Gets Life Imprisonment --

Robert E. Cox Convicted

Both men involved in the murder of Sheriff's Deputy Tom Bedford were convicted and sentenced Wednesday. In District Court, Robert Elton Cox, pleaded non contest Wednesday morning to a charge of murder in the first degree in the Otero County Courthouse in Alamogordo.

Lincoln County Deputy Sheriff Tom Bedford on October 8, 1979. The charge to which Cox pleaded did not include any allegations of aggravated circumstances.

An allegation of aggravated circumstances would have required a separate trial by a jury on the issue in addition to the trial on the

murder charge.

If aggravated circumstances had been found, the death penalty would have been imposed upon Cox.

Forty year old Cox will be eligible for parole after thirty years in the New Mexico State Penitentiary.

District Attorney Frank Wilson stated, "The reason the death penalty

was not sought was based on prior knowledge that the defendant would plead no contest to murder in the first degree without aggravated circumstances."

Wilson continued, "The decision to accept the plea to a life sentence would have been different had Cox's companion not been a juvenile, had his companion been more successful in the polygraph examination; had his companion not had as extensive record of adjudication for delinquency; and had the murder weapon been found.

Cox was taken before the court at the Honorable Robert Doughty, District Judge.

Mr. Cox pleaded guilty to first degree murder, a capital felony, and was sentenced by the court to be incarcerated in the New Mexico State Penitentiary for a term of Natural Life.

In the children's court in Lincoln County, the sixteen year old juvenile companion of Cox admitted commission of multiple criminal acts including harboring or aiding Cox after the murder, but not the murder itself.

The matter was before the Honorable George Zimmerman, District Judge.

Louis Anthony Salandre, 16, of Albuquerque was sentenced to two years in the Boy's Correctional facility at Springer for rehabilitation.

Salandre was tried as a juvenile and so the charges were delinquent charges instead of felony charges.

Salandre's parents were with him at the juvenile trial and the sentencing. The prosecutor was Dan Bryant, Assistant District Attorney, and the Defense Attorney was Carrizozo Attorney Don Walls.

Dear Mike,

SCM RC&D REPORT

The South Central Mountain RC&D Executive and Steering Committees held their regular meeting in Carrizozo this week.

Project measure progress was given on eight measures. The Pinon pipeline was reported as having plenty of water for the ranchers in that area. The cost of the project was high and difficultly with construction was encountered, but the people of Pinon are very pleased to have water. Bob Bell of Weed said he first started working on a way to get water there 12 years ago.

It was reported that Congress has appropriated \$32 million dollars for RC&D's continuance, and many think the RC&D will be strengthened and emphasized in the future because of its objectives of people helping people to find a means of getting problems solved and projects completed.

A film entitled "These are Our Forests" was shown by Herman Alencio with the New Mexico State Forestry Dept. Mr. Alencio stressed that the demand for firewood is now great, and that controls are essential for substantial use of wood. The demand for wood in the past few years has increased from ten thousand to eighty thousand persons in New Mexico alone.

It was announced that the New Mexico State Soil and Water Conservation Districts will conduct public hearings on Phase II of the Resource Conservation Act in January.

-I wrote this to the Ruidoso News and thought you might like to re-print it!
ED. NOTE: I certainly would.

Sir:

I must say, I was dismayed and thoroughly disgusted with your editorial on Oct. 18, 1979.

First, let me ask you, have you ever in your life been placed in the position of those officers, under those circumstances, jittery, apprehensive, etc., having in their custody an alleged killer of a very fine officer of the law. He was shot down like a dog. Such a person as this suspect has many tricks up his sleeve. Regardless of how well trained those officers were, in circumstances such as that, it is a matter of survival. Who knows the true circumstances at this point?

I received training by one of the finest service of the United States. The United States Marine Corps. Discipline, respect for authority and the right of others are of utmost importance in their training. During World War II in Okinawa, that training did not stop me from being jittery. The slightest movement in the brush or in a tree, and I was ready to open fire. In a sense, those officers

Winner to Face Mt'Air in Quarter Final Play-offs

The Capitan Tigers defeated Mountainair Friday night 13-12 at Mountainair preparing them for this Friday's final game of the season against District rival Carrizozo.

A win Friday night will put Capitan in 2nd place behind Reserve who is 2-0 in District play beating both Capitan and Carrizozo.

In the first quarter, the Mustangs missed a field goal attempt and turned the ball over to the Tigers on their 20 yard line. Fourteen plays later taking up most of the 2nd quarter, Jeff Greer completed a pass to Johnny LaMay for 20 yards scoring first. The extra point was blocked finishing the first half 6-0 for Capitan.

Following the break, Mountainair came out with a drive ending in a touchdown but Norvell Carpenter blocked the extra point to bring the score to 6-6.

It was a standoff until three minutes left in the game when Mark Samello punted for 70 yards. The Mustangs fumbled on their 25 yard

line recovered by Capitan. Two plays later the score was 13-6 as Johnny LaMay scored on the option and Tim Proctor kicked the extra point.

With less than a minute left in the game, the Mustangs scored on a long pass. They tried for 2 extra points but were stopped leaving themselves one point short at 13-12 in Capitan's favor.

Statistically, the game was very close. Capitan rushed for 180 yards compared to 140 for Mountainair. The Tigers passed for 20 yards while the Mustangs had just over 50.

Commenting on the game, Coach Henson said, "We had super defense. We shut down their running attack forcing them to the air. However, with four interceptions and a fumble recovery, there was nowhere else for them to go." Henson says, "Last week was a crucial game for us as far as our attitude goes. We played as well as we were earlier in the season. We will be full strength this Friday, something that we haven't been since the first half of the Tatum game."

The Tigers are 5-3 on the season and face Carrizozo Friday in a must-win contest. The winner will face Mountainair in the quarter final playoffs next week. Game time in Carrizozo is 7:30 p.m.





Health Hints-

Spinal Curvatures

A spinal curvature generally begins in early childhood and steadily becomes worse. Chiropractors are able to correct such curvatures, providing they have not progressed too far; that is, if the patient is not too old and if the degree of curvature is not so marked that the bony segments of the spine have lost their normal shape and size.

Muscular Tension
Numerous ligaments and muscles are attached to the spine. These ligaments and muscles extend from the spine in opposite directions, with an equal number on each side. Every muscle is supported by nerve fibers which carry motor impulses from the brain to the muscle tissue. If anything occurs to produce an excessive amount of these motor impulses, the muscle is over contracted. In the case of the muscles along the spine, this causes the vertebrae to be pulled to one side.

Far-reaching Effects
There are many far-reaching effects of spinal curvature which the patient does not realize. The curvature forces vertebra of the spine to assume an unnatural position; this may strain muscles or ligaments, crowd the internal organs and impair circulation. Spinal curvature may irritate the spinal cord and nerve trunks also. These nerve trunks supply various

organs of the body. Therefore, it may be said that any organ could be affected, and any bodily function impaired, because of spinal curvature.

How Does Chiropractic Help?
Electrical change along a nerve membrane is called a nerve impulse. Nerve impulses are transmitted from the brain to the cells, tissue, muscles and organs of the body through the spinal cord.

If misalignment of the spinal vertebra occurs due to a spinal curvature, nerve impulses become distorted and cause the body to malfunction.

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



On handing out the "C" awards to her girls, Stephenson had special words of appreciation for each girl, as did Schippers and Bush for their football team.

TAX NOTICE

The Lincoln County Treasurer's office is in the process of preparing the 1979 tax billings for mailing. All tax billings will be mailed prior to November 5, 1979. Property taxes are payable in two equal installments. First half payments are due November 5, 1979, and become delinquent December 5, 1979. Second half payments are due April 5, 1980, and become delinquent on May 5, 1980. 
of sparring, running, jump rope and hitting the bag. These six Zozo boxers were awarded medals for high score and sportsmanship. They were




