Kick-off Set For

1st Annual Beautification Day

The Carrizozo Womans' Club 1st Annual Beautification project will kick-off with a caravan June 15 at 7:00 p.m. and end with a bonfire after the June 16 bar-b-cue picnic.

The caravan which will start at the Rec Center will include firetrucks, police cars and a convertible full of cheerleaders. The Little League teams will join the rally.

Beautification Day activities will begin at 8:00 a.m., Saturday, June 16 with a siren blast from the fire station. The clean-up effort will continue all day until the picnic, scheduled for 6:00 p.m. at the Rec Center.

The Rec Center will also serve as the main information, supply, coordination headquarters and baby-

sitting location for parents participating in the day-long activities. Participants are urged to wear long sleeves, shirts, long pants, boots or proper shoes, gloves and hat or caps.

The town has been divided into seven areas, with an area coordinator assigned to oversee the activities in their location. See town map to determine your location or get a map at a business place. Some pick-up trucks and their owners available for hauling trash that day include: Bob Stearns, Sterling Spencer, Ken Jones, Bobby Dan Crenshaw, Roy Hayhurst and Bob Means.

As an area is policed, people will be shifted to needed areas. Six year olds must be accompanied by parents. Those who wish to work on alleys and streets, may bring along

their equipment (weed-eaters, pruning tools, handsaws, etc.) Call 648-2235 or 648-2398 if you have a removal request or want a work assignment, that requires tools.

Town Council Needs More Time

To Consider Lease

A proposed lease was presented to the Town of Carrizozo Board of Trustees June 11, by Town Attorney Bill Payne for Alpha Mineral Processing Corporation in connection with the Industrial Park.

The Trustees felt that more time was needed to finalize this business proposal. Mayor English wants Alpha Minerals contacted as to when they plan to begin work, so a special Town meeting could be held accordingly.

Trustee Orsak requested that such a meeting be publicized with the local news media, so that residents will know exactly what Alpha Mineral proposes. English said if there was time the meeting would be published.

Orsak voiced strong opinion that this business required a regular

schedule meeting and not a special meeting. A contract figure of "\$1.00 per year on 50 years" was among the many items on the proposed Industrial Park lease that Orsak questioned.

Discussion of swimming pool and hired staff was on the agenda. Following Environmental inspection the pool is scheduled to open for business June 16. A team of two Brenda Lindsay and Tammy Trout will split pool duty responsibility which includes management and life guarding. Mona Payne and Phillip Payne will be the fill-in employees. The handling of pool chemicals was discussed. Town Superintendent Emilio Beltran has been in charge of chlorination.

During the June 11 meeting, a proclamation was read by Town Attorney Bill Payne and signed by Mayor English:

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, The Town of Carrizozo, Lincoln County, New Mexico, is a good place to live, and

WHEREAS, The people of Carrizozo have much to be proud of, and

WHEREAS, no municipality of similar size in the Southwest can equal Carrizozo in what it has to offer its citizens, and

WHEREAS, The people of Carrizozo, in a spirit of cooperation and being concerned with the appearance of the Town, have indicated their desire to improve and make Carrizozo a better place to live and work, and

WHEREAS, a vast majority of the people in Carrizozo desire to evidence their pride in the community of Carrizozo by uniting in an all out effort in cleaning up and doing things to make their Town more beautiful on Saturday, June 16, 1979.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it known that the Town of Carrizozo does hereby proclaim Saturday, June 16, 1979, as BEAUTIFICATION DAY and urges all residents to take part therein and, further to make the month of June an annual clean up month and the third Saturday of June an annual beautification day for the Town of Carrizozo.

Lincoln County

Commissioners Approve 1980 Budget

The Lincoln County Commissioners approved the final 1980 budget draft of \$954,503. general fund and \$713,000 road budget after handling other county business.

Several items on the budget were questioned with last minute changes made, most items were approved.

Cuts were made for vehicles for the property assessment department and to the amount to the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission. Questions were raised on salary promotions and cost of living raises. Budgeted is a 5 percent raise for promotions in addition to the 5 percent annual cost of living raise. The commission approved the proposed promotions to begin the first day of the month after the promotion is approved by the commission. Cost of living will be July 1.

Another personnel question involved budgeting \$1400 to certify sheriff's deputies.

\$6000 for a new county managers car was approved, money to come from Revenue Sharing.

There were questions about money in the Ambulance fund regarding a communication device. Money from Revenue sharing to purchase two trucks for the road department was also questioned, but finally approved.

Fire-Funds found Lincoln and Bonita over-budgeted but will be allowed for.

A special request by Mary Ellen Payne, county home economist, was made for \$1500 to help defray the Carrizozo pool operation costs. The amount was approved and included in the Recreation Fund.

The budget was finally approved and will now be sent to Santa Fe for State approval.

Bud Payne was appointed to the Road Review Board to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of Pat Gnatkowski.

Action on approval of an amendment to Ordinance No. 17 of the Lincoln Town Historical District was tabled until the attorney could be present. The amendment concerns restrictions on trailers and new businesses within zone B of the Lincoln area.

Audit contract was approved with Kniff and Co., Albuquerque for 1979-80.

Approved: CETA summer program, purchase of a validating machine, April-May payroll and

warrant register, treasurers report. \$3000 was approved to be spent for a line purification system for EDP center. The system will eliminate power surges within the court house complex.

Inspection of the Nogal Fire House was set for that day and contract for remodeling and funding of

the Zia Development Center was tabled.

A letter concerning appointment of a county chairperson for the International Year of the Child was turned over to the Extension Office.

Vacation of a road, and request for a cattle guard was also discussed and requests for bids on pick-up trucks, fuel contract and rock for the Bonito Road were also read.

No action was taken on the proposition by Mary Rich Real Estate on behalf of an anonymous client to purchase any or all school property near school.

Board member Ray Wells expressed his appreciation to Jim Steinpreis, out-going superintendent, this being his last meeting in this position.

Earlier on June 12, an afternoon budget hearing was conducted by Dr. Al Clemmons, Director of Public School Finance Division. Clemmons approved a proposed over-all budget of \$1,129,380.00 for the 79-80 school year for the district. A finalized budget will be approved in August.

Salary increase given employees ranged from 0 per cent to 15 per cent.

The District has plans to spend a considerable amount of money to improve buildings and grounds, use additional money for curriculum work in all grade levels and work on energy conservation to hold down utility costs.



Only those who have worked directly or indirectly in the drive and/or clean-up are eligible to attend the free bar-b-cue picnic. These names will also be used for the drawing of prizes to be awarded by KOB-TV Anchorman, Rod Green and the Mystery MC.

Red Cross Recognizes Seven Lincoln Countians

The American National Red Cross has recognized seven persons for their voluntary service to Safety Programs of Lincoln County. Recognition falls under two categories: (A) Certificates of Appreciation and (B) Service Medals.

Receiving Certificates of Appreciation are Devil Bill Adams of Ruidoso, William MacVeigh of Capitan, Jeffrey Gillen of Alto, Virginia Spall of Ruidoso.

The Certificate of Appreciation is awarded on an annual basis to an individual who has accumulated a specified number of hours in one or more years. The first award that may be earned is the 300-hour Certificate of Appreciation. The second is based on 500 hours and thereafter in multiples of 500. An individual may receive only one Certificate of Appreciation in a calendar year.

The second category is the Service Medal. Those receiving the Service Medal have given a minimum of 500 hours of service during five consecutive years with some service provided each year. An individual is eligible to receive only one Service Medal. The recipients of this award are Ralph Romero of Ruidoso, Nona Bechstein Ruidoso and Paul Wakens of Ruidoso.

Also to be recognized are the members of Donald W. Means' Basic First Aid Course conducted at Corona High School in May. A total of eight hours in basic first aid procedures was completed by 10 Corona area persons. These are Sandra Alford,

Bill Bryan, Irma Bryan, Zelma Clewin, Betty Donahue, Billie Lindsay, Patricia Perkins, Clara Porter, Myla Pounds, and Royce Washburn.

Certificates for the participants will be awarded by Means.



An old time good resident of Capitan, Jake Griego passed away after eight months illness in the Hondo Valley Hospital in Ruidoso Thursday June 7 and was laid to rest in Capitan Cemetery Saturday June 9. He was a good man and loved by everyone. He will be greatly missed.

Bryan Wright passed away suddenly at his home in Ruidoso of a heart attack last Saturday and was laid to rest with grave side services in the Capitan Cemetery Tuesday June 12, 1979. His survivors are his wife Doris Wayne of Canadain, Texas; Glenda Price of Albuquerque, Dede Wright and Gary Wright of Ruidoso, and four sisters.

I have been in Tunisia almost two months now. The first month was rather slow as I was getting acquainted with the local situation and my counterpart, Mohamed Haddad.

Most of the sheep are fat-tailed, a few are thin-tailed. Sheep scabies is one of the major problems I have noted. Sheep lay down in the middle of the road to scratch and cars coming both directions. The shepherds use tobacco solution for local treatment. The tobacco is boiled in water and the liquid is then poured on any scab on the sheep. The designing of the low cost dipping vat is one of my first concerns. The shepherds recognize

this problem but do not have the means to control them.

I have been able to go into many Arab homes in my work. I have drank tea (very strong and sweet) with a shepherd in a clean cave, eaten coys coys and drank buttermilk. At every stop we have to at least drink tea, coffee or buttermilk or they are insulted. The Tunisians are a very happy congenial people and are easy to get along with. There is no color discrimination although there are from dark to white skinned Tunisians.

Tunisian sheep are raised mainly for meat; wool is not considered in sheep selection. Tunisians never

castrate any animal as the religious beliefs are that it is not an entire animal; therefore it is not useable for meat.

The small pastoralist keeps his own ram lambs; I have seen several herds with little to no wool and small frames due to an inbreeding problem. They fire brand their sheep on the nose when they are sick so that they will get well. It is done in Arabic writing. The wool is shorn with hand scissors. The average fleece is about 4 to 5 pounds with about 55 percent shrinkage. The colored wool is more valuable as it does not need to be dyed. Some of the wool has large kemp fibers; they call it "god-hair." The kemp fibers will not take dye remaining white.

There are Roman, Byzantine and Punic ruins all over Tunisia. One of the most unique ruins in the "Elephant Walk" from near Mahdia to El Djim. It is a tunnel about 20 feet deep, and just wide enough for an elephant for the 30 miles from the sea to El Djim. The tunnel came out at several lakes along the way. The Romans used "Elephant Walk" to haul rocks and food to the big coliseum at El Djim. The coliseum is in better condition than the one in Rome.

Central Tunisia has many olive trees. There are over 100 varieties. The oranges are picked ripe; so are sweeter than the oranges I have eaten at home. Some oranges have partially red flesh. We bought some last week for 180 millemes per kilo. The Tunisian Dinar is divided into a thousand millemes; a kilo is 2.2 pounds. For quick figuring the Dinar is about \$2.50 so 100 millemes is 25 cents. The oranges cost about 11 cents per pound.

Some French golden delicious apples were on the market here for about 40 cents per pound. About half of the apples that we bought would not make U.S. Grade as they had too much scab on them. They were No. One Grade on the box.

Getting back to sheep, we saw one herd that had the rams with Arabic writing on the back. The writing was pink and was to tell the ewes that he was a good "groom". We vaccinated and drenched sheep in the middle of the pasture with no fence restraint. Others were penned in low bush corrals. The shepherd often brought us the sheep for treatment. The sheep were never marked yet we never treated one twice. Some shepherds can recognize the sheep by their bleat and can give you her age, color and production record without looking.

In Tunisia you see sheep everywhere either in herds or tethered. The country is now turning brown. The rain stopped in mid April and starts again in late September.

Inside the Capitol By Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—In your capital city even a so-called "quiet" week yields grist for the newsman's mill. These were the things they talked about here this week.

TUNNELS: Some folks, including Senator Pete Domenici, want to take a closer look at MX missile plan the President is about to come out for, reportedly as way of convincing some Senators they should vote for his SALT II treaty. Plan calls for eight to nine thousand missile silos, connected to one another in some way, so that missiles can move from one to another, presumably leaving Russians or other potential enemies baffled as to their exact location. Nowhere but here in the West is there space for such a massive installation—so big that at one time potential plans would have

had Department of Defense buying all of Deming and Lordsburg for the purpose. Sometimes those military minds get wilder.

BIG PARTY: More than 700 people, at \$25 per, turned out for "appreciation" dinner for Senator C.B. Trujillo in Taos. Trujillo, who heads powerful Legislative Finance Committee, is reportedly eyeing a run for governor in 1982, though, as he admits, he has to get himself reelected to Senator next year to deserve consideration for bigger run. Decision on making statewide race is much harder than it once was, since prices for high-class television ads, most effective campaign tool, continue to skyrocket. Those who think of making the big runs ought to talk to those who have done it, who can tell them how expensive, how time-consuming and how downright exhausting such a race is.

MOONSHINE: Supreme Court judges, miffed that they didn't get a pay raise during last legislative session, issued some changes in the canons which guide judicial conduct.

Thought it has long been agreed that judges can't engage in private practise of law while they're on the bench, new code would let them act as "consultants." Many folks asking what anyone would consult a judge on except the law—which would put his back into private practise. Almost any other "consultation" for which a judge would be paid appears to many to be in the nature of influence-peddling by the person doing the consulting. Predictions from here are that justices will re-think their situation and go back to the old limitation—maybe after getting a promise that next legislative session will listen with sympathy to their pleas for more dough.

QUESTIONING: Many observers think it's about time somebody looked into that \$13 million and more the state has pumped into supposed energy research and development in the last five years. As long as money came from income earned by severance tax funds, nobody seemed worried; we just gave out \$2.5 million a year. But now it comes from the general fund, which led the Legislative Finance Committee to tell its staff to do some digging and come up with a comprehensive report on what we've gotten for our money. Larry Kehoe, cabinet secretary for energy and minerals, indicates some past projects may not have been so super, when he says, "We are not at the point where we can criticize the past. All we can do is insure that things are better in the future."

POSTAGE: Governor King, we were told at a recent Cabinet meeting, takes an armful of letters from constituents home with him to read at night. He says they help him while away the long evenings in the Governor's Mansion, and they let him in on what voters out there are saying.


