Airport Problems Discussed

A new proposal to take over management of the Carrizozo Municipal Airport. A trustee says that the town is in violation of its own codes. A letter of complaint against a city police officer. Two resignations from the Recreation Committee. These and many other items were discussed at the regular meeting of the Town of Carrizozo held May 16. Many items were tabled because the town attorney was not able to be present, due to illness.

Mary Rich, on behalf of her client, Alpha Minerals introduced the new proposal of submitting an application to take over management of the airport, despite the fact that the town is currently under contract with Yellow Bird, Inc., whose president Ben M. Morris was present.

Ms. Rich informed the board what her client could offer, for example: 24 hour service, increased air travel, necessary equipment, and 15 percent gross profit to the town. She added pessimistic opinion that Yellow Bird will fulfill their contract obligations. Ms. Rich stated that the airport is "not the pride of the town anymore," and her client would "endeavor to maintain the airport in the proper way".

Morris responded by saying that no service was available for four years prior to his contract. He added that he cleaned the airport and is presently in the process of locating a proper site to construct a hanger. He admitted he did not expect to make it "another Albuquerque International," but that he was making every effort to live up to his contract. Earlier in the meeting Mayor English read the following letter, a report of airport progress as requested by the board in a previous meeting:

Dear Mr. English:
Doug Jarrard has informed me that your next council meeting will be the 2nd Monday in May.

I intend to attend it if possible. But since my work may not allow I am giving you a progress report concerning the airport.

1. I am presently working out of Carrizozo and on a U.S. Fish & Wildlife contract with my helicopter and have been since 26 April.
2. From the Carrizozo base I have grossed approx. \$15,000.00 since 25 March with the helicopter operation. New Mexico State University Bureau of Land Management-U.S. Fish & Wildlife.

3. I do have aviation fuel available. And have applied for my guaranteed availability of same from Department of Energy because of my Federal & State contracts.

4. I am financially ready to construct a hanger as soon as location is determined.

5. I have just purchased another helicopter from the Ventura, California Sheriff's department.

6. One helicopter will be permanently based here at Carrizozo. Of course that does not mean it will be physically here all of the time.

7. Fixed wing instruction will again be available with my nephew setting up the instruction program for both fixed wing & helicopter.

8. Enclosed is my financial statement in case it is of interest to the council. Also a copy of present aircraft rates.

9. Prices on fuel tanks for underground installation are 4000 gal approx. \$1,171.00 8,000 gal. \$1,980.00.

10. I have installed a new wind sock & purchased two spares.

The following comments by Ms. Rich and Morris; Jim Jones, secretary-treasurer Alpha Minerals took the floor and approached the council. He informed them that in the one and a half years Yellow Bird was in management, that there was no radio communication, no one available for fueling, and weeds obstructed strip lights.

Morris at one point attempted to respond but was requested by Jones not to interrupt. Jones went on to say that the airport is well located, is a good energy strip, and a credit to the community if well-equipped and that Alpha Mineral is "ready to move in."

Mayor English said regardless of outcome, the town will install vassa lights, and a pump on an existing city-owned tank. Morris added that he

M-Y T-I-M-E

I went to several graduations, and instead of my usual column, I am presenting the speech given by James Lueras of Carrizozo. I feel this graduate thinks very much as I do.

Good evening Ladies and Gentlemen. And welcome to the 1979 commencement exercises. I would like to read to you a newspaper clipping and dedicate it to all teenagers.

Three teenage boys, products not of the slums but of a very good suburb of Cleveland, have been found guilty of 11 burglaries. Why did they commit them? They had "nothing to do."

This case inspires us to present a message we have been saving for just such an occasion. The words were delivered by a juvenile court judge — one who speaks to young people every day. This is his message:

"Always we hear the plaintive cry of the teenager: 'What can we do? Where can we go?' The answer is clear: Go home! Hang the storm windows, paint the woodwork, rake the leaves, mow the lawn, wash the car, learn to cook, scrub the floors, repair the sink, build a boat, get a job. 'Help the minister, priest or rabbi. Help the Red Cross, the Salvation Army. Visit the sick, assist the poor, study your lessons, and when you're through, read a book.

"Your parents to not owe you entertainment. Your community does not owe you recreational facilities. The world does not owe you a living. You owe the world your time and your energy and your talents so that no one will be at war, in poverty, sick or lonely again."

"In plain, simple words, grow up. Quit being a crybaby. Get out of your dream world and develop a backbone, not a wishbone. Start acting like a man or a woman.

"You're supposed to be mature enough to accept some of the responsibility your parents have carried for years. They have nursed, protected, helped, appealed, begged, excused, and tolerated you and denied themselves needed comfort so that you could have every benefit.

"You have no right to expect them to bow to your every whim and fancy.

"In heaven's name, grow up.

Tell me honestly are we the Graduation Class of 1979 really mature. Stop and think. You always seem to hear those famous words. I'm 18 years OLD now I'm considered an adult. Our age doesn't make us adults our minds do, when we are ready to take on the changes that life has to offer instead of sitting on our chairs and being critics. Then that is when we are considered ADULTS, when we are ready to gather up all our courage and sail our ships on the open sea. Then that is when we are considered ADULTS, when we are willing to break that barrier between student and teacher, between child and parent and realize that they are the best thing that ever happened to us. Then my friends, we are considered adults.

Fertilizing Rangeland Increases Beef Production

FORT STANTON - Research conducted at the Fort Stanton Experimental Ranch shows that ranchers could double their stocking rates if they fertilize their blue grama rangeland with 40 pounds of nitrogen per acre.

According to Dr. Arnold Nelson head of NMSU's animal and range sciences department, the nitrogen fertilizer studies began 12 years ago.

"At that time our researchers studies small plots of blue grama grass to find out what nitrogen application rates would produce the best growth in blue grama grass. Once those rates were determined, we transferred our studies to Fort Stanton pastures where we applied 40 pounds of nitrogen fertilizer per acre. We then measured the weight gains made by cattle feeding on the fertilized pastures."

Nelson adds that "grazing 100,000 yearlings on fertilized blue grama range has the potential for a \$2.5 million increase in annual cattle sales in just New Mexico."

Almost 100% Placement

Roswell Campus of E.N.M.U. Offers Wide Variety in Vocational Courses

Over 300 students are taking vocational courses on the Roswell Campus of Eastern New Mexico University while another 800 students are seeking a two-year Associate of Arts degree in academics.

The Roswell Campus has over a dozen vocational courses leading to an Associate of Applied Science degree. This college year, for the first time, college credit is offered for vocational courses.

The Roswell Campus produces about 50 nurses (R.N.'s) per year, as well as a number of dental assistants. Vocational courses on the Roswell Campus include Air Conditioning and Refrigeration, Aircraft Maintenance Technology, Meatcutting, Office Occupations, Watch Repair, Welding, Dental Assistant, Petroleum Technology, Mid-Management and Parts Counterman.

The newest program is the Petroleum Technology course, a two-year course emphasizing drilling, well servicing, and production. A student may take part of the whole or the whole.

The Roswell Campus also produces some 25 or more aircraft mechanics per year. It is the only school training aircraft mechanics in New Mexico. Currently a \$1.1 million aircraft mechanics building is nearing completion on campus. The campus has four major vocational buildings.

A placement office on campus insures that graduates will have jobs when they complete training. Placement is almost 100 per cent.

In Air Conditioning and Refrigeration, students learn how to install and maintain refrigeration units in supermarkets, restaurants, etc. and how to service and maintain air conditioning equipment, commercial and domestic.

In Auto Body and Paint, the student learns how to redo wrecked vehicles down to complete new paint jobs. In Auto Mechanics, the student learns under three instructors—each having his own specialties such as air conditioning, tuneup, major overhaul, brakes, etc.

In Electronic Technology, students learn how to service and maintain many types of electronic equipment including radio and TV but not limited to them. This is a highly technical course requiring a good knowledge of math. Meatcutting is a nine-month program where students learn not only how to cut meat, they learn packaging and marketing techniques. Most graduates start at \$5.50 per hour or better, working in supermarkets, frozen food plants, etc. In-office occupations, secretarial students can specialize if they want. They can put emphasis on petroleum—secretarial, legal secretarial, or general secretarial. Or, the student may want to obtain a medical-clerical certificate.

The Watch Repair program was started by the Swiss Watchmakers of America. Students learn to repair all types of timepieces—from antique clocks to electric wristwatches. Jewelry manufacturing and repair is a part of the watchmaking course also.

Welding speaks for itself. Students learn pipe cutting, MIG welding, plate cutting, TIG welding, and other techniques and skills.


Dental assistants are just that—they assist dentists in their offices. Mid-Management teaches students how to be businessmen and businesswomen at the mid-management level—store management, bookkeeping, inventory control, etc.

In the Petroleum Technology course, students do classroomwork, field training in nearby oilfields, and lab work on campus (indoor and outdoor laboratories are maintained.) Students are taught skills which will enable them to go to work in the oilfields with a general knowledge of the many facets of the petroleum industry and with specific knowledge in most areas—especially equipment repair and maintenance.

The Roswell Campus has men and women's dormitories, full cafeteria service, student government, Student Union Building, clubs and organizations, and a good ratio of students to instructor.

In academics, students can emphasize art, Business Administration, Business Education, Communications, Education, English, Nursing, History, Human Services, Math, Natural Science, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology and Speech-Theatre.

Both daytime and nighttime courses are offered in academics.

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Inside the Outdoors

Sit down in your easy chair, lean back, prop your feet up, and think back to your childhood days. Specifically, think back to the times you played animal doctor.

Remember how your little wagon or some kind of cart served as your ambulance, a cardboard or wooden box was a hospital bed, and your cat or dog was your patient? Sure you do.

You probably remember wanting to help other animals too. For example, that baby bird you found under the big tree, remember, the little fellow that could just barely fly. You wanted to help him, so you took him home.

You put him in your little box and began to apply your "treatment." First, you had to feed him - but what? You asked your parents and they said you should put a little feathered friend back where you found him, and that its mother could take care of it better.

Nevertheless, you - with your big eyes - won out and kept your little bird. You tried to feed him everything from worms to bread crumbs, but to no avail. Then one day you went to check on your little friend and found him dead. You learned the hard way that wildlife is just that - wild life.

Perhaps your experience was with a rabbit, or squirrel, or maybe even a deer or antelope fawn. More likely than not though your end result was the same - death of the animal. It is difficult for man to successfully play the mother role to a wildlife species.

Even if the animal is raised successfully in its man-made environment, more often than not it cannot be returned to its wild state and be expected to survive.

You probably noticed during the last few weeks that new life is all around us now. You can see baby birds, baby rabbits, antelope fawns and more.

Just as spring means new life to the animal world, it also means death. Nature has a way of taking lives just as quickly as it may give them.

Severe thundershowers, high winds, extreme drought, freak storms all take their toll among the young wildlife of the year.

Of course, nature alone is not the only limiting factor on spring babies. As always, man enters the picture, and too often, as a villain.

It is not that man intentionally and deliberately kills the young animals. On the contrary, it is mankind's good heart that often leads to the downfall of wild young.

Just as a puppy or kitten might get more attention than do their adult counterparts, young wildlife attract human attention too.

Young animals often appear to be alone and helpless so your first thoughts are probably that the poor creatures have been abandoned. Yet in reality, the mother of the young is watching helplessly from her spot of concealment while you "rescue" her young.

We, the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, would like to remind everyone to think twice before taking young of the wild from its home. And, that if the biological factors and moral factors aren't enough to discourage the "kidnapping" of wildlife, perhaps the laws which protect most of New Mexico's wildlife species against private possession are.

Should you observe one of these spring babies that appears to be abandoned, use your better judgement, and let it be.

If you are certain the young one is abandoned, report it at once to a local game and fish officer.

Finally, if your youngster comes to you with a baby bird, rabbit, etc., in his hands, explain to him the cold, hard facts of the wildlife world. After all, you have the experience of an "animal doctor."

Counseling Center Adds New Counseling Service

Counseling services for individuals and families are now being offered to the community of Carrizozo of the Counseling Center which is located at the Zia School.

Persons who come to the center are those who wish to talk to a counselor about some kind of a personal problem, a marriage, or family difficulty or a problem that is affecting a member of the family.

The Counseling Center which is sponsored by the Lincoln County Mental Health Association, offers additional services to those mentioned above, including a 24-hour HELP line telephone service (1-437-8680), a rape-crisis program, after-care for individuals returning from the Las Vegas State Hospital, and drug abuse counseling.

It is common for people to believe that those who seek help at the Center are individuals who are mentally ill. This is not the case. The large majority of people who are seen are persons who simply need to talk to a counselor about a problem that they are having difficulty resolving. For example, an individual may be facing a crucial decision in his or her life, a behavioral problem with a child in the home, difficulty in resolving grief following the death of a loved one, or an injustice following a divorce.

Services are strictly confidential. Fees for services are based on ones income and no one is refused services due to inability to pay. The Center is funded also by county, state and federal funds.

During Reports from Trustees, Joe Orsak mentioned that the town is in violation of its ordinances: weeds around City Hall, weeds in 'spider' at Spider Park as well as trash and trash containers located there not proper size, not racked or covered.

Orsak went on to read from the Municipal Code of Carrizozo under weeds: 9-4-1 Definition, 9-4-2 Removal required and 9-4-3 Failure to comply. Orsak stated, "City owned properties should set example for town." Mayor English then requested that Emilio Beltran, Town Foreman, give him a list of owners who have been red tagged on improper trash cans. Beltran said 90 percent have been tagged.

Orsak, contacted by the NEWS next day said his philosophy and why he came about to be on the board "centered on three things: (1) that the council operate according to the ordinances and laws of state and federal government; (2) balance budget (3) try to help people and the town."

A letter from Barbara Lovelace was read by Mayor English concerning 'unethical law enforcing methods' of a town policeman, W.A. Bennett. The Mayor will look into the situation. Police Chief Morales was unable to be present at the meeting because of another commitment.

Marcos Barela and Ray Wells turned in their resignation from the Recreation Committee. Positions to be filled later.

Other business at the May 16 meeting included the presence of Sterling Spencer to ask if any methods were being used to contain the litter from blowing out of the landfill. His property is near the landfill. Dirt is used to hold trash down until site is filled and another site is obtained, possible within a six to eight month time frame. Next site will be properly fenced and some type of cover used. Attempts by Attorney Payne to find site continue.

The Mayor read two letters from the Jr. High Language students class in regard to the landfill and potholes. The others pertained to students interest, from stray dogs to town clean-up.

Mary Rich's request for town water from fire hydrants for beautification of a lot next to Santa Rita Catholic Church was approved. This is part of a town beautification endeavor undertaken by the Taeris Foundation, Inc., Chamber of Commerce and various people to fix homes, lots, and business areas. Orsak asked if the group would consider using the 'Spider' at the park as a planter in their project.

Ruth Armstrong, there on behalf of Carrizozo Woman's Club was approved the request of obtaining 14 feet of city owned land for their Community Improvement Project. The club is sponsoring. Plans for 2-four plex apartment for the elderly lacked 12 feet for FHA approval. The apartments to be located across the club building will give all easement rights to the town.

Town clerk Christine Chavez and co-worker Yolanda Roper were granted request of \$100.00 increase in their salaries. The board also approved a 10 percent increase starting January 1, to all employees.

A vacant, dilapidated building on Birch Street was discussed following complaint by citizen. A letter will be sent to owner by Payne. The building, formerly 'Pancho's' is considered a hazard to children.

Jan Geha, director of Zia Senior Citizens Center, asked the Mayor to join the petition to the Governor and other state agencies and officials stating that if New Mexico is "gas rationed," that the center be acknowledged as 'Mas Transit' Travel is an essential part of the Zia program. The board voted to look into this after discussion with town attorney.

ROADBUILDERS: Highway Commission, long in dutch with Governor Apodaca, got into trouble with Governor King. Within hours after meeting with him to get his views on what role they should play in government, they went back and cancelled their own prior approval of \$5 million worth of bonds to be sold. Result was that over \$50 million of summertime highway work wiped out. After Governor heard from highway contractors, who have been known to be politically active, he called Commission back to meet with him and explained to them how the cow ate the cabbage.

WREATH: McKinley county, which went for Governor King last November, is steamed over his naming of another Bernalillo county man to replace Julian Garcia on the Highway Commission. Folks in Gallup say it has been 21 years since their area had a person on the Commission. They don't understand why King would reward big Albuquerque, which went for Joe Skeen in the last election.

Obituary



SENTENCES: New, tougher laws on sentencing of criminals take effect shortly. Under new system, judges must sentence 18 years for those guilty of first-degree felony, nine years for second-degree felony, three years for third-degree felony and 18 months for fourth-degree felony, though they may increase or decrease by no more than one-third for mitigating or aggravating circumstances. Also effective soon is restored death penalty, though few expect to see much use made of this, because of complex circumstances under which it applies and the spirit of the times. Use of firearm in crime and repeated sentencing also bring more time in penitentiary under new laws about to take effect.




