Capitan Council-- Garbage Fee Up a Dollar

The Capitan Town Council approved an \$87,164 budget for 1980-81 with increases in garbage and water covering the income deficit tabulated from last year's income and Santa Fe projections.

Garbage fees will be raised \$1 a month and water will experience a decrease in water allotment, from the 3000 gallons minimum to 2000 gallons a month. Each 1000 gallons over the 2000 gallon minimum will be charged \$1 a ten cent increase over present rates. These increases will be effective July 1 but will not be billed until August.

Fuel inflation has repeatedly kept the garbage department in the hole. Minimum water was decreased because a majority of Capitan water users never exceed the limit. The increase is expected to not effect those using little water, like the elderly. Heavy water users will pay the increase.

June 2 will be a special meeting to review Revenue Sharing. Santa Fe has directed the money all go into Capitol Outlay, Ambulance, water and the museum will receive these funds.

J.G. Moore will provide a \$7343 insurance contract covering workman's compensation, general liability, vehicle and property. The coverage is at the present rate of coverage which Mayor Stark considered out of date.

Maintenance supervisor Caywood told the council of the three items for the May 17 Auction to be held at Olan Booher's in Capitan. The items are an International truck, used police car and a packer. The items have been approved for sale by Santa Fe. The auction will feature surplus county equipment also.

A resolution was passed giving city approval to the forming Senior Citizens group. The group is now eligible for federal and state funds.

The resignation of Tommy Qualls from the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission was not filled because of the village's refusal to participate in the program. Mayor Stark suggested Benny Coker be appointed. Coker declined, "Capitan should be a part of the commission or I don't want to be on the board."

County Commissioner Ben Hall, scheduled to appear and brief the council concerning the Airport was not present and the Council agreed to table the appointment until Hall could address the problem.

Caywood informed the Council of excess sewer water into the Maggardo Creek. The village has not discharged water for three weeks and is now letting it flow into a dry arroyo. The state agency has instructed the village to install a lift station and sprinkler system to get rid of the excess water. The sewer lagoon, built four years ago, were designed to handle ten years of sewage without problems. The problem was tabled until funds could be obtained, then a special meeting will be called.

Water brought Paul Jones and Vernon Goodwin to the meeting. Jones complained of being billed twice for just one meter. A situation where a trailer has been installed next to a residence and is using one meter is controlled by an ordinance passed this year concerning water meters. Any residence, including trailers, staying longer than 45 days is subject to the ordinance and must have a separate meter. Jones complained he had no objections to the additional meter but wanted the minimum allotment for two meters. He also felt the additional work and cost for a meter that will not likely use the minimum seemed unnecessary.

The Council replied they did not want to set a precedent in granting Jones a waiver on the ordinance. They instructed Caywood to install a meter. Jones also complained of the poor drainage at his property on the east end of town. Stark told him the village would look the situation over and see what can be done.

Vernon Goodwin appeared with his proposed subdivision. He told the Council he would install a booster pump and lines at his cost and donate them to the village.

Capitan School Board--

Phase One Finalized

The \$793,565 contract to John C. Cornell, Inc. Clovis, for Phase One of Capitan High School was finalized at the May School Board meeting.

Delayed because of a regulation concerning the number of feet a school can be from a State Highway, the contract was awarded after a waiver of the regulation was granted by the State Board of Education.

Capitan Superintendent appeared before the board May 1 to appeal for the waiver because of the limited space at the Capitan Campus. Architect Jerry Lake gave Cornell, Construction, Inc. the go ahead the day after.

BCA, Building Corp. of America, Albuquerque, was low bidder on the science furniture for the High School. The \$44,700 bid was \$2300 less than the original bid, which was omitted as Alternate One of Cornell's base bid. The original subcontractor was found to have a product not meeting the architect's specifications.

Lake thanked the board for the opportunity to correct the mistake of the original contract. He also announced Frank Mundell, supervisor of Cornell Inc. would begin preliminary site operations the following week.

School Superintendent Clifton announced favorable comments from the Capitol Outlay Committee concerning Capitol Outlay funds next year Phase 2 of the high school. The school received \$860,000 this year for phase one now beginning.

The Board approved re-hiring 19 teachers and hired two new teachers. Jack King was hired to help initiate the Vo Ag program. He will replace Wayne Richardson, teacher of the Industrial Arts program terminated this year. Two teachers aides were hired.

Clifton reported on the progress of the Forest Service land trade. The school is proposing to trade 10.12 acres for over six acres of Forest Service adjoining the school. The school will now need three appraisals; local, state and federal. The local appraisal must be sent to the Department of Finance and Administration and will be rejected in order to begin a state appraisal of the ten acres. After the three appraisals are completed the Forest Service will move toward the trade.

Herbert Traylor requested the school consider giving the now forming Capitan Senior Citizens group the administration building. The group is offering to move the building after the offices are moved to the new school. The Board was in favor of giving the building but must wait until the request is approved by the Department of Finance and Administration.

Problems with the elementary now in construction were also discussed. Bill Nance, inspector for the state contractor's board, recently reviewed the project at the request of the School Board. He inspected the cement used in the floor of the elementary and further tested the core samples taken earlier. The cores had tested to a 3000 pound minimum, except one at 2700. The concrete in question is a 10x15 foot area. Lake requested Shackelford Construction remove the concrete and repour.

Another item the inspector found missing was added fire protection for the steel columns and beams. He ordered these be wrapped with fire proofing. The job is at a point the wrapping can still be done. Partitioning and electricity are in and the sheetrock work is the next step. Lake told the Board he had designed one hour fire protection without the steel fireproofing, but the inspector required a two hour limit and ordered the wrap. Lake suggested the Board comply to avoid a lengthy and perhaps losing battle with the state board.

Lake informed the Board, Shackelford Cone was willing to wrap the steel if the 2700 lb. test concrete

does not have to be taken out. He offered to supply materials and labor. Lake suggested this offer be taken.

The questionable concrete represents about one-fourth of classroom 128 and will be covered by carpeting. Lake told the board he felt the concrete would do a good job and give no trouble.

"I'm suppose to use good judgement, that 2700 lb. concrete will do a good job, I'd take the fireproofing," Lake commented.

After arguments leading to the soil compaction under the questionable concrete--and the probable problems of repouring the Board agreed to wait until receiving written recommendations from Bill Nance. The Board instructed Lake to get prices on the fireproofing and two soil compaction tests. Permission was given to go ahead with the fire proofing if the price was reasonable.

The Board did not commit itself to Shackelford's offer, with a majority wanting the concrete taken out.

The Elementary project has been plagued with concrete problems from its beginning. The School is scheduled for completion in July.

The board approved meeting time to 7:30 p.m. for summer months.

FFA Awards Banquet Held

Outgoing FFA president, Philip Payne, a Carrizozo high school junior received a number of awards at the eighth annual Carrizozo Future Farmers of America Parent-Member-Guest Banquet on May 13.

In addition to dairy judging and farm business management awards; a Past President plaque, Payne received the Star Chapter Farmer Award. This award is presented to the chapter member who is the most involved in all phases of the chapter's activities. The member also has an outstanding Supervised Agricultural Occupational Experience Program (SOEP).

1973 Carrizozo graduate, Rex Wilson was recognized at the event. Wilson, an NMSU student was Carrizozo FFA president; district VI president and State reporter; State president and ran for National office. He was the first member from the Carrizozo Chapter to receive the American Farmer Degree. Wilson was given an appreciation award during the banquet.

The banquet featured John Orin, director of the New Mexico Service from Las Cruces, who gave a slide presentation. Many awards, including the Star Greenhand were given as part of the program.

Awards in Judging were given as follows: Horses - Mona Payne; Livestock - Billy LaMay; Dairy - Philip Payne; Entomology - Robert Hemphill; Crops - Stephen Payne; Wool - Mona Payne; Farm Management - Philip Payne.

Mr. Ken Jones, FFA advisor presented the Star awards. The Star Chapter Farmer to Philip Payne as noted earlier and the Star-Chapter Agribusiness to Mona Payne. The requirements for this award are very similar to the Star Chapter Farmer. The one exception is that this FFA member's SOEP is in the agribusiness area rather than production agriculture. Jones presented John Hemphill the Star Greenhand award. This is presented to the first year member who is most

active in the chapter, has demonstrated leadership and has a strong SOEP.

Other honors included Greenhand Creed Award - Kevin Wilmore; Greenhand Quiz Award (based on knowledge of the FFA organization) - John Hemphill. Proficiency awards were given to Mona Payne in Agriculture Sales and Service and to Lisa Ferguson in Dairy Production.

James Miller, Virginia Curtiss, Mary Ellen Payne, Ken Jones and Laura Jones were given Honorary Chapter Farmer degrees for their help with the Chapter in the past years.

The 1980-81 officers were installed at the banquet. Billy LaMay is the new Chapter president. The rest of the officers are: Matt Ferguson, vice-president; Johnny Bob Stearns, Secretary; Johnnie Herrera, Treasurer; Todd Lindsay, reporter; Moses Sambrano, sentinel.

Airforce at Local Airport

Air representatives from Holloman AFB contacted the Carrizozo Municipal Airport to inform them that they will visit the town's airport on Friday, May 23. The purpose of the visit is to discuss subjects of general interest with civilian pilots in the local flying area. They will also bring information concerning current military operations and projected future operations in or around this area.

Herbert W. Johnson, Major USAF Chief of Current Operations wrote that the local airport is requested to contact local pilots and inform them of the scheduled visit to the airport on May 23. Johnson and the other AFB airspace representatives will be arriving in the civil aircraft.

Carrizozo Airport Advisory Committee members plan to attend the 9:00 a.m. meeting with the Holloman officials. The committee invites others in the area who are interested to be at the town airport for the meeting.

Johnson writes that in the past, all who attended felt that visitations were vital to the interest of both civilian and military pilots; subjects of air safety, mid-air collision avoidance, and airspace utilization are interesting and universal in nature.

The Carrizozo Airport Advisory Committee, which town trustee Joe Orsak recently organized, met last Monday evening for their first meeting since being formed. Orsak received the town council's permission at the town's May 12 regular meeting to form the group.

The committee is not a "not a policy making" committee, Orsak said at the town meeting. They will try to generate air traffic to Carrizozo Municipal Airport.

The committee consists of Orsak, Scott Shafer, Dr. Dale Goad, Leon "Hoot" Gibson, Tom Tracey, and Robert Hemphill. The group includes town policeman Dave Wheeler, who resides at the airport house and is acting airport manager.

He was seeking a commitment from the village for water. Councilman Riska, head of the water department, told Goodwin the village could not guarantee water, not to him for anyone for that matter.

"If it's there you can have it," Riska stated.

The Council suggested Goodwin take his proposal to the county for approval. They approved a vote of confidence for 24 days of the subdivision as long as it complies to regulations and as long as the village has the water.

Stark reported the LEAA \$7800 grant for a new police car was received. The car will be \$670.00, the remaining funds will outfit it.

Dorothy Winderoff was seeking help to stop tennis court abuse. She was informed the court belongs to the state and the matter be referred to Park Superintendent Henson.

A closed session for personnel problems ended the meeting.

The NEWS understands that the County Manager Billingsly is recommending the removal of Bud Payne from the position of County Ambulance Coordinator, and that, that position be administered by the County Manager's Office.

The NEWS talked with Bud Payne and he stated at that time that he will go along with that proposal as long as the Ambulances are kept where they are, and the E.M.T.'s operating the Ambulance system for the county are satisfied.

The system under Payne is one of the best Ambulance systems in the State and the Nation.

Seven years ago, there wasn't much that an injured person could expect from the Ambulance service in this area.

The Carrizozo Mayor Johnson Stearns gave then Fire Chief for Carrizozo Payne the old ambulance and told him to do what he could.

Payne contacted state and federal officials and got grants for the first ambulances in this area.

John Suddarth, then County Commissioner, appointed Payne as the County Ambulance Coordinator, and Payne developed a program for the rest of the county.

Payne also stated that the reason that the system works is the time and effort that the volunteers have contributed in their EMT training. The County's system is operated on a budget of \$40,000 a year.

For the last year, Ruidoso has operated about half as much on a budget of \$110,000.

We at the NEWS commend Payne on his efforts and are shocked at County Manager Billingsly messing in something that he shouldn't.

When you are miles from the nearest hospital and injured, people like Bud Payne make the chances that you will survive much greater; we need more people like Payne, less like Billingsly.

The next Commission meeting is next Tuesday. MS

Deadline for Lincoln County

Fair Queen Contest is June 20

This is a reminder to all Lincoln County girls who are considering running for fair queen of Lincoln County. The 1968 queen contest will be held at the fairgrounds at Capitan at 3:00 p.m. Thursday, July 3.

The contest will consist of two sections, a personality section and a riding section. For the personality portion, the contestants will be dressed nicely and will visit casually with the judges in the large room of the fair building. The riding portion will follow immediately and will be held in the fairgrounds arena. In the riding portion, each contestant will ride through a predetermined pattern to show the girl's horsemanship abilities. In addition, each contestant is allowed three minutes of freestyle riding time in which she can further demonstrate her horsemanship abilities. For the riding portion all contestants will be attired in blue denim pants, white shirt, boots, and hat of choice. Contestants will be judged 80 percent on horsemanship and 40 percent on personality.

The Lincoln County Fair Queen contest is open to all single girls age 16 through 20, who attended a Lincoln County High School. There is a \$10.00 entry fee for each contestant, with the money going to the winning contestant. The contestants must agree to appear at all performances of the Snoddy the Bear Stampede and the parade on the morning of July 4. The queen will be crowned at the afternoon performance of the rodeo July 4.

The queen is expected to conduct the 1968 queen clinic at the State Fair in Albuquerque. The queen will receive a trophy belt buckle, a tiara, a bouquet of roses, money from the Lincoln County Fair Board and the Lincoln County Commissioners, along with the entry money from the other queen contestants.

C'ozozo Seniors Honored at Graduation Exercises

Graduates of the classes of 1917 and 1918, Rachel West and Clara Snow were "two special people" that superintendent of Carrizozo Schools, Dr. James Miller, Jr. recognized the evening of the Class of 1968 Commencement exercises.

They listened from their place on the stage, along with the 1968 seniors and others on the program, as valedictorian Steve Howard and salutatorian, Mona Payne talked about the future and the past.

"For years people have talked about the developing problems that the future generations are going to have to solve, well we are one of the future generations, and we have our share of problems to solve," Howard told his fellow seniors and the audience. He went on to talk about the energy shortage, recession and the military.

Howard said, "We have quite a few resources to draw upon though, to help in this uphill battle. The most powerful being our education and the fact that we can get all the education we want."

His final message was—"If the trend continues, technology will give us more leisure time and a more comfortable life. The classes of 1968 all over the world are going to solve the problems of today. Everyone will help in one way or the other to solve the problems of energy, economy and our military with our greatest tool of all: Education!"

Salutatorian Mona Payne took the audience on a trip down memory lane—to the year 1968, twelve years ago when her graduating class began first grade.

1968: A year of notable political unrest . . . Martin Luther King, Jr. and Robert Kennedy were assassinated . . . The Vietnam war was making headlines . . . the price of gold reached a record high of \$43.36 an ounce . . . astronauts orbit the earth . . . Nixon was elected president of the U.S. . . . David Cargo was New Mexico's governor.

As Payne gave highlights of the good news and bad news in 1968, she commented on differences in that year as compared to 1960, and added, "It's interesting to look back and try to learn from some of our failures and some of our successes. But we can't live in the past. If we try to reach back for yesterday, we might miss tomorrow. The past is our heritage, the present is our responsibility, and the future our challenge. Our ancestors met the challenges and so will we. The future is ours!"

Carrizozo Schools counselor Jim Cope presented various awards and scholarships to several graduating seniors during Tuesday's commencement exercises held at the high school gym. Cope also recognized many seniors for their accomplishments.

Representatives of businesses, churches and clubs also awarded scholarships. Not all the scholarships were total tuition but were incentives to aid the seniors to pursue higher education in a trade school, college or university.

Full tuition institutional

scholarships were awarded to Howard and Payne, as well as to Senior Class President Vince Vega who gave the welcome address. In addition Howard and Payne were presented the valedictorian and salutatorian awards.

Other scholarships were as follows: Mona Payne (Beico Industries \$500.00); Pat Ventura (Citizens State Bank \$100.00); Arthur Vega and Vince Vega (Student Council \$100.00 each); Kim Vallejos (United Methodist Women \$100.00); Kim Vallejos, Mona Payne, Vince Vega (Vocational Advisory Council \$150.00 each); Vince Vega (Woman's Club \$500.00)

There was no recipient for the Canyon Cowbelles scholarship of \$100.00 for a student who wants to major in agriculture. Cope said that the selection process for all local scholarships was not easy and he hopes that the community scholarships will continue next year.

The University of New Mexico High School Achievement Award and plaque recipients were Tawnya Castar and Pat Ventura. A \$30.00 stipend is awarded to each student upon enrollment at UNM for the fall semester.

Two seniors and a junior in national contests were recognized. Two entries from Carrizozo Don Ward, a junior and Mona Payne in the Calvin Horn Historical Essay Contest with Payne coming in as alternate.

Jaylen Vega is alternate in the National Honor Society Scholarship competition.

Historic Wortley Hotel Re-opened

The historic Wortley Hotel, a state-owned property in Lincoln, has once again opened its doors to the traveling public.

The rustic eight room hotel, first built in 1872, had been closed since November while the Museum of New Mexico carried out a major restoration program. The Museum, an agency of the State Office of Cultural Affairs, oversees operations of the hotel and 10 other properties in town as Lincoln State Monument.

All of the Wortley's eight guest rooms and dining room were refurbished with a Victorian flavor. Antique dressers and tables with marble tops, lace curtains, and four-poster brass beds in each bedroom were cleaned and repaired.

Bath fixtures were replaced, corner fireplaces repaired, and wood floors and adobe walls refinished. Historic lithographs of the 1870's and 1880's, some borrowed from the State Museum of Fine Arts in Santa Fe, were hung in guest rooms and the dining room.

Kitchen appliances were either repaired or replaced, and new tableware was purchased for the dining room.

The dining room also is furnished with antique pieces. Breakfast, lunch and dinner is served daily.

The Wortley figured prominently in the bloody Lincoln County Wars of the early 1860's in which rival factions struggled for control of rich grazing lands. Among the war's participants was the now famous (or infamous) Billy the Kid.

Rev. Wayland B. 


