## BSI Announces Agreement

Bank Securities, Inc., a New Mexico bank holding company, announced an agreement in principle with Robert O. Anderson, his sons, Phelps and Robert B., and A.G. Hamilton for the latter to purchase approximately \$9.45 million of BSI securities. The BSI securities in the proposed transaction would consist of

200,000 shares of new BSI capital stock and \$8.75 million of debentures of subsidiary banks with warrants for the purchase of 500,000 BSI shares.

The agreement in principle is subject to various conditions, including the Anderson group being satisfied with the condition of BSI and its subsidiary banks, all requisite regulatory approvals and the negotiation and execution of definitive agreements. Fulfillment of such conditions cannot now be assured.

As a part of the proposed transaction the Anderson group would succeed to control of BSI and would obtain irrevocable proxies for 290,000 outstanding BSI shares currently held by certain major stockholders. The Anderson group members would become BSI directors, together with up to three other nominees. Messrs. Ted Bonnell, Maurice Hobson and John Petty will remain on the BSI board of directors and maintain their BSI stock ownership. Mr. Robert O. Anderson would be elected BSI Chairman of the Board and Mr. Hamilton would serve as its President and Chief Executive Officer. Mr. Anderson is Chairman of the Board of Atlantic Richfield Company and resides in New Mexico. Hamilton, a resident of Carlsbad, New Mexico, is a director of the American Bank of Carlsbad and is Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of Oncor Corporation of Houston, Texas.

Robert B. Anderson resides in Roswell and is president of The Lincoln County Land & Cattle Company. Phelps Anderson is a member of the board of directors of the First National Bank of Roswell, president of the Tinnie Mercantile Company and a member of the New Mexico state legislature.

It was also announced that BSI entered into an agreement with the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System relating to certain policies of BSI and its subsidiary banks. During the past months of the BSI Board of Directors adopted revised loan policies. BSI management believes that the Federal Reserve agreement will not materially change existing lending policies of the BSI in conversation today with Robert O. Anderson, expressed his elation over the joining of two New Mexico families into the BSI family.

For 29 years banking has been the most important business part of Mr. Bonnell's life. During this time BSI has grown, developed and contributed to the well being of the state of New Mexico and its people. The Bonnell family has been in the banking business three generations, beginning in the Tularosa Basin in 1912. Ted Bonnell joined the family bank in 1950. He has been an innovator on the New Mexico banking scene and established the state's first domestic bank holding company. Many advanced banking systems in use in New Mexico today owe their origin to Bonnell. His civic career has paralleled his banking career and encompassed many positions from advisor to governors to the top position in Rotary as district governor. His ventures into the humanities have been recognized throughout the region, especially his efforts on behalf of New Mexico Boys Ranch.

Beat Melrose 21-0

## Undeclared Capitan Wins

To quote coach Henson, "We were breaking a tradition."

In the last few years, Capitan has always been on the losing side of a match with Melrose. That is until last Friday night.

Capitan beat Melrose 21-0 to be one of only seven New Mexico teams to be still undefeated. This week in Capitan another undefeated team, Hagerman, will be in town to do battle with the Tigers.

Ritch Sanchez scored all three TD's with Tim Proctor converting on all three extra points.

The Tigers had 247 total yards, all rushing compared to 173 yards for Melrose.

"The offensive line played real well throughout the entire game. We put together three long drives, just the opposite as the Cloudercroft game," Coach Henson stated.

He continued, "In the Cloudercroft game we had a bunch of big plays, with Melrose we just stuck to it and kept going 4 and 5 yards a play."

Sanchez rushed for 153 yards, averaging 6 1/2 yards a carry.

Junior Johnny Lamay had 80 yards rushing averaging a little more than 6 yards a carry. Lamay also scored twice, but both TD's were called back for penalties.

Coach Henson praised the offensive line for their constant pressure citing Tim Proctor, Ruben Chavez, Deke Lamay, James Burch, and Tracy Maxwell for their efforts.

On Defense Henson singled out Tim Proctor, Tracy Maxwell, Mark Emello, and Scotty Townley. Townley intercepted a Melrose pass.

Henson commented, "It was a very wet field, so when we won the toss we elected to kick instead of receive. Melrose fumbled, but recovered their own fumble," Henson added, "We took the ball 70 yards in our first possession and scored."

This Friday at the Tiger's field, Capitan will host powerhouse Hagerman. The number one spot in 1A ball is at stake with the winner either number one or mighty close.

Capitan under Henson two years ago beat Hagerman, to be the first 1A team in three years to do so.

"We will be doing our best to do it again," Henson said.

## Rex Wilson Nominated to Receive (FFA) Degree

Rex Wilson of Carrizozo has been nominated to receive the American Farmer Degree, highest degree presented by the National Future Farmers of America (FFA) Organization. Rex was nominated for the degree by the New Mexico FFA Association. The nomination was approved at a recent meeting of the National FFA Board of Directors in Alexandria, Virginia. One of 788 FFA members nominated for the American Farmer Degree, Rex will receive the degree in a special ceremony on Thursday, November 8.

Travel awards will be presented to American Farmer Degree recipients to offset their travel expenses to the National FFA Convention in Kansas City. The cash awards are sponsored through the National FFA Foundation by J I Case Co. of Racine, Wisconsin; Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc., of Des Moines, Iowa; The Federal Land Bank Systems of the United States; Amoco Oil Co., of Chicago, Illinois, and The Chevrolet Motor Division, General Motors Corporation, of Detroit, Michigan. At the convention each American Farmer Degree recipient will be presented a gold key and certificate by the National FFA Organization.

The American Farmer Degree is much sought after because it is only presented to approximately one member in 700 of the 494,394 member organization. It is presented only by the National FFA Organization to members who have demonstrated exceptional agricultural and leadership achievements.

Rex is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Walt Wilson and is currently attending N.M.S.U.

He earned the American Farmer Degree on the basis of Beef Cattle Production.

Rex's high vocational agriculture instructor and FFA advisor is Ken Jones of Carrizozo.

To qualify for the American Farmer Degree, FFA members must have advanced through a system of degrees unique to the FFA organization. FFA members begin as Greenhands and after one year of membership may be advanced by the local chapter to the Degree of Chapter Farmer. The third degree, that of "State Farmer," is presented by the State FFA Association to two percent of the State's FFA membership in any one year. Only students who have earned the State Farmer Degree are eligible for the American Farmer Degree.

The National FFA Convention, an annual event of the Future Farmers of America and is carried out in cooperation with the U.S. Office of

Education, of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. This year over 20,000 FFA Members, vocational agriculture teachers, parents, and guests are expected to take part in the 52nd National FFA Convention.

The convention is conducted entirely by student members between the ages of 14 and 21. Six National FFA Officers take charge of all business sessions and 122 official delegates represent the membership in voting on all issues of business.

In addition to the American Farmer Degree, many other FFA awards are presented during the convention. Contests are held in dairy, livestock, poultry, meats, milk quality and dairy foods, agricultural mechanics, floriculture, nursery-landscape, farm business management, and public speaking.

## Zia Changes to 'New Horizons, Inc.'

The Zia Therapy Center in Carrizozo has changed its name and its directorship. The new name is "New Horizons, Inc." according to Mary Rich, Chairman of a twelve person governing body.

The administration for the center had been through the Zia Therapy Center in Alamogordo. Now the twelve person board will handle all of the decisions.

"There is a movement to de-institutionalize all persons who are capable of returning to the mainstream of life either in a shelter home or fully with the proper training," Rich stated. She continued, "We hope to run a pilot program for New Mexico in the placement of developmentally impaired students. These people can successfully be trained to become productive members of society."

New Horizons will continue the contract with Ft. Stanton for the daily training of about 30 students into skill areas, and the placement of the students with employers.

Others on the board of directors are: Bill Payne, Vice Chairman; Bob Stearns, Sec. Treasurer; Father Dave Berg, Rev. David Lynch, Betty Dean, Lucy Wilson, Dr. Craig Nelson, Delfina Vega, John Allen Hightower, and Howard Shanks.

Chairman Rich also stated that no personal changes are anticipated at this time.




### Back the Grizzlies Join the Boosters!!
