## ?At Town Council Meeting!

### To Light up or Not to Light up??

To light up or not to light up?... That was the smoking question that after much heated debate caused an angry Carrizozo Mayor to declare early in the monthly meeting, "This meeting is adjourned!"

This put an end to the burning issue on hand and resulted in a signing of feelings among the councilmen.

The lengthy agenda on last Monday's meeting was to include many items, two controversial lease agreements, among them. Prior to the adjournment by Mayor Jesse English, only two items were discussed and voted on-approval of minutes and a bid on a new copy machine.

Trustee Orsak made an amendment to last months minutes which concerned a move by him which died by lack of a second. Orsak moved that the minutes of the 2nd paragraph of the Town of Carrizozo Board of Trustees meeting of June 11, 1978, be amended to read as follows:

"During the course of the discussion of the proposed lease between the town of Carrizozo, Lincoln Co, N.M., a New Mexico

Municipality, and Alpha Mineral Processing Corporation, Joint Venture, Mr. Orsak made a motion that if the town council has a meeting to consider a lease agreement between the town and Alpha Mineral Processing Corporation, Joint Venture, such a meeting should take place during a regular session or if a special meeting is called to sign a lease agreement, the town would advertise the meeting and the nature of the business to take place, in the local newspaper. The motion died for lack of a second."

The copy machine bid resulted in Orsak questioning a purchase. He went into the detailed study he made on the Town's bad v.s. good machine copies. It was decided to contact the machine's factory representatives for checking out existing copy machine and to re-advertise for bids on new one.

What brought on Town meeting sparks was the move by Orsak to suspend, just for that evening, the ordinance that prohibits smoking during municipality sessions, since no members of the public were present and if the news media reporter did not mind.

Trustee Roy Harmon stated that he would move to adjourn the meeting if the smoking motion passed. Trustees Orsak and Ortiz voted yes and Hernandez abstained. Trustee Ortiz suggested that the ordinance be repealed for all time, not just for one night as Orsak moved.

The smoking motion was favored 2-1. Although he is a smoker Mayor English tried to exercise his veto power and Orsak promptly inquired of Town Attorney Bill Payne, if this was in order. Payne said the Mayor could not veto the smoking motion.

Mayor English told the board that, "too many subjects are brought up (during meetings) to kick around and throw around" and that they should, "get on with what we have in front of us." He warned that he would have meeting adjourned if this continued.

Another round of pros and cons followed. At one point Orsak told Harmon "Now you know how I feel when I make a very important motion and don't receive a second," referring next to a firecracker ordinance that had been "OK" to suspend in the past.

Mayor English at the end of his patience stated, "This meeting is

adjourned!"

Throughout the business of amendment of minutes, copy machine bid and to smoke or not, Town Attorney Payne had to continually advise the board on whether a motion had or had not been seconded or if even a motion had been made and by whom. Later Payne said an adjournment had never occurred in his time as town attorney.

Contacted later by the NEWS, Orsak expressed opinion that the smoking issue led to the real issue—a resolution being passed and not enforced and the inefficiency of resolutions. Orsak said that he had not meant for the smoking motion he brought up to result in an adjournment, but added, "I was glad it was adjourned because there were very important matters on the agenda for the council to consider and no members of the public were present."

This coming Monday, July 16, the board will hold their NEWS advertised Final Budget Hearing at 7:00 P.M. at the Town Hall, along with the additional business of monthly expenditures and the lease agreements which had to be cancelled due to the adjournment July 9.

### Mary E. Payne Named to New Position

Mary Ellen Payne, Extension home economist for New Mexico State University, has been named temporary administrative head of the Lincoln County Cooperative Extension Service office. Announcement of Mrs. Payne's increased responsibilities was made by Dr. John Oren, associate director of the NMSU Cooperative Extension Service.

Mrs. Payne has served since 1969 as the Lincoln County Extension home economist. She will continue to serve in that capacity, in addition to assuming the duties of office administrative head while Ralph Dunlap is on foreign assignment.

As office administrative head, Mrs. Payne will coordinate county Extension education efforts in agriculture, home economics, community development and 4-H. She will provide supervision and initial performance evaluations for county office personnel, in addition to managing office affairs. She will also make official contacts with the Lincoln County commissioners and other county officials.

Mrs. Payne holds a masters degree in Extension education from NMSU. Prior to joining NMSU's Extension, she worked as the Otero County Deputy County Clerk.

### Jane McSwane Fills County Clerk Vacancy

Jane McSwane was appointed by the Lincoln County commissioners to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Barbara Lovelace at their July meeting.

Mrs. Lovelace, elected in 1978 cited personal reasons for resigning.

The Commissioners also approved a resolution for a budget increase of \$5750 for the Ft. Stanton Volunteer Fire Department for 1979-80.

Several items from last month were approved. A co-operative agreement with the state highway department on the Carrizo Road was approved; Lincoln Ordinance No. 17, dealing with zoning, was also approved.

Contract with N. C. Ribble for a rock crusher was approved with a supplemental letter concerning insurance. A lease agreement for a Sheriff's office in Four Seasons Mall, Ruidoso, was also approved.

Proposal by Herkenhoff Engineering on flood related projects was approved.

Discussion was heard by property owners of Fawn Ridge Subdivision and Alto road problems concluded county business.

### First Meeting for New Superintendent

A patriotic move, the reciting of the Pledge of Allegiance, followed the call to order at last Tuesday's regular meeting of the Carrizozo Board of Education. The Pledge of Allegiance is one of the many new additions and changes under the new administration, Dr. Jim Miller, superintendent and Mr. Steve Stuart, principal, who were present for their first board meeting in these positions.

The items on the agenda included the strong support of the board in taking positive action establishing parent-teacher organization. Mr. Stuart, who has experience in this type of community relations, explained the pros and cons of joining a national organization. Miller and Stuart will schedule an evening meeting for interested parents and other individuals who would like to

discuss forming a local parent-teacher organization or possible affiliation with a national association.

Dr. Miller reported that Don Eskins, 1978-80 coach will soon begin a two week conditioning training program for fall sports. The board described specifications for the purchase of a 36 passenger activity bus. Board member, Wally Ferguson gave an account of the football field progress. The addition of "good ol' black dirt," 500 pounds of fertilizer and Manhattan rye are part of the field improvements being made in preparation of the Grizzly football games anticipated this fall.

The resignation of Mr. Luis Ortega, custodian was accepted and Mr. David Collins was re-hired for mid-school science.

Bids on tile for the elementary building floors to be sent out, the J.G. Moore bid on vehicle insurance and security bond coverage accepted and a sub-committee to look into the revision of the school board policy manual was business undertaken at the July 10 school meeting.

Dr. Miller told the board members that Dr. Al Clemmons, Director of Public School Finance Division, announced at the Albuquerque Public Schools budget hearing recently that the Carrizozo Municipal School had the shortest budget hearing in the state - 28 minutes.



### Claudio R. Montoya Capitan Board Appoints


Claudio R. Montoya was appointed by the Capitan School Board to fill the vacancy left by Board President Virgil Hall, Jr.

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

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## Thinkin' In Lincoln

What more colorful way to cool down summer meals than with soft summer fruits! The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) predicts bountiful supplies of fresh peaches, plums, nectarines and limes to sparkle your menu. In fact, lime supplies are so large you should find retail prices more favorable. It is important that consumers know what to expect so they can look for good buys.

Expect adequate supplies of these fruits: fresh apricots and sweet cherries, oranges and dried prunes. By the end of July shipments of fresh Bartlett pears promise light-less than adequate supplies. Also, fresh lemons and grapefruit will be in light supply.

Pork and poultry continue to compete. Pork prices fell in April and poultry prices remained unchanged. However, with an increase in output of both items, you may see lower prices in coming months. Pork production will average 16-18 percent above last year. Broiler-fryer marketings will show a 8-9 percent increase, and turkey supplies will be up 25-30 percent. Beef supplies are adequate enough to meet normal needs—but down from record levels of recent years.

Supplies of milk and dairy products will be in good balance with demand. Plenty of staple food items—potatoes, onions, rice, wheat, corn, dry beans and dry split peas—will be found. Stocks of most processed vegetables are adequate, with frozen lima beans, snap beans, and corn-on-the-cob plentiful. Until harvest of new pack green peas and spinach, these items will remain in light supply.

With pork supplies good and prices reasonable you might want to try this pork casserole that cooks in your slow cooker.


**CHINESE PORK STEW.** (If you like sweet-and-sour pork, you'll rave about this stew.) Cook on 190 degrees to 200 degrees for 8 hours or on 290 degrees to 300 degrees for 4 hours. Makes 8 servings.

- 2 pounds boneless pork-shoulder, cubed
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/4 cup light molasses
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 can (13 1/4 ounces) pineapple chunks
- 1 cube or teaspoon instant chicken broth
- 1/4 cup vinegar
- 1 can (1 pound) sweet potatoes
- 2 firm tomatoes, cut in eighths
- 1 green pepper, halved, seeded and cut in 1-inch squares

- Trim excess fat from pork; place in an electric slow cooker; season with salt, ginger and pepper.
- Drain syrup from pineapple, adding water to syrup to make 1 1/2 cups; reserve pineapple chunks. Add syrup mixture to pork; stir in sugar, instant broth, molasses and vinegar; cover.
- Cook on low (190 degrees to 200 degrees) for 8 hours, or on high (290 degrees to 300 degrees) for 4 hours.
- Turn heat control to high (290 degrees to 300 degrees). Combine cornstarch and 1/4 cup cold water in a cup; stir into pork mixture until well-blended.
- Add sweet potatoes, tomatoes, pineapple chunks and green pepper; cover; simmer 20 minutes longer.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

The Federal Disaster Assistance Administration (FDAA) hereby gives notice to the public of its intent to reimburse eligible applicants for eligible costs of repairing their flood damaged facilities to pre-disaster condition within Lincoln, Mora, Rio Arriba, Santa Fe, San Miguel and Taos counties, New Mexico. The facilities involved are those which are within the 100-year floodplain or which may affect that floodplain.

In accordance with the President's Executive Order 11988 on Floodplain Management, FDAA may require that the restoration of these facilities incorporate certain measures designed to mitigate the effects of future flooding. Certain projects are not included in this notice and will be the subject of other notices in this publication, if one or more of the following conditions exist:

1. The cost of eligible repairs is more than \$25,000, and equals 50 percent or more of the cost of reconstruction of the total facility.
2. The facility is located in a PRESCRIBED flood hazard area:

3. The facility has been previously damaged by a flood that resulted in a Major Disaster.
4. The design of the facility is changed sufficiently to require a grant-in-lieu.
5. The federal contribution will be used to build a new and different facility or facilities from those that existed before the disaster.

## Inside the Capitol

 SANTA FE—How important to New Mexico history is the role of the "UNCONSCIOUS VOTER"?

Well, the evidence seems to indicate that for one thing, if there were no such animal, our present governor would be named Joe Skeen. The "unconscious voter," according to evidence given before federal district judge Santiago Campos in the case last fall, is somebody who goes into the voting

booth and pushes the lever for candidates whose names are on the top line. Witnesses said as many as 3 to 5 percent of the voters in New Mexico do this each election time.

That gives a long margin to the top-liners, as anyone can plainly see. And who are those happy folks on the upper line? In New Mexico, from time immemorial, it has been the Democratic party.

That's gotta stop, Judge Campos said, and he gave the Secretary of State of New Mexico till Friday of this week to propose a system that is "neutral in character," as he put it, and which gives all parties an equal chance at the privileged position.

Does it make much difference? Well, last election, which took place after the judge's ruling, Bruce King beat Skeen by less than 4000 votes. If just 3 per cent of the 340,000 who voted that day were "unconscious" in the sense in which that word is used here, that's 10,200 people—more than King won by.

In other words, Skeen might have been the winner this time and last time he ran if Judge Campos had ruled sooner.

If the Secretary of State, Shirley Hooper, who has to provide the suggested method of making things fair in the future, comes up with some sort of lottery (let's-just-flip-a-coin-and-see-who-gets-top-billing), that isn't likely to satisfy the Republicans who brought the suit in the first place.

As Bill Lutz of Las Cruces, attorney for Nila Baer and Jack Emmons, the plaintiffs, said, "That isn't the kind of system we want." What some Republicans would like to see is a system which makes up for the losses they feel they have suffered in the past by being automatically relegated to the lower line.

So Mrs. Hooper's plan, which she has not hurried to make public, could affect the next decade's elections in New Mexico. Whatever her proposal, you can bet she put some sleepless nights into it. If you happen to be a loyal member of and successful candidate from a particular party, it's no fun to have some judge forcing you to make a ruling which may hurt your party. That's why Ernestine Evans, Secretary of State at the time the judge handed down his decision, went quietly out of office without attempting to come up with an answer. She left the responsibility as a legacy for her successor.

There are those, of course, who say the whole theory of the "unconscious voter" is made up out of the whole cloth by theoreticians who know nothing of reality. That could be true.

Whichever way it really is, we are liable to see some difference from this point forward if the Secretary of State follows the court's injunction and comes up with a plan which "takes account of all political parties."

NOTE: The Legislature could have acted to solve this problem and, like gentlemen, have spared Mrs. Hooper. They didn't want to touch it with a ten-foot pole.


