Contacted Wednesday, Banning stated to the NEWS, "I appreciate the vote of confidence that the Town Council has shown me, and after I give this matter serious consideration, I will decide if I would rather continue with my plans to run for the Town Council or accept the position of Mayor."

## **BLM** Representative Clarifies Proposed Boundry Change Dan Rathburn, representative of smostly bureaucratic, BLM hoping the . for submitted to the State Highway

the Bureau of Land Management appeared before the Lincoln County Commissioners to clarify the proposed boundry change.

Rathburn apologized for the letter which stated the change was definite, not a proposal. He told the commissioners he will meet with individuals to work out the change. Ranches on the boundry lines will be reviewed and the land will be put into one or the other districts.

Lincoln County is presently split into two districts, Las Cruces and Roswell. Under the proposed change, Lincoln County would be under the Roswell office entirely.

"I want to emphasize the change. is not a final deal at all," Rathburn 1978 flooding will be \$130,000. added. The change was considered

change would help those ranchers who now deal with two district offices because their land lies on the present BLM boundries.

Due to a Feb. 1 deadline, on the contract agreement with Kent Nowlin Construction for box culvert & low water crossing construction, the Commissioners awarded the contract to Nowlin. Money for the project will come from the Federal Disaster Administration Agency but has not been officially approved. Bill Redd from the State Planning Office recommended the county approve the entire project and begin with the \$85,000 advance by the FDAA. Total cost for the culverts, damaged in the

Facts: 1. The previous mayor, Jesse

English, resigned January 15. 2. The Town Council concluded the position of mayor could not be put on the upcoming ballot for election of new councilmen.

3. The Town Council decided to appoint a mayor to fill the remaining two years. 4. Three residents, Mike Swickard, Les Olson and Sonny

Banning campaigned, that is asked people to call the councilmen in their behalf. 5. A special meeting of the Town Council was held January 29, 1960.

Whether the special meeting was properly advertised may be an important question, since it involves the appointment of a new mayor.

4. The special meeting was called to order by Manny Hernandez, Acting

7. A molion was made and seconded and approved to enter into ciosco sension.

8. The stated reason, uttered by Joe Orzak, councilman, was to discuss the councils' 'options'. No mention was made of discussing the qualifications or sensitive information about any of the canpublic audience that the candidates were to be discussed. The Acting Mayor made it clear there were three options, maybe four.

9. Upon emerging from closed session, the Acting mayor announced that . . . "a mayor has been selected". And proceeded to amounce that Sonny Banning was selected by manimous vote in private session. The council then approved a motion to appoint Banning mayor.

10.The meeting was adjourned, Banning not having been sworn in.



# Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE-There is really no difference between this year's legislative session and those of any season past, though we were promised faithfully there would be.

This year, they said, all the big money bills would be done early; they aren't; they aren't. This year, they said, both houses would have plenty of time to examine every important piece of legislation; they won't. This happen now? year, they said, there will be no last-

minute crush-but there will be. The problem this time is that nobody's sure who's the leader. So each house gropes its way along, perhaps not knowing who will exert the most influence on it until the next 0-day session.

That gives the governor more room in which to maneuver, and that's just what he's doing.

SCANDAL AT UNM: A subcommittee of the House Appropriations and Finance Committee started out only to do some factfinding about the University of New Mexico, not to investigate it. The facts it found, however, were so troubling it turned the hearings into something much like a full-scale investigation.

Almost nobody came out of the thing looking good, Regents and administrators swore they had everything under control, and repeatedly swore such trouble could never happen again. What they failed to answer was how it happened the first time.

The new athletic director and coaches sounded fine, with their assurance that things would take a whole new track-until word got out that the new football coach has just signed cither junior college transfers, of the very kind that got the now disgraced basketball coach into this fix in the first place.

One or two faculty members, who took the time and trouble to come up and have their say, had the whole thing right: It's time to forget all about that win-at-any-price attitude which is appropriate only for those operating semi-professional sports. It's time to start treating athletes like any other students, including making an effort to see that most of them get a

IGNORED? We can't help asking whatever happened to the President's wage and price guidelines, as we listen to all this talk about the extent of the raises state employees are supposed to get.

We agree those who work for the state were treated shabbily last year, but does that entitle us to ignore the inflationary effect of what's about to

We don't oppose their raises, necessarily. We just think somebody ought at least to raise this issue.



# Beef Producers to Vote Feb. 19-22

Beef producers will vote early in 1960 on whether they want a nationally coordinated Beef Research and Information Program. According to Pablo Boybal, Chairperson, New Mexico State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The upcoming referendum was announced by Azsistant Secretary of Agriculture P.R. Smith. He said beef producers will be asked to register for the referendum between Jan. 28 and

They vote by secret ballot Feb. 19-

The Order issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture authorizing the program provides for a Beef Board of up to 68 producers to administer the program. There would be as many as five non-voting consumer advisors to the board.

Each state or geographic area would be represented on the board in porportion to its share of the U.S. cattle industry.

The program would be funded by assessments based on the value of cattle sold (20 cents per \$100.00).

After two years, the board could recommend an increase up to fivetenths of one percent.

All sellers in the marketing chain would be assessed. The buyer at the point of slaughter would deduct the total assessment and forward it to the board. Any producer could request and receive a refund of the assessment paid.

Ray Fitzgerald, Administrator of department's Agricultural Stablization and Conservation Service, (ASCS) said his agency will conduct the referendum. The department's Agricultural Marketing -Service would monitor the program.

Rules for registering and voting in referendums have changed. The department determined that 10 days (8 working days) would be sufficient for all producers to register and that the four-day voting period would result in a more efficient voting procedure and reduce administrative costs.

A similar Order, issued in 1977, although favored by 56,4 percent of voting producers, did not receive the required two-thirds approval. Since that time, the Beef Research and Information Act has been amended by Congress so that a majority of produces will be sufficient for approval of the Order.

Following the change in legislation, beef industry organizations proposed a new Order. A public hearing has been held in five locations. Based on the hearing testimony, the department issued a recommended decision and Order in September.

Comments were acce days and were considered in developing the Order.

Mr. Roybal said producers may register and vote at local ASCS offices. Registration and voting can be completed by mail if information and ballots are requested in advance.

The registration period for Lincoln County voters will be January 28 through February 6, 1980. Registrations will be accepted in person at the county office until Feb. 6 and those sent in by mail must be postmarked before midnight Feb. 6 and received in the county office by Feb. 11.

Voted ballots will be accepted in person at the county office beginning Feb. 19 through Feb. 22. Ballots that are mailed in must be postmarked before midnight Feb. 22 and received in the county office by Feb. 26.

Ballots will be counted in the county office February 27, 1980. The Order and notice of referendum is scheduled for publication in the Federal Register





## Game & Fish News

I sure am glad good of "Mom" dropped all this frozen precipitation on Southeastern New Mexico this pastweek. Despite having to douge snowballs and having to assist stranded motorists for a couple of days, the snow was a welcome sight as we needed the moisture desperately.

There is something about a good snow that seems to always make the hunters in the crowd think about rabbit hunting, particularly for delicious tasting cottontails. The recent snow was no exception as our phones became quite busy with people calling to see if it was "safe" to hunt rabbits yet.

Their expression of safe refers to their concern of rabbits being carriers of tularemia or the plague.

Therefore, I took it upon myself to contact the State Medical Office in Santa Fe for a quick summary of tularemia and plague cases in New Mexico last year.

I talked with Dr. Richard Hoffman, the acting State Epidemiologist. He told me that there were 3 cases of tularemia and 4 cases of plague confirmed in our state last year.

Of the 3 tularemia cases only one was believed to have been rabbit related. It involved an individual in the Ruidoso Area that had been rabbit

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hunting in January of lest year.

Of the 4 plague cases, again only one was believed to have been rabbit related. It involved a 19 year old boy that lived in a small community near Las Vegas. Apparently the boy's dog had caught and tilled a rabbit and shook it vigoreusly. The rabbit must have had plague - carrying fleas that eventually hosted upon the boy Despite intensive care, the boy died.

Hoffman went on to explain that tularemia, also called rabbit faver, is

Hoffman went on to explain that tularemia, also called rabbit fever, is caused by a tiny bacteria called Francisells tillarensis. The disease is transmitted to rabbits by ticks, fleas, and other biting pests.

Humans usually contact this disease by getting rabbit tissue, blood, or other body fluids on their hands while cleaning rabbits, or by eating insufficiently cooked meat. However, Hoffman said rabbit fever can also be contacted by penetration through a mucosal surface (such as around the eye), or by drinking water infected with tularemia bacteria, or by the bites of various files and ticks.

Apparently deer files, and wood, dog, lone star, and rabbit ticks are notorious tularemia carriers.

Tularemia is a rather "mild" disease that is only about 5 percent fatal when it goes untreated, according to O.J. Rollog, State Veterinarian (from a phone interview last year).

Hoffman says that the plague is a much more severe disease, one that is often fatal. Since the plague can be transmitted from person to person, it can reach epidemic perportions.

The plague is caused by the bacteria Yersinia pestis and isprimarily associated to the rodents, particularly ground squirrels, rock squirrels, and prairie dogs.

Fless are the transmitters of the plague. An infected animal with the disease will die and the fleas, carrying the disease, look for another warm bodied animal to attach to, including humans.

Hoffman did say that the plague and tularemia season was at its peak in the summer months, about June to September. "However," Hoffman said, "The winter months are critical also because this is the time your rabbit hunters and trappers are handling wild animals."

Even though tularemia and the plague are infrequent in this state, it is advisable to follow some simple precautions that will help in reducing the chance of contracting tularemia. These are:

i) Since the cold days of winter do help to drive the fleas and ticks off of animals, hunters should wait until after the frosty days to hunt. Cold weather often takes the lives of the sick rabbits as well.

2) If an animal shows no natural wariness or no inclination to run, leave him be, as infected animals often account as alternation of the account of the same of the account of the same o

often appear as sluggish, or "tame".

3) When dressing rabbits, or skinning predators, wear gloves, preferably rubber, even in the winter

5) Rabbit hunters, cook your rabbits throughly. Do not est raw or undercooked rabbit mest.

6) Hunters using dogs in the field should flee powder their dogs as often as recommended by the directions. Now, go cottontail hunting and
