## Harmon Moves for 'Special Election' to Solve Mayor Vacancy in C'zozo

For Councilmen Positions--

D. Cummins, M. Trujillo,  
T. Sullivan Announce

The first order of business for Mayor Pro Tem Manuel Hernandez at last Monday's regular Council meeting was the appointment of a mayor - again. First a letter was read from Roy "Sonny" Banning concerning his recent appointment as mayor of Carrizozo.

The contents of Banning's letter read by Hernandez:

"After having given much thought to my appointment as Mayor of Carrizozo and after much serious conversations with my family, I have decided not to accept the council's offer to me for the mayor's position."

"I truly appreciate the vote of confidence that was given me, but I do not have time enough to give the town for the work that needs to be done. Accepting the position of mayor would cause me to have to sacrifice time in some of my other jobs, and I cannot do that at this time."

Banning, a minister with the Church of Christ, is a juvenile probation officer. He had originally filed for a trustee position and had relinquished his position as town relief police officer. Banning was appointed mayor at a special closed meeting the same day he filed for trustee. Attorney General Jeff Blingaman was contacted by a mayor hopeful concerning the way the appointment had been handled. The 'Open Meeting Act' was not mentioned at last Monday's meeting.

Following the reading of Banning's 'no-thank-you-letter' Hernandez said, "One gentleman is still interested in becoming mayor." He asked that Olsen be given a chance to express his opinion.

Olsen said that his training, education and experience gave him a good background for assisting the town in its goals and plans. Trustee Ortiz motioned to appoint Olsen, but the motion died for lack of a second. Later a letter addressed to the council from Mr. and Mrs. Forrest Thorpe was read. It expressed their endorsement of Olsen and that he is "people oriented."

Hernandez asked Harmon and Orsak if they would like to comment. Harmon responded by moving that a special election be held and said the mayor vacancy "is a controversial subject" and that the special election "will solve the whole thing."

The mayor pro tem was concerned about going this route because it will require \$300.00 to \$350.00 for election costs and that the budget should be checked considering the many raises given employees recently. Town Clerk Christine Chavez said, "It isn't going to break us. We can afford it."

Hernandez asked Town Attorney Bill Payne if the mayor election could be included in the March 4 trustee election. "No way," said Payne. He added that he has "never been in on a

special election", and would get some direction from the Municipal League.

An unexpected turn of events occurred when Police Officer Guy Brown told the council, "I can no longer do the job for you." Mayor Pro Tem Hernandez asked several times if his decision to resign could not be handled in a closed personnel meeting to "iron out" any problems. Brown told the council that they (council) "weren't prepared to iron it out."

That evening Brown had originally been called before the trustees to verify that he was going to the March session at the police academy. Morales had said Brown had filled out an application and should have been to the academy a year ago. Brown said he liked his job & would like to get the police schooling but that, "I can't get the job done on the street," and suggested that the Police Department is not clear on what they want their men to do.

He said that he "can't get the job done the way it needs to be done." He will turn in a written notice, which he was in the process of preparing. He had not planned to give the verbal resignation at Monday's meeting.

Brown repeatedly said that he liked his job and kept saying that "a certain job needs to be done here and we're only just enforcing the law." He said he will reveal the reasons for leaving the force in his written resignation because the council "need to be told," and "going to school won't cure it." He did not specify about what "certain job needs to be done here."

The council discussed and approved certified police pay increase

of \$850.00 and after six months probation to \$950.00. Orsak said that this "would put Carrizozo in the right direction in police salaries." The council and the chief of police were in agreement that the town will prefer certified policemen to fill the present vacancy and future vacancies. Uncertified police pay is \$650.00 to start and \$700.00 after six months. Money has been earmarked for police equipment and a request for a new police car to replace the '76 Plymouth was discussed.

Under new business Town Superintendent Emilio Beltran requested and was given permission to put out bids on a pickup, a lawn mower and seven tons of fertilizer for use in city parks.

Payne informed the council that the town's Community Development Grant application had been turned down - again. Payne said that he contacted Congressman Runnels as a concerned citizen and not as town attorney regarding the rejection. He told the council that, "apparently somebody has got it in for Carrizozo. That's my opinion as an individual."

It was the fifth application Payne said that has been turned down and that the last three times sketchy excuses were given for non-acceptance. He said the application process requires three public meetings which lead residents to build up their hopes. Alamogordo and Roswell applications were accepted with Tor Cites smallest community to be funded.

"Grossly unfair," Payne said.

seek an ordinance against the sale of such items.

Blessings were bestowed upon Mrs. Hutchinson, proposing a Chamber of Commerce, the South Central Mountains Resource and Conservation Development District and Jack Sniadecki, volunteering his labor and money to pour a concrete walk-way over a village installed culvert.

Mrs. Hutchinson felt the village has not received much publicity in the larger area newspapers, such as the El Paso Times, and she felt a Chamber of Commerce would help distribute information on the Capitan area. She reasoned this would help increase tourist info thus increasing village income.

Jack Sniadecki requested village help to clean a drainage ditch which did not drain the area in front of his business.

Claudio Montoya was informed of the 1978 ordinance concerning separate water meters for permanent mobile homes. Permanent was defined as 45 days or more. Non-permanent mobile hook-ups were not required to have separate taps. He reported having paid a \$140 water bill from the former owner of his business. The council approved a resolution investigating the charge, applying it to the \$170 cost of a water meter if the charge was not in lien.

A request from the Architect for the proposed High School was denied with a resolution stating a lack of personnel and funds in the water department prohibited the donation of a four inch water tap and fire hydrant to the school.

A civil suit will be filed against an illegal water tap. Village Attorney Gary Mitchell stated Capitan was not the only municipality having the problem of illegal water taps.

The Cox water connection contract was approved.

## If It Won't Start

If your car won't start, don't commit "Autocide". A little knowledge and patience will take you a long way toward persuading that hunk of junk to move.

Car experts say that the vast majority of starting problems could be avoided by preventive maintenance. That means regular oil changes, tune-ups, and trouble shooting beneath the hood and, and even if you forget about maintenance, there is much you can do to start the car if you know where to look and what to do.

The three "buggies" may seem laughably obvious - don't forget your ignition key, don't forget to have gas in the tank, and don't leave the car out for long in winter.

Now for the less obvious. One of the most common yet most easily fixed problems is the so-called "dead battery syndrome". Usually the battery is not dead but just sleeping. To wake it up, make sure the battery

terminals are not caked with corrosion. If it's not the battery terminals, the problem could well be with the solenoid. Also, check the alternator belt, usually referred to as the fan belt for looseness. If it isn't reasonably tight, the battery won't charge. If it needs replacement, a mechanic can probably put on a new one a lot faster and more easily than you can.

Suppose the car is flooded. You can usually tell by the smell of gasoline. To get it unflooded, we recommend: Take you foot-hold the gas pedal to the floor...and let it spin - keep the engine cranking for about 20 to 40 seconds. It'll clean itself out.

Another area of trouble is the carburetor. Dirt and water become mixed in with the gas, which gets into the fuel system. That usually means you have to have the carburetor reconditioned or "rebuilt" and that could cost from \$65 to \$80, depending on the year & model of the car.

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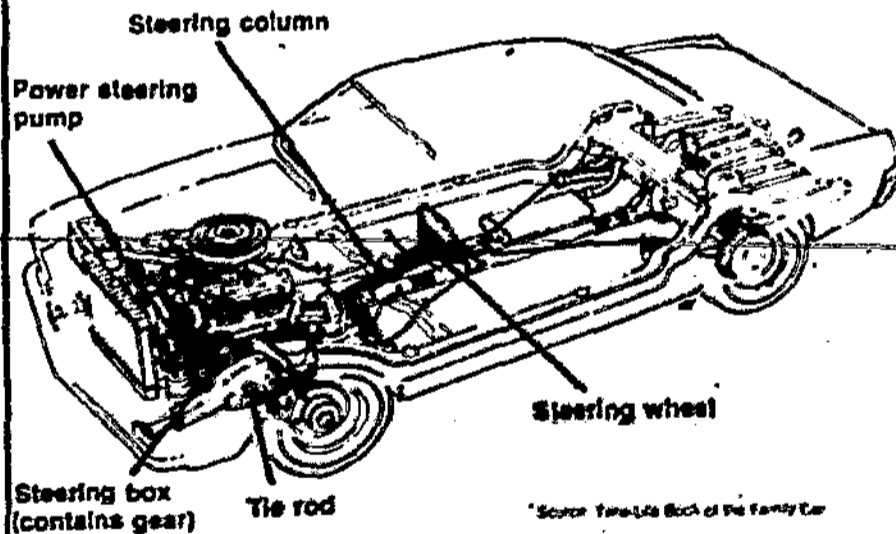
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## Steering system



## The heaviest machine can turn with the greatest ease

Turning the front wheels of the car begins with a turn of the steering wheel, which turns the shaft, or steering column, on which it is mounted. At the end of the shaft is the steering gear, which gives the driver a mechanical advantage. He can turn the steering wheel through an arc that is longer than the arc of the wheels turning on the road. The smaller the arc of the wheel, the "quicker" and, theoretically, the harder the steering.

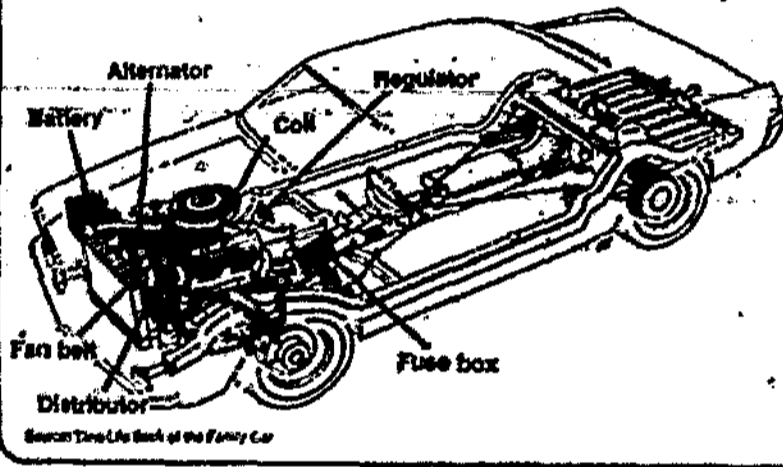
The rotary motion of the steering gear is converted to lateral motion by a lever called the Pitman arm. As the steering wheel is turned, the Pitman arm rotates left-to-right or right-to-left. At each end, are tie rods connected to steering arms, which are attached to the wheel assembly by steering knuckles.

The front wheels pivot about the knuckles on ball joints.

In rack-and-pinion steering, the pinion gear at the end of the steering column meshes with the teeth of a rack gear (in effect, a geared wheel opened up and laid flat across a bar). As the steering column rotates, the rack is pushed from side to side and the movement carried to the tie rods, then to the steering arms, knuckles, and wheels.

In power steering, a belt-driven pump and fluid reservoir assist the turn of the steering column. With the engine off, the fluid, similar or identical to transmission fluid, can be checked with a dipstick. Otherwise steering maintenance is mostly a matter of regular lubrication.

## Electrical system



## The source of all power surging through the wires

**IGNITION:** The spark plugs are connected by heavy wires to the distributor, which sends current to the plugs at the instant the compression cycle gives way to the combustion cycle. To make the spark, the voltage from the battery must be converted from its 6- or 12-volt charge to as much as 20,000 volts. This is done by the coil, which looks like a can with a ripple on top. Two small wires carry the 6- or 12-volt current to it; one wire is from the battery, the other from the distributor. The high voltage is sent to the distributor through a heavy wire at the center of the distributor cap. The coil does its work only when the distributor tells it to by sending a burst of low voltage.

Inside the distributor, accessible by removing the cap, are the points, which open and close as the distributor shaft, operated by the engine's camshaft, rotates. Each time the points touch, low voltage, stored for a fraction of a second in the condenser, which resembles a small battery, is sent through the points to the coil for generation to high voltage.

Also inside and mounted atop the distributor shaft is the rotor, which carries the high voltage current from the coil to metal terminals in the distributor cap. There is one terminal for each spark plug wire. As the rotor spins, it sends current to the spark plug one after another.

Some newer cars have electronic ignition systems, some of which use mechanical points, some of which use magnetic or optical sensors. Breaker-less ignition systems eliminate the points and condenser.

**STARTING:** The battery, usually located in the engine compartment, provides the current to start the car. A battery has separate cells that usually work each, and each cell has an opening to add water. (Some new batteries are sealed and don't need additional water.) The water mixes with sulphuric acid in the battery. The acid reacts with lead plates in the cells to set up a flow of electrons in the water. Chemical energy is thus converted to electrical energy. Because impurities liberate or destroy the process, only distilled water should be added to the

battery. Water should be added carefully and the water level kept 1/4 inch, no more, above the plates.

Atop or at the sides of each battery are two terminals, or posts, a positive (marked plus) and a negative (marked minus), with a cable clamped to each. One cable carries the power to the starter switch. The other cable, called the ground cable, completes the circuit. It is attached to the frame of the car or to the engine block or to both. In most cars, the negative cable is the ground cable.

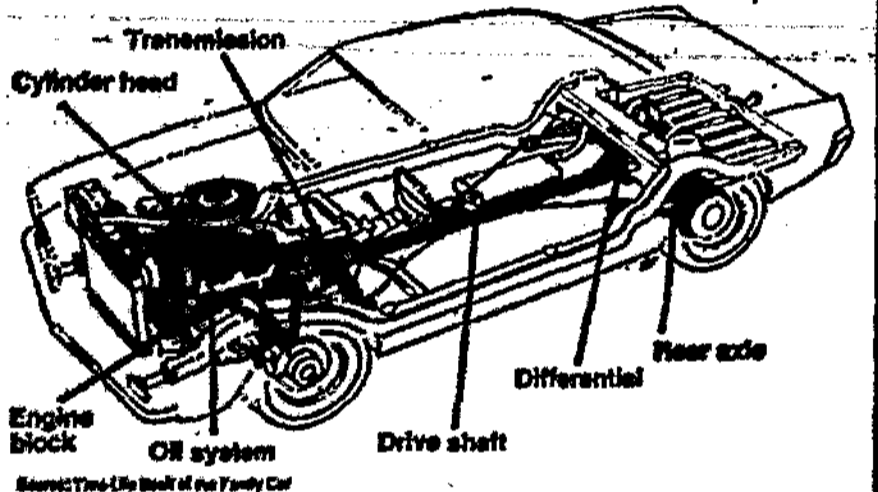
The starter switch, which may be either a solenoid or a relay type, is often, but not always, mounted on the starter. The starter solenoid is usually mounted low and at the rear of the engine block, where it turns the engine's flywheel, attached to the crankshaft. A pinion gear on the starter engages a ring gear on the flywheel, and rotates, turning the crankshaft, which is turned clockwise by the piston and the distributor shaft to start the engine cycle.

**GENERATING:** The battery can only supply so much electricity before the chemical reaction inside it used up. Then the battery goes dead. To bring it back to life, it must be recharged, which reverses the process, converting electrical energy from an outside source to chemical energy inside. That outside source is the generator or alternator.

The alternator is driven by a belt attached to a pulley at the front end of the crankshaft. Because the belt also drives the radiator fan, it is called the fan belt. When the engine is running, the alternator sends current back to the battery through the same cables the starting current came out of.

The current from the alternator also takes over the battery's function of supplying current to the accessories since the engine is running. But because the speed of alternator is controlled by the speed of the car, a device called voltage regulator is needed to limit the voltage so it won't burn out light bulbs or overcharge the battery.

## In the beginning, there were gears and a motor

### THE ENGINE: (Part 2)

**CLUTCH AND TRANSMISSION:** In cars with manual transmissions, the clutch sits between the rear of the engine and the gearbox. When the clutch pedal is out, a disk with friction-producing material makes contact with the engine's flywheel, which spins as the engine turns. That spinning motion is transmitted through the clutch to the gearbox. When the pedal is depressed the clutch disk moves away from the flywheel.

The rear of the clutch is mated to the input shaft of the gearbox. A gear

wheel on the shaft meshes with another gear, which turns the countershaft. Several gears on the countershaft constantly mesh with gears on a third shaft, the output shaft, or main shaft, which delivers power to the drive shaft that leads to the rear axle. When the driver shifts, a fork in the transmission pushes a sliding dog clutch along the output shaft into contact with one spinning gear, locking the rotating gear to the shaft so that it too starts rotating. Each position on the gearshift lever locks one gear to the output shaft.

The purpose of the gearbox is to give the engine a mechanical advantage by varying the number of times the crankshaft must turn to rotate the wheels once. In high gear, the crankshaft may revolve once for every revolution of the drive shaft. In low gear, the crankshaft may revolve three or four times for every revolution of the drive shaft, a sacrifice of speed for power—the power needed to overcome inertia when the car is stopped or moving slowly. Once the car is moving, less power is needed to keep it moving.

Automatic transmissions also vary the ratio between engine speed and drive shaft speed, but they do it without a clutch and with no necessity to shift gears. Automatics have a torque converter, which is essentially two turbines facing each other in a sealed housing filled with transmission fluid. One turbine, the impeller, is driven by the engine, and as it spins, the turbulence set up in the fluid spins the output turbine, which in turn spins the drive shaft.

**DRIVE SHAFT AND AXLE:** From the output shaft of the transmission, the power is transmitted to the rear axle and wheels through the long drive shaft, beneath the car. Universal joints at both ends permit the drive shaft to flex as the wheels hit bumps. At the extreme rear end of the drive shaft a ring and pinion gear directs the power at right angles to turn the axle. Like the transmission, the axle gears give the engine a mechanical advantage. The ratio between the drive shaft gear and the gear in each axle shaft is known as the rear axle ratio. It is usually 3 to 1 or 4 to 1, meaning the drive shaft turns three or four times for every revolution of the wheels. The ratio does not change unless the gears are replaced.

Another set of rear axle gears, known as the differential gears, permit one wheel to slow down while the car is turning. Without these gears, the inside wheel would move at the same speed as the outside wheel, a handling and safety hazard and hard on the tires. On ice and snow, unfortunately, the differential also causes the wheel that gets traction to stop if the other wheel is spinning because the power follows the path of least resistance.
