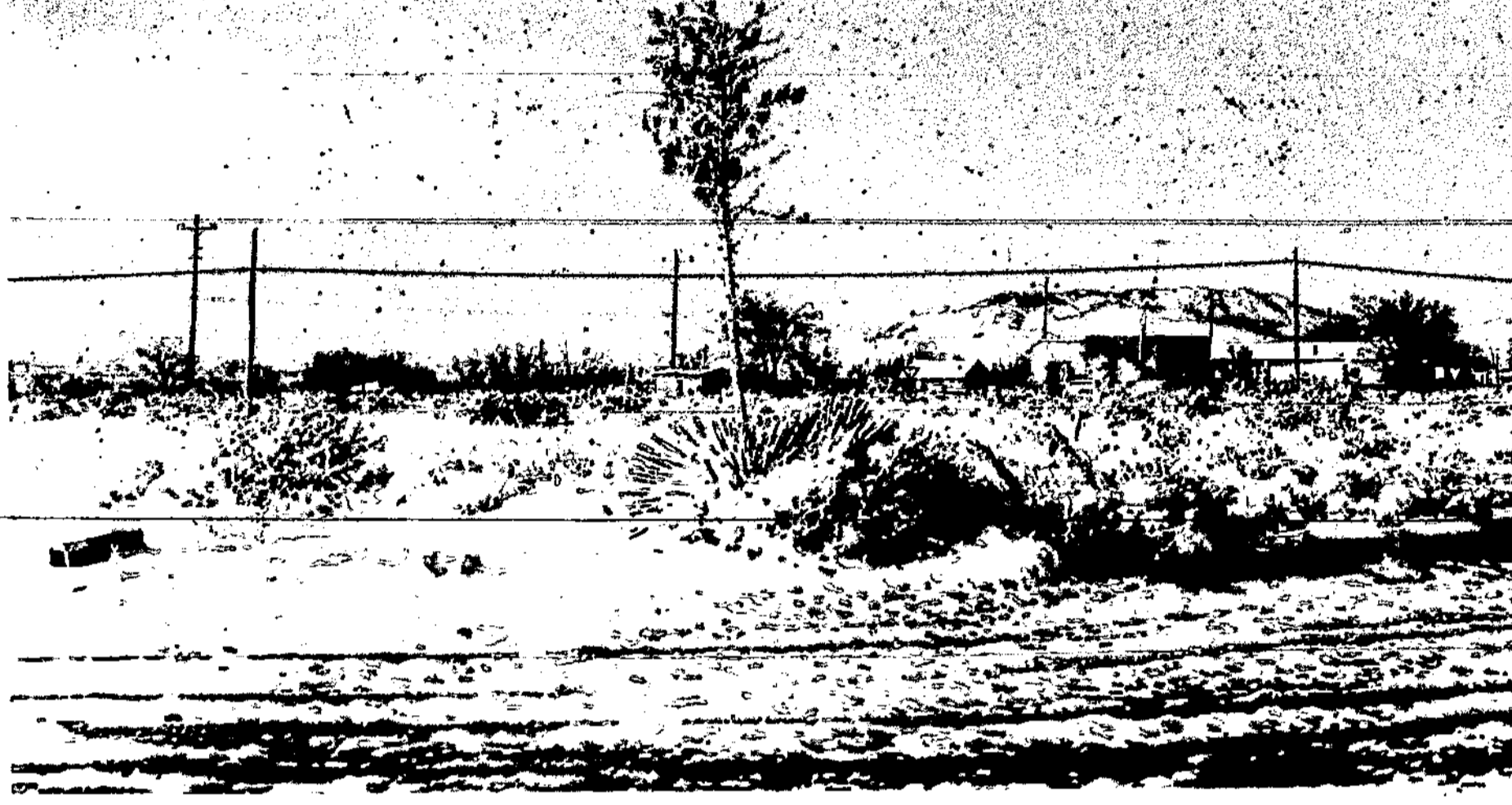

by Capitan School Board—

Richardson Terminated . . . "with regrets"

The termination of Wayne Richardson, Industrial Arts Teacher, in order to begin a Vocational Agriculture Program brought comment from concerned parents at the March Capitan School Board meeting.

Jim McDaniel, area rancher asked the board when parents have something to say about school programs. He was informed that the Vo Ag program had been discussed for over three years requested by several different parents.

McDaniel continued with his reasons why VoAg is a chancy program. He felt such a program in a school system where 90 percent of the students do not live on a ranch or farm has a tough time succeeding. He implored the Board to reconsider their choice.

Wayne Richardson was given the legal option of transferring into another field if he was certified. His certification is for Industrial Arts only, therefore he will be terminated May 1980.

Richardson suggested the Board not hire a first-year teacher for the beginning program and that the Board budget Vo Ag to "the hilt." He cited his own lack of experience in pushing for more funds for his program.

Superintendent Clifton told the Board, Vo Ag would be funded the same as Industrial Arts.

There was a fear among teachers present the FFA Competition would draw too much from actual classroom Vo Ag.

The Board approved termination of Richardson with "regrets."

Tests to be taken on the Elementary concrete floor and soil compaction were approved at a recent special meeting. Because of controversy over former tests, Boardmember Curtis Payne proposed a representative of the Contractor Industries Board investigate the need of the tests.

"They're the people who license the contractors, I think they should be involved in this," Board President P. Huey stated.

The Board approved a recommendation to contact the architect, who would contact the Industries Board and, to abide by the investigator's written recommendation, Boardmember Ralph Barber had the dissenting vote.

A survey to find how many teachers want to take the Emergency Medical Training course will be made. The 81 hour course teaches how to react in emergency situations. Teachers could utilize it on the playground and classroom, coaches on the playing fields. There was hope the county would pick up the tab on the course costs.

Jack Sniedecki, local taxidermist, proposed a life-size tiger mascot made from fake fur. A survey will be taken to determine student response. The Board expressed the hope that a mascot would create more school pride.

Appreciation was given to John and Kemeth LaMay for the dirt track recently graded on the ten-acre school parcel. Also thanked was Greg Hauseler, who laid out & leveled the track before the work began. All the work was donated to the school. Letters of appreciation will be sent to all involved.

Cutbacks and inflation were the story when Superintendent Clifton reviewed the 1980-81 budget, scheduled to be one of the first in the state to go before State Budget hearing April 24.

President Carter's cutback of PL874 concerning students with Federal employee parents, resulted in a more than \$1700 decrease in allocation. Clifton felt the school should withdraw from the program because the \$308 was not worth the extra paper work. The cutback will not be felt in Capitan much, but schools such as Gallup could lose millions, Clifton reported.

The budget will be based on 350 students, the same as last year. But inflation in transportation and other costs will show an increase. Capitol Outlay money for high school construction will be earmarked under Building Construction series.

State Finance Division is advocating schools with declining enrollment drop teachers. Capitan, with a one teacher to 18.75 student ratio is not overloaded and has not suffered a dropping enrollment. Average state teacher-student ratio is 1 to 25.

Teachers, whose starting pay is \$14,204 plus benefits, will receive a 12 percent cost of living raise, considered good for Capitan. According to the National Education

Association, the beginning pay is among the highest for beginning teachers.

Non-certified staff-secretaries, custodians and other non-teaching employees, will also receive the 12 percent raise.

Barber felt these employees, lowest on the pay scale, should be given more. The suggestion was taken by Clifton.

The total budget for 1980-81 was \$809,440, coming from local, state and federal revenues.

Mildred Morris Is E.N.M.U. Student Teacher

PORTALES—Mildred Morris of Capitan, a student at Eastern New Mexico University, is among the 109 students currently involved in an eight-week period of student teaching. "We try to provide the students with the best teaching situation and evaluation that we possibly can," said Dr. Albert Bettina, dean of College of Education and Technology. "Evaluation of student teachers is a collective effort between the education department and several disciplines on campus. Placing the students in various schools in New Mexico and Texas is a process of student preference, teacher recommendation, grade-point average, and the student's major area of study." Ms. Morris, a physical education major, is teaching at Capitan High School under the direction of Billy Henson.

Health Services Division Tips---

Nutrition During Pregnancy Important

The Health and Environment Department's Health Services Division offers many direct services and information on well-being.

Michael J. Burkhardt, the Division Director, released today the following information prepared by his Nutrition Unit.

The relationship of nutrition to the outcome of pregnancy has been repeatedly demonstrated. Poor nutritional status, inadequate diet, and insufficient weight gain contribute to fetal, neonatal (newly-born) and maternal morbidity and mortality (sickness and death). It has also been demonstrated that a woman with a good nutritional status prior to conception, an optimum diet during pregnancy and a gradual weight gain during pregnancy averaging 24 pounds, has a better chance of delivering a healthy infant and of remaining healthy herself.

Good nutritional status prior to conception is necessary for assuring a health outcome of pregnancy. An adequate diet or "super nutrition" during the nine months of pregnancy cannot make up for years of inadequate nutrition. A body deprived of nutrients before the pregnancy may be depleted enough to cause problems during pregnancy and childbirth.

Good nutrition during pregnancy is critical since the mother's diet nourishes the developing fetus baby in uterus. Sufficient amounts of nutrients and calories must be supplied by the diet. A daily food guide is suggested to translate accepted nutrient recommendations into a

workable and adequate diet. Pregnant women need 300 more calories per day than non-pregnant women.

Every day at least 4 servings are needed from the MILK GROUP. Milk and foods derived from milk contain calcium for building bones and teeth. The MEAT AND PROTEIN GROUP contains protein for building most body tissues and cells. At least 3 servings from this group are needed every day. A serving can be, for example, a 2-ounce hamburger patty, 2 eggs or a cup of beans. The FRUIT AND VEGETABLE food group provides vitamins A and C for healthy skin, eyes and strong body tissues. At least 4 servings are needed daily. One-half cup of cooked vegetables, most fruits, and vegetable juices constitutes 1 serving. The last food group is the BREAD AND CEREAL group containing carbohydrates for energy and growth. A minimum of 4 servings is needed daily. A serving can be 1 cup of cooked cereal, rice or macaroni.

Evidence now shows that if a fetus is malnourished, that is if its mother receives insufficient amounts of these foods, during the last 3 months of the pregnancy, the brain will not form the normal number of cells.

Adequate and reasonable weight gain is another critical factor in having a healthy baby. Women who gain too little weight are much more likely to have infants born prematurely or who are born at the normal time but have low birth weights. Premature and low birth

weight infants have statistically a greater chance of having physical and mental handicaps and of having illness around the time of birth.

A weight gain of about 24 pounds is usually recommended. The rate of weight gain is just as important as the total amount of pounds. Ideally 3 to 4 pounds should be gained in the first trimester (3 months) and then another 10 pounds in each of the following trimesters.

Pregnancy is the time to decide whether you will breastfeed your baby, since successful breastfeeding is enhanced with preparation before the birth, beginning several months before. Your local District Health Office can provide information and help on preparation.

Breastfeeding is encouraged for all pregnant women because breastmilk is the most nourishing, least expensive and most convenient way to feed a baby. The mother's diet is also very important during the period of breastfeeding in order to produce enough milk and not deplete her own body of the nutrients it needs. Therefore good food practices during pregnancy need to be continued during nursing.

Frank Wilson Announces for District Attorney

District Attorney Frank Wilson has formally announced that he is seeking election to the Office of District Attorney for the term 1981-84. Wilson is presently serving as District Attorney upon appointment by Governor Bruce King in March, 1979.

Wilson states: "The people of Lincoln and Otero Counties deserve and want a continuation of honest, respectable law enforcement. Over this past year, the citizens of both counties have seen the Office of the District Attorney handling a wide variety of law enforcement and legal problems ranging from the massive narcotics raid executed two weeks after I took office, to the exhaustive Grand Jury investigation of the Alamogordo Department of Public Safety and the heaviest caseload of homicide cases this District has ever experienced during this past year. Because of my experience as an Assistant District Attorney for two years, I was able to effectuate a smooth transition of this office without reshuffling the staff and without any interruption of services to any agency.

Shortly after my appointment, I made the decision to open a satellite office in Lincoln County, staffed by a full-time Assistant District Attorney and a full-time secretary. On August 1, 1979, the Lincoln County Office opened and has been fully staffed ever since. Because of the ever growing caseload in Lincoln County and the burden of trying several of the homicide cases from late 1979, I hired Leandro Vega, former Sheriff of

Lincoln County & an experienced law enforcement officer and investigator, as Special Investigator for this office in Lincoln County. With the satellite District Attorney's office in Ruidoso and the Investigator living in Carrizozo, we are able to provide even better service to the Lincoln County area. "The people of this District can be assured that aggressive prosecution, together with common sense, and non-political use of the taxpayers dollars will be continued if I am returned to office for the next term."

Frank Wilson, now 32 year old, came to New Mexico in 1969 as an officer in the United States Air Force stationed at Holloman Air Force

Base. After his Honorable Discharge with the rank of Captain in 1973, Frank attended the University of New Mexico School of Law, graduating & being admitted to the Bar in 1976. He returned to Alamogordo and was employed as an Assistant District Attorney for the next two years. His primary duty was handling all criminal matters in Lincoln County. In September, 1978, he became a partner and shareholder in the Law Firm of Payne, Mitchell and Wilson, Ltd. While practicing law privately, he served as City Prosecutor for the City of Alamogordo, upon being awarded the contract for prosecution of all Alamogordo Municipal Court cases; contract prosecution has been the custom in the City of Alamogordo for

Former Carrizozo mayor Jesse English welcomed a joint session of the organizations and a response was given by Cisneros, followed by the introduction of speakers and the oratorical by Montano. The high school freshman was pinned with the district second place award. The group, after lunch, reconvened into separate sessions - American Legion and Auxiliary - for business meetings and election of officers.

The American Legion ranks as the largest veterans' organization in the U.S. Men and women who have served honorably in the service during World War I, II, the Korean or the Vietnam War, may join the American Legion. It seeks to advance the aims and interests of veterans, to continue the friendships formed during military service and to see that disabled veterans receive the care and help they need.

The legion takes part in programs that promote the American way of life at the local, state, regional and national levels and actively oppose communism. Each year the legion holds a national high school oratory contest to promote the study of the United States Constitution and the Bill of Rights. The legion sponsors Boys' State, whose participants take part in a one-week course on the practical operation of state government.

Bob Durant, Albuquerque, national executive committeeman, urged the group to push the right to vote and spoke on youth activities. Durant said that the young should be utilized and that "they in turn advertise the American Legion." Department commander, Bill Scully of Deming said in part that he, "will do everything I can on membership, for veterans, widows and children."

Department adjutant, Hugo Flores of Albuquerque said that at present there are 7,000 Vietnam veterans in the legion, "they are

moving to join in continued growth." Until 1942, membership in the legion was limited to American soldiers, sailors, marines and nurses who had served on active duty in World War I. In 1942, the legion amended its chapter to allow World War II veterans to join. Korean War veterans became eligible in 1950 and Vietnam War Veterans in 1966.

Flores told the group that May 24 is American Legion Open House Day and that they should designate a place to invite the public to tell them all about the legion.

The American Legion Auxiliary is an organization of women who are interested in the programs of the American Legion. Wives, mothers, sisters and daughters of men and women who died in war or were honorably discharged may be members. One of several auxiliary sponsored projects in the annual Girls State, a program which gives high school girls a chance to practice the responsibilities of citizenship.

Mrs. Myrtle Williams named 1980 N.M. Teacher of the Year

Carrizozo's second grade teacher, Mrs. Myrtle B. Williams was selected as the 1980 New Mexico Teacher of the Year. The Selection Committee met in Santa Fe recently to review each of the applications submitted from teachers throughout New Mexico. The Carrizozo teacher's application was selected as the best of these submitted for this school year. This is the 29th

year that the State School Board has awarded this honor to a New Mexico teacher.

In a letter to Williams announcing her selection: "It is clear that you have had a most varied teaching career, and that you have maintained an excellent attitude towards teaching, and towards children, through adversities that might have significantly discouraged someone of lesser dedication. Further, the Committee found it admirable that you have embarked upon yet another face of your personal education in order to be trained in a program of guidance and counseling."

Williams began teaching in the late 1930's at Ramon, N.M., 30 miles south Vaughn, in a one room all grade school house. From there she south Vaughn, in a one room all grade school house. From there she

was employed under Lincoln and Dona Anna County schools at Ruidoso, Salem and Las Cruces. She has taught school in the state of Arizona.

Among her early experiences was a teaching position in the 50's at "Our Lady of Good Shepherd" schools. At this former parochial school in Las Cruces her students were Mexican children who spoke mainly in their native language. In the 60's she taught at Capitan and at two different times in Carrizozo.

The second grade teacher today is active in civic organizations & the Presbyterian church. She has been a member of the New Mexico Education Association since 1940 and has held a variety of local and regional office with the association. She and her husband, Miles live in Nogal.
