Clements-Cunningham Win 'Pony Express Race'

"Old Lincoln Days" Tabbed Success

Only the late Sunday afternoon shower could dampen the atmosphere of "Old Lincoln Days." The celebration carried out annually in the tiny New Mexico village, featured three days of fun, food and festivities for locals and tourists alike.

Mrs. Betty Schreengost headed up organization of the "days" which included the Pony Express Race, Old Fiddlers Contest, Parade, Arts and Crafts exhibits, and the famous Billy the Kid Pageant.

The Pony Express Race began with four teams entered at 8:00 a.m. Saturday from White Oaks. Sterling Spencer did the starting, and

finishing, honors. By the end of the race, two teams had dropped out but the team of Ted Clements and David Cunningham from Picacho crossed the finish line in the lead mailbag on the postmistresses table.

Second place finishers were Phelps and Robert Bruce Anderson of near Picacho.

The Old Fiddler's Contest under the direction of Lewis Purcella and assisted by John Ferguson both of Roswell, as always was well-attended in addition to adding light and lively entertainment.

On Sunday, the celebration was highlighted by the parade. Entries in

order of march were Police and Sheriff escorts, mounted flag bearers, 62nd Army Band, Sheriff Brady's Bunch float, The Tularosa Rose Queen-Mary Hartley, Alamogordo, 17-member Rocket Shrine Club and Clown, Old-Timers' Reunion float, Carrizozo's float—"The Good, and the Not So Good," Lincoln County Heritage Trust, Lions Motor Patrol, Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinners and Wagons, Chavez County Mounted Sheriff Possee, and the Lincoln County Development Association including many Pageant cast members.

The Parade was sparked by music played throughout by the 62nd Army Band from Fort Bliss, Texas under the direction of Chief Warrant Officer Dean A. Schutz. The 28-member band including 4 women, played a variety of march music along with several pop tunes.

One of the best-known Arts and Crafts Fairs in New Mexico, Lincoln draws artists from a wide area. Exhibits ranged from hand-painted jewelry and paintings by Naomi Eggleston of Carlsbad, weavings by Beulah Moore of Carrizozo, crafted candles and paintings by Lorene Caywood, wood Carvings by Kevin Wolf—both of Capitan, and several local Lincoln Artisans such as Walter Henn, Arts and Crafts Chairman Diane Schreengost commented that the Fair is open to anyone who would like to register and invitations are extended to desired artists. Booth fees for the exhibits is \$15 which goes to supply electricity and shelter for the exhibitors, and funds for the Lincoln County Development Association.

Food concessions of all kinds provided visitors with taste treats unlimited. Cokes, snow cones, candy, burritos, menudo, fried bread, doughnuts, hotdogs and more were consumed by the large crowds both Saturday and Sunday.

Four performances of the pageant highlighted the three-day activities. The history of the Last Escape of Billy the Kid is described as the following. "The folk pageant centering around the Life of the legendary Billy the Kid, was first presented in the year 1940. The episodes of the pageant are based on historical facts of the notorious Lincoln County War, and in particular its focus is centered upon the best-remembered of its fighters, Billy the Kid. From the killing of John Tunstall which precipitated Billy's wrathful vengeance, to the Battle of Blazer's Mill in which the courageous Buckshot Roberts stood off Billy and his twelve cohorts, to the siege of the McSween House, to Billy's incarceration in the Lincoln County Courthouse and his remarkable escape."

Pageant director, Diane Schreengost worked with over 50 people to make the presentation a true drawing card. Over 1700 tickets were sold for Saturday night's performance, with as many expected for the finale on Sunday. "Many of the players are descendants of the War's participants. All of them are everyday players of the Western scene. These people have gladly donated their time, energy, and possessions. They are the real heroes of this Folk Play—one of the very few in the United States made up entirely of local players without any outside of professional help. This is unique and living Folk Art."

This year's Pageant was dedicated to Peter Hurd, the first Billy the Kid; and John Thomas, Billy the Kid for sixteen years.

The Schreengosts especially want to thank New Mexico State Monuments for the restoration work done on the pageant grounds and surrounding buildings. The ladies cited the Pageant Committee and the Lincoln County Development Association for their cooperation and volunteer commitments in making the Lincoln Days so successful.

St. Rita Fiesta Festivities Kick-off With Vesper Service

The crowning of a Fiesta Queen Saturday night is part of Fiesta 1979 - a Santa Rita Catholic Church event this coming weekend, August 10-11-12.

Mexican food and dancing will be included in the three day church celebration. Annunciation Parish Spanish Choir of Albuquerque has been invited to participate at Sunday's Fiesta Mass and a candy-filled Mexican pinata will be broken by townchildren at the 3rd Annual People's Market Place at Spencer Park.

Santa Rita Parish festivities will begin Friday, August 10 with a 7:30 Vesper Service which will include the combined singing of the Hosannas (Community Choir) and the Santa Rita Choir. Rev. William Scholes, Presbyterian minister will be the homilist. Reading will be by Fr.

Joseph Scheib of Swissvale, Pennsylvania. During the reception which follows at the Parish Hall, the queen candidates will have their drawings for various raffles they held as money raising projects.

Fiesta Queen candidates are Monica Ortiz, Cyndi Fenter and Elisa Montano, sophomores in high school. The crowning of the queen will be at the 7:00 PM Saturday Mass, followed by a dance at the Nike. Chili and posole will be served at the Santa Rita Parish hall that evening starting at 11:00 PM.

Sunday, August 12 the Annunciation Parish Spanish Choir of Albuquerque will sing at the Fiesta Mass at 9:00 AM. They will also sing at the 11:00 AM Mass in Capitan.

Director of the group is Mary Francis Reza, an accomplished

musician on the organ, piano and guitar. She is also director of music for the Liturgical Commission of the Archdiocese of Santa Fe. Mary Francis has been a member of the Worship Team of Annunciation Parish for many years and is recognized as a leader in Spanish music in New Mexico. The Spanish Choir has been together for many years and regularly sings at Sunday Spanish Mass at Annunciation Parish and at major church events in Albuquerque.

Sunday is also the day that the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce sponsors the Spencer Park People's Market Place where Santa Rita Fiesta '79 will hold a barbecue starting at noon. Advance tickets may be purchased from any queen candidate. Tickets also available at the door. The church will also hold the drawing of the 30-30 hunting-gun and license raffle at 4:00 PM at the park.

At the People's Market there will be music, food, games, arts, and crafts. Various organizations and individuals will have booths. An old fashion treat will be home-made ice cream by the Carrizozo Lions Club.

Fiesta Bingo includes the week of church celebration activities. The black-out jackpot bingo will be held at Santa Rita Parish Hall this Sunday evening.

Mark Delgado Reinstated as Ft. Stanton Head

The New Mexico State Personnel Board voted unanimously on August 1 to reinstate Mark Delgado as administrator of Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School.

Delgado was terminated early May and began appeal at that time. With former Attorney General David Norvell as legal council, Delgado presented witnesses and evidence refuting the allegations during a two-day hearing in June at Fort Stanton. Each item in the termination letter was categorically denied.

Delgado's appeal was postponed from an original date of June 28 until August 1. Postponement was due to the large number of appeals heard by the board.

The Aug. 1 appeal was heard by four of the five-person board. Charles Lapier, chairman, Carol Munford, Gus Trujillo, Genevieve Chavez heard two other appeals on that date. The board told Delgado the June hearing report was in his favor. All three appeals heard at that meeting, were decided during executive session simultaneously rather than the separate method used in June which resulted in postponement of the Delgado appeal.

Delgado will be reinstated as administrator of Fort Stanton with his salary retroactive to his termination in May. According to State Personnel Rules the board has thirty days to reinstate.

Delgado expressed concern over this but was pleased with the outcome of the appeal.

"I'm glad there is a process for appeal," he stated.

Former Attorney General Norvell acted as legal council, being chosen from the state pre-paid legal services. Delgado stated his choice was based on Norvell's knowledge of state administrative processes.

The State Personnel Board deliberated over three hours on the cases brought before them Aug. 1. Board member Willy Ortiz was absent.

"It was a long time coming," Delgado replied when asked about the appeal. "I've missed the hospital, the kids and I'll be glad to get back to work."

Wayne A. Connell, of Alley-Connell & Associates Architects, and Joseph Ortega, Executive Director of Region VI Housing Authority, met with members of Carrizozo Woman's Club Tuesday, to review preliminary drawings of the 8-unit apartment complex project which should be completed within the next 6 to 8 months.

Mr. Ortega reported to the group that Farmers Home Administration has placed the Woman's Club project as the Number One Priority for the State of New Mexico and that the project has received mention by the national administration because it is owned and managed by women.

Those attending the session included Jan Geha, who will manage the complex, Bobbie LaMay, Viola Fenter, and Sue Stearns. The preliminary plans were approved by the members. The final draft should be completed within the next two weeks. It will then need to be approved by FMHA, and can then be let for bids, probably within the next 45 days.

The units will be built across the street from the Woman's Club building. There will be two four-plex units, with a separate laundry and storage unit. One apartment will be built for the handicapped.

The preliminary plans may be seen at the Senior Citizens Center.





Ft. Stanton Area Improved by Y.C.C.

Our Summer experience in YCC will soon be over and all to soon we will be back in the world of family and school. But all of the hard work, the tasks we did, that we thought impossible, won't be forgotten. And neither will the field trips & fun. But the most important part of our (YCC) Youth Conservation Corps, was working with old friends & the new friends that we made.

The corps originated with an act of congress in 1971. They serve a dual purpose; to provide employment for teenagers and to provide man & woman power for needed work projects.

There are 18 Lincoln County young people presently engaged in conservation projects of different kinds in Fort Stanton.

We are enjoying the experience. We are especially enjoying the educational sessions which explain how to determine the ages of trees.

We will all keep our memories alive through old friends & new experiences.



Sermon Is "SPIRIT"



Board Meets - FB Practice Begins

August 2, a group representing parents, teachers and school board met with Dr. Jim Miller and Stephen Stuart for the purpose of discussing a parent-teacher organization. Prior to the meeting, persons on hand toured the elementary building to view improvement to the freshly painted classrooms.

Before turning over the meeting to Mr. Stuart, Dr. Miller told the group of the goals he has for Carrizozo schools. He said that first of all he would like for everyone to put past school problems behind, think of the new school year ahead and providing an education for students.

Miller would "like to see the relationship between the school and community improve to a point where parents and others feel comfortable coming to school to express their concerns and suggestions."

"The administration, board and staff in turn can expect the community's assistance in co-operating with school ideas in regard to the students," Superintendent Miller added.

Miller wants the community to again show pride in their school. A large amount of tax payers money will be used to improve the physical

appearance of the schools for the students. The school will continue to work at improving the appearance of the school and would like the community to help keep it that way.

The school will work with students and parents to improve student self-responsibility, discipline and academic performance.

Stuart, principal, told the parent-teacher group he would assist them in any way he could. He and his wife have been co-presidents of PTA.

Parents, teachers and principal discussed ideas on organizing and encouraging a PTO or Joining PTA. Mrs. Danny Narvaez agreed to be acting chairperson. Meetings were set for the 3rd Tuesday of each month.

August 21 will be the next PTO meeting.

Tuesday, August 14, the Carrizozo school board will meet at 7:30 for their monthly scheduled meeting. Items to be undertaken will be a number of recommendations to the board from Dr. Miller for 79-80 teacher employment. There will be several bids presented to board including bids on janitorial supplies and electrical fixtures for the elementary building. Bus route changes will also be on the agenda.

August 14 also marks the beginning of football practice and kindergarten registration - 9:30 AM-1:00PM and 5:00 PM-7:30PM. Bring shot records and proof of birth certificate.

School begins August 20. Registration is as follows: 11th and 12th, 8:30-10:00; 9th and 10th, 10:30-12:00. They return for afternoon classes as usual. Registration for 5th through 8th at 8:30-10:30 and then they go to classes immediately.

Elementary students register at 8:30 AM. The first grade class will be released at 1:30 PM for the first two weeks of school only, thereafter they remain as usual. New students K through 12 are encouraged to enroll between now and August 20 to get paper work over with. They can then return the 20th for registration.

A very important note is that students will not be allowed to register or attend classes unless they have had the immunization required by state law. The Health office 648-2412 may be contacted for further information.

Parents who do not want their children immunized must request one of the various exemptions provided under the state law before their children will be allowed to enroll in school.

Carrizozo schools will make available low-cost insurance for interested students. K-12 school time coverage is \$5.50 and 24 hour full year coverage is \$22.00. Forms will be sent with children with more details.

Teachers Mrs. Lawson, home economics; Mrs. Vega, office education and Mr. Jones, vo-ag are attending the annual week long vocational educational conference at the NMSU campus in Las Cruces.

The annual New Mexico Coaching Clinic is being held in Albuquerque this week. The Carrizozo coaching staff is attending this week long clinic.

Junior high boy and girl sport student physicals will be August 11 at the Health Center, 8:00 AM-12:00 PM for boys and 1:00 PM-4:00PM for girls. Get forms at high school.

Carrizozo schools and teacher, Mr. Joe DeTevis are working out an art program for middle and high school students. DeTevis will be primarily an art instructor this year, teaching four art classes and one language arts.

Carrizozo Municipal Schools (Local School Food Authority) 1979-80

Carrizozo Municipal Schools today announced its policy for free and reduced-price meals and free milk for children-eligible for such meals-milk served under the National School Lunch, School Breakfast, and Special Milk Programs (as applicable).

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free and reduced-price meals and free milk as applicable.

In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, whether costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

If there is a change in family income due to reasons such as unemployment, or there is a change in family size, parents and guardians are urged to contact school officials. Such changes may qualify students for free or reduced price meals and free milk (as applicable).

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available in the principal's office in each school. The information provided in the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable state and federal criminal statutes.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

In the operation of child nutrition programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, or under the provisions of the policy, James P. Miller, Jr., Superintendent will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official he may make a request either orally or in writing to Dr. Miller, P.O. Box 99, Carrizozo, NM 88301, Phone No. 648-2451 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

Parental conferences may be called to verify information on applications prior to formal hearings.
