## ZIA Center for Developmental Services to be Incorporated

The Zia Center For Developmental Services, located in the old Lincoln County Hospital Building, is to be incorporated under the direction of a local board of directors chosen from Lincoln County. The Zia Therapy Center of Alamogordo voted in its August 14th meeting of the board of directors to sever ties with the Carrizozo facility. October 1, 1979 was set as the target date for the severance of the school.

Wayland Holbrook, Program Director for the Zia Developmental Services in Carrizozo, was present in Alamogordo for the board meeting and filed the following report: In an earlier meeting the Alamogordo facility had requested representation from the state office of Health, Education and Welfare and representation from the Zia facility in Carrizozo. Wayland Holbrook, the school's Program Director, was

present. John Gabaldon and Jerry Castillano, were present from the state HEW. Mary Rich, chair person for the advisory board for Zia, was absent but sent her personal representative, Rene Burton.

Shortly into the discussion of the business related to the Zia Developmental Services, Ms. Burton read a prepared statement from Mary Rich. The idea of the prepared statement was that Carrizozo was willing and able to provide its own

governing board for the school. Isaac Scott, chairman of the board for Zia Therapy Center of Alamogordo, presided over the meeting. The board unanimously voted to set October 1, 1979 as the target date for the severance of the Alamogordo and the

Carrizozo facilities. Wayland Holbrook, Program Director for the local facility, is proceeding with efforts to organize the local board of directors.

The Zia Developmental Services is a school for adults who are developmentally disadvantaged. At present the school has an enrollment

of 30. Individuals who are interested in becoming candidates for the board of directors for the school are asked to contact the school at P.O. Box 187,

Carrizozo. The formation of the governing board will comply with the rules and procedures set by the state of New Mexico.

## Lincoln County Fair Begins Thurs. (today), - Runs thru Sunday

The Lincoln County Fair opens today with entries in all departments accepted until noon and all livestock entries until 4 p.m.

Judging for Home Economics, Flower Show, Horticulture, Art, and 4-H Projects except Livestock will start at 2. At 4 p.m. weighing and classifications of Livestock opens.

Friday the fair opens to the public at 8 and at 9 a.m. begins the judging of livestock.

The Lincoln County Junior Rodeo sponsored by the County 4-H council begins at 7 p.m. Friday and Saturday.

Saturday the fair again opens at 8 and at 8:30 is the Pet Show in the Show

Ring, 9:30, Special Lead Class; 9:45, Trophies awarded; 10:00 Junior Livestock Sale.

The Junior Livestock Sale enables exhibitors to sell two animals. Buyers bid prior to weighing of the animals. Howard Shanks will be official Weight Master for the Fair and Livestock Sale.

There are 656 entries in the Open Class. Residents of Lincoln County are eligible. The Junior Division with 411 entries is open to 4-H, FFA, FHA, Boy and Girls Scouts.

Junior Livestock has 74 entries, including Lead Class and the Pet Show. Lead Class involves boys and girls showing at halter a sheep or goat. The pair is judged as a unit and ribbons are awarded for first through fifth place and honorable mention for every participant.

33 awards and trophies will be given.

The Lincoln County Fair began as an idea several years ago, a place for the 4-H kids to show their projects. A group of Capitan area people obtained the old school gymnasium on the present Fair Ground site and began the Lincoln County Fair.

After several fires and the instigation of a rodeo for fund raising, the present buildings and arena structures were erected.

Charles Jones, president; Fletcher Hall, vp; and Eleanor Jones, Sec.; comprising the Lincoln County Fair board with the help of many others, were instigators of the Fair and continue to operate it.

## \$850,000 is Approved for New High School Complex

Approval of \$850,000 in Capitol Outlay funds was announced at the August meeting of the Capitan School Board.

Superintendent Clifton reported the state Capitol Outlay Committee approved \$850,000 to begin construction of a high school complex. Clifton also told the board that two more requests from Capitol Outlay will be made the next two years so the high school can be completed, making the construction in three phases.

The board approved hiring four teachers and the resignations of three. George Haile, counselor; Mary Shanks, elementary; David Collins, Social Studies and Spanish; Sandra Retz, half-time English, were approved as new personnel. Sandra Collins, Lynda Sanchez and Chuck Browning resigned.

Lunch prices were raised to \$1.25 for staff, 60 cents for kids and 15 cents for special milk. The increase was attributed to inflation and a decrease in food commodities. The former 8 cent carton for special milk was at a 7 cent carton loss for the school.

A request from Fort Stanton Training School to enroll nine students was tabled until the state department could review the matter. The difficulties of having mentally retarded students within the public school were discussed. Capitan schools have no facilities or special education teachers to handle these students.

Howard Abercrombie informed the board of a Bureau of Outdoor Recreation hearing August 23. Abercrombie has proposed the board request money to construct a sport track. He reported the estimated cost of a neoprene track would be \$70,000, but an asphalt would be \$30,000 and double penetration (cinder and sand) only \$11,000.

Clifton told Abercrombie he would contact the auditor to check the actual cash balance and then with Al Clemmons about a special budget hearing.

BOR money in values matching funds. Fifty percent of the cost is covered by BOR, with a possible

twenty-five percent by the state. The school will be responsible for the remaining twenty-five percent.

The school must however pay all the bills and will be reimbursed later by the BOR. Money for the track has to be budgeted and approved by the state board of finance.

Verbal agreement was given to the Capitan Little League about the use of school property to construct a baseball diamond. The diamond will be across highway 380 from the school, adjacent to Olan's.

Board member Richard Phillips reported the Athletic Club's intention to purchase two basketball goals. The Club is seeking two more goals from the board. The board approved having Clifton see if money from improvement of buildings line item of the new budget can be used to purchase two goals. Two goals installed is \$4688.

## Capitan Village Council Awards Concrete Contract

Contract for concrete work for the village playground was awarded and easement problems were considered by the Capitan Village Council at their August meeting.

Pat Huey lowest bid at \$2912, will do the concrete work for the playground. The village has had funding and equipment for several years and is faced with a December 1 deadline.

Roy Horton Trucking was given the job of delivering sand from Belen.

Leroy Montes complained of a gate being constructed across his property and Red Barnett wanted the village to stop using an alley which crosses his property. The council agreed to investigate the complaints and suggested Barnett check with the county assessor to find the owner of the adjacent property. Agreement with the owner for easement must be obtained before the village takes any action.

Bud Combe, Carrizozo-Capitan Gas Company boardmember was reappointed. Combe's term was to expire next month. Gas rates were discussed and the council was informed of the need to work on a customer rate increase. Present rate is 75 cents per 1000 cubic feet of gas plus any costs that come from El Paso Natural Gas Company, the supplier. The proposed building to house Village Hall and Gas Company offices was briefly discussed. The possibility was questionable due to laws concerning public buildings.

A complaint by Mrs. Pope concerning water running from the alley onto her property was made. Mrs. Pope claimed the alley was higher than her property because dirt had been hauled last winter to fill low muddy spots. She was seeking action to drain the alley so water ran down it, not onto her property.

Larry Caywood, Village Maintenance Engineer agreed to investigate.

Councilman Benny Coker cited another complaint of poor drainage due to a clogged culvert.

Greg Hasler of the Upper Hondo Soil Conservation Service asked permission to begin tree planting around the sewerage lagoon. Hasler reported the trees would be purchased from the state forestry service. He proposed a drip irrigation with water from the lagoon used.

Caywood requested the trees be planted outside the fence. He asked if the trees would decrease the evaporation rate for the lagoon.

Hasler added the project would begin next spring and the council approved the project.

Dog problems brought complaints before the council but no action was taken.

A report on the new water lines showed 5th street complete and 4th street ninety percent complete. When the project is finished, driveways will be graveled, Caywood reported.

Attorney, writer, historian William A. Keleher in his book "Memoirs: 1892-1969, A New Mexico Item" recalls his time as clerk of the Albuquerque school board in 1907 and 1908. The school staff consisted of a superintendent with a monthly salary of \$383.33; a clerk at \$60.00; five janitors, each paid a monthly salary of \$80.00; five principals with salaries ranging from \$125.00 to \$135.00. There were forty-three grade school teachers with starting salaries of \$55.00 per month, with maximum salaries of \$85.00 per month. High school teachers of history, Latin, science, and mathematics were paid from \$83.00 to \$125.00 per month, depending on years of service. Music and art supervisors were paid \$133.33 per month.

One of Keleher's duties as school board clerk was to make out and deliver the paychecks to the em-

## New Fuelwood Policy on the Lincoln National Forest

Jim Abbott, Forest Supervisor of the Lincoln National Forest, announces a new forest-wide policy regarding fuelwood gathering on the Lincoln National Forest. In the last few years the number of people gathering fuelwood for their own use has skyrocketed. This increased use has resulted in road damage, soil erosion, and other environmental damage on many of the more popular areas.

Under our present policy each district ranger has acted on his own to deal with the problem on his district and the different practices on the districts has been very confusing for everyone. With the new policy Abbott hopes to eliminate confusion, provide a better service to the public and at the same time do a better job of managing impacts on the land.

"Concentrating the impacts on a smaller area will allow us to use what funds are available to maintain or repair roads, control erosion, and rehabilitate damage," Abbott said. Most of the designated areas will be free use areas as in the past, but in some cases there will be charges for permits. "Administering a good fuelwood program is expensive," Abbott said, "and charging a nominal fee will enable us to return a little money to the Treasury." Some of the

money collected will be used on the fuelwood cutting area to rehabilitate damage and to improve the area for wildlife habitat purposes.

If you want a fuelwood permit on the Lincoln National Forest after September 1st, here is how to proceed:

1. Determine what area, on which you wish to cut wood. Maps of the designated areas are available at ranger district offices and at the Forest Supervisor's Office in Alamogordo. The map will tell you whether an area is free use or charge. It will also give you information on the type of wood available for cutting.
2. For charge permits you must contact the ranger district office having jurisdiction over the area in which you wish to cut. Free-use permits for any free-use area on the Forest can be obtained at any ranger district office or the Supervisor's Office in Alamogordo. Requests by mail will be filled by return mail whenever possible.

Additional information will be furnished to you when you apply for a permit.

The energy crisis, a windstorm, and two heart attacks hasn't discouraged Ralph Henke, 44-year old California automotive body and fender man from looking forward to the time when a sponsor will come along with 25 grand to put his 165 gallon gasoline motor home on the road and in the RV shows.

"an ego trip....." That's how Henke of Rowland Heights, California describes how he feels about the publicity he receives from the fact that he is the designer, builder and owner of the world's biggest motor home of which he has already invested \$33,000 of his own money.

Henke and his motorhome have been shown on California TV, National Enquirer, Los Angeles Times, Motor Home Life Magazine and Mechanix Illustrated (March 1979).

Cars - old, antique, junked - has brought Henke to Carrizozo five times in the last 12 months. The heart attacks put him on 100 percent disability that resulted in a cut in income so Henke meanwhile has been transporting old cars to California where they are resold and restored. Cars of the '40s and '50s are the most in demand for restoring. Henke says Carrizozo and surrounding areas are good country for old cars because the dry atmosphere keeps them from rusting easily.

The engine of his 7-car transporter blew out dust outside town which resulted in a weeklong stay in Carrizozo this time. A familiar face at Four Winds Restaurant, Jackie's Cafe and the Crossroads Motel from earlier trips, Henke estimated he lost approximately \$1,000 in lost time, another engine, labor, room and board.

But the get But the east going Henke didn't seem to mind. While his truck underwent repair at Hobbs Auto Repair, Henke talked shop with Wayland Hill, local body and paint man and car enthusiast.

Why did Henke build the world's biggest motor home? A question news media reporters invariably ask Henke. Says Henke, "I can't psychoanalyze myself."

Henke can't understand how anyone can be satisfied going through life just working 9 to 5 everyday. A constructive man at heart, he loves to restore old cars in his spare time as well as on the job. He says, "they are part of our heritage and carried our grandparents around." He enjoys taking raw materials and building something. "I like to work with my hands," he said.

Henke calls Truly I is 85 percent complete.



U.S. Senator Harrison Schmitt announced today that he intends to renew the Bureau of Land Management budget in a hearing to be held Saturday, August 25. The hearing will be held at the main branch of the Albuquerque Public Library and will be open to the public.

Schmitt said that previous hearings in the State examined legal authority for BLM activities, "but tight management of congressionally appropriated funds can provide an immediate and direct control over BLM activities."

Schmitt's hearing will identify areas where funds have been expended for purposes, or in a manner contrary to, the law and the intent of Congress, and areas where the insufficient appropriation of funds has hindered the BLM from fulfilling the intent of law.

"In recent years, the BLM has become involved in a number of controversial issues which directly affect New Mexico's citizens and economy," Schmitt observed. He added that his hearing, and those held recently by Senator Pete Domenici, should provide an overview from which problems can be solved.

Schmitt's hearing will be under the auspices of the Senate Appropriations Committee. The topics to be covered include the expenditure of funds appropriated by Congress and derived from grazing fees on rangeland improvement and on the development of Environmental Impact Statements on grazing allotment plans. This will include a review of wildlife management and predator control.

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


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

# Travel to Washington, D. C.

Roby McDaniel, Mona Payne, Debbie K. Gallacher, Yvonne Jones and Brent Sultemeier returned home August 4 from Washington D.C., after completing Citizenship Washington Focus a week long experience in citizenship at the National 4-H Center.

These five youths were part of the 37 who represented New Mexico there were twelve other states having a total of 600 people present for the session. The program is designed to help young people understand the structure and function of our system of government, the heritage of our country's development and prepare plans for active citizen involvement when they return home.

Using the nation's capitol as a "classroom," the program included a day on Capitol Hill to meet with members of Congress and see government in action.

# Exchange Teacher Visits Carrizozo Area

"School students attend 13th grade following their 12th year of education, the school day ends at 1:35 p.m., and student reports are issued twice a year." (If a student has a "6" or several, he or she has not been minding their three R's - reading, riting, and rithmetic.)

Marion Stachick, teacher, sits in the living room of her 'host family' and tells the NEWS about schooling as taught in Krefeld, Germany.

Visiting New Mexico through an arrangement called the American Host Program which specializes in placing foreign teachers in the United States, Marion was placed first in Albuquerque and later in Carrizozo.

Owners of Belco Industries, Jim and Carolyn Cantrell and their family Elaina 16; Lisa 14, and Bryan 10 are the Carrizozo host family that Marion recently spent two weeks with.

The Cantrell family showed Marion around Lincoln County. The sight seeing included a tour of Mal Pais-Valley of Fires State Park, a stop at Lincoln 'Billy the Kid Country', a picnic at Baca Camp Site, and a hike up Sierra Blanca. Marion also was in historic White Oaks where she attended a White Oaks Historical Association meeting with Jim and Carolyn, who are members.

Other side trips were to White Sands National Monument and the Cantrells took Marion to Nogal to show her the progress made on their new home.

Marion, who is fascinated with Indian culture, did not leave Carrizozo without a special trip to the Mescalero Apache Reservation at Mescalero.

Prior to arriving in Carrizozo July 15, Marion had spent two weeks in Albuquerque with a host family upon her arrival in the United States from Germany. While in Albuquerque, she and her host family toured the Indian pueblos in the area and visited the Indian Cultural Center where she saw Indian arts and crafts.

In 1975, Marion stayed in Pennsylvania with three host families. Marion's hobbies include pottery making and Indian history reading. She was delighted when her application with the American Host Program was accepted for a second trip to the United States. Marion chose to visit New Mexico.

During the NEWS interview, Marion, whose long bond hair was in two long braids & who looks younger than her 28 years of age, spoke on education in West Germany. Marion is a German and English language teacher in Krefeld, Germany. She also teaches art.

Education in West Germany, as in the United States, is controlled chiefly by the state government. In Germany, children must go to school from age six to 18 and religious instruction is given in school.

In the fourth or fifth grade, a child's future education is decided on the basis of special tests. On the basis of these tests, a student is transferred to a higher level school called

'Gymnasium' for grades 5 through 13. (In Germany and some other European countries, this secondary school is for preparing students to enter a university.)

Students who do not transfer to Gymnasium attend 'Hauptschule' or 'Realschule' both schools are grades 5 through 9. On graduation from this level, they may attend either full time or part time vocational school along with being an apprentice for a master craftsman in a craft or trade.

Marion, after elementary schooling, attended Gymnasium in Koblenz, Germany. She enrolled at Pädagogische Hochschule in Bonn for three years. (Although 'hochschule' translates into English as 'high school', in Germany it is a teacher training college.)

Following graduation in 1973, and a year of practical and theoretical teaching in Krefeld, Marion became a fully examined teacher.

Marion, who teaches in the Hauptschule level gives her students achievement progress marks with numbers "1" through "6". Number six being the equivalent of an American "F". Teachers are off only for a six week summer vacation but have quite a few breaks through the school year including one week for autumn, two for Christmas, three for spring and Easter Holy Days.

When asked the name of the Hauptschule in Krefeld where Marion teaches, she replied with a smile, "It goes by the name of the street where it is located."

Hafelsstrasse Hauptschule where Marion is employed has a total of 43 teachers. Lessons 45 minutes long are taught to about 1,000 students. Two breaks for "school yard" or a sandwich is part of the school day. Although the school day ends at 1:35 p.m., some teachers and students must return for afternoon classes if they have not met their lesson requirements. Marion said she has been fortunate that she has not had to remain after 1:35 p.m.

Krefeld, population 225,000, last year formed a parent-teacher 'board' for its schools, similar to United States parent-teacher associations or organizations. Marion said that a school principal who does not necessarily set the rules of the board, is its leader.

The board participants do not include all parents and all teachers but a selection of each, who previously had met with all interested parents and teachers. Board representatives are then selected who are 'speakers' at the board which meets twice a year. They discuss ideas on curriculum methods and materials to be used on behalf of students.

Marion, who rides a bicycle to school recalled transportation for her U.S. trip - train from Krefeld to Hamburg - airplanes to New York and Albuquerque - bus into Carrizozo. School students in Germany do not have special bus service as American students. They either use public service street cars, ride bicycles, or walk.

Scheduled for school teaching duties in Krefeld on Aug. 6, Marion left Carrizozo on July 26. Soon she will be telling her pupils of the sights in Lincoln County and the Land of Enchantment.

Although Marion is not a cooking enthusiast, she may tell her students how to make Kiva Bread or Indian Fry Bread following instructions in her new Indian cookbook. Or perhaps she will tell her students of the United States gas crunch, which will make them appreciate their two-wheelers!

## EMS Council Will Meet August 27th

Bob Brooks, Associate Administrator for the High Plains Hospital in Clovis and President of the Region III Emergency Medical Services Council, has announced that a special committee of the Region III EMS Council will meet at the Sally Port Inn in Roswell, August 27, beginning at 12:30 p.m. The purpose of the meeting will be to explore all possibilities of funding (local, state and federal) for the Emergency Medical Services needs of the Region and also to study and make recommendations to the whole Council on the most efficient methods of Council administration.

The EMS Region III is made up of Health Planning Districts IV and VI of New Mexico. District VI encompasses Otero, Lincoln, Chaves, Eddy and Lea Counties. All Emergency Medical Services in all communities of each of these Districts and Counties are of direct concern to the Region III EMS Council. Future funding will be for the purpose of training emergency medical personnel, the purchasing of emergency medical service equipment, the setting up of a Region III EMS system, the refinement of an EMS communication network, and supporting of a full-time staff person for the region. All Region III EMS members and interested persons are invited to this meeting.

**'New' Used Car Business to Locate in Carrizozo**

At a special Carrizozo town meeting held August 23, Bob "Rod" Rodman was granted permission by the council to locate a temporary used car business on land situated on an area which town attorney referred to as an "agricultural and low density residential zone."

Joe Orsak moved and Roy Harmon seconded to grant an exception to the zoning ordinance on a conditional use for a used car lot for a period not to exceed two years. An extension could be granted if Rodman comes before the council with proper justification.

Although adjoining property owners were contacted and encouraged to attend the special meeting, none were present. The

English signed a zone certification for the Rodman's so that they could obtain their dealership license. The Rodmans plan to locate a permanent used car business on a lot they own across from the A&I Supply Inc., Hiway 330 and E Avenue.

"We want to fix it up right," Rodman answered when asked when the permanent location would be ready.

Mr. and Mrs. Bob Rodman, formerly of Loveland, Colorado were accompanied to the special meeting by Bob Means, who is Mrs. Rodman's brother. Rodman, known as "Rod" worked in Carrizozo 29 years ago for Means as a body and fender man.
