Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce president, Mary Ellen Payne, announced that on Sunday, August 12 the Chamber is sponsoring the Annual People's Market Place.

This year, the People's Market Place will be held in connection with the Santa Rita Catholic Church 'Fiesta '79, August 10-11-12. Vesper service, queen coronation, dance and mass are among the three-day St. Rita festivities. A big barbecue Sunday at the People's Market Place concludes the Church's celebration.

Carrizo Mountain Fire Contained

A small fire on Carrizo Mountain has been contained by a squad of nine men from the Smokey Bear Ranger District. The blaze is thought to have been started by a lightning storm Sunday afternoon, but was not discovered until Tuesday afternoon. The smoldering fire burst into flames around 3:00 p.m. Tuesday and was

reported to the State Forestry at 4:15 by Agetha Long.

The State Forestry Department referred the information to the Smokey Bear Ranger District because the blaze was on Federal land.

Pony Express Race set for Aug 4th

The Lincoln County Development Association will again be sponsoring the annual White Oaks to Lincoln pony express race. The race is to be held on August 4th starting at 8:00 a.m. There is expected to be over \$1,000 in the purse for first second and third.

The White Oaks to Lincoln Pony Express Race was started in 1969, as part of the Lincoln County Centennial Celebration. The idea was introduced by A.W. Gnatkowski, at the March 7, 1979 meeting of the Special Events Committee. The race was been sponsored every year by the Lincoln County Development Association.

Gnatkowski was chairman of the original committee who set up the rules and route of the Pony Express Race. The rules and route are still the same.

The entrants in the race are required to use a Western style saddle and Western style clothing. Riders must follow a marked course.

The first race had six entries. Trouble plagued the entries from the start. Joe Lively and Clifford Lambert were unable to get their truck started to transport the horses to the starting point. The Charles Taff-Eddie Hill entry failed to complete the second lap.

Fermin Chavez, San Patricio, was the first of the four entries to come to the finish line, with a time of 2 hours and 36 minutes. He was followed by Barney Aldaz-Roy Payton of Lincoln, Preacher Dobbs of Carrizozo and Zane Leslie, Jr., of Capitan.

The riders carried 650 special centennial cancelled letters. Barney Aldaz, 76 years young, rode two horses that were 16 and 22 years-of age.

The second Pony Express Race in 1970, almost ended in dead heat. Both Johnny Dobbs and Brahim Hindi dismounted at the same time, but Johnny Dobbs ran faster on foot after dismounting and got his mail to Postmaster Hattie Phillips first and won the race and saddle. J.B. Morris was third and Clifford Lambert fourth. Fermin Chavez a winner of the first race, had a horse get sick and was never a contender. 1400 pieces of mail were carried in that race.

Brahim Hindi won the Third Pony Express Race in 1971 with a time of 2 hours and 13 minutes. This was the fastest time, with Ted Clements, of Picacho 2 minutes behind, came in second. Ronnie Eldridge was third. Fourth was the team of Clifford Lambert and Joe Lively. Ted Zumwalt was fifth with a time of 2 hours and 41 minutes. They carried 1000 pieces of mail.

Benny Runnels ran the Fourth Pony Express Race in the fastest time of any race. The official time was 2 hours, 6 minutes and 35 seconds.

Benny trained his horses at the Parsons Hotel near Bonita Lake, where his father Arvel Runnels resided. He conditioned them at this 8,000 foot elevation for three months.

J.B. Morris was second and the team of Terry McNatt and Fermin Chavez were third. Other finishers were Brahim Hindi, Zane Leslie and Ted Clements.

Benny Runnels won the 1973 Pony Express Race, with a time of 2 hours and 10 minutes. The Ted Clements-J.B. Morris entry was second by only 15 seconds, and Brahim Hindi-Ken Burkdoll team was third. Other entrants were Jamil Hindi, Thomas Montes and Bill Shrecengost, Jr.

The 1974 Pony Express Race was won by the David Cunningham-Ted Clements entry, with a time of 2 hours and 20 minutes.

He beat his nearest competitor by 75 feet (5 seconds). This was the closest finish in the 6 year history of the race.


The 1975 Pony Express Race ended in a dead heat between Benny Runnels and Brahim Hindi. Each was awarded a saddle for winning the race.

Due to heavy rain the finish line had to be changed, unknown to the riders.

The time was 2 hours, 4 minutes

4.885 Mi. of New Pavement

Hiway 37 work to begin

Work has been started on a state Highway Department project to complete the paving of New Mexico Highway 37 south of Nogal in Lincoln County. Six old wooden bridges also will be replaced as part of the project.

The work area extends from a point about five miles south of Nogal for a distance of approximately 4.885 miles to the community of Angus. The present dirt and gravel road segment, when paved, will have two, 11-foot driving lanes with six-foot wide shoulders.

Road construction will consist of subgrade preparation and the placement of an eight-inch gravel subbase. A four-inch asphalt mat will be placed over the subbase in two layers bonded together with a topcoat. This is the same type of construction profile used for the paved road leading from Nogal to the present project.

The six wooden bridges in the project area will be torn down and removed by the contractor. They will be replaced with concrete box or pipe culverts. These will serve as drainage structures to divert water under the road and as bridges to carry traffic across the streams or arroyos for which they provide drainage.

"Most of the construction will be done with traffic moving through a work area," Highway Department project supervisor Brad Carr said. "This means that motorists will have to be particularly careful when driving on this road." "They should

be alert for men and equipment working in and near the roadway and be prepared to follow directions from flagmen."

The project work is being done for the road agency by Kent Nowlin Construction Inc. of Albuquerque. Inc. of Albuquerque. The Nowlin firm was awarded the contract on the basis of its low bid of \$2,718,149. The project was let to bid by the Highway Department on June 8.

"Right now," Carr said, "the contractor is busy setting up a construction yard." "Within a few days they will begin erecting project

area warning signs and start some of the initial construction work."

The new roadway will almost completely follow the alignment of the present road, according to Carr. Detours will probably be used only at those places the culverts will be installed to preplace the old bridges.

The project contract provides for work completion within 225 good weather working days. An optional winter lay-off is not counted against this time. Weather permitting, the contractor expects to complete construction in the fall of 1980.

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School Immunizations

"Get your child immunized before school starts again", advises the Health Services Division of the Health and Environment Department.

Many parents wait until shortly before school begins to have their child immunized.

The high level of immunization in New Mexico has resulted in a very low rate of communicable disease among school children according to Dr. Jonathan Mann, Chief of the Disease Prevention Bureau.

"During the 1978-79 school year, there were only 19 cases of measles, 18 of which occurred in the Silver City area, and 2 cases of rebecca. There were no cases of diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, or polio", said Mann.

State Law requires that children be immunized before entering school.

County Rape Crisis Program available

The Lincoln County Rape Crisis Program is one of the services provided by the Lincoln County HELpline in cooperation with the New Mexico Sex Crimes Prosecution and Treatment Act. The local HELpline volunteers are trained in the support of victims of sexual assault and their families during the crisis period and through the medical and legal system should the victim decide to seek medical or legal services. The emphasis is on helping the victim to get the help that he or she wants without pressuring him or her into doing anything he or she doesn't want to do. Volunteers have an understanding of the procedures that typically face a victim of sexual assault and are available 24 hours a day through the HELpline to accompany a victim through those procedures he or she may choose. The Lincoln County HELpline number is 1-437-8680.

Sexual assault is the fastest growing violent crime in our society and also one of the least reported crimes. Approximately 1 in 10 sexual crimes are currently reported to police. Victims are people of all ages and of both sexes. Because it is a violent crime and not an act of passion, sexual assaults happen to people who are vulnerable - the weak, the elderly, children, and people alone. Hitchhikers, more than anyone, put themselves at the mercy of strangers and people they don't know well.

Center fund raising for lab equipment

The Carrizozo Health Center Advisory Board is promoting a series of fund-raising activities to purchase lab equipment for the Clinic. Their goal is \$9000 for immediate use, and an ultimate goal of \$15000.

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more violent with each succeeding attack. Rapists also seldom seek help for themselves voluntarily and it is usually only through apprehension that the pattern of sexual offenses can be stopped. For this reason, a third party report is also made anonymously to police by a victim or friend so that the police may watch for a similar case or assault in the future. This ensures the privacy of the victim who need not become involved with the legal system at all.

Army changes ration cans

The Army's familiar green field ration cans, which have been used by GIs on maneuvers since the Spanish American War, are being phased out, victims of modern packaging techniques.

The can will be replaced by flexible pouches - called RETORT packaging - which have been heralded by the Packaging Institute of America as the most significant packaging breakthrough since Nicolas Appert developed tin cans for Napoleon's troops.

Developed by the U.S. Army Research and Development Laboratories in Natick, Massachusetts, these new flexible pouches will make eating in the field

As services to victims of sexual assault are improved, the victims will receive more concerned care and be treated by people who understand that while the victim may have put him or herself in a risky situation, no one "wants" to be attacked. It has been found that people who receive such care will more often report the assault to authorities and apprehension of rapists will increase. Increased apprehension is critical to

reducing the number of sexual assaults in a community because it is known that rapists tend to be "recidivists" in that they rarely assault only once and often become

easier. They are 40 percent lighter than the canned rations, and can be heated on the radiator of a jeep, on a hot road or in hot water. In addition, the new process is more nutritious because the lower cooking temperatures retain more nutritional elements.

The new pouches have been tested and ready for production. The Army is planning to use the existing stock of canned rations but will restock with the new packaging.

Twelve menus are being planned at this time, according to a spokesman from Natick Labs. Each package will contain a main dish, snack, dessert, and high energy foods; it also contains eating utensils and personal articles.

In addition, more than 25 door prizes have been donated by merchants of Capitan and Carrizozo to be given at each intermission.

1978

The 1978 race included several changes. The special mail carry cost was 50 cents per letter with part of this money going to the riders. Entry fee per team was \$50.00 with a late entry fee of \$100.00.

Ted Clements, 3-time winner, and Brahm Hindi 2-time winner, have each used the same horse for the last lap, the longest and most difficult, for the past eight years.

A special tenth Pony Express letter was available for people to send. It included a brief history of the White Oaks to Lincoln Pony Express Race.

PONY EXPRESS MAIL

The Pony Express Race from White Oaks to Lincoln has been an official mail route since its inception in 1969. Each year about 2,000 letters are in the special Pony Express mail. Each letter receives a special postmark and seal designating it as a letter in the Pony Express Race. A handling charge is made on each letter to help with costs.

Mrs. Clara Snow along with Mr. & Mrs. Bill Hayes, have had the task of putting Pony Express seals on each of the letters. They have done this as a service to the Pony Express Committee every year. Truman Spencer, Jr. signaled the start of the race with his trusty 44 every year until 1977 when his son, Stirling Spencer carried on as starter. Hattie Phillips and Ellen Faye Womack have been postmasters receiving the mail at Lincoln. The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, New Mexico State Police and Lincoln County Mounted Patrol have provided a safe route for the riders. Spencer Hall, Roswell, has used his camera to record the Pony Express Race for the last four years.

The tax bite out of our paychecks has become enormous. Everytime we get a raise we also see our taxes go up. No longer can we keep pace with inflation, we can't even hope to.

For the first five months of this year the inflation rate surged to 13.4 percent. Who can keep pace with that? In fact, in a recent survey completed by my constituents, 68 percent demanded a constitutional amendment calling for a balanced budget.

Americans call for less federal spending, and politicians sensing an angry mood in the real American call for biting the bullet. But we have not bitten the bullet nearly enough. Many political leaders say one thing and do another; and so we have more programs instead of less and are spending more dollars instead of less.

Productivity will increase when Americans have a reason once again to be productive, when the fruits of their labor will once again go into their pocket and not Uncle Sam's, and when they believe our government really wants them to produce.

That day will come. The National Survey for Productivity in a report to Congress notes that productivity will go up again. When that happens it will be because once again we have something to work for and look forward to.

American ingenuity is boundless, somewhere someone is always

looking for a way to build that better mousetrap. But rightfully the inventor wants something for it, he doesn't want to be snapped up in his own trap because of government tape and bureaucratic snafus.

Water Improvement Plan Approved

The Lincoln County ASC Committee has received approval for the plan which was developed by the Lincoln County ACP Development Group for the Upper Rio Hondo Watershed in Lincoln County.

The Primary objective of the plan is to make a concerted effort to control nonpoint sources of pollution with existing USDA programs.

One of the basic methods that will be used in achieving this goal will be to cost-share practices with produces that will improve the quality of water in the Ruidoso and Bonito Rivers. Approved practices are listed below:

- Permanent Vegetative Cover Establishment
- Permanent Vegetative Cover Improvement
- Terrace Systems
- Diversion Dikes
- Grazing Land Protection
- Windbreak Restoration and Establishment
- Permanent Vegetative Cover on Critical Areas
- Water Impoundment Reservoirs
- Water Ditches and Dikes
- Rangeland Moisture Conservation
- Irrigation Water Conservation
- Sediment Retention, Erosion or Water Control Structures
- Soil Waterways
- Animal Waste Control Facilities
- Streambank Protection and Channel Clearance
- Relocation of Ranch Roads

These practices were requested but they have not received approval. Agricultural producers who are having problems with water conservation or soil erosion should contact the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office which is located in the Lincoln County Courthouse at Carrizozo.

Eligible land must be located within the boundaries of the Upper Rio Hondo Watershed and the problem must be contributing to pollution of water in the same watershed. All area located within the watershed that drains into the Bonito, Ruidoso and Hondo River west of Hondo will be eligible.

The Lincoln County ASC Committee will begin taking cost-share applications for this program on July 20, 1979. Applications are available at the Lincoln County ASCS Office.

Grizzlies Open at Tatum Sept. 14th

Grizzly pigskin fans can see their team in action September 14 at Tatum for the first of eight games scheduled for this fall's football season. Prior to this there will be three scrimmages instead of the usual two. The 1st home game is here September 21 against Hatch.

An enthusiastic audience of prospective football players and their parents listened attentively at a meeting last week as Carrizozo's '79-80 head coach, Don Eskins "talked football."

Parent permission slips, doctor release forms, insurance and physical check-ups were part of the talk Eskins gave. If the sport student takes advantage of the specially set clinic days, there will be a savings in the cost at the Carrizozo Health Clinic.

Clinic schedule for three consecutive Saturdays is as follows: July 28; juniors and seniors - August 4, sophomores and freshmen - August 11, junior high. On all three dates the hours are 8:00 am to 12:00 pm for boys and 1:00 pm to 4:00 pm for girls.

Coach Eskins advised the football players to get physical check-ups in time for practice. Sports students should stop at the principal's office for forms necessary to participate in sports and to obtain their physicals. No physicals - no practice. Early morning and late afternoon practice will begin August 14. Locker check out is August 13.

Eskins told the players at the football meeting, "...give your best. If you give your best, you'll get better." He added, "We want to look back and say something good about the year."

Another meeting will be announced at a later date to discuss training rules, parent support and a booster club. A weight program will begin July 30.

While in Duncan, Arizona, prior to coming to Carrizozo, Eskins was defensive coordinator with the varsity football team as well as head JV football coach. Later in the season he was head of JV girls basketball and boys baseball. In addition to his head coaching position in Carrizozo, Eskins will also teach high school World History, American History and Civics.

A former sports editor on the 'Gallup Independent' in '71 to '73, Eskins later returned to Gallup to teach and assist coach at John F. Kennedy Jr. High and Gallup High.

Eskins told the group at last week's meeting that he was in Grizzly Country while he was assistant coach at the Reservation School at Zuni, N.M. in '73-'75. Zozo played Zuni twice while Eskins was with the school and it was then that Eskins first saw, "what Carrizozo had to offer."

Coach Eskins and his wife, Pat, who was introduced at the football meeting, have two children, Angie, five and Sean, three. Pat was on the board of directors for Greenlee County Special Olympics when they lived in Arizona and found the experience rewarding. Happy to be in

Carrizozo, the Eskins family will make their home in the former Marion Pherigo residence.

Other developments in preparation for the '79-80 school year include Dr. Jim Miller's announcement that they are looking for two assistant coaches.

Miller needs the assistance of the community in locating housing for new teachers that are coming to town. If anyone has a house for rent or sale, they are urged to contact the administration office.

Dr. Miller requests that individuals who have borrowed tools and equipment over the years from the school to please return them as they are presently attempting to bring the inventory up to date and planning to do routine maintenance on equipment, some of which is to be used in the vo-ag instructional program.

Interested parents and teachers are reminded that August 2, the superintendent and principal, Mr. Stephen Stewart will be on hand to discuss a parent-teacher organization which seeks to unite the forces of home, school and community on behalf of children and youth.

Inside The Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE-Well, let's see now, it's been almost two weeks since the President got on the tube and told us we ought to straighten out our lives. "Stop being so materialistic and so selfish" was what the sermon part of his speech came down to. Nothing new about that. We've heard those ideas from every pulpit in the land though he may be the first elected official to have looked us in the eye and said them straight on to us.

So how have we heeded his words here in New Mexico? Has the state of our spiritual life improved in any appreciable manner?

Well, here are some straws in the wind you can judge by.

The glow of the TV tube had hardly faded that Sunday night before our Secretary of Energy and Minerals, Larry Kehoe, was telling the newspapers to tell us we better get our wagons in a circle to keep from having all our energy ripped off. The way he put it is that "they" - some mysterious "they" who always lurk out there - are going to "ride roughshod over us." That sounded more like Paul Revere warning us that the British are coming than it did like Saint Francis of Assisi preaching to the birds, which was what the President wanted.

Then the Governor came up with a couple of ideas which be so much in the unselfish mode either. He implied that those folks back in the Big East would be out here

trying to make an energy colony of us. Not only did he say that here at home, but he went up to Denver and told it to all the other Western governors. Hardly seemed like a friendly thing to do.

Then he got to thinking about all that money that's suddenly going to be flowing through the pipeline for synthetic fuels. He pretty much announced that our state will be out there wrestling to get our full share of that good stuff - and nobody had better try to stop us.

Both of those positions sounded more like boys squabbling in the schoolyard than they did like Saint John saying of the early Christians, "See how they love one another!"

(Of course one or two of those guys who got sacked from the Carter cabinet within a few days after the Boss' allocation may not have thought the spirit of primitive Christianity was prevailing on the Potomac either.)

Some of us took to mumbling because the man back there in Washington didn't say enough about nuclear energy, and we've maybe got our dough tied up in uranium stocks, which will skyrocket if the nuclear business picks up at all. And some were griping that he didn't say enough about solar energy, which is what they're into. Hardly

anybody really seemed to be satisfied with the speech or what came after it; everybody who wanted to could find something to grumble about.

Maybe - just maybe - we would all have been able to show ourselves a little less materialistic and not quite so selfish if the President himself hadn't talked that night and over the next few days, about so much money the government is planning to spend. We're certainly not going to tell a President what to do, but we have noticed when you toss that dough around is when the ugly side comes out in most people.

Oh, well, what it all boils down to, here in Santa Fe at least, is business as usual - or every man for himself. Conclusion: The effects of President's sermons don't last any longer than those from ministers or priests.

All members and interested persons are urged to attend and meet the members of Cowbelles from all over the state.



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
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Old Lincoln Town News

The Federal Disaster Assistance Administration (FDAA) hereby gives notice to the public of its intent to reimburse eligible applicants for eligible costs for restoring or repairing disaster damaged facilities within Lincoln, Mora, Rio Arriba, San Miguel, Santa Fe, and Taos Counties designated for the June 23, 1979 Presidential Major Disaster Declaration. The facilities covered by this notice are roads, culverts, bridges, low water crossings and water control facilities damaged as a result of severe storms, snowmelt runoff and flooding during the period May 2, 1979 through June 30, 1979, inclusive. Some of these facilities were damaged in a previously declared major disaster and all are in the 100-year floodplain. FDAA proposes to fund restoration of these facilities to their pre-disaster conditions in accordance with the funding prescribed by the Federal-State Agreement dated June 26, 1979. FDAA's participation in these projects, pursuant to the President's Executive Order 11988, Floodplain Management, is based on the following rationale:

1. There are no practical alternatives for the roads, culverts, bridges, and low water crossings because such facilities are integral parts of a road network which would preclude economical relocation of the damaged facility or the road system.
2. Water control facilities cannot be economically relocated because they are functionally dependent upon floodways.
3. These actions will not directly or indirectly support floodplain development, nor increase the risk to lives and property, and will not impact on the natural or beneficial values of the floodplain.

FDAA will review each application for Federal assistance to assure minimization of any impact.

Projects not covered by this notice or the previous notice will be the subject of later public notices.

Those persons interested in the implementation of the Floodplain Management Executive Order with respect to the restoration or repair of any project covered by this notice should submit their views in writing to the Regional Director, Federal Disaster Assistance Administration, 504 Jose Street, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87501. Comments should be specific as to exactly which project (s) you may be referring to and include exact locations and/or addresses of the facilities in question.
