Council Views Water Upgrade

A full house welcomed the two new Councilmen and the new Municipal Judge as the Capitan Village Council covered water quality, low cost housing, request for dumpster boxes and other business.

New councilmen "Maggie" Trujillo and David Cummins and Judge LeRoy Montes were sworn in and councilman Benny Coker was appointed Mayor Pro Tem. The new councilmen replace Valton Hall and Tom Sullivan.

Tom Gress, Culligan Co., showed the Council how to upgrade water quality with a more sophisticated filter sold by his company. The present filter on the Capitan water supply produces 4 million gallons on a 24 hour basis, at a poorer quality than the proposed additional filter.

Ruidoso is scheduled to receive a filter for their Upper Canyon water system.

The Council told Gress they were "definitely interested" but must wait until the next budget.

Mayor Don Stark read a letter of eligibility for Capitan to receive 16 - low cost housing units. Because of the low income per capita in Capitan, Carrizozo, Corona and Roswell and Roswell are eligible for the program. The council approved a resolution to begin preliminaries which will be

handled and paid for by the federal agency. Bill Payne is the first local representative appointed to the board by Governor King.

A request from Capitan businesses to use dumpster boxes was tabled with a promise to investigate the specs on the type of box to fit the garbage truck. The village stressed they could not provide boxes.

Kevin Wolfe, Capitan wood carver, was low bidder on a replacement Smokey Bear for the Smokey Bear Museum. The former bear was damaged when high winds blew down the tree on which it was placed. The \$285 fiberglass replacement will be paid for out of the donation fund.

Representatives for Equitable Life Insurance Co., explored the costs of small group insurance for Capitan Village Employees. Equitable's full package was \$575.62 a month, the village to pay half, the other absorbed by the five village employees.

Because of the high cost, it was suggested State of New Mexico group insurance at \$492.02 a month. They felt a health insurance was incentive for good employees.

A resolution calling for pursuit of \$2500 for building the Capitan Ambulance shelter was approved.

Needs Assessment

Board Hears Report

The Carrizozo school board. In last week's regular meeting discussed the Needs Assessment Report. Four areas parents, interested citizens and high school students agree on is that the district needs: (1) Drug abuse prevention education; (2) Instruction in human sexuality education; (3) Woodworking separate from Voc; and (4) Bilingual education.

The general findings also revealed that parents want more counseling provided: the elementary and mid-school students. Parents feel the balance between extra-curricular activities and the athletic program is wrong and that the district should not allow athletic programs to use class time. The high school students were the school's most detailed critics, they are saying the school needs to do more of everything.

Complete copies of the report, which includes opinions of school employees and mid-school students, are available to the public at the administration office. The questionnaire was divided into five major areas, developed by a committee comprised of parents, students, teachers and the principal of the school.

Three hundred forty six (346) questionnaires were collected and analyzed. The purpose of the needs assessment was (1) to discover perceived differences, if any, between the district's current program and service priorities, efforts, and expectations, and those by others; (2) to further encourage constructive commentary by students, employees, and the community about the district and its operation; and (3) to provide specific program direction to the district faculty, staff, and Board of Education for the next several years.

Superintendent Miller presented to the board the 1980-81 tentative budget. He explained the budget preparation and process. In the development, committees representing various employee groups spoke on behalf of their groups. Miller pointed out highlights of the proposed budget.

This week Miller was in Santa Fe to present the tentative budget to the district's auditors. THE LOCAL SCHOOL BOARD WILL AGAIN REVIEW THE BUDGET FOR ADJUSTMENTS. On April 25 at 9:30 a.m. a Public School Finance representative, Mrs. Rebecca Delgado will be in Carrizozo to go over the budget with the school board. Delgado, PSF deputy director will conduct the budget hearing in the conference room. Miller said Special Education, salary increases and energy con-

servation will be looked at very closely.

The high school facilities review by the board resulted in a move to pay \$500.00 to an architectural firm to give an analysis of the 40 year old building's condition for possible remodeling. Ferguson said, "I can't see destroying when walls are sound." Some discussion included: lowering bathroom and dressing room ceilings; replacing doors and locks; remodeling office; reducing windows; rewiring entire building; converting plumbing to plastic fittings; removing boiler, steam lines and radiators. When work exceeds \$25,000 an architect is required for structural assessment.

In other business the board: -accepted the resignation of custodian Gilbert Archuleta, following an executive session.

-moved to approve a Title IV-B application.

-changed the district payroll from the 15th to 21st of the month, now that the district is its own board of finance.

-postponed personnel decisions to the April meeting.

-authorized that insurance payments during leave of absence be paid in part by the district.

"will conduct an equipment public auction in the near future.

Sandy Henson, Smokey Bear Park Superintendent, told the Council the old depot is scheduled to be renovated Spring 1981 under a \$105,000 appropriation for capital improvements at the Park. Paving of the front area along Highway 390, a circulating water pump will be included. Councilman Coker praised Ms. Henson on her work at the Park. Ms. Henson is one of the two women out of the 38 state parks superintendents.

Councilman Cummins agreed to work with the Fire Department to eliminate the outside 2 inch water tap at village hall. This was prompted by complaints of individuals filling tanks at village expense.

A resolution to draw an ordinance to clean vacant lots was approved. Attorney Gary Miticell revealed state law concerning clean-ups. Villages may bill owners of lots cleaned and collect by a lien on their property.

The call for a vacant lot clean-up came after recent control fires got out of control and burned larger areas than anticipated.

Approval of moving village limit signs was given, minutes of the meeting required by the state highway department before final approval is given.

State Officer of Energy and Minerals requested a voluntary 10 percent cutback on fuel consumption. The council approved a resolution to attempt this.

A request from newly elected Municipal Judge LeRoy Montes to have municipal court within his home, because of the limited space in the village hall, was denied. Montes will set hours and will hold court at the village hall.

Mayor Stark appointed Lydia Hall as alternate judge at Montes request.

A \$375 budget increase for the village portion on \$75000 car from LEAA was approved.

Dog Problems Continue for Town

Stray dogs, vandalism and theft continue to be never-ending cases of complaint called in to local police. Man's best friend - the dog - has been getting unfavorable publicity. Dogs have joined forces to roam the streets, alley and private property, including ranchlands. They attack bicyclist, walkers and livestock. The situation has put the dogs' lives in danger also. Outlaw dogs have been exposed to malnutrition, disease, injury, mutilation and death.

The Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SPCA) place the blame on dog owners who have abandoned their pets to fend for themselves. Peace officers enforce the law to protect human population when they make a decision in a dog problem situation.

The Town of Carrizozo has an ordinance stating that it is unlawful for any owner to allow or permit any dog, whether licensed or not, (in the daytime or nighttime) to be or remain on the streets or alleys of the town or in any public place in the town, or on any other premises without consent of the person in possession of other premises.

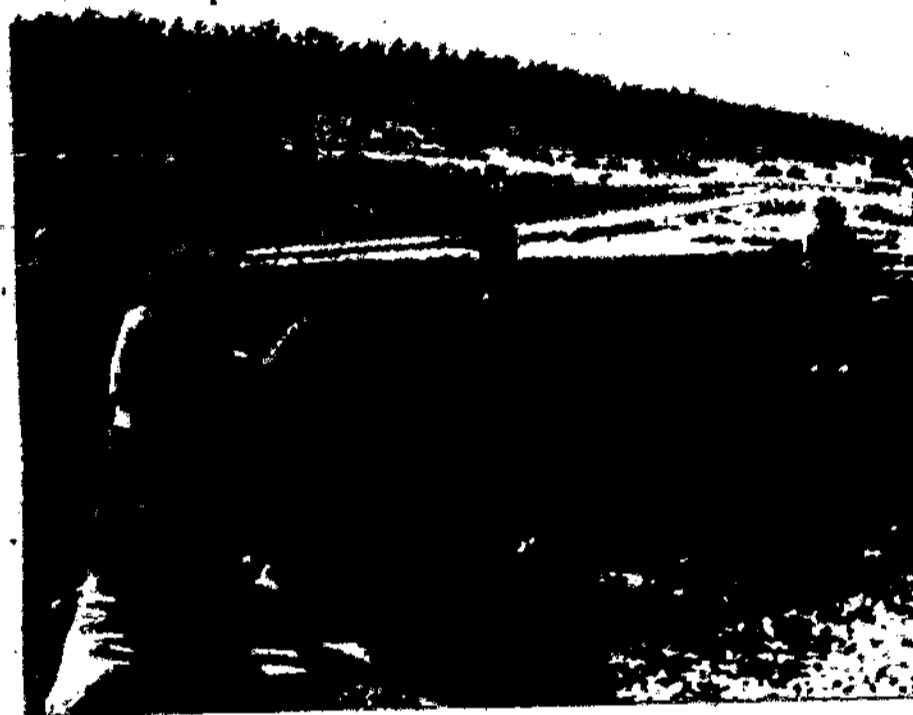
Annual rabies vaccination of dogs and cats over the age of three months is required by the N.M. Rabies Control Act. Records at Town Hall show that 74 were issued tags, which are purchased at the same time as the shots. A dog census would reveal that not all town dogs were licensed and vaccinated.

All dogs and cats running loose within the town are to be held for 10 days at the pound. All animals not claimed by their owners within the 10 day period will be destroyed, according to the town's "Running at Large" ordinance.

But Carrizozo has no dog catcher, dog pound or Humane Society. "Man" should look into this. Local police records show the following:

Pat Vigil, "A" Avente reported two possible rabid dogs, part of a pack of dogs seen near his property. A town officer killed one in the area, chased another across town to 12th Street and shot him to death there. The two rabies suspected dogs were decapitated and heads were taken to the Health Office where they were shipped to the State Lab at Albuquerque. County nurse Hazel English received word that the tests were negative.

Another loose dog in the 12th Street area was accidentally shot in the incident. Malco owner Buddy Garcia filed a complaint at City Hall in regard to the shooting of his dog, which required a veterinarian to amputation part of his paw. Garcia wanted the town to "foot the bill" for veterinarian services. He was given a notice of the dog and cat ordinance.

March 5 Paul Morales lost control of his bicycle after running over a small black dog, one of a pack of 5 (five) that attacked him as he drove down Central on Hwy 54. Damages to his bike was \$20.65.

A Birch Street Resident reported to town police March 4, neighborhood dogs have been overturning garbage cans and causing nighttime disturbances when family pets and residents are trying to sleep.

Bobbie LaMay, East of Carrizozo called the Sheriff's Office that dogs killed chickens owned by her mother who lives nearby.

Stray dogs were reported by Mrs. T.R. Appar, 1113 11th Street. The dogs on her property included a St. Bernard, one of a pack of 4 (four) which had been missing for two days. Owner and dog were reunited. The other three dogs had no owners.

Dogs running loose were reported by H Avenue and 8th resident Dr. C. Ridgley. She also reported a broken window. An embedded pellet was recovered following the discovery of the broken window.

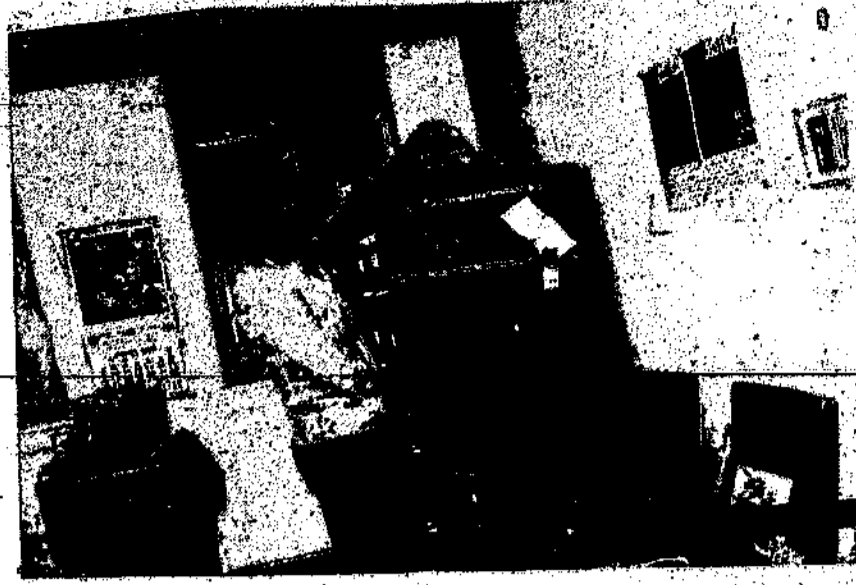

Lincoln National Forest - Fire Fighting Crews Mobilized

Fire crews on the Lincoln National Forest are mobilizing early this year because windy, dry weather is rapidly drying the forest. Two years of good growth has produced lots of vegetation which, when dry, makes fire more of a hazard than usual.

Fire personnel have already responded to two small fires one on the Smokey Bear Ranger District, near Ruidoso, and one on the Cloudcroft Ranger District. Neither fire did any appreciable damage, and both were quickly brought under control. The crews have also responded to two false alarms.

George C. Green, assistant fire management officer for the Forest, has asked that anyone who wants to report a fire call 437-2288 in Alamogordo. "If the Alamogordo number is a long distance call from

where you may be located, call the Forest Ranger District Office nearest your location and they will relay the message to us," Green said.

He explained that the above number, the Lincoln Fire Dispatcher's Office, will be answered 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Anyone who wants to burn anything outdoors on the Forest, can call the number and get the most current weather report at any time. Weather reports, with wind predictions, are received at the fire dispatcher's office four times a day, every day.

Some of our fire fighting crews on the Forest are mobilized and ready Green said, adding that on March 28, a helicopter and five-man crew, which can also carry water or fire retardant, will also be on duty, to reduce the time required by the ground crews to respond to fire

reports. Green urged everyone to be especially careful with fire on the Forest this season, and particularly during the coming spring-turkey hunting season, coming next month.

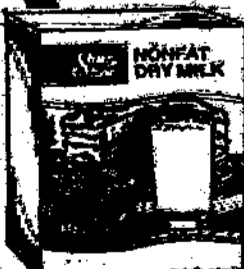
