Woman's Club In Top Five

The Carrizozo Woman's Club was named one of the five finalists in the 1979-80 Community Improvement Program co-sponsored by the General Federation of Women's Clubs and Sears, Roebuck and Co. Carrizozo was the Southwestern winner.

In being a winner of a territorial award, Carrizozo joins winners from California, Michigan, Tennessee and Pennsylvania as finalists for national prizes totaling \$25,000. The top national prize will be \$10,000.

The final five clubs are; Canoga Park Women's Club and Canoga Park Junior Women's club, Canoga Park, California; Carrizozo Woman's Club, Carrizozo, N.M.; Manistique Woman's Club, Manistique, Michigan; Junior Reading Circle, Ladies Reading Circle and Soma Sala Circle, Morristown, Tennessee; and Village Improvement Association, Doylestown, Pennsylvania.

A panel of three judges is slated to visit each site in the week of April 21 to the 26th for a closer look at activities. Placement at the national level will be determined following the judging tour.

Carrizozo was visited Wednesday by judges Mrs. Margaret Adams, senior editor of national affairs, New York, N.Y.; Charles P. Arnot, former television broadcaster and foreign correspondent, Prescott, Arizona; and Daniel W. Shannon, director of the division of community and organization development, University of Washington, Seattle, Washington.

Prizes will be awarded on June 4, 1980 during the annual GFWC convention in St. Louis, Mo. Officiating at evening award ceremonies will be Mrs. A.M. Quint, GFWC President, and Charles W. Harper, Sears vice president-public relations.

Winning projects range from Carrizozo's housing complex for low-income senior citizens, to a youth emergency shelter for abused children, an outreach program developed for retarded residents in a community home, a shelter and referral service for battered women and children, and include the only community hospital in the United States owned and operated by a Women's Club.

Designed to stimulate and encourage volunteer action at the community level, the two-year program attracted more than 10,415 entries.

CIP - 25 Years and Going Strong

The Community Improvement Program (CIP) is a 25 year old, nationwide program of community action based on community need. Co-sponsors, the General Federation of Women's Clubs (GFWC) and Sears, Roebuck and Co., developed the biennial program to encourage citizen involvement in local activities.

During the past 25 years, CIP projects have dealt with a wide range of concerns including health, education, crime prevention, ecology, historic preservation and culture. In the thousands of projects that have been completed since the program began, nearly every human need has been addressed.

CIP has progressed from a contest to a program of continuing education and action. Since 1960, CIP has sponsored district, state, regional and nation seminars in community development, with the assistance of members of the Community Development Division of the National University Extension Association.

The amount of incentive awards offered for outstanding projects has increased throughout the years, with the current state and nation competition awards totaling \$65,000. From the 51 first-place state winners, a panel of judges selects five finalists representing the Sears territories; eastern, midwestern, southwestern, southern and Pacific Coast. The judges then make on-site tours of the finalists and determine the order of national awards. First place receives \$10,000, second place, \$7,500, third place, \$5,000; fourth place, \$2,500; and fifth place, \$2,000.

Members learned at their meeting last week that their club will be awarded \$400.00 at the State Federation of Women's Club convention this Thursday in Santa Fe. They will be given the monetary award for their Community Improvement Project (CIP).

Members were told at last week's meeting that the club's annual \$200.00 scholarship will be increased. The club women discussed criteria and eligibility for the scholarship award as well as for the Sun Duchess nominee.

Charlotte Wall is desert chairman for May 3 Clean-Up Day, when the club is sponsoring the noon meal for the clean up participants.

May is 'Older American Citizens Month' and Sister Jan Geha, director of the 21st Senior Citizens Center told the club members of the awards dinner ceremony to be held May 15. A senior will be recognized as "Senior Citizen of the Year."

Ski Road Re-surfaced

The State Highway Department is working on a project to resurface New Mexico 532 in Lincoln County. The 12.5 mile road extends from Alto to the Sierra Blanca Ski Area.

The work is being done by a district two crew headed by Glen Armitage. Assistant maintenance supervisor Scott Davis is overseeing the project.

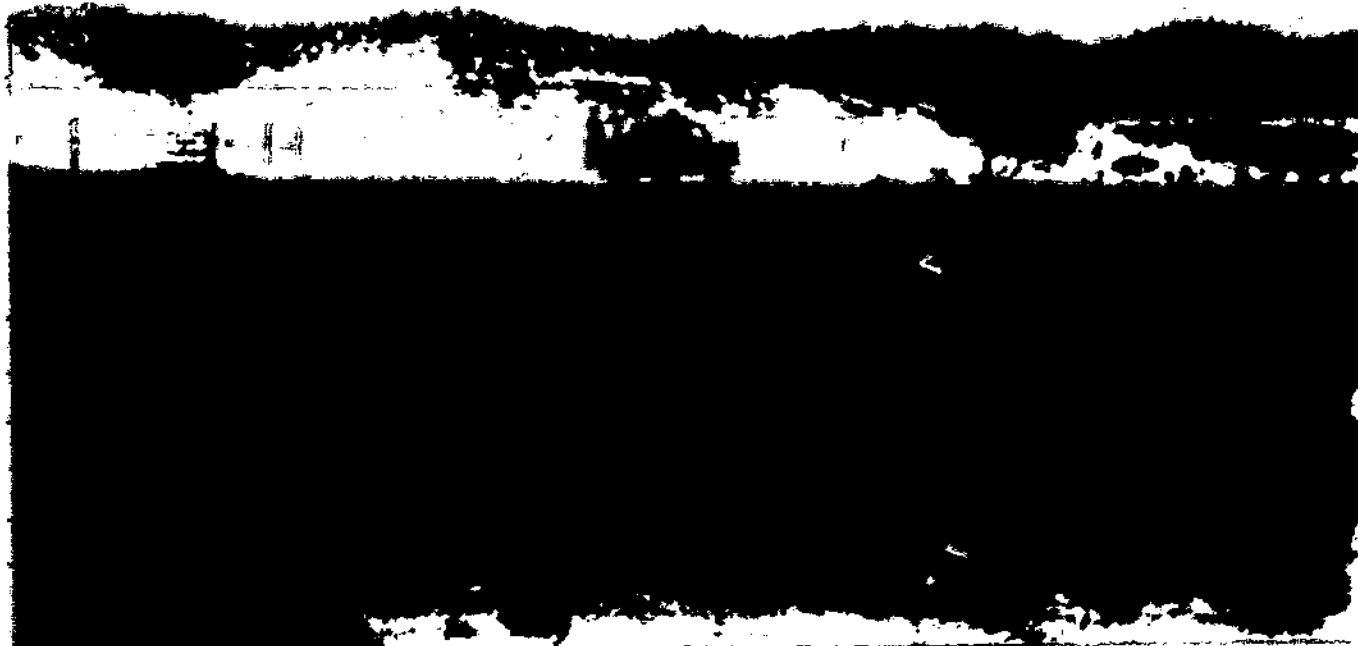
The crew is reworking and stabilizing the present road base, adding base material and applying a double penetration seal.

"Depending on the severity of the weather in the area and the effect of tire chains which are often necessary on the road, the repair work could be effective for about five years."

Last year, the department did some stabilization work on the road which some Lincoln County residents mistook for the road repair work that is being done now. The earlier work was just a temporary measure to prevent further deterioration of the road base before the ski season.

The total cost of the resurfacing project, including the work done last year, will be about \$450,000.

Weather permitting, the target date for the resurfacing to be done is June first of this year.



Two Fires at the Same Time

The Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department handled two fires at the same time last Sunday. Just before noon the fire alarm sounded and the firemen responded to a ten acre grass fire seven miles east of Carrizozo.

Before they got back, another fire was reported by the Railroad in one of their box cars. A third Carrizozo unit responded to the box car fire. Both fires were contained quickly.

Quilting Bits by Polly



It was around the 40's when a patient lady hand pieced hundreds of miniature hexagonal patches to flowers. The flowers were joined by tiny green diamond shapes. The "Grandmother's Flower Garden" was double outline quilted with thousands of fine stitches. The exquisite work of love was to be her first great-granddaughter.

Mrs. Vandenberg of West Cliff, Colorado has passed away since, but the recipient of the quilt, Lynne Miller of Carrizozo treasures the quilt and the grand prize ribbon awarded the quilt at Colorado's Custer County Fair.

The popular design of the quilt is a favorite of quilt fans. Thousands of small hexagons in a finished quilt is a matter of pride. In Colonial days it was called "Honeycomb" or "Mosaic". What is unique about the

Vandenberg quilt is the addition of the hundreds of tiny diamonds and triangles used to connect the patches and create the border.

In reading Wilbur Coe's "Ranch on the Rio Grande" I haven't yet come to any mention of quilting bees, but no doubt the pioneer women of Lincoln County were involved in quilting. Quilting is history and played an important role in the lives of county women. Quilts are family and community history records, and also a source of social and recreational activity.

From Chapter IV of Coe's book, "Frank and Helena Anne Coe Migrate to Lincoln County": "In Lincoln he (Frank) loaded the wagon with the things they needed, remembering to select some yard goods so his wife would have some sewing to occupy her time."

Recently I was fortunate to see three quilts made by Carolyn Wells of Claunch. I saw a gorgeous blue tones "Lone Star" that she made for her daughter Barbara Langley of Carrizozo. A quilt-as-you-go "Log Cabin" which she was in the process of completing will be an outstanding quilt. An all-solid color quilt featuring various quilting designs was beautiful.

QUILTING BEE TALK: Floor tiles at your local hardware are a good source for patterns. When drafting the design allow 1/4" for seams... have guests at a bridal or baby shower tie a quilt with yarn... to quilt in straight lines use masking tape for guide lines to avoid pencil marks on your quilt top... A gift to a quilting friend can be wrapped with a length of cloth instead of paper... to keep children or grandchildren occupied they can trace quilting templates (patterns) on paper with a pencil, then color and cut them out.

Former Corona resident Lucille Porter who now lives in Artesia

recognized the quilts in the NEWS picture this month. She believes they were made by Mrs. Cleve Brown. They were on display at the former Cleve Brown Hotel in Corona along with craft work of Mr. Brown, both who have passed away. Mr. Brown at one time lived in a nursing home in Carrizozo and was well known for skill in crafts.

If you know someone that quilts, I would like to know. If you quilt, share your ideas through this column. It can be like a quilting bee in that we can exchange hints or just "talk quilts". How are you coming along with your quilt for the Lincoln County Fair to be held in August?

By the way, the New Horizons students are seeking the donation of a used sewing machine. They would like to learn to sew with a machine. Cloth scraps would also be appreciated. They want to try their hand at quilt making.

Washington Report

From Your Congressman

Casting The First Stone



As our economy lurches from bad to worse, government officials are proposing solutions almost as fast as they can call press conferences, despite the fact that few are adopted and fewer still have any effect. Nowhere has the fever of economic reform hit harder than in Congress where a wave of born-again budget-cutters are crying for restraints on government spending and a balanced budget.

However, the role Congress played in creating the mess we're in is seldom mentioned. To repeat again the words of Pogo in that famous cartoon, "We have met the enemy, and he is us."

The National Association of Business Economists recently released their second annual review of laws passed by Congress. They found that in 1979 Congress passed more than three times as many bills that spurred inflation as those that helped control it. The NABE is a professional organization of more than 3,000 members from business, government and academia.

The association's Legislative Review Committee, a panel of leading economists, found that of the 172 non-appropriations bills passed during the 96th Congress' first session, 95 were "moderately" or "significantly" inflationary while only 28 helped cool the rise in prices.

The non-appropriations bill judged the most inflationary was P.L. 96-185, the Chrysler loan guarantee program. It was considered the worst because of its anti-competitive precedents.

Other non-appropriations bills considered to be significantly inflationary were:

- P.L. 96-127, continuing price supports for dairy products;
- P.L. 96-88, establishing a separate cabinet-level Department of Education;
- P.L. 96-128, increasing disabled veterans' benefits by 9.9%; and
- P.L. 96-125, authorizing \$3.8 billion of military construction.

The Congress did not pass any legislation that could be expected to significantly slow inflation, although the economists said 28 non-appropriations bills were rated as having moderately counter-inflation potential.

The NABE also said 14 out of 15 appropriations bills passed in 1979 were inflationary. Five of them were considered significantly inflationary.

They also reviewed Congressional action on the budget resolutions now required by the Budget Act of 1974. The review panel also said that far from bringing inflation under control as the Act intended, both Congressional budget resolutions were considered to be significantly inflationary.

The first budget resolution passed by Congress in May 1979 approved fiscal 1980 budget outlays of \$532 billion, revenues of \$509 billion, and a \$23 billion deficit. The second resolution, passed on November 28, boosted budget outlays to \$548 billion and revenue estimates to about \$518 billion, and projected a fiscal 1980 deficit of just under \$30 billion.

It should be pointed out the sole criterion used by the NABE in evaluating the laws was the degree of inflation expected. No consideration was given to other potentially harmful or beneficial effects of the laws.

Even with that in mind, it is plain that Congress must share a major portion of the blame for the inflation raging in our country. Aside from the inflationary laws passed every year, deficits have been approved in 18 of the last 20 years.

Hopefully, we can get the budget under control and are on the path toward more responsible legislation. In 1978 there were five times as many bills passed to spur inflation as those to help control it, so the three-to-one ratio last year looks a little better. Public pressure is mounting and I'm sure that will force Congress into passing a more sound fiscal program.

It's going to mean that cuts in some federal programs are going to have to be made, including some that benefit New Mexico, but we are just going to have to tough it out and learn to do without them. Government spending must be brought under control and the federal budget balanced and we have to do our part.
