Capitan School Board--

Approves VoAg Program

A two-year contract for Principal Glen Crane and the adoption of a Vocational Agriculture program were approved by the Capitan School Board recently.

Crane, hired last year, told the board he appreciated the Board and Superintendent Clifton's vote of confidence.

Superintendent Clifton urged the board to take action on the Vo. Ag. program in order to budget it for this fall. The board has discussed the program previously, local interest has increased and a survey among students showed enough interest to make the program feasible. The major concern was for funding and it was agreed there was not enough money to have both industrial arts and the Vo. Ag. program. The Board decided the Industrial Arts program should be eliminated. Some boardmembers felt industrial arts were spread "too thin" over too many different areas.

Board Secretary Richard Phillips stated, "I have the highest regards for Wayne Richardson, (present

Industrial Arts teachers) it is just one of those unfortunate things."

They approved adoption of the VoAg program and eliminated Industrial Arts.

Zanner & Co., Kansas City, was the low interest bidder on the sale of \$150,000 in bonds, part of the \$860,000 bond issue approved last year. The first sale of \$710,000 in bonds was held last fall.

John Archuleta of Quinn & Co., Albuquerque, presented the 6.9 percent interest bid to the board and informed them the actual sell would be around March 15. The \$150,000 will be used on the elementary building project.

The Board also approved a budget adjustment to compensate for the sale of bonds.

Substitute teacher's pay was increased for the 1980-81 school year. Certified teachers will get \$25 and non-certified, \$22 a day.

Clifton told the Board of the April deadline for the 1980-81 budget. He projected the number of students will be the same as this year, averaging 350 in Kindergarten through twelve. An increase in textbook allocation and

a change in the uniform state tax rate were also reported.

George Halle was designated coordinator of Basic Skills, a new program beginning this fall. The program will develop skills that will help the student function in an adult world after graduation. With three years to pass, the student will receive a mark on the diploma that educators hope will make the marked diploma more valuable. The program will also spot those who do have trouble with basic skills and will help those students however they need.

Pat Sullivan, Capitan Cheerleader Sponsor, came to their defense when Boardmember Phillips wanted to know why the cheerleaders were not at a recent game. She told the Board the cheerleaders were cheering at too many games and they felt they did not have enough time to devote to school and to getting enough rest.

She also cited the lack of support from the students attending games, adding to the problem Capitan cheerleaders are not divided between

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Carrizozo School Board Meeting--

Myrtle Williams Nominated as 1980 State Teacher of the Year

The Carrizozo Board of Education learned of their February 12 regular meeting about the nomination of Mrs. Myrtle Williams as 1980 State Teacher of the Year. Her application has been completed and mailed in Mrs. Williams who teaches 2nd grade in Carrizozo began her teaching career 32 years ago in Ramon, N.M. 30 miles south of Vaughn. Grades 1-12 were taught in the one room school. Among the other New Mexico schools that she has taught at - Ruidoso, Capitan, Salem, Dona Ana, and Las Cruces. She has been a teacher two separate times in Carrizozo, early in 1969 and now for the past eight years. She has also been part of the Arizona school faculty.

For the last 29 years the State School Board has selected a State Teacher of the Year. A number of people from all over N.M. and

Arizona have written letters of recommendation on the Carrizozo teachers' behalf. They express admiration and appreciation for the work that Mrs. Williams has accomplished over the years. She lives in Nogal with her husband, Miles

In other business the board moved to re-hire Dr. James Miller, Jr. for a second year. Regarding the superintendent's job, Wells, who has been a board member the longest said, "Have heard nothing but good." Newest board member Stackpole, the only female, appreciates Miller's "Superintendent Reports" on the monthly agendas and his newsletters to the board, which keep information flowing and up-to-date.

The Board and Miller discussed the 1980-81 budget. Among Miller's priorities were improving employee salaries, continued support of current

curriculum development, increase in budget for rising contract services, and high school building improvements. Miller told the board about the committees he has set up for budget preparation assistance. The committees consist of individuals representing the various employee groups and interests in the District. These are CTA teachers, non-CTA teachers, teacher aides, cafeteria workers, maintenance-custodial, administrative, secretaries.

The board will meet for a special meeting on February 22 at 2:00 p.m. The purpose of the meeting is to examine the condition of the high school building. The building, which is 43 years old, will be toured to determine if it is structurally sound. Wiring and plumbing will be investigated closely.

Last week's school board meeting included school bus route improvement discussion. County and State help in fixing routes in this district and others in Lincoln County is anticipated.

Mr. Nat Palomarez and Mr. Robert Hemphill with the aid of Vo-ag instructor Ken Jones will over see the yard renovation, which is underway. Town Foreman Emilio Beltran donated the use of the town's grader. Everett Greer and Guy Henley, with the County road department, volunteered their services this past Friday and Saturday in the grading of the vo-ag yard.

In other board business: 1) Principal Stuart reported that the attendance policy is working well and has "cut down on our Monday-Friday Club", referring to favorite absentee days. Parents have been cooperating with the policy rules.

2) Vince Vega, Senior class president gave an account of the proposed senior trip to Six Flags Over Texas park. The Friday to Sunday trip for 27 students and sponsors will cost about \$1,110.00. Fund raising projects are being conducted. Students must maintain passing grades to be included in the May 9-11 trip.

3) Mr. Rick Bush, one of three ski sponsors gave a review of student participation in the Ski Club. 50 students, grades 4-12 whose "behavior in class is up to par" leave each Wednesday for a day on the ski slopes. Scholarships for needy students are available.

County Commissioners Approve \$1840.⁶⁰ Bid

The Lincoln County Commissioners approved the low bid of \$1840.60 for floor tiles for the County Annex at a meeting occupied by budgetary adjustments.

Carrizozo Hardware was low bid out of our bids on floor tiles for the first floor of the courthouse annex.

Capitan Village Mayor Don Stark requested the Commissioners help pay the cost of a shelter for the Capitan Ambulance. In a February 1978 agreement, the village agreed to provide shelter if they received an ambulance. At that time, the ambulance was housed in the village fire hall. Since purchase of an additional fire truck the ambulance was turned out and now is parked beside a EMT's home.

A proposed addition onto the present Capitan Village hall will cost about \$5000. The county suggested a 50-50 compromise but tabled the item until it could be further investigated.

An incorrectly shown corner on the original plat for Little Creek Hills Subdivision was corrected and approved by the Commissioners. The correction had been earlier approved by the Planning and Zoning Commission.

Also approved was a release of eight lots in Deer Park Woods Subdivision to Lakeside Corporation. The Subdivision was reported finished and in good order.

County Manager Truman Billingsley was appointed alternate member of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District and John Hightower replaced Nancy Guck on the Camp Sierra Blanca Review Board.

The School Bus Route Improvement Program for fiscal year 1980-81 and 1981-82 was approved. The priorities include Carrizozo, Hondo and Capitan school districts. Carrizozo has two roads slated for improvement at total estimated cost of \$90,000.

Hondo district, priority two, has five roads for improvement with total cost, \$35,000.

Capitan, priority three, three roads at total cost of \$122,000.

The list of priorities will be sent to the State Highway Department and will be considered for matching funds.

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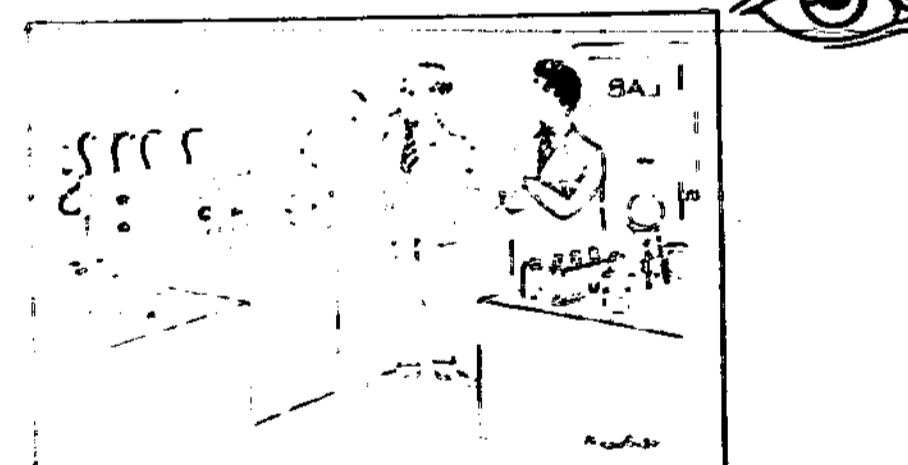
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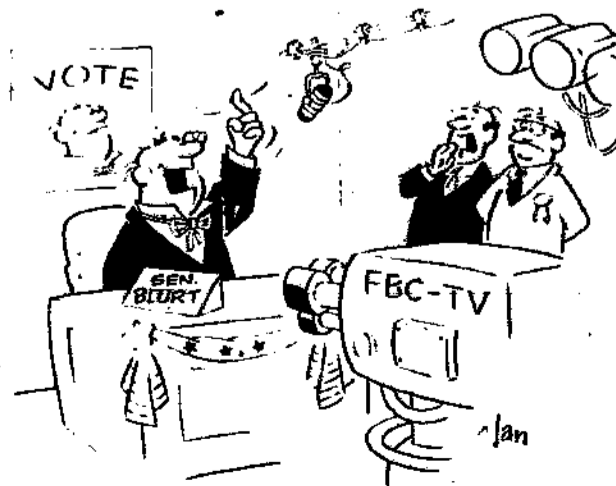

County Commission

Annual lease of \$600 for office space for the County ASC Committee was approved.

A donation of an electric hospital bed to the Lincoln County Home Health Services was approved. The bed will be taken from the defunct Carrizozo Health Center.

Five resolutions for budgetary adjustments were approved. \$53 from LEAA for camera equipment was transferred to the general fund, an increase of the general funds of \$7400 provided by the Forest Service for an emergency vehicle, an increase in the SB Airport Commission Budget of \$16,191.70 provided by the state for alternate site selection, an increase in the ambulance budget for equipment \$3378.35 allocated by the NM emergency medical services fund and a transfer of \$8335.04 from FDAA 571-DR to Road fund for payment of engineering fees for replacement of flood-damaged bridges.

A cooperative agreement between the Lincoln County Sheriff's department and the US Forest Service was tabled for lack of information from the Forest Service.

George Shoemaker, Sierra Blanca Airport Commission, commented on the \$16,191.70 charged by Herkenhoff, consulting engineer on the project. He stated the cost was for a reprint of a contour map made in 1969.

He further commented on the need to get support for Site B on Fort Stanton Mesa from the New Mexico State University Regents as well as the University President, Dr. Thomas. He felt the airport site would not interfere with animal projects on the NMSU experimental range. He mentioned the 600 acres for the airport site are not used for

animal research.

"We have to make another attempt and start with cooperation," Shoemaker stated. He added he did not want to start any more big battles concerning the site.

He informed the Commissioners the landing strip at Fort Stanton is 7200 feet and the present Ruidoso airport is only 5500 feet. He felt the increased growth of the county in the area around Fort Stanton and Capitan is enough to warrant the site B for the new airport.

County Road Supervisor requested either lease or purchase of a 2 dump trailer for a county Mack truck that would increase hauling capacity. He informed the commissioners it would cost less to use the trailer that make separate trips with the smaller dump trucks.

The Commissioners okayed a lease from H.N. LaRue of Capitan for three months.

Other county business included a transfer of a liquor license from Mrs. Panebouef of the former Ramon Bar and Restaurant to Ron Mitchell of Roswell. No disagreements were made and the transfer was approved.
