Council Appoints 'new' Board

Center closed for Summer

The Carrizozo Town Council met May 22 for a special meeting, including appointments to a "new" recreation committee. Mayor Hernandez told the council that Morgan Maxwell received approval from Mrs. A.N. Spencer for six individuals to be appointed to the Recreation Committee.

Trustee Roy Harmon inquired about this new committee and Hernandez replied "Same as one we abolished temporarily," referring to a former Recreation Committee of 6 members that he removed, including Maxwell, at a special April meeting.

Hernandez said he also had talked to Mrs. Spencer and that she stated that this will be the last year that she will be funding the Carrizozo Recreation Center and Golf Course. The town has two more checks coming from her and she has approved the following new appointees: Sterling Spencer, Dale Housley, S.M. Ortiz, Cherri Goad, Leroy Zamora and Maxwell, "who will be staying on as chairman," Hernandez said.

Trustee Michael Moreland asked the type of input the new Rec Committee would provide the council, "because before, evidently there wasn't much in the past." Moreland

was appointed Recreation Committee 'ex officio' member (by virtue of the office) to keep the other town trustees abreast of the Committee's doings.

With this being the last year that Mrs. Spencer is supporting the recreational facilities, the mayor is

looking into federal monies for the golf course. Hernandez said that the town's goal for the Rec Center is to be self-supporting and may even be leased out to a private individual. Plans are underway to repaint and clean the center and to bring the snack bar back to life.

The council discussed property insurance with insurance agents, Pat Vigil (Lincoln County Insurance) and Bob Stearns (J.G. Moore Insurance) participating. The town's J.G. Moore 3 year policy is up for renewal and Vigil had submitted a bid, which was never brought to the council's attention.

Stearns said, "If the council wants bids they ought to do it in the form of sealed bids," and that they need to prepare a new statement of values, increasing property values to 1980 because present property values are for 1978 which are low.

Harmon asked Town Attorney Bill Payne for his opinion. Said Payne, "I feel that you could do two things: (1) is you can pay J.G. Moore's invoice, or (2) solicit bids for a new insurance policy. That was not done before. This is a practical matter."

The council will ask for bids for the town's properties and restate values.

The town is waiting for a performance bond before allowing construction of a solar heating system to the swimming pool. The pool will open on schedule, as the solar construction, when in progress will not interfere in the operation of the pool.

An item of lengthy discussion was a request by Mable Vigil for a zoning change. The council received a letter of re-consideration for a parking of a trailer on Central Avenue. Mrs. Vigil had a trailer parked in the lot in question at one time and another one is located there and she would like permission to leave it there.

Hernandez is all for, "Going back in the zoning ordinance and changing it. From Roy Dow's to the other side of the court house," there by allowing Mrs. Vigil her request.

Trustee Joe Orsak wanted the matter tabled, "If we're quick to grant a variance, we'll run into trouble later on."

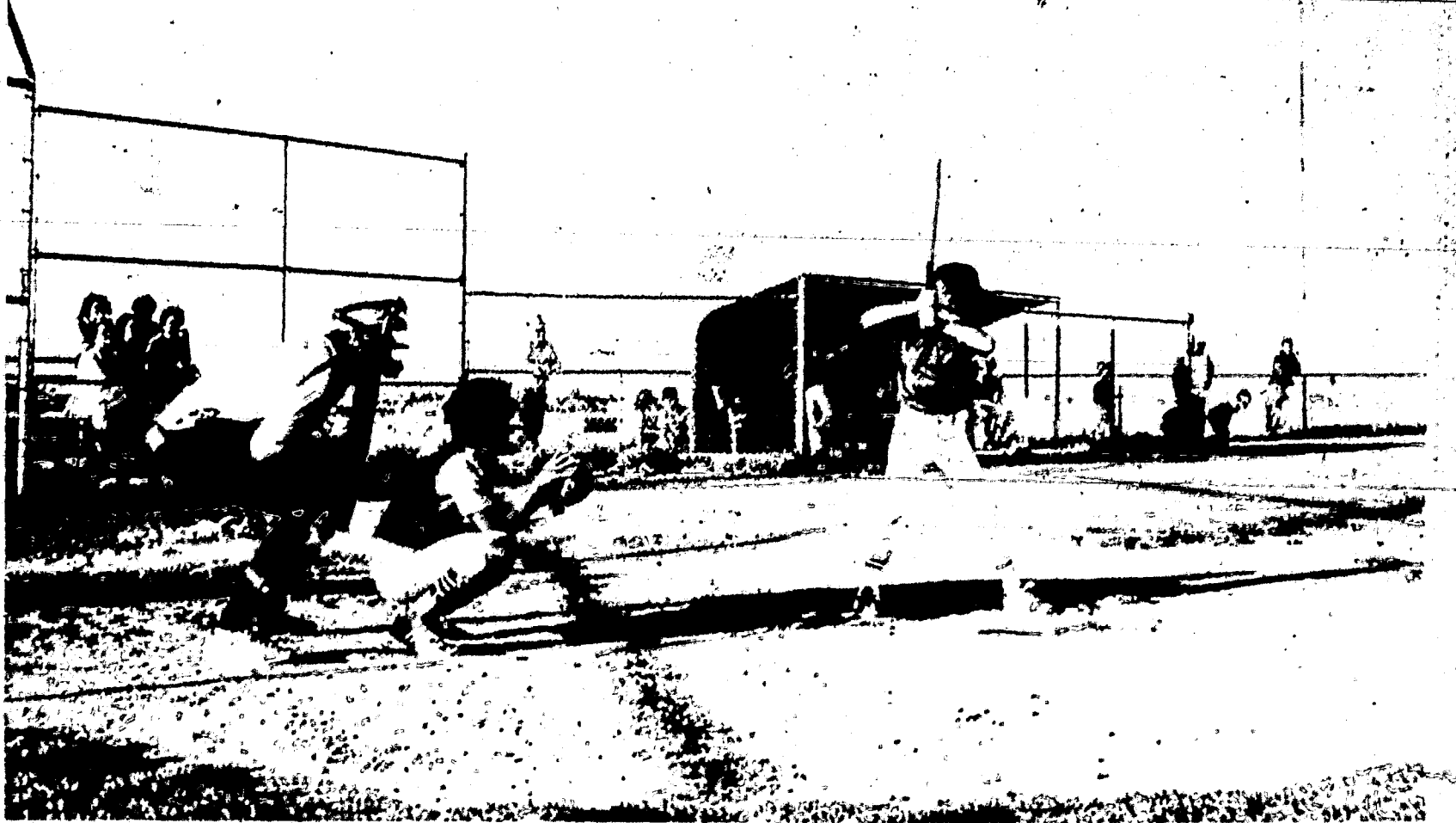
The council will have a 'work session' on the trailer ordinance to review the situation. Meanwhile the trailer in question will remain there. Hernandez said that the presence of the trailer means money to the town in utilities because it is already hooked up. The Vigil request was tabled until the next regular meeting, "to see what changes we can make."

The town council discussed CETA help and On The Job Training (OJT).

Trustee Ruben Zamora who was to report on police business was not able to attend the special meeting.

The town will spend left over money from the Industrial Park project to replace water lines on Birch, Cedar and Aspen, 3 streets south of the rail road tracks. Town Superintendent Emilio Beltran said that these streets now have 2 inch water lines and will soon be converted to 4 inch lines which will allow for more volume and pressure.

A pre-budget hearing was part of the May 22 special meeting. The final budget hearing will be in July.

The mayor replaced the four that were voting as a majority, these four also were the only ones that went to the center regularly, and they (this includes myself) were replaced by three that don't go and one that goes once a week. We now have a board of members that do not go to the recreation center. No reason was given for this action. I would like to know why, and so would others.

I noticed that Mayor Hernandez stated in the meeting that Mrs. Jackie Spencer approved the new board... and then pulled her money out. Sounds like she wasn't all that happy with all of the council's dealings. I don't blame her at all.

Jackie Spencer has made one of the most beautiful gifts to a community ever, that of something for the children. And this council has done everything in it's power to ruin the gift. They even closed the center for the summer, just when the kids needed it most. I don't blame her if she is mad, I don't know if she is, but is sure seems that way.

Again Gentlemen, the children are what matter in this recreation mess, not the "elected" bosses of the town.

I took the news of the Center's closing with some degree of preparedness. You see, I already knew that they were not going to keep it open as they promised for the summer. None of the Town Councilers go to the center, so they are not out anything. But the kids....

And speaking of other town happenings, I thought that at least the kids would have the Swimming Pool. They may still, but I found out something odd the other day. I was asked for some information on the Pool at a town council meeting by the firm that is installing the solar equipment. I put off getting the information as it will take a little time to figure, but as the people from the solar equipment place were due in town soon, I went over to the pool to figure this problem out. The problem that they asked me about.

I have managed the Carrizozo Swimming Pool three times, and helped it get started three other times. So having started the pool six times, I am very well schooled on the Carrizozo Swimming Pool. I have helped the Pool whenever asked, free of charge, because I believe that the pool helps the kids of our community.

The other day, when I got to the pool, I was told by the town workers that I was barred from all town property without written permission, orders from the "boss". The Mayor seems to be mad at me. So mad that he would rather not have any of my free help.

At first I thought that they were joking, but they were not. I can not set foot on any town property without written permission of Mr. Mayor.

All right Mr. Mayor, you have made your point. You are all powerful, much like the all powerful Oz.

You are the head person in Carrizozo.

You are the supreme boss, the one and only leader of men women, and children in Carrizozo. Your power is unlimited in Carrizozo. We all worship the ground you walk on, etc. etc. etc.

There, now that I have said the magic words, now that I have acknowledged your supreme power, let me humbly ask your written permission to help the kids of the community, if they need it. If the need

arises, let me help as I have for these many years to get the Swimming Pool open. Don't make the kids suffer for a bunch of adult ego problems, they don't deserve it. MS

This week's Potpourri is featuring the graduating class of 1933. Politics, inflation and graduation exercises all over the country this month and next make 1960 reminiscent of the year 1933. And now for a look at yesterday:

THE CLASS OF '33 DURING THE GREAT DEPRESSION

"The only thing we have to fear is fear itself," Franklin Delano Roosevelt told the nation in his 1933 inaugural address. Roosevelt took office as president at the depth of the Great Depression which hit after the stock market collapsed in 1929 during the Hoover administration.

The country sank into the most acute depression in its history. Millions lost every cent they owned. Banks failed, factories shut down and stores closed. Angry farmers prevented mortgage foreclosures with pitch forks and workmen demanded radical government action. Desperate men sold apples on street corners, ate in "soup kitchens", and lived in clumps of shacks called,

"Hoovervilles". Carrizozo and surrounding area residents still remember the steady stream of "tobes" (unemployed men) who jumped off the freight trains. They knocked at back doors offering to chop wood or clean a yard for a bite to eat.

The republicans renominated Hoover in 1932. The democrats turned to Roosevelt, who won an overwhelming victory. His vigorous optimistic campaign speeches advocated a "New Deal" for the "forgotten man". Relief, Recovery and Reform were Roosevelt's aims when he took office in 1933. The country needed immediate relief and recovery from economic collapse and reform to prevent future depressions.

The Carrizozo graduating class of 1933 stated in their year book, the predecessor of all future Grizzlie Annuals: "In order to comply with depression customs it was deemed advisable to photograph the various clubs as a major group instead of featuring each club separately."

Attire at their 'Depression Junior-Senior Banquet and Prom' was short gingham dresses for the girls and Levi's and gingham shirts for the boys. A small high school band from Hondo Valley provided the popular 30's dancing music.

A new era in American history began under Roosevelt. Under his 'New Deal', dozens of government agencies were set up. Many were known by their initials such as CCC, TVA and NRA. Roosevelt himself was widely known by his initials - FDR.

The Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) gave work and training to young men in forestry, roadbuilding and flood control. A CCC camp in Carrizozo was located in the area of the present Rell residence by the overpass. Young men from all over the nation were stationed there. They dated the Carrizozo high school girls, which no doubt was resented by the local chaps of 1933.

The Parents and Teachers Association in Carrizozo was going strong in 1933. Officers that year were installed by Mrs. R.E. Lemon, Misses Beatrix and Rhea Boughner presented a xylophone duet. The trio of Misses Thelma Shaver, Margorie and Dorothy Nickels sang. In March of 1933 the PTA gave a charity ball at the Community Hall (now a grocery store). Music was furnished by the Harold Davies' 12 piece staff orchestra. Radio fans heard this band broadcast frequently from El Paso.

One address at the PTA meeting was: "What Kind of a Parent Are You?" There were no television sets then. Adults and young people listened to windup phonograph music and radio tear-jerkers (soap operas). On March 12, 1933 FDR gave the first of his famous "fireside chats" speaking to the nation by radio. He was the first president to use radio effectively to win public support. Later he also became the first president to appear on television.

The 'forward' on the 34-page 1932-33 year book says: "We are publishing the first annual of the Carrizozo High School. You may peruse this book from mere curiosity but for us each page contains a treasured memory of the beautiful past in our beloved Carrizozo High School."

Of the businesses advertised in the handmade yearbook, two remain to this day - Carrizozo Hardware Co. and Prehm's. Some of the others are only a memory: Ziegler Brothers, Outlook Art and Gift Shop; Doering's Shoe and Variety Store; The First National Bank; Carrizozo Home Laundry; New Mexico Light and Power Company, Burnett's Cash Grocery and Market; Carrizozo Bakery; Skinner's Grocery and Meat Market and T.E. Kellys Hardware and Sport Shop.

This first 'Grizzlie' yearbook with glued on photos brings fond memories of school board, staff, post graduates, seniors, juniors, sophomores, and freshmen as photographed 48 years ago by senior classman "Johnnie" Jackson. Many of those featured in this yearbook '33 who still live in Carrizozo are Jane Kimbrell (Ortiz) and Ernest Prehm. The others reside in different parts of Lincoln County or all over the U.S. Many have passed away.

The picture accompanying this story are from the yearbook of Mary Ellen McMillan (Brady) who died in 1970 at San Diego, California. In 1933, Mary Ellen was the senior heart crusher with her raven locks and Cleopatra appearance. She was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. H.W. McMillan.

McMillan, an electrical engineer was employed at the New Mexico Light and Power Company that also supplied electrical merchandise and White Oaks coal. This plant is now the location of the town maintenance yard by the overpass.

In earlier times, when the McMillan's lived in White Oaks, he worked in the power plant above White Oaks that once supplied power to White Oaks and Carrizozo. The McMillans had 6 children - five daughters and one son. Ruth Burnett, Bonnie Fortenberry and Euda Roberts; all three live in Carrizozo. Corinne Brady lives in Ruidoso. Their brother, Henry Walter, Jr. died in 1953 in Carrizozo.

The 6 x 9 manually typed 1932-33 yearbook is tied with purple velvet auditorium curtains trimmed in gold. All that remains for posterity is the high school bell encased and displayed by Clegg Hall part of today's high school facilities.



Quilting Bits by polly

There are many wall plaques throughout the home of Mary Elizabeth Seay. Some are humorous, some serious. Among the plaques is "An Old Irish Blessing", one of Mary's favorites, given to her by a niece:

"May the road rise to meet you,
May the wind be always at your back,
May the sun shine warm upon your face,
The rains fall soft upon your fields,
and until we meet again... may God hold you in the palm of His hand."

With an attitude like that and her love of her fellowman it is no small wonder that Mary Elizabeth was recognized at a May 15 Senior Citizens dinner at the Rec Center. The most recently acquired wooden plaque reads: "Senior Citizen of the Year - Mary Seay - 1980"

She enjoys participating in the Center's activities. "Any kind of activity that I can help with, I donate my time." She especially enjoys quilting for the Center. Mary keeps the Center's monthly schedule handy. She likes the "special days", like covered dish day, movies, picnics, demonstrations. "If I'm not going to be busy at the Center, I don't go. I

don't want to hold my hands. I have things to do at home."

At age 88, Mary does her own washing, ironing and housekeeping. She keeps a tidy yard, tends a garden and cans fruits and vegetables. "I make my own pickles," she adds. Quilting is one of many favorite hobbies that she enjoys. She makes quilts as gifts for her relatives. She will also do quilting for others. Mary likes to do other types of needle work and reads for pleasure.

Every room in her home shows the evidence of the art of quilting. There are neat stacks and boxes of quilt blocks everywhere. Among the blocks: Fan, Butterfly, Dutch Doll, Improved Nine Patch.

In her living room is a quilt set in frames. Says Mary, "It's for no one special, I'm putting it together for myself. I may keep it. I may sell it." She learned to quilt from her mother. Mary was quilting before she became a teen-ager. "I was seven or eight years old when I first began to make stitches."

The betting in this latest quilt is polyester and wasn't quite long enough. She didn't want to cut into a new batt so she "carded" her own cotton to add the needed length. Mary explained "carding" and demonstrated the "old timey" process with two wooden No. 3 Cards. "It tears up the cotton, makes it soft and fluffy."

"I learned when I was a kid to make cotton batts. Many improvements have been made since our mothers and grandmothers made quilts. They used cotton from the fields for batting." She said her mother told her stories about how her ancestors even made the thread at home for quilting, "but that was before I came along," she smiled.

Mary Elizabeth "Lizzie" Fortenberry Seay was born in a "dug out" in Floyd County Texas on August 5, 1983. She was the fourth child of parents which she referred to as "nesters", Mr. and Mrs. J.C. Fortenberry, who migrated from the east.

"Lizzie" described the dug out as a hole in the ground. When I asked if they lived like that because of dust storms, she replied that they lived in this manner because there was no means to obtain lumber and other house building supplies. "Most everybody lived like this in that period of time. There were only 2 or 3 families with regular houses."

The Fortenberry's had 11 children, including one set of twins.

Pa Fortenberry prospered in the plains of Texas. He acquired lots of land, a regular house. He was a stock farmer, raising food for family and stock. When the Fortenberry off spring married they were by their father 160 acres of land each.

"Lizzie" (Mary) was born, raised and married in Floyd County Texas. She and her husband John Daniel Seay raised their children there. They are Nora Belle, Albert Cephus, and Alfred, Aaron.

The Seay family later settled in Duran, N.M. for ranching purposes. Duran was a rail road town and at one time a thriving location, but that was before the Seays arrived. Mary was Duran's post mistress for 18 years. The Seays legally adopted their great-granddaughter, Gayle Ann Cartisano, age 9 in 1962. John died in 1968 at the age of 76 in Carrizozo and is buried in the family plot in Floyd County Texas. Prior to his death, he and wife Mary lived in Tucumanearri.

When Mary recalls the past she says, "I was a Jack-of-all-trades. A housewife, a postmistress or if they needed an extra cowboy, I would help with the branding."

"I could do anything a man could do or a woman. I worked in the field with pa and the boys, helped mother in the kitchen."

As I interviewed Mary she quilted, she showed me finished quilts and quilt blocks. I noticed that the tip of the thumb of her left hand was missing. When I inquired about it, she laughed, "That's another story!"

She went on to tell me that the accident happened in Duran while she was assisting John repair their stock wind mill. She remembers that the closest doctor was 15 miles away at Vaughn.

"Lizzie" will be 87 years old in August. The nail-less thumb has been no handicap to her in quilting, gardening or in any of the many interesting things that "Lizzie" does.

Primary Election Proclamation

WHEREAS, under and by virtue of Section 1-11-1 of the New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1978 Compilation, it is the duty of the County Clerk to proclaim and give notice of elections;

AND WHEREAS, under and by virtue of Chapter 3 of the New Mexico Laws of 1938 (Special Session) known as "Primary Election Code", provision is made for the holding of direct primary elections throughout the State of New Mexico and in each County, and precinct thereof;

AND WHEREAS, the Governor of the State of New Mexico has heretofore issued Public Proclamations calling a Primary Election to be held in the State of New Mexico on the 3rd day of June, A. D., 1980.
