the young must again be found in the tender years of their childhood. We demanded neither respect nor responsible behavior from our children and it should not be surprising that some of our young citizens are now demonstrating the absence of these virtues.

And further, most employers will admit that the quality of most American workers is terrible. In Lincoln County we are lucky that the work ethic is still in force for some, but at other coast, workers no longer feel compelled to give value for value received.

I was talking to the manager of a department store in Alamogordo the other day, and he mentioned that he had moved from Los Angeles a few months before. Out here he said at least some of the workers felt obligated to work for their wage.

Again our "give away" society has given the wrong impression to the workers of America. Nothing is for free, at least for long it isn't.


Come on sunrise, a new day is coming, a day of reckoning when we will not have the money for all of these give aways and they will end. It is as simple as that.

This country was founded under a principle known as "value for value". You do a day's work and you get a day's wages. Value for value was the way we operated business when we were trading potatoes for corn, or lumber for beef.

Gradually, much like the frog sitting in the pan, we have changed to "Give me-for nothing" society.

It is the same for our country as it is for the computer programming job. If you put garbage into the system, you will get garbage out. This country is only as good as the people that are in it.

If you want value from this country, you must give value, or someday, and sooner than you think, the temperature will rise until we very quietly expire. MS
