Council Approves Processing Lease

When direct questioning to Mayor Jesse English by Trustees Orsak and Harmon, failed to reveal the mystery identity of the "four men" involved in the "old mill site" negotiations, English placed an order that one, 'Lubojacky', be fetched to last Monday's special meeting.

The lease agreement which was eventually approved at the Carrizozo town hall July 16 was also critiqued by a trustee's personal lawyer.

The lengthy discussion of lease ended in a satisfied mayor, two 'yes' votes and one strongly voiced 'no'. Town Attorney Bill Payne, who approved the lease and Trustee Manuel Hernandez were absent at the tape recorded special meeting.

Earlier the mayor called out three items on his agenda to be handled that evening - lease agreement "with Lubojacky and his people out there," monthly expenditures (cancelled from last week's unexpected adjourned meeting) and final budget hearing.

Before approval, English went over a corrected copy of the lease agreement between the Town of Carrizozo, referred to as 'Lessor' and American Minerals Recovery, Inc., a corporation, referred to as 'Lessee'.

The American Minerals Recovery Corporation leased the former Scott-Tex Mill Site containing approximately six acres (located near the McBride land) for a period of one year commencing May 1, 1979, \$500.00 being the first years rental, with option to lease for an additional year and from year to year thereafter for a total of five years under same prices, terms, and conditions. After

five years, the Lessee shall have an option to renew said lease from year to year on the same terms and conditions and at the price of \$900.00 per year for up to and including five additional years.

The lease agreement stated that Lessee shall have the right to construct buildings on the premises in connection with the processing of ore of various kinds, the right to explore the property for water for use in operation of their mill or mills, with the Lessee bearing all expenses incurred. The Lessor will meter the water and will be paid for water used. When the property is returned, the Lessor will get the well or wells with installed casings.

It was specifically agreed by the Lessee that this site and the utilization of this site shall not interfere with the utilization of the adjacent area used by the Carrizozo motor cyclists.

Although English said the four men involved were not in operation yet, "a big building, a lot of mining machinery, over head storage bins, and elevators" are at the location. English added that they are in the construction phase.

Orsak asked, "Do we know what they're going to mine?"

The mayor responded with, "Well, I haven't been able to really pin them down close. I know that there's two or three different things. I know that they're going to try to separate a little bit of gold from it and other minerals, but just what..."

At this point Orsak had the chance to ask, "Do we know where they're going to mine?" English said

the men would bring ore from the Capitan area and the Jicarillas.

Orsak then presented the mayor with a written statement concerning the lease agreement, which Orsak previously had critiqued by a lawyer for a second opinion. After the prepared statement the mayor said, "The questions he (the lawyer) raised, I think, are pretty well covered."

Orsak questioned, "I would like to know who is American Mineral Recovery, Inc.?"

English said - four people - one who he knows, others he can't remember their names, his answer in part included, "no one else involved in it but those four, they have taken money out of their own pocket and put this thing together, no promotion type deal."

In regard to the negotiations, Orsak added "...gentlemen's agreement?"

English said, "We have dug our feet on it," referring to the "2 1/2 month original lease" and the "corporation is the only one actually leasing it...a combined effort of four men. All we need is a company name on it."

Harmon suggested that Lubojacky present himself to the board to explain the lease and clarify who is the director. Orsak added, "We should know, be able to tell who we are dealing with in black and white for public record."

English then asked, "Okay. What you're saying is—in addition to showing company name in here (lease) you want all of the individuals listed as well?"

Answered Orsak, "No, Mr. English, I think we should know this before we sign lease agreement - for public record."

On hearing this the mayor then turned to Emilio Beltran, Town Superintendent, who was in the audience, and said "go get Lubojacky."

He then tabled the lease agreement while Lubojacky was located.

Presently a "W.F. Carpenter" who represented American Mineral Recovery, Inc. arrived. English told Carpenter that he and the trustees "want to know a little bit more," asked what will they be milling and what people are involved.

Carpenter told trustees and mayor they would mill "what's profitable," and are basically set up for milling iron ore and other minerals through a process called "floatation", and at present time a maximum of five participants are involved, including himself.

At the question of "Who are we dealing with?" and "Who will we sign lease with?" the answer was: W.F. Carpenter, major stock holder. He went on to mention his associates Mr. Lubojacky, Li Shun Kung, Mr. Lafaiola, A.F. Lake, an East coast acquaintance with 10 percent interest" and Carpenter added a brother of his, of which he did not volunteer name, as the 5th participant.

Carpenter said, "All those factors will be available as soon as corporation gets through with it and then it will be a matter of state record."

He said he has gone over changes with Town Attorney Payne. The mayor asked him if he has "papers in front of commission as far as incorporating?" Carpenter mentioned that he has not contacted Attorney Mitchell in Ruidoso where she is located because he has not been able to get away.

English satisfied with Carpenter's responses, said the agreement, "was well-covered both ways."

Ortiz moved to approve lease, Harmon seconded and that appeared to be the end of that matter when Orsak requested to have the floor for a point of discussion. Orsak felt he would not vote until he know in writing exactly who they were dealing with and wanted the lease agreement open to inspection by the public. (Present in the audience that evening were the town superintendent, the police chief, NEWS reporter, and two interested individuals.)

English answered that the lease agreement had been before the public for "almost two months," and he received no pro or con comments. English said motion had been made that evening and seconded. He added "all in favor?" and Harmon and Ortiz raised their hands.

Orsak raised his hand at English's "opposed?" Motion carried. The rest of the evening included the monthly expenditures and a lengthy reading by town clerk, Christine Chavez, of items and figures on the final budget, fiscal year 68 - July 1st, 1979 to June 30, 1980.

Following the budget hearing, Harmon moved to give Town Superintendent, Emilio Beltran an increase in salary for his extra work as town employee.

Orsak said Beltran had recently been given a 10 percent salary increase and asked how much extra work had Beltran done. English went into detail the time Beltran puts into his job. Beltran, who is on call 24 hours and is the only certified employee to keep Carrizozo's utilities going, received an additional \$100.00 increase in salary.

The signing of the budget adoption resolution which was read by the mayor concluded the town's special meeting.



Congress Should Say No to the Special Interests

Congress refuses to say NO to the special interests who seek inflationary favors from government. Hundreds of wasteful subsidies, tax preferences, and anti-competitive regulations are costing American consumers billions of dollars. These costs directly fuel inflation.

Congress treats inflation as most of us treat bad weather; complain and accept what comes. Something CAN be done about inflation if those special interests are challenged.

According to William Simon, President Ford's Secretary of the Treasury, "Many businessmen . . . want import quotas, subsidies, tariffs, handouts. They want to enjoy the profits when everything is just fine, but they want to nationalize their losses (through the U.S. Treasury) when economic storm clouds appear. They want protection from the very competition that made our system so dynamic." Simon's comment applies to lots of special interests.

Congress allows its obsession with the most parochial concerns to prevent it from doing what's needed to halt inflation. It resists anti-inflation efforts opposed by powerful economic interest groups. It approves measures which cause the price of consumer goods and services to rise. It favors special interest programs that the public pays for directly through higher taxes. There are more examples than anybody can count. Here are a few.

Containing hospital costs is necessary to brake inflationary health costs. The Department of Health, Education, and Welfare estimated that health cost containment legislation considered by Congress last year could have saved consumers about \$27 billion through 1982. Yet \$1.79 billion in 1976 congressional campaign contributions from the American Medical Association (AMA), the principal opponent of hospital cost containment legislation, helped bury the bill last year without a House vote. So far this year the Congress has done nothing.

Congress also has a bad habit of supporting many subsidy programs which cost consumers dearly. Fewer than 1 per cent of U.S. farmers grow sugar cane or sugar beets yet the sugar industry is one of the most expensively subsidized products of the U.S. economy. The current sugar price support system costs consumers \$1.3 billion a year in direct costs alone and pressures are mounting for Congress to increase the subsidy even higher. Someone has to foot the bill-it's the American taxpayer.

Sometimes Congress may not vote a direct subsidy to a special interest but instead grant a tax break. Either way citizens pay. For example, Congress has given corporations a \$1.5 billion tax preference allowing them to defer taxes indefinitely on a large portion of the income they earn on exports. The Treasury Department has said that this tax incentive is not increasing exports as it is supposed to do. Yet that tax preference and hundreds of others remain because Congress never examines whether they are meeting their original purpose.

Congress escalates inflation on food, health, energy and housing. To end these atrocious results Congress must examine all parts of the federal budget to see the big picture. Instead of ignoring long term costs, Congress should know what those costs are by budgeting beyond one year. To reduce wasteful activity Congress should sunset programs, regulations, and tax preferences. Only by terminating what's wasteful and unnecessary will the necessary new initiatives begin.

Wishing won't stop inflation from growing. But a Congress that stands up to the special interests will.

Officials Warn Public - - - "Explosives Still Live"

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, N.M., Jul. 13--Although White Sands Missile Range boundaries are posted and military and civilian guards continually patrol the 4,000-square-mile expanse, trespassers are continually apprehended within its confines.

"Many of those we apprehend wander onto range property accidentally, but others come onto range property on purpose," a Security Office guard said. "Some are rock hounds, others are hikers, and some call themselves prospectors," he said.

Security Office officials and members of the range's explosive ordnance disposal branch agree all missile range trespassers have one thing in common: They are in immediate danger.

Impact areas, rattlesnakes, scorpions and blazing heat are minor dangers compared to a prevalent danger found throughout the range, claims Staff Sgt. Richard L. Sherrow, noncommissioned officer-in-charge of the range's explosive ordnance disposal branch.

Sherrow pointed out White Sands Missile Range has been used for more than 30 years as a testing area, and during that time "hundreds of thousands" of explosive items have been dropped, fired or placed in the area.

"Thousands of these (explosive) items failed to function properly and still can be found throughout the range," Sherrow said. "And contrary to old wives tales, explosives do not become inert with age -- just the opposite is true."

Sherrow, a veteran of 12 years with Army explosive ordnance units said the older explosives become, the more sensitive and dangerous they become.

"As time passes, some explosives become so sensitive they will detonate by themselves,"

Sherrow said no deaths have been recorded at White Sands Missile Range from "dud ordinance," but the record is maintained "...only by fate and dumb luck."

A Security Office official noted a metal scavenger was killed last year at the Dona Ana Range Camp on Fort Bliss when he attempted to remove missile debris.

Although missile range recovery crews do their best to keep the range free of missile debris and unexploded ordinance, seasonal rains and wind storms continually expose buried dangers.

Sherrow said he recently heard of a soldier at Fort Dix, N.M., who picked up an anti-tank rocket on the range and returned it to his bivouac area, thinking it was a harmless training round.

"When that rocket exploded in the bivouac area, two men were killed and eight others were injured," Sherrow said.

The best advice Sherrow has for anyone, range worker or trespasser, is don't bother it. "This means don't throw rocks at a dud, prod it with a stick, or even get near it -- just quietly move away and call us or the military police."



Inside The Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—One man who always manages to make himself heard in Santa Fe is Ron Chavez, of Santa Rosa.

He knows what buttons to push to get attention—even publicity—for the programs in which he is interested.

One thing that always matters to him is tourists, and their care and feeding. (He has two eateries in the Santa Rosa area and wants to keep them busy).

It's surprising that not all New Mexicans really appreciate how much of an economic influence tourism is. Many of us seem to feel that, since we do not ourselves make our living directly by taking care of tourists, this group of traveling Americans are not very important.

Fact is, each dollar a visitor spends probably "turns," as the economists say, from four to six times before it leaves the state, and that means it passes through a lot of hands which have nothing to do with the tourist business directly.

Will the current gasoline shortage have an effect on this segment of our economy? There is no way this century's major economic problem could do anything but hurt this business which is in many ways the backbone of our state's financial soundness.

Where does that leave our political leaders?

In a very tough spot indeed. As Larry Kehoe, Secretary of Energy and Minerals, admitted last week, the state has to keep encouraging tourists by telling them there is no gasoline shortage while telling the rest of us there is.

The Department of Commerce and Industry, for example, which contains the Tourist and Travel Division, has been running radio spots in major markets reasonable close to our state borders to tell folks to come on and vacation with us. The invitation contains information which says our visitors will find they can fill up their gas tank while they're here.

As gasoline grows increasingly tight, that kind of message may seem less and less pleasant to those of us who live here, especially if it turns out that there isn't enough gasoline to take care of our needs.

But Commerce and Industry is stepping up the ads, in an effort to keep the tourist and travel industry busy. They were even prepared to go to the Board of Finance to ask for a deficiency appropriation (that is, money over and above their present budget) to keep the ads running after the dough assigned for them runs out.

That makes the contrast even sharper: Spend money you haven't got to bring visitors here, while you try to convince us local residents that we shouldn't waste energy on travel. It sounds pretty contradictory, as Rep. Nick Salazar from Rio Arriba pointed out to the interim committee on energy and the environment. Answers given by members of the administration to his questions on the subject weren't very satisfactory.

At least Commerce and Industry was in process of cancelling \$20,000 worth of ads it had scheduled to run in National Geographic, just like it used to do in the days when there was no energy shortage.

That money will be spent to attract tourists, which will make Ron Chavez feel good but will still leave Nick Salazar scratching his head, and asking, "Is there an energy shortage only for us stay-at-homes, or does it apply to tourists and travelers as well?"

Sense & Nonsense

U.S. Senator Pete Domenici

If you read the Gospel according to IRS, you'll learn that the "wages of sin" are often higher than you think. . . . sometimes \$1,500 higher.

For when the tax man descends upon us each April, he wields a mighty but unequal sword that lashes away at the most noble institution of marriage.

Here's what happens. A couple without children filing jointly and making a combined income of \$40,000 pays \$1,564 more income tax than if both had filed single.

On \$30,000 combined income, the "marriage penalty" is \$785 while couples making \$25,000 must pay \$535 more. At \$20,000 the penalty is \$355, but any way you look at it, it's a lot of money. The one thing that is very clear is that the two earner couple can live cheaper out of wedlock than in wedlock.

In fact, the Census Bureau has just reported that between 1970 and 1978 the number of unmarried couples living together has doubled and increased more than eightfold among people under 26 years of age.

This so called "marriage tax" became effective in 1970 when Congress tried to end tax discrimination against single persons so none would pay more than 20 percent in excess of what married persons paid.

Now, however, the shoe has landed on the other foot. Married couples who make more than \$30,000 together pay 24 percent more than singles and the percentages increase right up the scale.

Each year about 20 million couples suffer this marriage penalty, paying out more than \$2 billion extra to IRS, and these numbers are sure to increase as more wives join the work force and more women move into higher income brackets. Already half the wives in our country work.

So when the wife brings home the bacon, hungry Uncle Sam is waiting around to snatch it up.

This marriage tax is one reason why so many young people prefer to stay single. Many just cannot afford the penalty our government imposes on us to walk to the altar.

For all these reasons, I have joined with 20 other U.S. Senators and 103 House members in sponsoring legislation which would permit a married person to file his or her tax return individually and use tax tables

now applicable only to singles. The tax rates for singles and married couples wishing to file jointly would not be changed.

In addition, our bill would allow married persons who file separately to take advantage of credit for employment-related expenses such as child care, just as single persons do now.

The entire point is that if a couple wants to remain unmarried that should be their prerogative, but it shouldn't be imposed on them by the taxing whims of Uncle Sam.



PUBLIC NOTICE

The Federal Disaster Assistance Administration (FDAA) hereby gives notice to the public of its intent to reimburse eligible applicants for eligible costs for restoring or repairing disaster damaged facilities within Lincoln, Mora, Rio Arriba, San Miguel, Santa Fe, and Taos Counties designated for the June 23, 1979 Presidential Major Disaster Declaration. The facilities covered by this notice are roads, culverts, bridges, low water crossings and water control facilities damaged as a result of severe storms, snowmelt runoff and flooding during the period May 2, 1979 through June 30, 1979, inclusive. Some of these facilities were damaged in a previously declared major disaster and all are in the 100-year floodplain. FDAA proposes to fund restoration of these facilities in accordance with the funding prescribed by the Federal-State Agreement dated June 26, 1979. FDAA's participation in these projects, pursuant to the President's Executive Order 11988, Floodplain Management, is based on the following rationale:

1. There are no practical alternatives for the roads, culverts, bridges, and low water crossings because such facilities are integral parts of a road network which would preclude economical relocation of the damaged facility or the road system.
2. Water control facilities cannot be economically relocated because

they are functionally dependent upon floodways.

These actions will not directly or indirectly support floodplain development, not increase the risk to lives and property, and will not impact on the natural or beneficial values of the floodplain.

FDAA will review each application for Federal assistance to assure minimization of any impact. Projects not covered by this notice or the previous notice will be the subject of later public notices.

Those persons interested in the implementation of the Floodplain Management Executive Order with respect to the restoration or repair of any project covered by this notice should submit their views in writing to the Regional Director, Federal Disaster Assistance Administration, 504 Jose Street, Santa Fe, New Mexico, 87501. Comments should be specific as to exactly which project(s) you may be referring to and include exact locations and/or addresses of the facilities in question. Comments should be received not later than 5:00 p.m. on July 21, 1979.
