'Closed' Meeting Really Open

A large crowd was in attendance at last Monday's regular town meeting, to the pleasure of Mayor Hernandez, who said he was "glad to have public input". Residents participated by voicing their opinions on various issues at the lengthy meeting.

The late item on the agenda, a letter which Hernandez saved until the end, was written by Chief of Police C.A. Morales. Hernandez asked the audience to leave as they (the council) were going to have a closed session regarding personnel involving town police officer Russell Smith and Morales. Hernandez gave Smith the option of having a public or a closed session on this matter, Smith said he had "nothing to hide", but said a closed session would be best.

While Trustee Joe Orsak tried to take action on close session legalities, the audience continued to make their exodus, thanking the council for their cooperation and bidding their "good nights".

The news reported lingered on although it was apparent my presence was resented. I finally left not knowing that I could have stayed until a public vote by the council was taken in order to conduct a closed session.

A phone call next day to Trustee Moreland on another town matter revealed that no closed session was held after all. The letter written by Morales, the basis of the planned closed session, was technically incorrect and no personnel closed session was held. Moreland was not free to disclose the contents of the letter.

Had a closed session been held the public would not have been on hand on the council's return to hear how the council voted on the matter based on the closed session discussion.

With the audience now safely tucked in bed the council proceeded with the public meeting. Hernandez removed Moreland from the Police Department and replaced him with Trustee Ruben Zamora. Moreland was pursuing grant applications for police equipment and chaired a review committee regarding the Police Department. The findings of an April 28, 3:00 p.m. meeting was the consensus of opinion of this review committee which was made up of Dale Housley, State Police; Jay McSwane, Sheriff's Dept; Don Means, Citizen; Mike Swickard, Citizen; and Conception Morales, City Police Department. Only McSwane, Means and Moreland were present at this meeting.

Morales earlier in the public meeting resented that he was listed as an observer at this one-time meeting of the review committee. He took offense that the opinion of the other law enforcement took priority over his input. He did not agree to the changing of the current six month probation period of police employees to ninety (90) days. Among other items on the findings that he objected to was the suggested State Police monthly recaptulation reports his department would have to fill out.

Applications Taken June 4th

Representatives from the Regional Housing Authority of Region VI New Mexico will be in Carrizozo, Wednesday, June 4, 1980, to take applications for the HUD Section 8 Rent Subsidy Program. This program assists low-income families in making their monthly rental payments.

The income limit is \$11,650 a year for a family of four. Any citizen who thinks they will qualify for assistance is encouraged to apply at the Welfare Office in Carrizozo, Wednesday, June 4, 1980, between 10:30 and 12:30 p.m. Also any landlord who is interested in possibly participating in the program and would like more information, is encouraged to contact the representatives.

In other business the town is plagued with skunks of the animal species. It was learned during the regular meeting that a rabid skunk was killed north of Evergreen cemetery. Gene Baker, who lives in the area shot the skunk. The head was sent to the lab in Albuquerque and results of the tests came back positive.

In other town business: Individual representing eight (8) families opposed the council's action at past meeting—granting R. E. Lubojacky permission to locate a mill in their neighborhood. Lubojacky had informed the council that he had the approval of neighboring residents, when he had only contacted one. The people involved were concerned with environmental problems resulting from mining operations. The variance to the zoning ordinance granted to Lubojacky was rescinded. Lubojacky had already changed his mind in locating his mill.

Ruth Armstrong representing Dr. Dale Goad, Economic Development Committee and Scott Shafer, president of the Chamber of Commerce, who were unable to be here, told the council that "Carrizozo wants to throw their hat into the ring for a regional airport." Armstrong said the organizations she represented would like to see Goad appointed to the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission. Armstrong pointed out the advantages from an economic standpoint, and "would like to see you appoint Dr. Dale Goad," for a voice and a vote at SBAC meetings. She said that she would like to borrow a phrase, "A regional airport would do for Carrizozo what the railroad did," in terms of growth.

Orsak was reluctant to pursue "a dream" and would like to upgrade the local airport instead. An appointee to SBAC would possibly entail a \$600.00 fee for "petty expenses", which the Chamber of Commerce would help raise. Orsak felt money should be directed to the town's airport. He told the council of maintenance improvements and had a list of items for the Mayor's disposal to further update the present airport.

Following a recent meeting with an FAA official, Orsak is pessimistic about Carrizozo's chances to be chosen for a regional airport site.

Town policeman Wheeler who resides at the airport house, reported that 26 aircraft stopped last month and 18 so far this month. Orsak would like to see more air traffic generated to the local airport and voiding the down fees is a means.

Plane Crashes—Two Injured

At approximately 12:45 Saturday afternoon a single engine two seater experimental aircraft crashed 16 miles East of Carrizozo injuring the two occupants, Mr. Williams Wilson, and the pilot Skip Stevens.

The cause is still unknown, with neither man able to recall any of the details of the accident.

Mr. Wilson's condition is fair, and Mr. Stevens' condition is still critical, although he is responding to treat-

ment and the doctor's prognosis is good.

The plane, a 1936 vintage Tiger Moth from England was removed to Carrizozo Airport by Lincoln County Sheriff's Department Deputy William Hasenbuhler.

Regional Airport for Carrizozo Area Discussed

A representative of the Albuquerque office of the Federal Aviation Administration, Mr. Bill Howard met on May first with the Economic Development Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, the Carrizozo town council and interested citizens of Carrizozo and Capitan.

The purpose of the Economic Development Committee is to encourage and attract business and new industry to Carrizozo. Howard was contacted by them because of their interest to have Carrizozo chosen as the site for a proposed regional airport.

At the afternoon meeting Howard discussed the history of a proposed new regional airport, the criteria involved for selecting sites commonly referred as Sites "A" and "B" and answered questions concerning a possible site in the Carrizozo region.

Sites A and B are located in the Fort Stanton mesa area. Site A will cost approximately 9 million dollars. The State and Federal Aviation Administrations will pay 6 million of this, with the remaining cost to be paid by the Lincoln County residents, through a general obligation bond. Site B is located on BLM land and is used by NMSU for experimental purposes. The Ruidoso Airport can not be used for large aircraft. An alternate site closer to Carrizozo is what the Economic Development Committee would like.

At this meeting with Howard, Dr. David Rouleau, Capitan physician presented some opinions and concerns of the citizens of the Capitan area in regard to the proposed airport and the Ft. Stanton site. Rouleau questioned the cost-benefit ratio to the average Lincoln County resident. He

stated that a totally new facility in site A or B with expensive access roads would mainly benefit jet-setter, race track enthusiasts, legalized gambling and organized crime.

Rouleau went on to say that sites A and B did not satisfy many questions regard to safety. He asked if climate and elevation, as well as the decrease in aircraft performance with higher altitude.

He pointed to the fact that the Ft. Stanton area is adjacent to the National forest, wilderness area, and a twenty-year livestock research program. He added that an airport would be detrimental to all of these. The doctor said that many residents of the Hondo Valley and the Lincoln town area enjoy their rural atmosphere and wish it to remain a quiet place to live.

Howard said that "any kind of transportation brings growth", and a change of livestock.

Bonnell Signs Grazing Permit

Rancher-banker Ted Bonnell has signed a new grazing permit with the Lincoln National Forest, to consolidate a group of grazing allotments into one 130,000 acre ranch, making it one of the Lincoln's largest single grazing permits.

The cooperative effort provides for planned range improvement over the next five years including water development, fencing improvement and range reseeding projects. Costs will be split between Bonnell and the Forest Service.

Bonnell, who has been a Forest grazing permittee since 1965, said the overall effect of the agreement will be to provide a single grazing management system over the entire area.

The cooperative improvement plan was coordinated with other uses on the Forest including watershed, wildlife, recreation and timber. A range monitoring process will be used over the next five years to evaluate the plan's effectiveness on both the range resource and livestock production.

Lincoln National Forest Supervisor James R. Abbott said this is the first of major consolidations that are needed to improve range and livestock management in the Sacramento Mountains.

"This kind of cooperation and effort on the part of Ted Bonnell is the best way to manage the land and help meet needs for beef production," Abbott added.

Orsak added that "for all practical purposes, we're running the airport" and the council will take action to terminate the lease of Yellowbird, Inc. Orsak said, "We're losing revenues by virtue that we have an absentee landlord." Contract agreements have not been met and the town will take over the airport facilities.

Construction will begin next week to add solar heating to the swimming pool. Opening day for swimming is scheduled for June 1. Town Superintendent will serve as the pool manager. Applications for pool employee positions are in. The council learned that Linda Gibson's letter in the NEWS resulted in the donation of \$110.00. The council approved the increase of admission for swimming, including increase in single and family passes.

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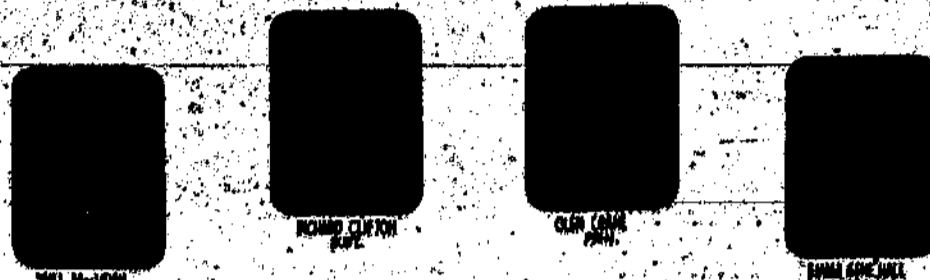
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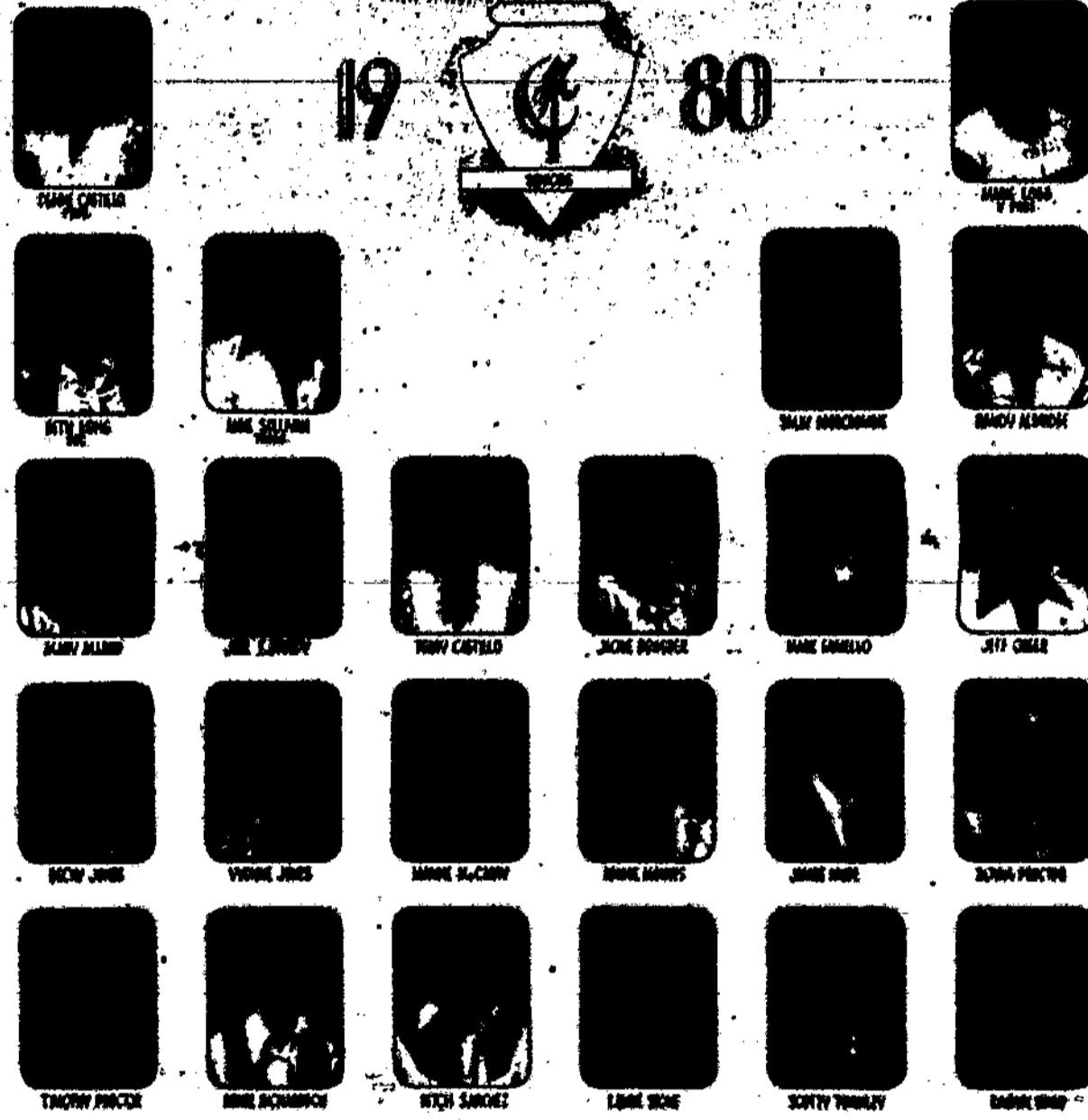

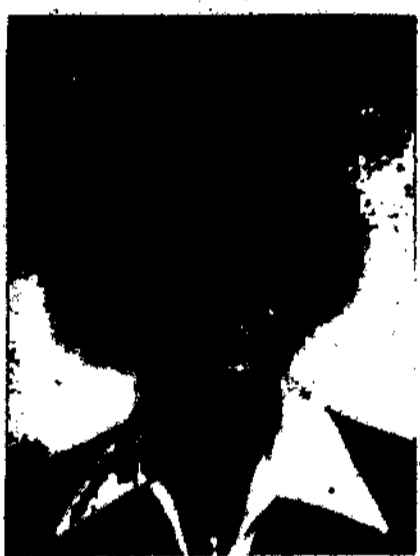

This column will bring you ideas adapted from the functional quilts used by our forefathers. Hints will help readers to create quilt-related projects from "almost nothing". This craft requires a minimum of equipment and supplies. In these days of inflation this is one practical hobby that will stretch your dollars (or pennies).

Through mini lessons and "quilt talk" with readers, quilt fanatics will be able to share their hobby in **QUILTING BITS**. The pioneer women, whose artistic efforts brought warmth and beauty to their homes will be the inspiration to readers sewing projects.

It is still not too late to make a New Year's resolution: "To start my Christmas sewing!"

Come December 1980 we should have many quilt inspired vests, bags, toys, coverlets, tablecloths, as well as quilts, for our own household and personal use and for gift giving. In addition we may want to enter our projects in county fairs. Before you know it, the Lincoln County Fair will be around the corner.

Your holiday sewing no doubt left you with a variety of remnants, (velvet, satin, velour, etc.) pieces to little to make a garment, but ideal to make small items. Quilt-related things like patchwork bags, vests and aprons.

Pillows and cushions bring the warmth and beauty of old-fashioned quilts into a home. How about making cushions out of those luxurious holiday fabric remnants? Or you may use "dressed" clothing you no longer want. Party clothes for rascals may be found at rummage sales. Check the classified section of this issue of the

Lincoln County News for sales this weekend.

Cushions can be round, square or rectangle shaped. The design may be used only on the top or both sides. Try to use the same type of materials together. Work with scraps in different shades of the same color or choose fabric with strong contrast to make the pattern stand out.

Designs to be appliqued may be printed or solids. Frame with a ruffled or trim with lace for a special look. Applique or paint on stencil style initials or embroider a message to make your pillow extra special and unique if you want to give it to someone as a gift.

Fabric pieced together in odd shaped pieces, then sewed haphazardly form a "crazy" quilt cushion. Fill cushions with polyester batting and when it becomes soiled it can be thrown into the washer and dryer without taking apart.

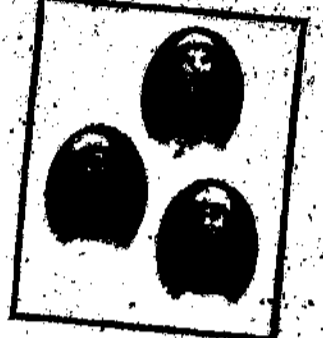

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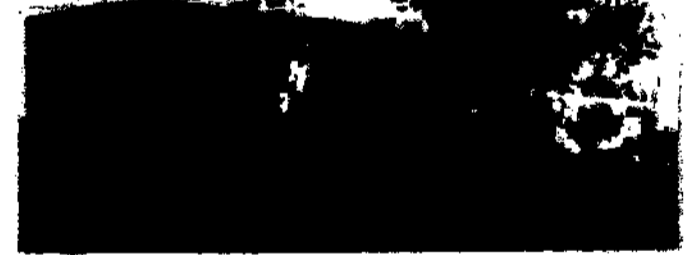


