"Autumn Fantasy" is Theme for Woman's Club Convention

The Carrizozo Woman's Club was the site for the District Convention held September 27-28. The Carrizozo and Capitan Woman's Clubs co-hosted the 2-day affair.

The Convention theme of "Autumn Fantasy" was carried out beautifully with dried flower arrangements and fall-colored weavings by Beulah Moore of Carrizozo.

Registration began Thursday morning at 9:00 A.M. for over 90 delegates and visitors from all over southern New Mexico.

A luncheon hosted by the Junior

Clubs of District IV featured enchiladas and accompaniments furnished by the Carrizozo and Capitan Clubs, opened the Thursday session.

The Convention formally opened at 2:00 A.M. with Mrs. Albert West of Canutillo, president of District IV, presiding. Welcome addresses were given by Mr. Scott Shafer representing the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Howard Shanks representing the Capitan-Carrizozo Ruidoso State Bank, and co-chairman Mrs. Bob Stearns and Mrs. Bill MacVeigh.

Two workshops were presented

on Thursday afternoon concerning crime reduction and membership as they relate to Woman's Club projects.

Thursday night was highlighted by a banquet at "The Four Winds" New Mexico Federation of Woman's Club President Mrs. Emil Kiehne of Reserve gave the State President's Address. Mr. Joe Worthen of Capitan entertained with piano and song, followed by installation of new District officers.

Friday morning started off with a continental breakfast catered by Jackie Martin of Jackie's Cafe. Sister Gail Stackpole presented a warm Memorial Service for Club members who have passed away this year. Providing music for the Service were Kathy Cope and Jane Shafer of Carrizozo.

Final workshops of the convention concerned Leadership given by Mrs. James Ogden NMFWC President-Elect; Parliamentary Procedure, by Mrs. H.A. Bowling, NMFWC Parliamentarian, and Canceled Cancer by Mrs. Leona Carlson, District IV Chairman. Dr. Amy Barton guest speaker, spoke to the woman on early signs of cancer and answered many pertinent questions on the disease.

Capping off the convention, a noon luncheon hosted by Carrizozo's Canyon Cowbells was served. Kathy Cope accompanied by Jane Shafer entertained. Mrs. Lorene Caywood, Arts Chairman, presented awards from the cultural arts show.

The Convention adjourned with an invitation to the 1980 District Convention to be held in Glenwood.

Survey Taken on Town's Opinions

Carrizozo, a small town of 1,500, located in the south central part of New Mexico. A small town with few problems. Our task was to determine what the residents of the town say are the major problems. We interviewed a total of 50 of Carrizozo's youth, and 30 adults. Here are the results:

Of the students interviewed we were easily able to find five dominant problems:

(A) 70 percent of the students interviewed said maintenance around Carrizozo needed improvement. Maintenance covers a broad area such as the streets, trashy upkeep of vacant lots, upkeep of vacant buildings, etc.

(B) 24 percent said that there was not enough activities for the youth, but necessarily recreational activities but also the lack of jobs.

(C) 15 percent said that the school system should be improved so that graduates not going on to college will be able to cope better with society.

(D) 15 percent said that Carrizozo needs more business, more places to shop. A person has to travel to great distances to find adequate shopping facilities.

(E) 12 percent said that the laws on drunkenness, speeding, theft, etc. should be more strictly enforced.

Out of the 30 interviewed, the responses were slightly similar to that of the students:

(A) 83 percent said that maintenance around Carrizozo needed improvement. Maintenance covers the same basic areas as covered earlier.

(B) 27 percent said that there was not enough employment for youths and adults. Covered in this area is recreation.

(C) 37 percent said that stray animals were the major problems, not necessarily abandon animals, but also animals that aren't kept at home.

(D) 18 percent said that not enough people get involved in community affairs.

(E) 17 percent said that there were too many people on government programs such as welfare, food stamps, etc.

These percentages add up to more than 100 percent because every person gave two responses. The question asked of the people was "What do you think are the two biggest community problems?"

The next part of this survey dealt with finding the two largest problems from the student poll and the adult poll combined. Obviously the biggest problem is Carrizozo's maintenance. Out of 80 people interviewed, 75 percent said this was the major problem. The second problem is not so obvious, but we decided it had to be that there was not enough to do as far as recreation and jobs. 25 percent of the people interviewed responded with the above problem.

We then asked the people if they had any possible solutions to these

problems; here is a sample of their responses. To problem 1: Petition the city council, and then the city council will have proof that they need some financial help from the Federal Government if money is the problem. If not some people said everyone should get together and pitch in a little and have massive clean up operation. The solution to problem two was fairly universal: A majority of the people said that a committee should be formed that would encourage business to come to Carrizozo. This same committee would also inform the people of Carrizozo about the facilities available in Carrizozo.

In conclusion we would like to say we learned a lot from this survey. We were aware of these problems, but we had little idea that the rest of the population felt the same way. We learned something about poll taking and got a new insight into the problems around Carrizozo. Some people were reluctant to comment, and some didn't say anything. A majority of the people were cooperative though, and very happy to help. This survey was not designed

to incriminate or put down the people who work hard to keep these problems from getting out of hand. These problems are certainly not out of hand, none of the people interviewed were angry with the job these people are doing. This survey just points out some possible problems in Carrizozo, and only represents 5 percent of the population. The results of this survey do not necessarily reflect the opinions of Carrizozo High School's teaching staff, faculty, or the persons involved in its production. Help!! Help!! Indians!

It happened on a cool Sunday at Highrolls, New Mexico in the spring of the year 1928. Highrolls was a small fruit growing village located at the top of what is known as Box Canyon. It was a stopping station for a logging train on its way to Cloudercroft from Alamogordo. Jerry Fulton, a singer from the Pittsburgh Student Prince Choir, and I were working for a survey crew making a study for a new highway along La Luz Canyon from Las Luz to Highrolls. The new road would avoid the dangers existing on the road up Box Canyon which was hewed from sheer rock cliffs. Our boss was T. G. Brown, "a Rambling Wreck from Georgia Tech".

Jerry and I were waiting at the station to see the daily logging train pass by. An old man was sitting on the station platform whittling on a stick and chewing tobacco. Jerry asked

him how long he had lived in Highrolls. "Well," he answered, "when I was a young man, my partner and I stopped at the mouth of Box Canyon on our way to the California Gold Rush. We had just made camp when we heard Indian war cries from the nearby Mescalero Mountains. We jumped on our horses and headed up the canyon with the Indians close behind us. All of a sudden we come to a dead end, with steep rock cliffs facing us on all sides. We climbed up a tall pine tree. The Indians circled us, and we began shooting. We shot a lot of them before we ran out of ammunition."

Then the old man stopped whittling, spat more tobacco juice, but did not continue his story. Jerry was excited and impatient. "What happened then, Pop?" The old man went on chewing his tobacco and spitting, but finally he answered, "Son, the Indians killed us both."

It was the third loss of the season

for the Grizzlies who played good football for two quarters only to see the second half cost them a game again.

Carrizozo got on the board first with Arthur Vega going on from one yard out in the second quarter. Vega, Orlando Samora and Larry Beltran carried the ball well for the Grizzlies mounting up the scoring

drive. The tally put Carrizozo on the scoreboard first and marked the first touchdown of the year for them.

But a 65 yard run, (coupled with a two point conversion) following the first play of the ensuing kickoff put Carrizozo behind. They took the break behind, despite a good first two quarters, 8-6.

A fumble on the Carrizozo twenty yard line that rolled all the way

into the end zone to be recovered by Cloudcroft spelled early what was to come in the second half. And despite the fact that the Grizzlies kept the Bears out of the end zone for the second half defensively it was all Cloudcroft needed to salvage the win.

"Our kids have been picking up in different areas of the game every week," said Ekins. "And last Friday we felt we were ready to get our first win. The kids played tough and tightened up where we were weak against Hatch defensively, so we did see many positive things."

Orlando Samora headed the defensive effort at Cloudcroft and was named "Defensive Player of the Week" for his efforts. The Grizzlies also got good performances from other Grizzlies some of which were defensive ends Arthur Vega and Marc McKinley. David Samora, Robert Hemphill and J.P. Ventura did equally well on the line with sophomore John Vega picking off an interception from his safety position. The defense also recovered a fumble.

Offensively Arthur Vega was tabbed as this week's "Offensive Player of the Week". Vega ran well from his fullback position picking up key yardage in the first half.

"Our offensive linemen played well in the first two quarters," said Jerry Peckinpaugh. "Most everything worked for us in the first half. We had trouble picking up stunts in the second half though we didn't move the ball as well as we should have."

Offensive linemen David Zamora, Pat Ventura, Todd Lindsay, Marc McKinley, John Herrera, Steve Payne and John Aguilar do most of the work up front for the Grizzlies. "Said Ekins, "These kids are a rare bunch. They haven't shown any signs of letting down and every week seem to want to get with it again. These kids are winners."

Carrizozo travels to Melrose this week to take on the Buffaloes who registered a 45-6 victory this past weekend over Tucumcari's junior varsity.

Health Hints

VITAMINS?—MINERALS? What's right for me? Am I taking the right kinds or the right amounts?

These are some of the questions I've been hearing lately. There are several methods of determining what vitamins and-or minerals your body needs. Blood analysis can show individual or composite pictures of what your body was going at the time the sample was taken. Urine analysis has limitations, but can show some mineral values. Hair analysis (preferred method) shows the accumulation values of many minerals on a long-term basis and when accompanied by a list of foods eaten can be a very accurate test.

My concern regarding the above questions is that taking over the counter minerals & vitamins (or drugs for that matter) without knowing which ones your body needs, or worse yet, has already too much of, could be detrimental to you health.

On one occasion, a hair analysis I did on a 32 year old woman, with severe skin problems, nervousness, and loss of hair, revealed an overdose of several minerals. Since childhood she had been on a vitamin-mineral supplement because her parents took them. I could spend a great deal of time and space on this subject, but suffice me to say just this—Don't guess—Know!

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
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Polly's Potpourri Around Town & Surrounding Areas

This award program is designed to recognize and encourage excellence in the field of professional Extension work.

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
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



yards to the 5 yard line but lost the opportunity to score on two long penalties.



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Archeologists in Lincoln County

Archeologists may find discoveries of gold-filled tombs in Egypt but closer to home a handful of pottery from a site in Lincoln County tells us about "our" past and the human populations that lived 600 to 800 years ago in our area and who developed complex cultures.

Modern technology is destroying the records of human occupation in the United States. Housing developments, shopping centers, strip mining and roads are the cause of prehistoric site destruction.

Construction of a new highway near Angus has begun. Four Santa Fe archeologists and their crew of six county residents are eager to complete their search for evidence of ancient civilization before road construction reaches their location and our historical heritage is scattered, plowed under and black-topped.

Funds are provided to conduct surveys and preserve treasures before sites are destroyed. Since February, 1979 the archeologists, like detectives have studied the sites and objects found as a way of learning about the past. They have found where villages stood, salvaged whatever they could, figure out the age of remains and reconstructed a way of life from what was found.

Some important sites in North America have been ruined for scientific study by relic collectors and vandals. Removal of artifacts or disturbing a site destroys the evidence archeologists need to understand the culture of ancient villages.

Archeologist's training includes the study of languages, history, anthropology and such sciences as botany, geology and zoology. Archeologists have the assistance of many scientists such as geologists, botanists, zoologists, petrologists, chemists and physicists.

At research facilities and laboratories scientists analyze and identify material uncovered at sites. They help archeologists date material, establish a chronology and preserve finds. Some careers in archeology include museum work, government service, teaching and writing.

The four archeologists working in the Angus area are Steve Post, Yvonne Oakes, Daisy Levine and their director Robin Farwell.

A crew of six Nogal and Carrizozo residents (archeologist's helpers) play an important part in the search for the unwritten record of ancient times. They are Michael Wright and Lisa Townley of Nogal; Dorothy Zamora, Gaby Palomarez, Teresa Padilla and Debbie Ortiz, all of Carrizozo.

Since the archeologists and their crew began their work early this year they have endured very cold and very hot weather conditions in their efforts to unearth traces of the past. But there have also been many nice days and important finds that revealed human activities that made up our ancient society and how early man lived in Lincoln County hundreds of years ago.

The following is the account by Robin Farwell, Director, of the work and evidence uncovered at Angus:

The Museum of New Mexico is continuing archeological excavations along state road 37 near Angus for the month of September.

Seven sites were found within the proposed right-of-way of the new road, all of which will be destroyed as a result of highway construction. The sites are being excavated in compliance with state and federal legislation protecting cultural

properties. Excavation of the sites is being accomplished by four archeologists from the Museum in Santa Fe with the help of a local crew.

A backhoe was loaned by the New Mexico Hiway Department to make

exploratory trenches, but all other work is done by hand. Both rooms and excavation units are excavated by measured levels so that the archeologist is able to completely reconstruct the site once the information is back in the lab.


The largest of the sites contains several rooms which are 600 to 800 years old. Occupied by the ancestors of the modern Pueblo Indians, the site may have been a small village, possibly seasonally occupied. The occurrence of grinding tools such as

manos and metates suggests activities such as corn grinding while the large numbers of arrowheads found would also indicate hunting enterprises.

Several pottery types have been found at the site. The three dominant painted types are Chupadero B-W (white background, black design), 3 Rivers B-W, and El Paso Polydrome. There is also a great deal of plain ware or "cooking" ware. Pottery similar to this is common in the Southeast part of the State and as far south as Mexico.

Excavations will continue through the month of September by which time the recovery of all archeological data will be accomplished.

Disturbance of these sites by any person other than the Museum crew is a federal offense.






