V. Smith — D. Carter Win Pony Express

The 1980 version of the White Oaks to Lincoln Pony Express race was quite different from previous years. This year the winner rode into Lincoln thinking that he was coming in second.

41 miles and 2 hours, 17 minutes earlier the team of Virgil Smith and Dale Carter of Pichacho riding for the Diamond Ranch in Pichacho started the race along with two other teams.

The Hindi team from Duran were past winners of the race, and the team of Cindy Streid and Brenda Bowers of Ruidoso were making their first start.

The winning time of 2 hours, 17 minutes was slow compared to the record held by Ted Clement and David Cunningham of Pichacho, 2 hours, one minute and 45 seconds. Clement and Cunningham did not compete this year.

While the race was not one of the fastest, it was one of the races that people will talk about for some time to come. It showed that sportsmanship pays.

The race started at White Oaks evenly and the horses kept together part of the way. As the horses stretched into a lead, the team of Smith and Carter were last. At Capitan Gao the team of Cindy Streid

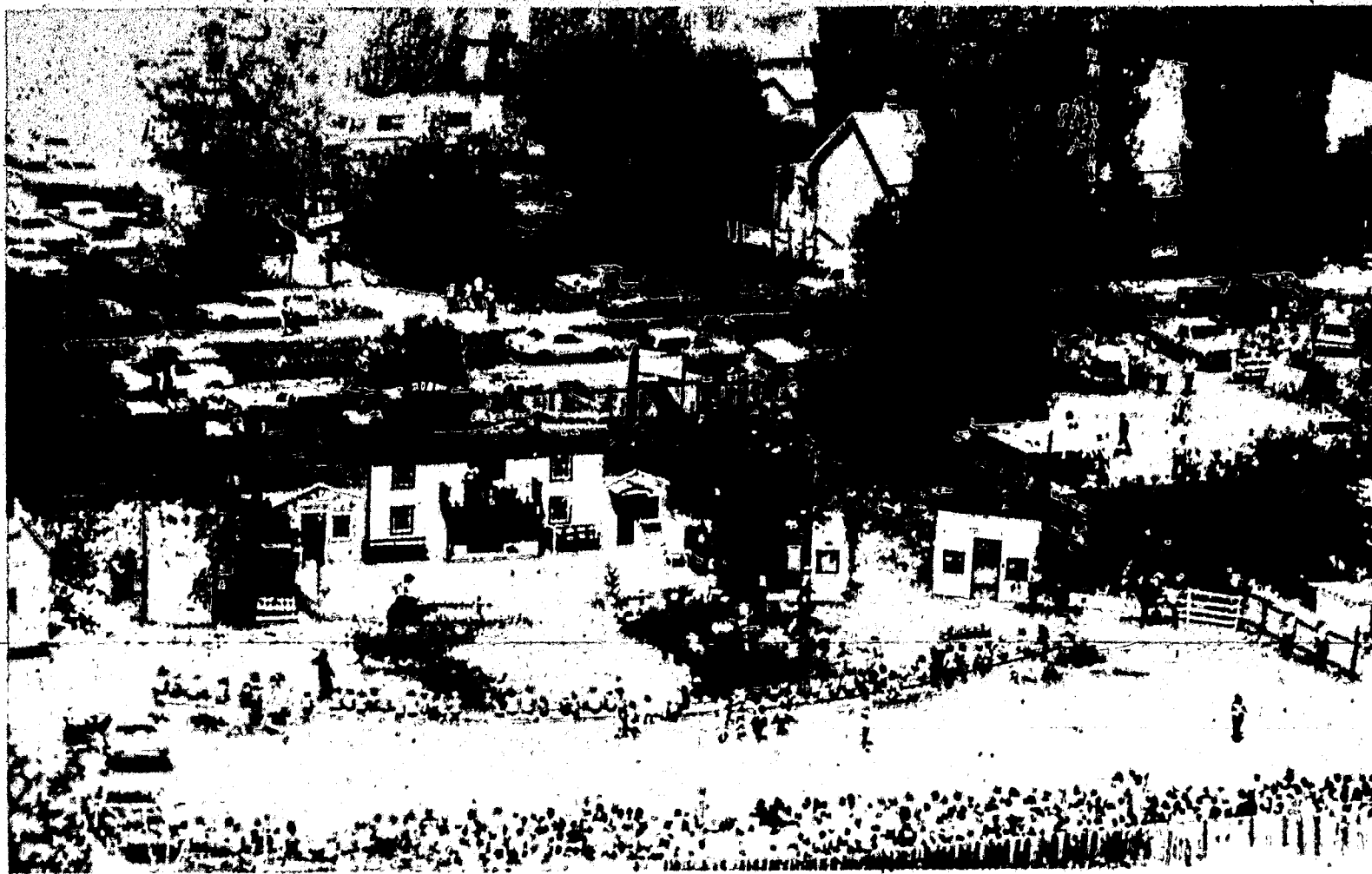
and Brenda Bowers were in the lead with Jamil Hindi and Anna Hindi second.

Smith discovered that Anna Hindi had veered off of the trail and her mount was caught in a cattle guard. While the name of the game is to race, and he could clearly see the Bower horse ahead, no thoughts of the prize of being first in the race surfaced.

Smith stopped and helped Hindi free her Arabian horse from the cattle guard. The two determined that the horse couldn't finish the race so Smith took off for the finish line at a lope rather than a run, with visions of second place firmly in his mind.

When Smith reached the finish line he was amazed to find that he had come in first, after five years of trying. It seems the Bower horse had fallen and she had trouble catching and remounting the horse. She had also suffered from some minor cuts and was somewhat covered with mud from the fall. She gamely continued the race anyway.

The winning team of Smith and Carter were awarded their first place trophy, a tooled boot each for their mantels, with another pair of made to order boots to be presented to each at a later date, along with their share of the prize money.

'Closure' Instituted

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management has instituted a legal "closure" of 19 caves in southeastern New Mexico in an effort to fight vandalism, unauthorized entry, littering, and destruction of cave formations and animal life. BLM officials stressed, however, that members of the public still can explore most of the caves if they obtain the proper permit.

Affected by the closure are Agogino, Big Manhole, Blue Tick, Doc Brito, Dry, Endless, Feather, Fort Station Hick's, Honest Injun, Jurigan No. 1 and No. 2, Little Sand, Lost, Manhole, McKittrick, and Torgac caves. These caves are in Eddy and Lincoln Counties.

BLM Roswell district manager James "Smokey" O'Connor said the caves have been gated with steel bars since 1975 and that access has been allowed only by permit. Signs have warned of the permit requirement.

T.E. Silva on FmHA

Tranquillino E. Silva, from Capitan has been named to a 3 year term on the Farmers Home Administration County Committee for Lincoln County, it was announced today by Drew Cloud, FmHA State Director. He succeeds Nancy R. Knight, Carrizozo, who term expired June 30th.

In making the appointment, Drew Cloud said, "Farmers Home Ad-

ministration County Committee is a vital link to local conditions. The Agency counts on their judgment, experience, knowledge of people and agriculture in their communities in selecting applicants who have a reasonable chance of success.

Mr. Silva is a life long resident of Lincoln County and ranches near Capitan at present. He also provides the school buses for the Capitan Independent Schools. Mr. Silva has been actively involved in numerous county functions and has served on the FmHA County Committee from 1976 to 1979. Mr. Silva and his wife Nora, reside on their ranch just West of Capitan.

FmHA, a credit agency of the Department of Agriculture, makes farm loans for real estate and production purposes as well as for nonfarm enterprises that supplement family income. A "Credit Arm of Last Resort", the Agency has, over the years, enabled many farm families to stay on the land and succeed in farming. A special "Limited Resource" program provides low interest loans to young farmers and others who have farming capabilities but need extra help in getting established.

FmHA provided over \$1,341,000.00 in loans and grants for farm, housing, community and business programs in Lincoln County during the past fiscal year. The County Office, at 1007 Mechem Drive, Ruidoso, is headed by Roy M. Finley, Jr., County Supervisor.

Artist at Lodge

Jan De Ruth, author of *Painting the Nude and Portrait Painting*, will conduct an art workshop, August 18-23 at Carrizo Lodge, Ruidoso, NM.

In the workshop, De Ruth will teach from life models and will include portrait painting, painting the nude and clothed figure, and still life. The Old Master techniques of Goya, Degas, Rubens, Rembrandt as well as the techniques and teaching of such contemporary masters as Ralph Soyer and Frederic Taubas will be used. Underpainting, glazing and scumbling will be taught, and students will be introduced to such new materials as oil pastels and alkyds.

Jan De Ruth has held 70 one man shows in the United States and Europe. His portraits of Ethel Kennedy, Martha Mitchell, Pat Nixon and others have appeared on the cover of *Time Magazine*. He has been awarded the National Arts Club gold medal, the Allied Artists of America gold medal, and the Butler Institute of America purchase prize. He is listed in *Who's Who in American Art* and is a member of Allied Artists of America, Audubon Artists, American Artists Professional League, and the Royal Society of Art, London.

Born in Czechoslovakia, De Ruth spent the year of War II in five countries in England where he studied at the Ruskin Art School, Oxford.

De Ruth's series of monochromes and child done each Christmas has brought him to the attention of Tonight Show audiences.

Hunting Regulations Set

When New Mexico hunters tear the month of July off their calendars, they begin to pay closer attention to wildlife observations, daylight hours, and dates.

No longer will they keep track of passing time on a weekly basis. Instead, the passing of each day becomes more important as they anxiously eye September 1, the opening of dove season which is considered by most hunters to be the official kick-off of the fall hunting seasons.

With only a month to go, hunters should take advantage of the month of August to get prepared for the seasons of their choice.

First of all, it is the hunter's responsibility to familiarize himself with the laws and regulations pertaining to hunting. Extra close attention should be paid to season dates, shooting hours, bag limits, possession

limits, areas open, and areas closed to hunting as each or all of these points are subject to change each year.

Also, it is law that anyone under the age of eighteen must successfully complete an approved hunter safety course before shooting or hunting with firearm, & prior to purchase of a hunting license. Therefore, August is a good month to sign up for this program.

The course isn't restricted only to youngsters, & is a good practical course for anyone interested in hunter education. The classes are taught by certified instructors on a local basis. For information concerning a class in your area, contact your local game and fish officer, or contact the Game and Fish office. Do it now and avoid the large last minute rush.

Once you have learned the rules and regulations and have attended a hunter safety course you are ready for the next step.

All persons hunting in New Mexico, regardless of age, are required to have a valid license for species being hunted. Often an additional permit or stamp is required to supplement the license, such as a crane permit, a band-tailed pigeon permit or a "duck stamp". Again it is the hunter's responsibility to acquire the proper licenses and permits.

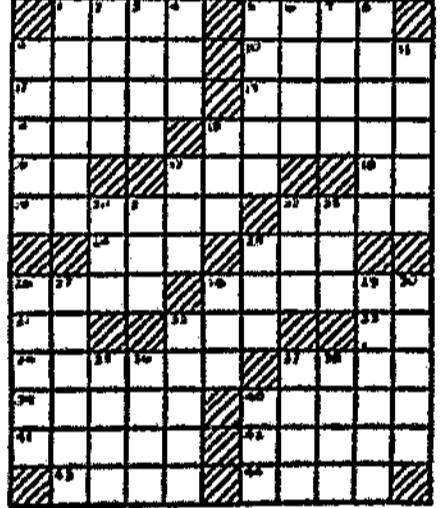
A general knowledge of the species to be hunted must be known. For example, you wouldn't want to hunt javelina in northeastern New Mexico, nor prairie chickens in northwestern New Mexico.

Physical conditioning is important. Whether you are chasing quail across sand dunes, walking out a corn field for pheasant, or climbing a mountain for deer you must be conditioned.

With only a month to get prepared, better get started and right NOW.

A legal closure notice wasn't published, however, and the BLM was limited to weak administrative penalties for fighting vandalism and other offenses. The new legal closure notice, on the other hand, begins with stiff criminal penalties; a fine not to exceed \$1,000 or imprisonment of not more than 12 months, or both.

The BLM has designated the caves as "special areas" which require increased management & protection. Special recreation permits will be required to enter the caves, but the permits are free as long as they are for "noncommercial and noncompetitive" recreational uses.

More information on the caving program on federal public lands in southeastern New Mexico can be obtained from BLM offices in Roswell and Carlsbad.

All Smokey Bear Campgrounds Open, Trails in Good Condition

Two dispersed camping areas, a hiking trail and a four-wheel drive trail were recommended this week by Ranger District recreation personnel on the Lincoln National Forest.

In the Smokey Bear District, near Ruidoso, undeveloped camping at the end of Forest Road 107 is recommended. The road ends about five miles past the turnout to the entrance to South Fork Campground. The camping area is surrounded by nice wooded areas. There is good trail

access, and is a "pace in, pace out" area. Take your own water.

In other Smokey Bear news, the danger of forest fire this week is listed as moderate as it is on all the other forest districts except Guadalupe, near Carlsbad. The fire hazard condition at Guadalupe listed as high.

With the exception of Oak Grove, all Smokey Bear campgrounds are open. South Fork is receiving heavy use and others are receiving

moderate use. Streams are low & Bonto Lake is being fished heavily. Construction work is still underway State Highway 37 surfacing is nearing completion. The Visitor Information Service Program at South Fork

Campground is being held on Saturday nights, at dark. A lot of wildflowers are in bloom. Trails are in good condition, afternoon thunder storms are likely and fuelwood areas are open.
