### Carrizozo Town to Clean-up

June 16 is Carrizozo Beautification Day. The Beautification Committee is proud to announce that Rod Green of KOB TV, Albuquerque, has made a commitment to come to Carrizozo on Saturday, June 16 to take part in the community clean-up day and evening bar-be-cue.

America's most visible pollution problem is the trash produced by millions to consumers in our prepackaged society. At every turn we come upon heaps of rubbish or overflowing trash cans. Roadsides as well as streets are littered with beer cans, pop bottles and candy wrappers, etc.

Awareness of this national environmental problem has influenced the Carrizozo Womens' Club to plan a Beautification Day in an effort to inspire individuals, families, groups and churches to join in a day-long clean up.

Sue Stearns, Carrizozo Woman's Club president and Joe Orsak, chairman of the Beautification Drive invite all residents, organizations and churches in Carrizozo to join in the sponsorship and to participate in the drive.

Orsak, who is a Carrizozo town trustee, will soon have a list of all organizations that have made a formal commitment to sponsor the Carrizozo Beautification Drive.

### RC&D Elects Officers

The South Central Mountain RC&D held their annual meeting and election of officers in Carrizozo recently.

Clem Weindorf, Hondo, was elected chairman. Other officers elected were Wally Ferguson, Carrizozo, Vice-Chairman; Delbert Nelson, Roswell, Secretary; and

Johnson Stearns, Treasurer.

Six new project measures were accepted by the Steering Committee. The Capitan, Carrizozo, Weed and Corona schools requested assistance in obtaining Bureau of Outdoor Recreation Grants. These will help improve the schoolgrounds which are used by all in the community for

physical fitness and recreational activities.

The upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District request a coordinated effort to find a suitable location for, and the building of, a baseball park for the community of Capitan.

The Carrizozo SWCD is seeking ways to reduce the gully erosion next to railroads and highway bridges.

Clara Snow suggested that the SCMR&D coordinate an effort to salvage the timber which was washed into the stream channels caused by the winter flooding along the Rio Bonito and Rio Hondo.

Dick Mutz, with the Administrative Services Division of the Natural Resource Dept. in Santa Fe, talked briefly about the five divisions under the Natural Resource Department of the State Planning Office - the Soil and Water Conservation Division, the State Forestry Division, State Parks Division, Game & Fish, and the Administrative Services Division. Each of these offices can in some way help the RC&D on various projects. Mutz reported that grants for rural communities look better this year.

Bud Bagley, Corona, gave his Chairman's Report before leaving office.

He stated that he was proud to serve the SCMR&D for the past several years and told of some of the accomplishments for the year.

Harve Abercrombie, RC&D Coordinator for the SCMR&D, reported that the future of the RC&D looks good according to correspondence received in the RC&D office. Progress on several measures is also excellent.

The next RC&D meeting has been set for July 24th in Alamogordo.

### Fair Board Makes Plans

The Lincoln County Fair Board is making plans for the 1979 Lincoln County Fair Queen Contest to be held during the Smokey the Bear Stampede July 3 and 4. The queen will reign over the Smokey the Bear Stampede and Lincoln County Fair besides representing the county in the State Fair Queen Contest in Albuquerque in September.

There will be a queen clinic again this year on Wednesday, June 27, at 6:00 p.m. at the Capitan Fair Building. The clinic is for all girls interested in competing this year or in future years. Miss Ann Womack, current Lincoln County Fair Queen, will be present to conduct the clinic and help the "hopefuls" with the horsemanship and personality portion. She will also tell of the experiences at last year's state fair contest and inform the contestants as to what to expect at the State Fair - what clothes are needed, approximate costs, etc. The queen contestants will be able to practice speaking over the P.A. system if they want. Ann will also help the contestants with the riding portion and demonstrate the riding pattern to be used, so be sure to bring your horse and hat. Ann Womack, our Lincoln County Fair Queen, did very well at state fair queen competition this past year, as she was selected as first runner-up. This is a real honor and a first for Lincoln County.

The queen contest will be held on July 3, 1979. At 11:00 a.m. there will be a question and answer type personality contest in the Capitan Fair Building. The horsemanship portion will follow at 1:00 p.m. in the fairgrounds arena. The contestants

will be required to wear a dress or nice pant suit during the personality contest, and for the horsemanship contest they must wear blue denim jeans, white shirt, and a hat of their choice. Contestants must be age 16 by September 10, not over 21, and single. She must have also attended a Lincoln County High School. The contestants must agree to appear at all performances of the Smokey the Bear Stampede and the parade on the morning of July 4. The queen will be crowned at the afternoon performance of the rodeo July 4. The queen is expected to conduct the 1980 queen clinic to be held in June of 1980. She must also compete in at least one event of the Lincoln County Fair Rodeo and appear in the Fair parade. The queen will represent the county at the State Fair in Albuquerque.

The queen will receive a trophy queen belt buckle, a tiara, \$50 from the Lincoln County Fair Board, \$50 from the Lincoln County Commissioners, and the entry money from the other queen contestants. Ann is also contacting some local western stores to support the queen contest by donating gift certificates to the queen.

Deadline to enter the contest is Monday, June 18. There is a \$10.00 entry fee for each contestant, with the entry money going to the winning contestant.

Oh we get lip service from Washington about inflation, but at every junction Washington shows no sign of slowing down. In fact while we seem to be balancing the budget, the government will actually be spending more, only with inflation, we will be secretly taxed more.

The Government, though, is us. We are the ones that vote 'em in because they are good ol' boys and will take care of us, (give us as much "free" as is possible). We vote every so many years and collectively send the wolf back since the chickens need guarding. We doom ourselves with the "chicken in every pot" thoughts so that we are our own worse enemy. We are the ones that put up with inflation.

I had a friend that was out of work and he would spout off about the rising inflation was cutting into his unemployment checks. How sad that he may never see the connection between "free" and "taxes" and "inflation". MS

## 'Good Summer Entertainment'

Want to hear a good story, or read a good book, perhaps free information? Then what you need is a visit to the Southeastern Regional Library Bookmobile.

The Bookmobile makes sixty-two stops in communities not served by a public library. Most of these stops are once every four weeks but larger communities such as Carrizozo and Tularosa see the bookmobile twice a month.

Keith Mortrud and Katy Rotan travel over 2300 miles a month in the motorized library. Books are loaned on a four-week basis with no charge, and no overdue fines. Nor do they limit your number of selections.

Selections include a good-sized fiction with plenty of new books rotating amongst the hundreds of borrowers, non-fiction biographies, records, several large-print books, and childrens books. The Bookmobile is a division of the New Mexico State Library providing the reader an even broader selection of books. Requested books will often be mailed to a reader.

Beginning in Lovington, the Bookmobile winds through the backroads to such small communities as Pinon, Weed in the Sacramento Mountains. From there they make an overnight stop and begin the relatively populated stretch between Alamogordo and Tularosa.

After another overnight stop, the long miles between Carrizozo, White Oaks, Capitan and Tinnie are traveled with stops made in each community. From Tinnie it's back to Lovington to get ready for the next jaunt.

The large number of borrowers in Carrizozo has necessitated two stops there, each one on a separate loop from Lovington.

Through all kinds of seasonal weather the bookmobile keeps its stops regularly, deterred by occasional breakdowns and sometimes by such natural things as snowstorms. One can rely upon the Bookmobile to keep their schedule.

In June the Bookmobile will stop in Carrizozo two times. On June 14 and stop will be 9:30 to 11:00 A.M. and June 26, from 2:50 - 4:20 P.M. at the Electric Co. office.

Also on June 14 the Bookmobile will stop in White Oaks 11:30 - 12:15, Capitan, Smokey Bear Cafe 1 - 2 P.M. and Tinnie P.O. 2:30 - 3:00.

Hondo Cafe, June 20, 2:40 - 3:10 and Tuesday June 26 Lincoln P.O. 10:15 - 11:15; Camp Sierra Blanca 11:30 - 12:15, Ft. Stanton 12:20 - 2:00 and back into Carrizozo for the rest of the afternoon.

The Bookmobile is designed to reach everyone, with reading material to suit most tastes, plenty of juvenile and childrens, good fiction and paperbacks too. Southwestern history and books on art, a summers worth of reading available for free.

So when in need of something to do this summer, remember the bookmobile schedule and the next time you see that funny looking van with Southeastern Regional Library printed on its side, step in, and join the growing number of "Bookmobile fans."


### OVER THE SECOND CUP

Know Before You Mow: Grass has a way of growing, whether you want it to or not. It seems that the only way to keep your lawn from looking like a jungle is to keep mowing those blades down.

The most powerful weapon in the homeowner's arsenal for this type of task is the power-mower, or for the bigger objective, the lawn tractor. The trick is not to become a casualty yourself in the unending war against the green menace. Under-writers Laboratories and your local County Extension Service recommend the following guidelines for this year's campaign.

Know how to operate the mower before starting it. Read the instruction manual.

Wear proper clothing. Safety-toe shoes are advisable.

Fill the gas tank outdoors with a funnel away from possible ignition sources. Replace the gas cap firmly.

Check the lawn and remove any obstacles that could be thrown by the mower.

Keep other people out of mowing area.

Never cut grass when it is wet, or there is not enough light.

Be sure the mower is on level ground, disengage all clutches, and stand to one side before starting. Keep hands and feet away from the blade area.

Do not walk in front of the mower's discharge chute while motor is running.

If your mower is self-propelled, it

was designed to go at a certain speed. DO NOT force it to mow faster than that speed.

Make sure all the guards are in place while mowing. Keep blades sharpened.

If mowing on an incline with a walk-behind mower, mow across the incline—never up and down. If using a lawn tractor do the opposite, mow up and down to prevent the tractor from tipping on its side and pinning you underneath.

Lay out the power cord of an electric mower carefully to avoid cutting it with blades. In addition, mow away from the electric outlet so that you will not be constantly crossing the cord and having to move it.

Never leave your mower running unattended. Shut off and disconnect the spark wire or power cord. This should be done whenever you are cleaning or adjusting the mower.

Store gasoline in a UL Listed safety storage can.

Never yank electric power mower cords from the outlet. Always use the proper UL Listed extension cord for use with the mower.

Always keep mower in top operating condition.

If you should hit a foreign object, UL engineers advise to take the following steps:

- 1. Cut off the power. If an electric mower, disconnect.
2. Inspect the mower for damage.
3. Have the damage repaired before restarting the mower.

## Tips on How to Save Gasoline

Looking for a discount on gasoline?

Strange as it may seem today, you can take the equivalent of a 5 percent on all of your gasoline purchases—just by avoiding gasoline waste and planning trips more carefully. The money you save could keep you in tires for the life of the car—or purchase a \$30 gift certificate for whomever or whatever you fancy.

What's more, you can choose among many steps, for it takes only a few convenient changes to add up to impressive gasoline savings. If you're the average individual, driving a private car in an urban area, you use just over two gallons of gasoline per

day. So you'd need to save only 1-10th of a gallon daily to provide what would amount to a 5 percent discount.

Why bother with pennies? The answer is that gasoline costs over 5 cents per mile, or over \$600 per year for the average driver, and the price is rising. Passenger automobiles account for about 31 percent of all the petroleum consumed in the United States, and almost half of the total is imported. And though Americans have cut back the growth rate in overall oil use, their demand for motor gasoline is up substantially.

Here are three gasoline-saving tips to help you—and your country—save this essential fuel:

- 1. Have you had an engine tune-up recently. Do you need one? If your engine is hard to start, hesitates, sputters, idles roughly, or the like—you are losing mileage and should check its condition immediately. You may need to clean and adjust spark plugs and ignition points, replacing if necessary; check timing; and replace air and fuel filter elements. How much you will save on gasoline consumption will depend on the condition of your engine and how much you drive in the course of a year, but savings could range up to 12 percent on your gasoline bills.
2. Drive at a moderate speed. The most efficient range usually is 35 to 45 miles per hour. On the highway, where you may need to maintain a higher speed, stay at 55 mph. Most automobiles get about 18 percent better mileage on the highway at 50 than at 65 mph, and 20 percent better mileage at 55 than at 70 mph. You may note that some drivers abuse the speed limit on highways, but state police are cracking down on speeders.
3. As some states advertise, "Drive Gently." You may have seen such signs on the highways. They mean, first, drive 55. But they also mean keep your eye on traffic ahead,

accelerate smoothly, drive at a steady pace, avoid stop-and-go traffic whenever possible, minimize braking, and never tailgate.



# Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—It's the Legislature that makes the laws and authorizes the expenditures, but it's the administration which actually carries everything out.

Where the two come together is before the Legislative Finance Committee, to which members of the administration come to report how they are doing. Last week it was David King's turn, reporting for the Department of Finance and Administration.

These are some of the things he told us.

The Legislature wasn't just boasting when it said 1979 brought some very substantial tax cuts to the citizens. The 12 laws that cut back taxes have saved the citizens about three-quarters of a million dollars in

the first six months of this year, and during the fiscal year that starts July 1, that total will pass \$60 million dollars. (At this point Joud cheers from the taxpayers. Sixty million certainly ain't hay. Now if MY taxes had just gone down a little more sharply...)

The state will be in good shape when we start the new fiscal year on July 1. We can expect total income to the state this year to run at least \$6.6 million more than out-go, and it could be more than \$21 million more than the state actually spent.

Even if it's just the lower figure, we will end the year with about \$85 million in the bank, as compared to the \$78 million with which we started this year.

But next year, we're going to be glad we had that surplus on hand.

During the 68th fiscal year, which runs from July '79 through June '80, we have already authorized more than \$755 million in expenditures. That's not up too steeply from this year, when inflation is taken into account, but expected revenues won't rise that sharply. (That's the result of those tax cuts we were rejoicing over just a few paragraphs above.) Income that year is only expected to be \$744.6 million. Even those of us who can barely balance a checkbook can see that's more going out than coming in.

So the \$85 million surplus will come in handy when the books have to be balanced at the end of that year. The surplus will go down to \$74 million.

When we're projecting all the way to June of 1980, we know we can't do it with any accuracy. Too many things could happen in the meantime to change our figures. If shortages of gasoline continue in California, for instance, what effect will that have on our tourist industry, since about 60 per cent of those free-spending

travellers we see are either coming from or going to the Golden State? Or suppose the federal government cuts back on revenue sharing. The state is in good shape in this regard because it doesn't spend this money before it gets it, but lots of counties and cities can't make that same statement. If their revenue sharing is cut off, they'll be in Santa Fe crying piteously for help.

But there was one cheering note on the subject of predicting revenues far ahead. Rep. Colin McMillan said he had done some fast calculating and, if Congress does deregulate the price of oil, he figures the state's revenues could go up by about \$50 million. Sort of "free" money, you might say, that we hadn't counted on.

We saved that till last, so we could end this column on a happy note.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — An American legend lies in a hospital as this is written, once again battling the cancer that is threatening to do what only a handful of movie villains ever accomplished; kill John Wayne.

Speaking of "The Duke" in the past tense is a mistake made by many Americans this past few years, as they thought he couldn't possibly whip the disease "this time."

But whip it he did, although it continues to recur and spread. Accesses Maureen O'Hara and Elizabeth Taylor Warner last week appeared before a House subcommittee to request a Congressional gold medal in honor of John Wayne, commemorating him as one of our greatest Americans.

I wholeheartedly concur. Although I didn't and don't always agree with him, I believe that never has one person so represented the values that Americans cherish; values that founded and forged this country, making a progressive civilization from a wild frontier.

Marion Morrison — aka John Wayne — made us feel good about ourselves as he battled wrong — not in the Superman style, but in super American style.

Perhaps some dialogue from one of his movies best personifies The Duke, dialogue that transcended his character of Davey Crickett in "The Alamo" and became Wayne himself:

"Republic. I like the sound of the word. Means people can live free. Talk free go or come, buy or sell, however they choose. Some words give you a feeling. Republic is one of

those words that makes me tight in the throat. Same tightness a man gets when his baby takes his first step, or his first baby shaves, or makes his first sounds like a man. Some words can give you a feeling that make your heart warm. Republic is one of those words.

"When I came down here to Texas I was looking for something. I didn't know what. It seems like you added up my life and I'd spent it all either stompin' other men or, in some cases, gettin' stomped.

"Had me some money and had me some medals, but none of it seemed a lifetime worth the pain of the mother that bore me. It's like I was empty. Well, I'm not empty anymore. That's what's important.

"To feel useful in this old world. To fit a lick against what's wrong, or to say a word for what's right, even though you get whalloped for saying that word. Now I may sound like a Bible-beater yelling up a revival at a river crossing camp meeting, but that don't change the truth none.

"There's right and there's wrong. You gotta do one or the other. You do the one and you're living. You do the other and you may be walking around, but you're dead as a beaver hat."

In our "sophisticated and enlightened" age, some people would brand those words corny, jingoistic, right wing, and other unsavory and erroneous things.

That minority of Americans is entitled to its opinion.

I prefer Ms. O'Hara's opinion, the actress tearfully commenting before the subcommittee, "John Wayne IS America!"

With the signing of House Bill 594, the Health and Environment Department assumes funding and coordination responsibilities for residential treatment of emotionally disturbed children in the State of New Mexico on July 1, 1979. Up to a total of \$886,500 is available for at least 50 youth under 18, who are determined to be in need to such services. It is anticipated that approximately 5 children-youth will remain in their present out-of-state placements for the first year of the program. The average monthly amount available per child is \$1,475.00.

**Definition:**  
A residential treatment facility is a 24-hour facility which operates under the direction of appropriately qualified mental health professionals including but not limited to psychiatrists, psychologists, social workers and psychiatric nurses. A clinical assessment and treatment program in conjunction with an individual treatment plan of services and activities is provided. Lodging and supervision of children are secondary to the primary treatment function.

**The Proposal:**  
The proposal must include but is not limited to the following:  
1. The number and types of children to be served. Specify age and/or diagnostic category limitations if any.

2. Estimated costs per child. (Present available funding averages approximately \$1,475 per child per month.)  
3. Goals, objectives and methodology.  
4. Geographical catchment area.  
5. A description of the facility to be used.  
6. The proposed staffing pattern.  
7. The types of services to be offered. (See below.)

**Included Treatment Services include: (See Standards for Detail.)**  
1. Intake study and treatment planning  
2. Individual therapy and group therapy  
3. Routine daily care  
4. Family liaison and/or therapy  
5. Educational and vocational training  
6. Community consultation and education  
7. Medical and dental care  
8. Transitional treatment  
9. Follow-up coordination with child's home community resources, including outpatient mental health, developmental disabilities and substance abuse services

+Please note that no distinction is made between residential treatment center and therapeutic group home.

**Referral Process:**  
The following process for referral to the program is under discussion within the Division. If a community (i.e., school, court, social services), state agency, and/or the family believes a child may be in need of BHS-supported residential treatment, a referral for an evaluation MUST be made to what are presently known as the juvenile forensic evaluation teams, regardless of

whether or not the child has come into conflict with the law. In those communities where juvenile evaluation teams do not yet exist, the present adult forensic teams will serve this screening evaluation function. These teams cover the entire state, providing diagnostic and evaluation services primarily to the courts and are located in Santa Fe, Roswell, Las Cruces, Albuquerque and Farmington. To avoid delays, additional evaluation back-up will be provided by either the local mental health center or privately contracted professionals. The chief of the local forensic team will arrange for these back-up services when necessary. The evaluation team's recommendation for or against residential treatment and the recommended facility (if the child's needs so dictate) will be sent to the RTP Chief who will review, approve, and verify placement in accordance with the clinical recommendations, provided vacancies are available.

The Interagency Residential Treatment Review Panel, which heretofore served as a screening and placement panel, will act in an advisory capacity to BHS and the Mental Health Bureau Chiefs on policies and procedures, proposal evaluations, site visits and in resolving differences in placement recommendations.

The morning meeting will also be used to discuss any other issues related to the program and will include a briefing on the Division's plans for the program.  
Until contracts are completed in August, 1979, children in residential treatment will continue to be supported through HED.

**Standards and Regulations:**  
Attached to the application are draft forms of the program standards and regulations. Formal public hearings on these will be held separately at a later date, but comments will be welcome at the June 5th meeting.
