Casa Manana Opened

The magical day for the nationally recognized senior citizen complex had arrived - Saturday, July 19. Carrizozo mayor, Manuel Hernandez armed with a pair of red handled scissors, told those gathered around him how much the project added to the community and cut the ribbon. "Casa Manana" was open to inspection by the public. Two of the eight apartment including one for the handicapped were seen.

Prior to the ribbon cutting, celebrants gathered at the Woman's Club building across from the New elderly housing project. Mary Thorpe, President of the Woman's Club opened the ceremonies by stating that, "this is the only senior citizens complex in the nation owned and operated by a Woman's Club."

Rev David Lynch, of the United Methodist Church gave a beautiful invocation and Ruth Armstrong, a Director on the Executive Board of the Woman's Club gave a brief history of Casa Manana.

Carrizozo, Sister Jan Geha, Director of the Zia Senior Citizen's Center and new manager of Casa Manana, thanked the Woman's Club for helping the senior citizens of Lincoln County.

Several New Mexico Women's Clubs were presented: Hobbs Silver City, Mesilla, Las Cruces and Albuquerque. Genevieve Tozer, President of District IV of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, spoke on the honor the Carrizozo Woman's Club has brought to all Women's Clubs throughout the nation.

Virgil Beagle, who owns the contracting firm that built Casa Manana said he was pleased to have built the project and stated that many people had helped and the local attorney, Bill Payne, was the lowest paid at about 7 seven cents an hour for the work he had done.

Viola Fayler spoke as 1st Vice President of the Women's Club manager of the local New Mexico Employment Office and for Eric Berna, director of New Mexico Employment Security Dept. It was through Mrs. Fenter's office that workmen were recruited for the building project.

Lou Andes, Farmers Home Administration, told how she had worked with and for the Woman's Club to get proper financing and how she had laughed and cried with them and would for the next 50 years until the loan is paid.

Joe Ortega, Executive Director of Region VI Housing Authority was the man responsible for getting the project off the ground. He spoke sincerely of his work with the women and how he admired them.

Representing Senator Pete Domenici was the Southeastern New Mexico Regional Office Director, Mr. Pos Cohn. He read a letter from the Senator congratulating the women for their efforts & for winning national recognition.

Over refreshments in the club's dining room, members, guests and dignitaries discussed their pleasure with the design, convenience and colors of Casa Manana. Casa Manana, a name chosen by the local senior citizens, is "House of Tomorrow" in Spanish. A beautiful name and that well fits the complex and the needs of the community.

The Carrizozo Woman's Club dream has come true.

Carrizozo Town Council--

Moreland Resigns

Carrizozo town attorney Bill Payne told the council at Monday's town meeting that he would like to know what to do concerning ordinances he was requested to work on. Payne said two council members can pass a resolution but not an ordinance. Among the ordinances Payne has on 'hold' are the model criminal code and the proposed ordinance for the airport.

Town meetings have been conducted without a quorum since the June meeting when three trustees walked off before the meeting was adjourned. The incident occurred following a closed session regarding police matters.

Just before Monday's meeting Dr. Michael Moreland walked into the town hall, flipped a letter of resignation before Mayor Hernandez, Chamber of Commerce president and banker at Citizens State Bank, Scott for?" and left the premises.

Moreland's letter stated, "I have been unable to adequately function within the position I was appointed as trustee of the city of Carrizozo. Therefore, I hereby resign from this position effective this day."

A council of two, Harmon and Zamora accepted Moreland's letter of resignation on July 21.

It is not clear to the council what Joe Orsak intends to do. He has not turned in his anticipated resignation. Orsak, Moreland and Harmon walked off during the heated June meeting. Harmon has participated in several special meetings since.

School board member Richard Vega has indicated an interest in filling a trustee position. Hernandez has not appointed anyone as of town hall, flipped a letter of resignation before Mayor Hernandez, Chamber of Commerce president and banker at Citizens State Bank, Scott for?" and left the premises.

Shafer declined.

Monday's agenda included the adoption of the town's budget. No salary increases were given, no money was budgeted for new projects or new equipment. The town barely managed to budget to operate normal town business. Part of the reason for "tightening the belt" on the town budget is that this is the last year that the town will receive revenue sharing unless the government changes their mind. They had been sending quarterly checks. The last two are scheduled for July and October.

The council approved the suggestion to present a plaque to Mrs. A.N. Spencer for the monetary donations she has bestowed on the town which will soon cease. The plaque is to include Dr. A.N. Spencer.

I was talking with some people recently about food cooperatives. This is where a group of people all pitch in to buy food, and act as their own store. The cost of the food is less, and some say that the service is better because the members benefit by also being the owners.

It was surprising, though, when one person said, "It sure is a nice idea, the food cooperatives, it is a shame that we can't use that same idea in other areas."

I told them that one of the best cooperative ideas has been around for over forty years. It is the Rural Electric Cooperative.

For this area, it is known as the Otero County Electric Cooperative. Founded forty years ago, the system that we in this area get our electricity from is owned by the very people that use electricity. It is not an impersonal utility, it is an electric power system that the subscribers of the service own.

Many of our remote ranches and towns would still not have electric power if it was not for this cooperative.

And the big thing is that we can say, "We did it ourselves."

The Otero County Electric Cooperative is having its annual meeting August 2nd, starting at 9:00 a.m. at the Cloudercroft School Gym in Cloudercroft. We are all owners of the system and it is our yearly time to talk business about the cooperative, socialize, and have a good Bar-B-Que. It is a great time for the family. I spent most of my summers while growing up visiting my grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. E.V. McKim Sr., here in Lincoln County, and every year we went to the annual meeting. I have been to many of the yearly meetings, then and recently, and have had a very good time each year. I certainly will be at this one, and I urge everyone to attend. MS

Speaking of things to do, Saturday, July 28th, Lincoln County residents who happen to be in Alamogordo can come by the Alamogordo City Gym (2 blocks east of the Courthouse) and see a top notch Karate Tournament. Karate men and women from all over New Mexico will be competing.

CARRIZOZO SCHOOL BOARD

Superintendent Miller gave the board a report on the mandated expansion of the district's Special Education program which will include the services of a speech therapist for three days per week. Plans also include to work with New Horizons Developmental Center and the Ruidoso Schools on sharing a physical therapist.

In addition, the school is looking for the part time services of an occupational therapist and psychological counselor. The school will purchase services from the New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped in Alamogordo and from the New Mexico School for the Deaf in Santa Fe to help the district's low vision and hearing impaired students.

The Board of Education reviewed and approved a new District Bus Transportation policy, covering to and from student transportation as well as activity trip travel. The new policy reflects current state and national concerns for energy conservation, physical fitness, and limitations on government services.

The Board directed the Superintendent to begin several steps in order to implement the policy: (1) to plan a number of central pick up points throughout the District at which students will collect in order to meet the school bus; (2) to reorganize existing routes around these pick up points; (3) to extend the current routes east of the railroad tracks to the area south of town along US 64; (4) to leave the airport road and Bingham routes as they currently exist; and, (5) to begin investigating the possibility of opening up a road between the airport road and NM 380 for the purpose of extending the Bingham bus route. Copies of the new policy are available at the District office, and all route changes will be made available to parents prior to the beginning of the Fall term, August 28.

Miller gave a maintenance program progress report. The Vo-ag shop and classrooms, the new gym locker rooms and coaches office have been ready for the 1980-81 school year. Office space has been made available in the high school building for a speech therapist for this fall.

The board continues to discuss the remodeling of the entire high school building. Miller is looking for sources of money for the project. Miller was given approval to submit an energy application for matching federal funds for help in the renovation of the high school. Title III of the National Energy Conservation Policy Act Provides grant funds for schools and hospitals to evaluate energy consumption and to study and implement projects to save energy.

Board members were notified of bid opening dates. August 6, bids on custodian and school supplies will be opened. August 8 is for bids on a tractor for the vo-ag and maintenance departments, both dates at 10:00 a.m.

The board approved the following bids: Workmens comp. coverage \$5,000.00, Vehicle Fleet insurance \$2,582.00 - J.G. Moore Insurance Agency; Cafeteria floor tile \$1,160.00 AA Decorators of Alamogordo; Construction of business machine room \$2,382.80 - Gibson and Pieters, constructors.

Principal Stuart gave a talk on the Title I carryover proposal which the board approved. The money left over from the last fiscal year will be used primarily for Title I salary improvements, supplies and to establish a parent advisory council. Public recognition was given to area individuals by Miller for their assistance to the school. Among the school patrons recognized: Nat Palomares and Joe Vega for their aid on the vo-ag yard project and loan of equipment; Fern Sawyer for making available low cost materials for surfacing of track; Emilio Beltran for loan of the town's lawn mower throughout the summer; Sisking Spencer for the huge mound of dirt

that will be a part of the new playground attraction; Leon for re-painting school tables and State policeman Dale Housley for helping instructor J.C. Richmond in driver's training.

Town Council

Dale Good and Ruth Armstrong were appointed by the Carrizozo town council as co-delegates to the Lincoln County Sierra Blanca Airport Commission. Shafter was at the town meeting to request that the two be appointed. The total fee to have representation is \$200.00. Shafter said the Chamber contributed \$100.00. The Carrizozo Industrial Development \$200.00 and the Carrizozo Women's Club another \$200.00. Shafter added that, "Without the Women's Club we wouldn't get a lot of things done in town."

Mary Thorpe, Women's Club president wrote a letter to the mayor requesting their endorsement and support of the proposed regional airport that will accommodate the surrounding area and that is under the consideration of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission. The Women's Club recommended Good as voting delegate and Armstrong as voting co-delegate to represent Carrizozo in the SBAC.

The Council approved a request for the use of Spencer Park for the annual People's Market Place on August 10 held in conjunction with the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce and Santa Rita Catholic Church, whose festa is August 9, 10.

The town meeting included discussion of the "big leak" at the

swimming pool. The pool will remain closed for the rest of the summer for repairs, which is believed to be pipe work 10 feet under the base of the pool. Mayor Hernandez suggested that a jackhammer be rented so that town workers can break up 1 to 2 feet of cement to expose leaking pipes.

The 18 year old pool was leaking about 2 feet of water overnight, Hernandez told the council. Former Oscura resident and Carrizozo school student, David Helms who is a swimming pool contractor in Alamogordo will be contacted to check the leak situation.

Letters of appreciation will be sent to Philip Payne and Tammi Trout for volunteer life guarding.

Chief of Police C.A. Morales told the council about a new relief town policeman, Tyford Dean. Dean is a former resident and worked about 5 or 6 years ago under Sheriff Leandro Vega, Jr. as dispatcher. Following this he worked as a town police officer. The council approved his employment. Although Dean is not a certified policeman, he has Police Science School credentials according to Morales.

The council gave Morales permission to purchase three for a police vehicles.

The council moved to adopt three resolutions - (1) To provide matching funds for a BOR grant to install solar heat at the swimming pool with money transferred from revenue sharing to general. (2) To provide a budget for anti-recession money received and spent in full. (3) To accept the assistance of the services of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District for an annual fee of \$68.00.

In other business the council - Purchased 10 cubic yards of black top from the state to patch pot holes.

Learned that the municipal airport car wiring caught fire and had been towed to the city yard.

Approved suggestion to present the Carrizozo Women's Club with a plaque for the club's elderly housing project.

were read a long list of city hall, golf course and city yard items to be sold to the highest bidder following NEWS advertisement.

moved to pay Matotan engineers \$3,153.47, only Matotan had requested more money after Aspen street was added to the water project.

approved three occupation tax applications: "Mr. Ice", ice making business, O.W. Morgan, Captain; Malco Station, Claudio Montoya; and H & H & C Mobile Home Sale and repair, Phil Plets.

Will advertise for initiation of the Civil Defense Committee, which requires 50-75 people membership. Establishment of this group enables the town to be eligible for loan of government equipment and bomb shelter maintenance. According to Jean Hopwood, General Electric Manager of Consumer Affairs, one of the most important air conditioning maintenance jobs is the monthly cleaning of the air filter. Remove the filter and wash or vacuum thoroughly to get rid of dust or dirt. Check your Owner's Use and Care Manual for the best method. This one small job will help maintain free air movement, good filtration and the efficiency of the unit.

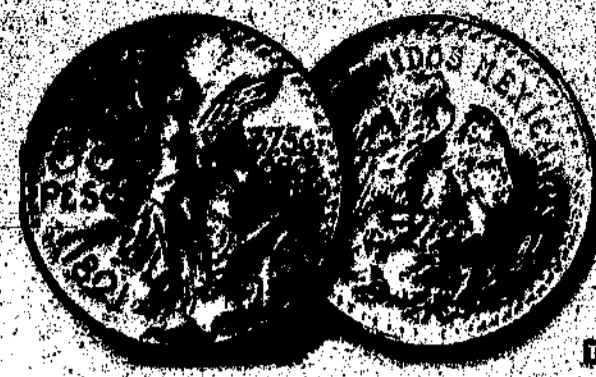
To save energy you might consider a special timer with an adaptor for a 3-prong outlet. Set the timer to coincide with family work schedules. The unit can be set to turn off after the last family member has left the house and set to turn on shortly before the first member is to return.

For another money saving tip, Jean suggests a room air conditioner to supplement your central air conditioning.

Turn your central unit off at night and use a bedroom unit to cool only a small portion of the home. When buying an air conditioner, measure the area you want to cool before you go to your dealer. Know the square footage of the area, the number of windows and doors and the type of exposure to the sun. Know the measurement of the window or opening in which the unit will be installed. Will the outlet be able to handle a 1 1/2" pipe? All are important in selecting the proper unit to meet your cooling needs.

High efficiency air conditioners are those that require at least 7.5 British Thermal Units (BTU) of heat for each watt of electricity used. Efficiency is expressed in an Energy Efficiency Ratio (EER). The higher the number the more efficient the air conditioner. An EER of 7.5 is considered "high efficiency" but EER's can go much higher. With the larger and more expensive components, high efficiency units can cost more than standard units. However, says Ms. Hopwood, the price difference can be minimized by buying a slightly smaller unit than normally recommended for a specific area. The unit will perform more satisfactorily too because comfort depends on temperature and humidity. A room air conditioner dehumidifies only while the compressor is operating. The compressor of a smaller unit operates almost continuously. A larger unit cycles on and off allowing humidity to build producing a clammy feeling. Beat the heat this summer with the cool comfort of room air conditioning.

While undergoing training, James will be earning college credits towards an Associates Degree thru the Community College of the Air Force.

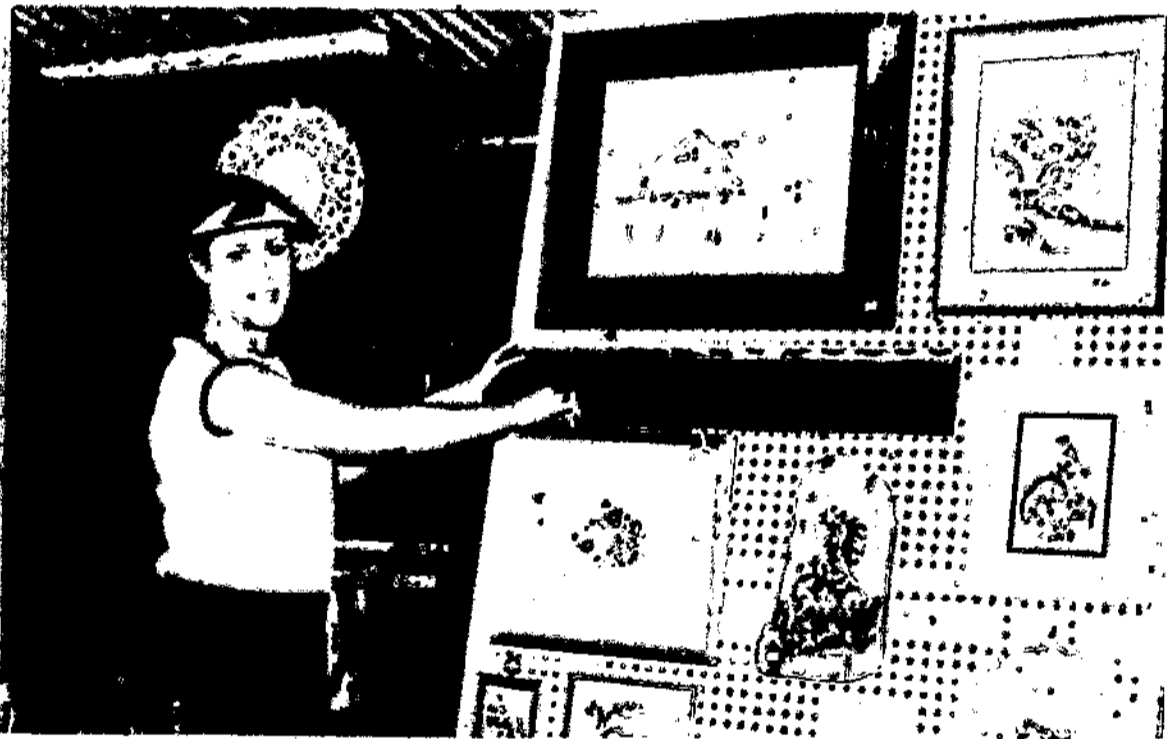

Patience Important For Great Pictures



Turn a small child loose with a set of building blocks and you've created a series of marvelous picture opportunities.

For most children the process of building is utterly absorbing, and your particular child will soon be completely unaware of the camera. As the structure grows, you will be able to capture an entire range of expressions, leading up to the horrifying moment when the one block too many threatens to topple the entire construction.

There are a few things you should remember, however, to get the best possible pictures. First, and foremost, shoot from the child's level. In this instance, it probably means getting right down on the floor.

Second, stay close enough to get the details of each expression without distracting the child. A Kodak

Tele-Ektralite camera is very useful in this type of situation since a flick of the switch to telephoto lens means you are shooting at half the actual camera to subject distance.

The Tele-Ektralite 600 camera has the added advantage of Sensalite flash that turns itself on and off automatically as needed.

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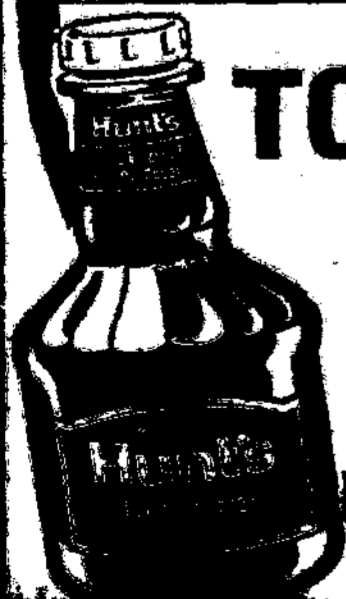
