Boundries Change

A letter, endorsed by the President of Cattle Growers, Phil Harvey, to State BLM Director Zimmerman concerning a change in BLM Boundries was approved and signed by the Lincoln County Commissioners at their first 1980 meeting.

Commissioner Hightower informed the other commissioners of a change in BLM Boundries to have them comply with county boundries.

County Manager Truman Billingsley reported he had received no notice from the BLM of this change.

The letter expressed the concern of the leasees over the change. The advisability and the total lack of consultation with the leasees about the change were major complaints.

Hightower reported the change was not publicly announced but that leasees had been informed by letter.

Also approved was giving Roswell office of the Criminal Justice Commission \$700. The money will be used to defray costs created a federal cutback. Lincoln County representatives requested \$2500 last meeting when the item was tabled.

Assistant D.A. Dan Bryant endorsed the office because it provides more direct funding to rural agencies and because of local representation.

County Manager Billingsley reviewed the findings of the audit report compiled by NEFF and Co. Three items were listed for improvement: no inventory of assets, no monthly cash reconciliation and no purchasing system.

Billingsley informed the commissioners of the need to inventory all county surplus property. He also told of the present cash reconciliation, which began recently. This is not computer processed because it is at capacity and must be done by hand.

Three Injured in Accident

Three men were injured Sunday morning in a one car accident on Highway 380, 8 miles west of Carrizozo.

A 1974 Mercury was headed west on 380, went off of the right shoulder of the road and traveled approximately 150 feet on the right shoulder.

The vehicle hit a rock embankment, flipped end over end once, and came to rest on it's top.

The four door vehicle came to a stop 5 feet from the edge of a 50 foot drop off.

The three men were Arthur Marquez, 44, from Vaughn; Orlando Pacheco, 48 from Santa Rosa; and Daniel R. Vaughn, 35, from Vaughn.

The three were brought by ambulance to the Carrizozo Health Clinic by Emergency Medical Technician Jan Geba and Bud Payne. EMT

Gilbert Archuleta joined them in transporting one of the injured, Marquez, to Gerald Champion Memorial Hospital in Alamogordo.

Marquez suffered a fractured left elbow and a puncture wound in the back of his shoulder.

The accident time was listed as 1:15 a.m.

Marquez, the driver of the vehicle was cited by State Police for reckless driving and was charged with DWI (Driving while under the influence of alcohol.)

I still do not feel that liquor is appropriate at a fire station. I did go to one fire meeting some time ago, and upon observing the consumption of alcohol at the fire station, I felt that I would not feel at ease. It is my opinion that alcohol and professionalism do not mix.

This is not to say that I don't take a drink once in a while, only that I don't when I am working or driving.

State Law for the record

46-10-11. Drinking in public places--Selling or serving liquor other than in licensed establishments.--It shall be unlawful to drink or consume alcoholic liquors, or for any person who is the owner or proprietor to sell, serve, furnish or permit the drinking or consumption of alcoholic liquors in any public dance hall, pool room, bowling alley, street, state or federal building, or in any other public place or any public or private club, key club, or coffee house whether operated for profit or not except establishments having a license to dispense alcoholic liquors. It shall also be unlawful for any licensee to give any kind of "curb service" of alcoholic liquors except in unbroken packages, outside of the building on the premises at which licensee's business is operated, except to customers seated at tables.

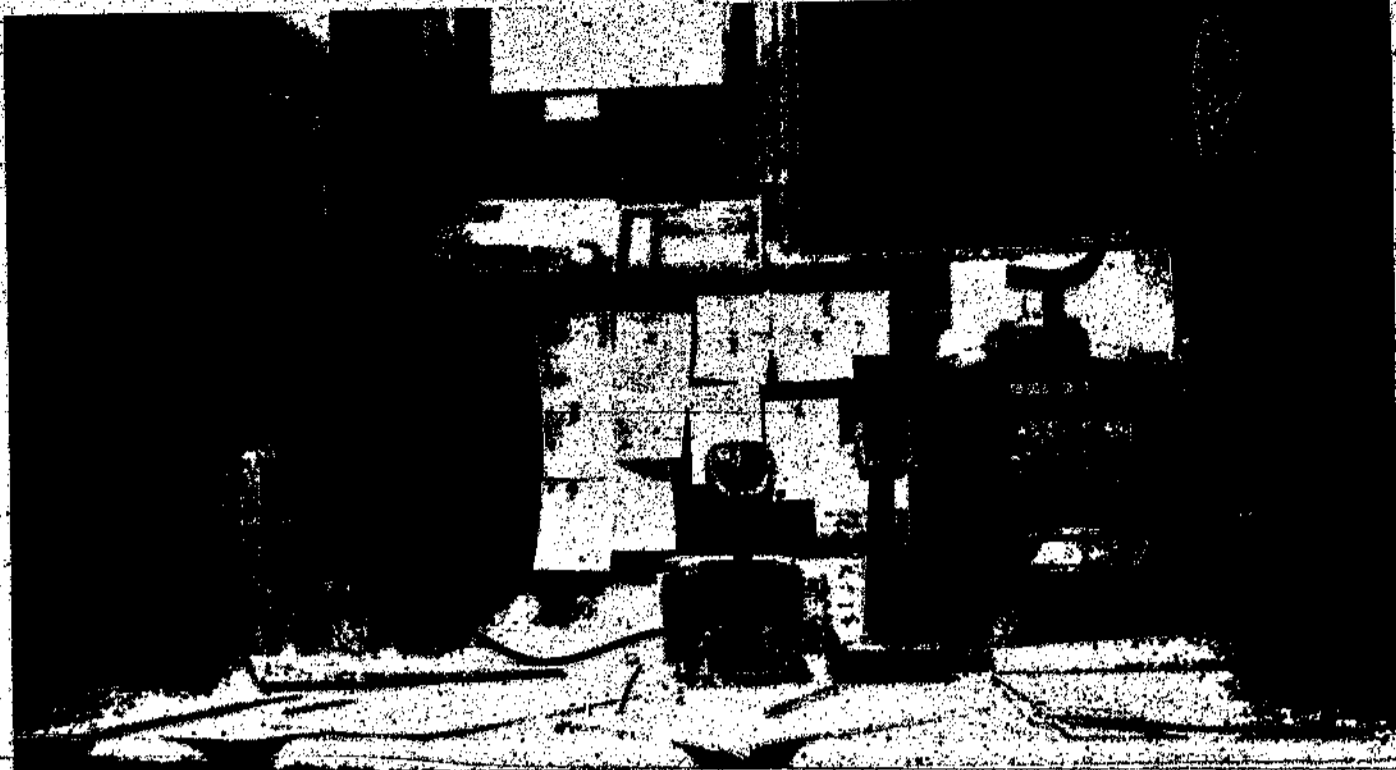

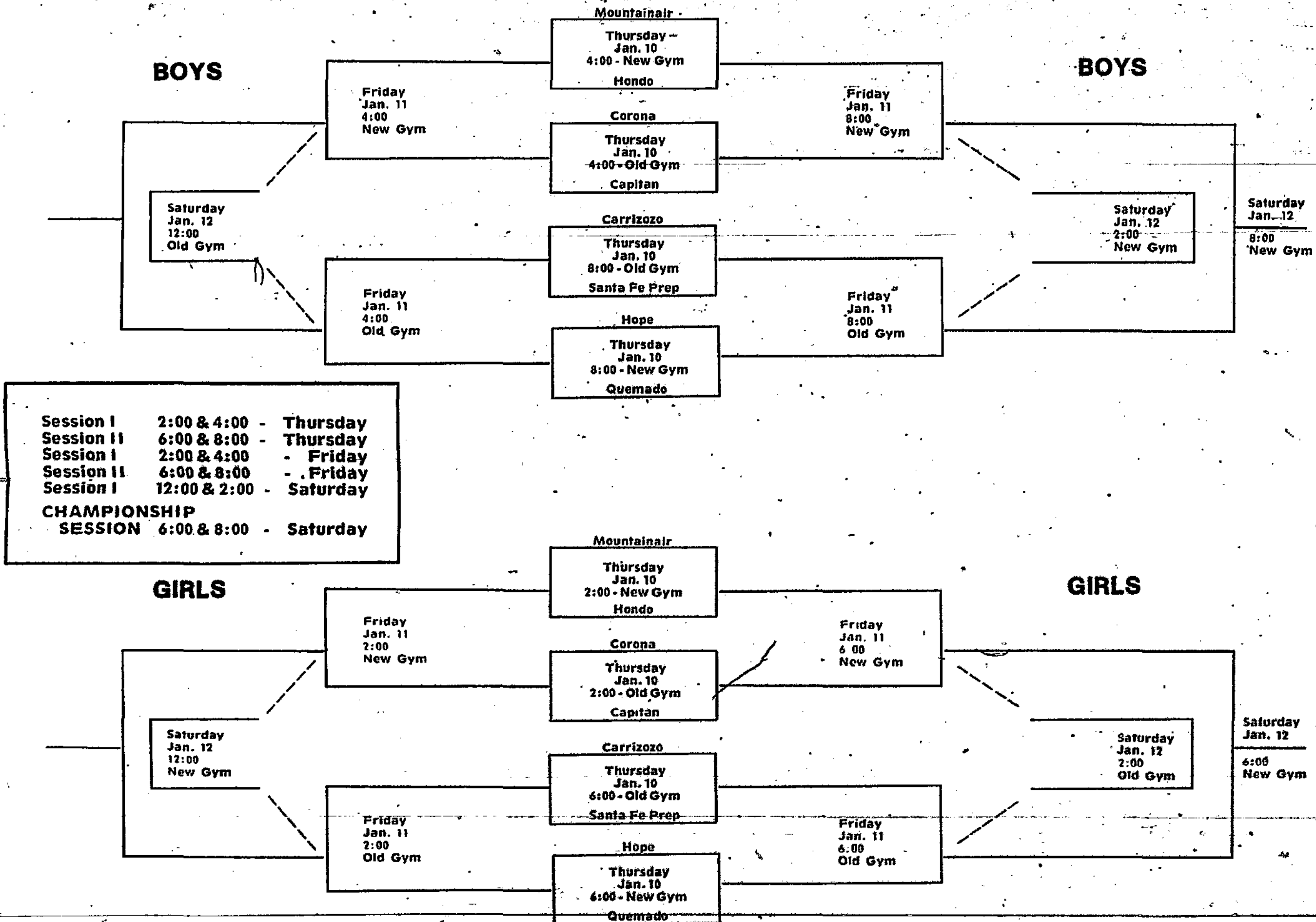
