Violation of 'Open Meetings Act'

Olsen Challenges Town Council's Appointment of New Mayor

Following the special town meeting for the appointment of mayor last Tuesday evening, one of the "three gentlemen interested in becoming mayor of the town of Carrizozo" voiced his opinion to the NEWS concerning the council's decision:

"The decision of the council is null and void by law, because the decision was made in an illegal closed session."

Les Olsen, who expressed interest in the mayor vacancy said that "the conduct of the council as a group was highly questionable" in their decision

to meet in closed session for discussing the persons interested in heading the town government and for emerging from this session with the announcement that "Sonny" (Roy C.) Banning had been appointed the new mayor.

Acting in place of Jesse English

who resigned at the January regular meeting. Trustee Manuel Hernandez (Mayor Protem) opened the special meeting last Tuesday. He asked the council if the appointment of a new mayor to serve English's remaining two years should be handled "here (in public) or executive session?"

Hernandez said that there are, "Three gentlemen interested in becoming mayor of the town of Carrizozo - Les Olsen, Sonny Banning and Michael Swickard." He said that they had "three alternatives, maybe four."

Olsen challenges the decision following the closed session, "based on the fact that the council violated the Open Meetings Act" and that the matter ought to be reviewed by the District Attorney.

"I have no intention of hurting Banning," Olsen said in explaining that he personally did not have anything against the new mayor appointee.

The fact remains that the council very obviously made a decision behind closed doors," Olsen stated. He said that discussion of mayor options did not justify a private session, as this did not involve litigation or personnel matters.

Prior to the special meeting Town Clerk Christine Chavez drew numbers to see how Hernandez, who is running for re-election and Banning, who had filed for trustee, would appear on the ballot for the March 4 town elections. Hernandez and Banning were seeking the same two year trustee positions.

Banning who has not been sworn in is the minister of the Church of Christ, a juvenile probation officer and a certified relief man for the town police.

Ruben Zamora and Trustee Joe Orsak are running unopposed for two other trustee positions, each for four years. At this time it is too early to know if any write-in contender will throw in his/her hat in the ring for any of the three trustee positions on the March ballot.

Imagine Mr. Banning's surprise at being chosen Mayor after he had indicated a desire to be a Town Councilman and there were two others interested in being Mayor.

It is not that Sonny minds being Mayor exactly, it just is a case of where he might do the most amount of good.

And the decision is his as to whether he will take the council's offer of being Mayor, or continue to run for Town Council.

This is not to say that Mr. Banning will not take the Mayor's position, I guess we'll all have to wait until February 11th to see who is sworn in, or at MS.

LETTER FROM LES OLSEN TO ATTY. GENERAL

To: Jeff Bingerman, Attorney General State of New Mexico

Subject: Town Council Meeting of January 29, 1980-Open Meeting Act-Town of Carrizozo.

Facts:

1. The previous mayor, Jesse English, resigned January 15.
2. The Town Council concluded the position of mayor could not be put on the upcoming ballot for election of new councilmen.
3. The Town Council decided to appoint a mayor to fill the remaining two years.
4. Three residents, Mike Swickard, Les Olsen and Sonny Banning campaigned, that is asked people to call the councilmen in their behalf.
5. A special meeting of the Town Council was held January 29, 1980. Whether the special meeting was properly advertised may be an important question, since it involves the appointment of a new mayor.
6. The special meeting was called to order by Manny Hernandez, Acting Mayor.
7. A motion was made and seconded and approved to enter into closed session.
8. The stated reason, uttered by Joe Orsak, councilman, was to discuss the council's "options". No mention was made of discussing the qualifications or sensitive information about any of the candidates, nor was it represented to the public audience that the candidates were to be discussed. The Acting Mayor made it clear there were three options, maybe four.
9. Upon emerging from closed session, the Acting Mayor announced that "...a mayor has been selected". And proceeded to announce that Sonny Banning was selected by unanimous vote in private session. The council then approved a motion to appoint Banning mayor.
10. The meeting was adjourned, Banning not having been sworn in.

The option of being mayor or running for council rests with Roy "Sunny" Banning.

The council decided to appoint Banning mayor after meeting in a closed session.

Banning has not been sworn into the post of mayor and as of Thursday, not withdrawn his name from the race of Town Councilman.

Contacted Wednesday, Banning stated to the NEWS, "I appreciate the vote of confidence that the Town Council has shown me, and after I give this matter serious consideration, I will decide if I would rather continue with my plans to run for the Town Council or accept the position of Mayor."

Banning continued, "My original plans were to run for Town Council, and not the post as Mayor."

The next meeting of the Carrizozo Town Council is set for February 11th

BLM Representative Clarifies Proposed Boundry Change

Dan Rathburn, representative of the Bureau of Land Management appeared before the Lincoln County Commissioners to clarify the proposed boundry change.

Rathburn apologized for the letter which stated the change was definite, not a proposal. He told the commissioners he will meet with individuals to work out the change. Ranches on the boundry lines will be reviewed and the land will be put into one or the other districts.

Lincoln County is presently split into two districts, Las Cruces and Roswell. Under the proposed change, Lincoln County would be under the Roswell office entirely.

"I want to emphasize the change is not a final deal at all," Rathburn added. The change was considered

mostly bureaucratic. BLM hoping the change would help those ranchers who now deal with two district offices because their land lies on the present BLM boundries.

Due to a Feb. 1 deadline, on the contract agreement with Kent Nowlin Construction for box culvert & low water crossing construction, the Commissioners awarded the contract to Nowlin. Money for the project will come from the Federal Disaster Administration Agency but has not been officially approved. Bill Redd from the State Planning Office recommended the county approve the entire project and begin with the \$85,000 advance by the FDAA. Total cost for the culverts, damaged in the 1978 flooding will be \$130,000.

Five county roads were approved

for submittal to the State Highway Cooperative Agreement Program for fiscal year 1981-82. Bonita Dam Road; Country Club Road, Carrizozo; Cedar Creek; Sun Valley; and the Capitan-Nogal Cutoff were to be submitted.

County Road Supervisor Guy Healey told the Commissioners the Cedar Creek and Sun Valley Roads were the "biggest headaches" in the Ruidoso subdivisions.

The Cooperative Agreement involves 50 percent matching work and money. Carrizo Canyon road in Ruidoso was completed under this program.

\$2000 was approved for the Zia Senior Citizens Center in Carrizozo. Jan Geha, representative of Zia,

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—There is really no difference between this year's legislative session and those of any other year, though we were promised faithfully there would be.

This year, they said, all the big money bills would be done early; they aren't; they aren't. This year, they said, both houses would have plenty of time to examine every important piece of legislation; they won't. This year, they said, there will be no last-minute crash—but there will be.

The problem this time is that nobody's sure who's the leader. So each house gropes its way along, perhaps not knowing who will exert the most influence on it until the next 60-day session.

That gives the governor more room in which to maneuver, and that's just what he's doing.

SCANDAL AT UNM: A subcommittee of the House Appropriations and Finance Committee started out only to do some fact-finding about the University of New Mexico, not to investigate it. The facts it found, however, were so troubling it turned the hearings into something much like a full-scale investigation.

Almost nobody came out of the thing looking good. Regents and administrators swore they had everything under control, and repeatedly swore such trouble could never happen again. What they failed to answer was how it happened the first time.

The new athletic director and coaches sounded fine, with their assurance that things would take a whole new track-until word got out that the new football coach has just signed either junior college transfers, of the very kind that got the now disgraced basketball coach into this fix in the first place.

One or two faculty members, who took the time and trouble to come up and have their say, had the whole thing right; it's time to forget all about that win-at-any-price attitude which is appropriate only for those operating semi-professional sports. It's time to start treating athletes like any other students, including making an effort to see that most of them get a degree.

IGNORED? We can't help asking whatever happened to the President's wage and price guidelines, as we listen to all this talk about the extent of the raises state employees are supposed to get.

We agree those who work for the state were treated shabbily last year, but does that entitle us to ignore the inflationary effect of what's about to happen now?

We don't oppose their raises, necessarily. We just think somebody ought at least to raise this issue.

FORMULA EDUCATION: One item the UNM situation makes clear is how much pressure educators are put under by the state's system of

funding them so many dollars for every student. That creates a heavy temptation to try hard to increase the number of your students.

There are fair indications, for instance, that the bosses at UNM put out the word that almost every student who applied was to be admitted, and that hardly anyone was to be thrown out after once being in.

What results from that kind of logic is a moral compromise and a decline in school standards which are hardly worth of an institution of higher learning.

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On Beef Rearch Program

Beef Producers to Vote Feb. 19-22

Beef producers will vote early in 1980 on whether they want a nationally coordinated Beef Research and Information Program. According to Pablo Roybal, Chairperson, New Mexico State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The upcoming referendum was announced by Assistant Secretary of Agriculture F.R. Smith. He said beef producers will be asked to register for the referendum between Jan. 28 and Feb. 9.

They vote by secret ballot Feb. 19-22.

The Order issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture authorizing the program provides for a Beef Board of up to 68 producers to administer the program. There would be as many as five non-voting consumer advisors to the board.

Each state or geographic area would be represented on the board in proportion to its share of the U.S. cattle industry.

The program would be funded by assessments based on the value of cattle sold (20 cents per \$100.00).

After two years, the board could recommend an increase up to five-tenths of one percent.

All sellers in the marketing chain would be assessed. The buyer at the point of slaughter would deduct the total assessment and forward it to the board. Any producer could request and receive a refund of the assessment paid.

Ray Fitzgerald, Administrator of the department's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, (ASCS) said his agency will conduct the referendum. The department's Agricultural Marketing Service would monitor the program.

Rules for registering and voting in referendums have changed. The department determined that 10 days (8 working days) would be sufficient for all producers to register and that the four-day voting period would result in a more efficient voting procedure and reduce administrative costs.

A similar Order, issued in 1977, although favored by 56.4 percent of voting producers, did not receive the required two-thirds approval. Since that time, the Beef Research and Information Act has been amended by Congress so that a majority of producers will be sufficient for approval of the Order.

Following the change in legislation, beef industry organizations proposed a new Order. A public hearing has been held in five locations. Based on the hearing testimony, the department issued a recommended decision and Order in September.

Comments were accepted for 45 days and were considered in developing the Order.

Mr. Roybal said producers may register and vote at local ASCS offices. Registration and voting can be completed by mail if information and ballots are requested in advance.

The registration period for Lincoln County voters will be January 28 through February 6, 1980. Registrations will be accepted in person at the county office until Feb. 6 and those sent in by mail must be postmarked before midnight Feb. 6 and received in the county office by Feb. 11.

Voted ballots will be accepted in person at the county office beginning Feb. 19 through Feb. 22. Ballots that are mailed in must be postmarked before midnight Feb. 22 and received in the county office by Feb. 26.

Ballots will be counted in the county office February 27, 1980.

The Order and notice of referendum is scheduled for publication in the Federal Register December 14, 1979.

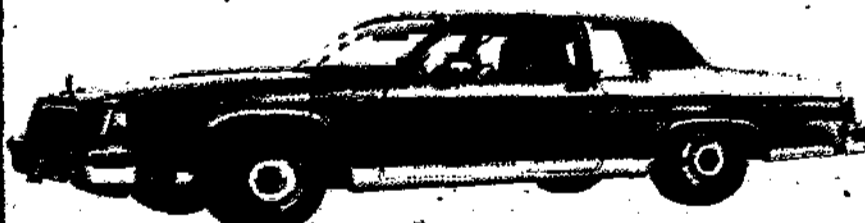
