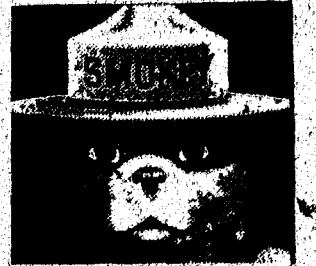

21st Annual

Smokey Bear Stampede Begins

The 21st annual Smokey Bear Stampede happens this weekend in Capitan. The two day event starts Friday, July 4th at 10:00 a.m. with a parade through Capitan. As of Tuesday, the parade has 47 entries.

The annual Smokey Bear Stampede is a joint project of the Village of Capitan, the Capitan Chamber of Commerce, and the Lincoln County Fair Board.

This year, in commemoration of the 30th anniversary of Smokey's rescue from the Capitan Mountains Fire of 1950, the parade theme is "Memories of Smokey". The theme was submitted by the 4th grade class of the Capitan Schools.

The parade categories include, Best Dressed Cowboy and Cowgirl, Bicycle Entries, Float Entries, Most Original Entry, Mounted Groups, Antique Automobiles, Organized Groups, Best Theme Entry and Best Miscellaneous Entry.

This year's parade entry winners will be given originally designed trophies which will also commemorate Smokey the Bear, according to Capitan Chamber of Commerce President Norman Renfrow. Instead of the traditional trophies, the winners will be presented with bronze-colored replicas of Smokey attached to a wooden base. The presentation will be

before the 8:00 p.m. performance of the rodeo, Friday.

Ban on Fire in Lincoln National Forest

The extremely high risk of fire throughout the Lincoln National Forest, because of prolonged dry weather and high temperatures,

makes it more important than ever that pre-4th of July celebrations, including fireworks, be held somewhere else.

George C. Green, Assistant Fire Management Officer for the Forest, said that campfire and smoking restrictions are still in effect. Visitors are reminded that shooting fireworks on any Federal land is prohibited.

The official order, prohibiting the use of fireworks says: Possessing,

discharging, or using any kind of firework or other pyrotechnic device, within National Forests located in Arizona and New Mexico, is prohibited.

"Apparently some people don't know that it is illegal to shoot fireworks on the Forest."

Green said violation of the regulation is punishable by a \$600 fine or six months imprisonment, or both. He urged everyone to please help prevent the worst kind of regulation to their friends.

The danger of fire in the Forest is currently rated as "extreme," and campfire and smoking restrictions are still in effect.

This week on the Smokey Bear Ranger District, at Ruidoso, all campgrounds are open with the exception of Oak Grove, which will re-open when road construction is completed.

South Fork Campground received heavy use all week. The other campgrounds are receiving heavy use on weekends. Bozko Lake is full and fishing pressure is heavy. Motorists are reminded to watch for construction equipment on State Highway 37, which is being paved near Forest Road 187. State Highway 532, to the Sierra Blanca Ski Area, continues to be closed Monday through Friday for repairs, & is open on weekends only. Trails are in good condition and fuelwood areas are open.

The folks who visit and enjoy using National Forests are generally pretty fine people. Here's a good example.

M-Y T-I-M-E by Michael Swickard

I usually get along fine with teenagers. Used to be me myself. But I have to say something about the habits of some teenagers that must change.

The other night in Carrizozo, I counted 21 different groups of people riding around town, "cruising". Most were teen-agers.

I was in Captain recently and noticed the same thing. Also in Ruidoso and Alamogordo.

Everywhere I looked, teens were using their autos and their parent's autos as sort of a front porch. They were watching life go by while driving around. No place to go, nothing to do, or so they say.

There are several reasons why this is not very acceptable in my opinion.

First, the kids are using a natural resource, gasoline, to entertain themselves, when we don't have enough to meet the needs that this country has.

Another point is that cars are dangerous, especially with teens driving around with nothing to do. More hot-rodding happens this way. Not all teens do this, just most.

And the auto is the number one killer of teen-agers by far.

I realize that it is easier to ignore these problems of safety by saying, "It won't happen". But it will, and it does.

And third, the kids are not under supervision and therefore more likely to become involved in situations that the parents would not approve of if they knew. Some of these situations are just part of growing up, but others are definitely the school of hard knocks.

And lastly, letting the kids drive around at will, as an entertainment, teaches the kid a false view of this world. Nationally, we have quit driving as much as we used to, but the kids are still driving around as much, as if our national problems don't really exist.

In talking to some of the kids, they tell me that 50 to 100 miles a night is about right.

When we hear all of the talk about families breaking up, and the entire system of family's breaking up, the habit of letting teens drive around at will seems to add to the problem.

I am not saying that kids have to stay home all of the time, but there should be limits.

One thing that might help the situation is if the driving age was raised to 18. People can always find reasons for kids to drive, but most of the driving that I see is unnecessary.

If the driving age was 18, the savings in lives, and resources would be spectacular. It is something to think about. MS

They can go to Sweden (oops, I forgot, Sweden has a draft) or they can go to Canada (oops again, another country with a draft). Well surely they could find someplace where they would be FREE to live in peace.

Sorry, America seems to be the best place to live if you want freedom. But it will cost you something. You 18 and 19 year olds will have to be prepared to fight for your country if you want freedom.

These young people know how to fight for their rights. It is time that they fight for their country. MS

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Stevens Delivers Reunion Banquet Address

At Friday's alumni banquet, former Carrizozo student, Charles Allison Stevens of Raton, NM recounted many stories of 1917 and 1918 - "the good ol' day at Carrizozo High School." Stevens, guest speaker at the event, said he was "recycling" some of his memories.

Chisaca State banker and Zozo alumnus, Johnson Stearns, who was the master of ceremonies treated the banquet audience with his special jokes, including those about life in a small town, "where everybody knows whose checks are good, and whose husbands are!" Stearns introduced Stevens, who is also in the banking business. "Old bankers never die, they just lose interest," Stearns said of bankers.

Stevens recalled humorous incidents involving former Carrizozo school staff and fellow students. A close shave with a Zozo school principal cured Stevens of his "hyper-activities." He reminisced about a local business place, the Carrizozo Eating House. In another story, Stevens amused the banquet with his recollection of the time he had to relay a message to his father. The nearest crank telephone was found at a "place" near the overpass. A "lady" he described as "Half percent concealed and half percent revealed" in clothing invited young Stevens into the establishment's parlor.

His father, C.A. Stevens was the last sheriff when Lincoln, NM was the county seat. The Stevens family lived in Ruidoso, Tezka Park (near White Oaks), White Oaks, Bonito Creek area, Angus, Lincoln and Carrizozo. His father worked in the Old Abe mine in White Oaks at one time. Following Sheriff Stevens term in office (1909-1913) he operated a delivery table, once located at today's White Auto Store in Carrizozo.

Banker Stevens, born on April 12, 1896 in Ruidoso was schooled "all over the county."

Stevens' only living sister and brother were unable to attend the Carrizozo alumni weekend festivities. Iona D. Hoopengartner, who lives in Phoenix, Arizona, graduated from Carrizozo High. She was later a Carrizozo school teacher. Their brother, Dero T. Stevens ranches in Vernon, Arizona.

"Not quite old enough," Stevens and a Carrizozo friend, George B. Barber, tossed a coin to see if they should join the Marines or the aviation section of the Signal Corps, which Stevens preferred. Stevens won. They enlisted during WW II. Stevens became an instructor in serial machine gunnery.

In the banking business since 1924, Stevens is semi-retired. He is board chairman of Raton's First National Bank. He is director and member of several committees in First New Mexico Bank Shares, Inc. A Corporation headquartered in Albuquerque, it has assets of over a billion and a quarter dollars. Stevens and his wife, "A Texas gal" live in Raton.

The Friday banquet kicked off the 3-day Carrizozo alumni weekend. Roy Dow, Carrizozo Alumni Association president, introduced association officers, Margo Duncan Lindsay, vice-president, Rachael Hughes West, secretary, and Roy Harmon, treasurer. Betty Moore Fields helped to coordinate the annual event.

Also introduced at the banquet held at the school cafeteria was Dr. James F. Miller, Jr., Carrizozo school superintendent. He had on hand a Carrizozo 1928-29 Daily Register, a first grade reader and an antique

milk bottle which were found in the high school. Miller encouraged the former students to tour the school plant next day.

Saturday was scheduled for registration and refreshments at the cafeteria. A late afternoon reception for members of the classes of 1965 and

1966 was held at the REA building. The Class of '66 celebrated their 25th anniversary. A dance for all former Zozo students and staff was held Saturday evening at the Country Club and a Sunday picnic a Nogal Canyon concluded the alumni event.

Spring is here, and so am I. But at my age, I wonder why.

If nature can be born anew, Why can't I be recycled too?

The preceding poem was recited by Stevens at the banquet. Another annual alumni get-together has come and gone, when former Carrizozo students young and old recycled their memories.

Game and Fish Patrol Areas

Anglers can expect to see uniformed Department of Game and Fish conservation officers heavily patrolling fishing waters statewide during the three-day Fourth of July weekend.

But they may not see the plain-clothes department officers who will also be out in the field as a part of the increased law enforcement activity over the popular fishing weekend. While many people will be making other recreational uses of the state's waters, Game and Fish officers expect anglers will be out in greater numbers than usual for these three days.

Survey to check fishing violations, part of a summer-long study being conducted on the state's four warm-water reservoirs, will be most heavily concentrated on Elephant Butte, Caballo and adjacent

Elbe Grande waters, according to Dan Pursley, coordinator of the study for the Department of Game and Fish. The angler survey started in late May and to date has shown a decrease of about seven percent in violations for Elephant Butte from last year's warm-water study on that reservoir, Pursley said. The majority of violations indicated by the survey are anglers fishing without licenses or license violations.

Violators of the state's fishing regulations could be fined from \$50 to \$500 Pursley said.

Department officials expect that many anglers will be fishing in waters closer to home because of the high costs of gasoline. Enforcement patrols have been adjusted to accommodate the expected change in fishing pressure in popular waters close to major centers of population.

KEEP WHEELS STRAIGHT WHEN STOPPED

A vehicle stopped in traffic, especially when preparing to make a turn, has a special vulnerability. Last year, according to the National Safety Council, nearly 8,000 Americans lost their lives in rear-end collisions. Some of these deaths may have been avoided by using a simple driving technique.

When waiting for oncoming traffic to clear or for a traffic light to change, always keep your front wheels pointed straight ahead until you actually begin to move into the turn. The direction of your wheels controls the direction of your vehicle's forward motion. In the case of a left turn, for example, a rear-end collision could push your car into the oncoming traffic lanes if the wheels are already turned left in preparation for the turn. For right turns, a similar collision could push your car into pedestrians who might be using an adjacent crosswalk, so watch your wheels and keep them pointed straight ahead until you begin your move into the turn.

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And the rocket's red glare, the bombs ablazing in air, Gave proof through the night that our flag was still there.
Francis Scott Key

Once a year Americans celebrate the fact that our flag was, and still is here with rockets and "bombs" bursting in the air. In most American communities, hand-held sparklers will draw bright silver circles in the night while bit colorful bursts of red, blue, and white stars explode overhead on July 4. If Francis Scott Key were here today, he would be delighted to know that the noise is happy celebration and, if properly used, the fireworks won't harm a soul.

Although fireworks are such an integral part of American celebration, they were created in the East, probably China, over 2,000 years ago. They were picked up by the Crusaders and brought to Europe where they were eventually included in Western Civilization. The Italians were the first Europeans to make fireworks and became respected masters in making the noisy spectacles. From England to Spain fireworks went off to enhance religious events and flatter kings and queens in their royal gardens.

When European emigrants came to the New World to establish the first American colonies, they brought with them their love for a good fireworks display. After the colonies decided to break away from England, John Adams envisioned the first celebration and included in his fantasy fireworks as a matter of course. In fact, fireworks became associated with Independence Day celebrations long before the Declaration of Independence was actually signed. Now more fireworks are blasted for July 4 than for any other national holiday in the world. It's no secret that fireworks can be very dangerous when misused, said George Plimpton, chairman of the National Council on Fireworks Safety. When used with common sense and caution, however, they are as harmless as they are spectacular.

The National Council on Fireworks Safety and the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission encourage you to:
read directions
have an adult present
buy from reliable fireworks stands
ignite outdoors
have water handy
never experiment
light one at a time
never re-ignite malfunctioning fireworks
keep at a safe distance
keep fireworks from small children
store fireworks in a cool, dry place
dispose of them properly

To enjoy fireworks like an expert, note the quality of colors; count the number of blasts from one firework; pay attention to the ground display of pinwheels, fountains, and Roman candles; and note the time lapse between each event. Finally, the best view can be had from at least 500 feet from the site, which also happens to be the safest distance. Designated watching areas are chosen with these two facts in mind, so it is doubly wise to stay within them.

Photographing Fireworks

If your July 4 photos are of picnics and frisbee games, you are missing out on the main attraction, the fireworks. Keep your camera handy when the sun goes down and you'll be able to add spectacular night photography to your July 4 memories. You'll be surprised as what you can get by taking a shot in the dark.

Photography after dark is a come-as-you-are affair although a few accessories would help. You need the ability to keep the camera steady, to determine the amount of light hitting the film and to control the shutter speed. Any camera with a (bulb) setting will keep the shutter open as long as you want. If the lens has a aperture ring, you will be able to control how much light is let in while the shutter is open. Since the shutter is open for a long time when shooting fireworks, it's good to mount the camera on a tripod or a sturdy flat rock. You can increase your chances of eliminating camera movement and blur by using a cable release which gently opens and closes your shutter.

Forget the flash. Its light isn't powerful enough to light up the sky; if it were, the effects would be washed out anyway.

To capture the brilliance of fireworks against a black sky, it is wise to use a good color film. Determine what the ASA rating is on the film.

It's always a good idea to "bracket" your shots. By varying your F-stops you can be sure to get the right exposure. Even "wrong" exposures can be pleasing. An overexposed shot will make fireworks look thick and light in color. Underexposed pictures produce fine lines and intense colors.

Once you've set the aperture, set the focus scale and intense colors. Once you've set the aperture, set the focusing scale to infinity and get ready for the first burst. Open the shutter when the rocket trail appears in the sky and close it after the burst disappears.

To give a photography depth, and added interest, try to include a lighted object in the composition, maybe a building or reflecting pool.
