I was talking with some people recently about food cooperatives. This is where a group of people all plich in to buy food, and act as their own store. The cost of the food is less, and some say that the service is better because the members benefit by also being the owners.

It was surprising, though, when one person seld, "It sure is a nice idea, the food cooperatives, it is a shame that we can't use that same idea in other areas."

I told them that one of the best cooperative ideas has been around for over forty years. It is the Rural Electric Cooperative.

For this area, it is known as the Otern County Electric Cooperative.
Founded Forty years ago, the system that we in this area get our electricity from is owned by the very people that use electricity. It is not an impersonal utility, it is an electric power system that the subscribers of the service own.

Many of our remote ranches and towns would still not have electric power if is was not for this

And the big thing is that we can say, "We did it ourselves."

The Otero County Electric Cooperative is having it's annual meeting August 2nd, starting at 9:00 a.m. at the Cloudcroft School Gym in Cloudcroft. We are all owners of the system and it is our yearly time to talk business about the cooperative, socialize, and have a good Bar-B-Que. It is a great time for the family. I spent most of my summers while growing up visiting my grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. E.V. McKim Sr., here in Lincoln County, and every year we went to the annual meeting. I have been to many of the yearly meetings, then and recently, and have had a very good time each year. I certainly will be at this one, and I urge everyone to attend. MS



Let's Apply Free Enterprise to the Truckers

Congressional committees have started hearings on legislation which could save American consumers \$5 billion a year by removing some of the complex web of regulations governing interestate trucking. With inflation raging, cost-saving measures should sall through Congress, But not with the powerful trucking industry and the Teamsters Union fighting to keep their advantages in

The Motor Carrier Act of 1985 protected the The Motor Carrier Act of 1935 protected the fragmented trucking industry during the Depression. Since then the trucking industry has prospered but the 1935 law is still on the hooks and hasn't been seriously studied since its adoption. As a result of that law the Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) today tells trucking companies exactly what routes they may travel, what cities they may serve, what goods they may carry, and what rates they may charge.

may charge.

The minutiae of ICC regulations have produced their own set of absurdities:

-authority for a trucker to carry empty ginger ale bottles, but not full bottles, or empty coke or root beer bottles.

-authority for some truckers to carry instant chicken noodle soup, but not onion or bean

The ICC's route restrictions are so arbitrary that companies often cannot take direct routes between cities but must go round about, adding mileage costs and wasting fuel, and driving ding mileage costs and wasting fuel, and driving up prices for consumers. One White House aide said, "It's like telling an airline, 'you can go from here (Washington, D.C.) to Boston but you can only take females who are between 60 and 65; you have to go by way of Cleveland, but you can only touch down your wheels there; you can't let anybody off or take anybody on."

Trucking regulation has outlived its usefulness. Prices are inflated because competition is blocked. Trucking companies are free to engage in legalized price fixing. Fuel is needlessly wasted and discriminatory pricing practices abound.

David Cohen is President of Common Cause a nonpartisan citizens' lobby.

The costs to consumers of this needless regulation are real. Regulatory practices reportedly waste 500 million gallons of fuel a year, Empty truck mileage alone may cost consumers an additional one cent per package of food and 37 cents for each pair of shoes.

Don't be fooled if these figures sound penny

ante. The overall cost of antiquated regulatory practices is high - an estimated \$5 billion a

year.
So why haven't we abandoned the 1980's herause over the trucking regulation? It's because over the years one of the strongest special interest groups has blossomed under the protective hand of regulation. Drivers and trucking companies, represented by the powerful Teamsters Union and the American Trucking Association, which together contributed \$759,899 in 1976 and 1978 to congressional candidates, pressure Congress to keep their candidates, pressure Congress to keep their benefits coming.

However, momentum is building in Congress to apply free enterprise to the trucking in-dustry. Consumers, farmers, and business people are fighting for deregulating the trucking industry and forcing it to compete. Last summer the Carter administration and Senator Edward Kennedy (D-Mass.) joined forces and introduced far-reaching trucking deregulation legislation. Key committee chairmen have committed themselves to send a bill to the President by June 1. The question is whether Congress will pass a bill that deregulates the trucking industry or will just enact a sham bill enact a sham bill.

It will be a bruising fight. However, Congress has the opportunity to reduce inflation, save energy, cut government red tape and in the process save American consumers some money - all in one piece of legislation. It's an opportunity our lawmakers should embrace.




