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## People's Market in Carrizozo a Success

Set for County Fair, Aug. 23---

### Area Merchants Urged to Support Livestock Sales

"With the Lincoln County Fair growing every year, the number of exhibits has increased quite a bit," said Scott Shafer of the Junior Livestock Sale Committee.

Shafer encourages area merchants to participate in this year's livestock sales, set for Saturday, August 23 at 10 a.m. "We need their support," Shafer said of local business people.

People can join forces and money to buy at the sales, thus individuals need not spend large amounts of money. The public can help in three ways; (1) Bidding on the top placing

animals, (2) The sales committee will allow and welcome add-on monies, which is a contribution to a specific youth's auction receipts, (3) By contributing to the "Easter Jackpot" to be divided on a per pound basis among youngsters whose animals did not place high enough to be offered at auction.

With more FFA'ers and 4-H'ers participating this year, Shafer said that the committee hopes to put as many animals through the sale as possible.

The youngsters work all summer on their projects and anticipate the

awarding of ribbons and sale. The sale encourages the youths to do even better next year. Proceeds of the sale goes towards a college fund or for next year's animal project.

Coffee, milk and doughnuts will be served to the exhibitors at 8:00 a.m. the day of the auction in the Livestock Barn. All exhibitors and interested people are invited to attend.

## New Horizons to Open 'Group Home'

New Horizons Developmental Center is again expanding to "new horizons" with the proposed opening of a group home for eight women. The group home will take women clients

from institutions such as Fort Station and be sort of a "quarter way" house, according to Raynene Greer, Group Home Supervisor. The New Horizons group home will be set up to

train the women to be self sufficient with the goal that they will eventually live in an even less restrictive environment.

The staff of the group home will be trained to teach the women self help skills in all areas of daily living, such as grooming, housekeeping tasks, shopping, and skills in getting along with others.

Greer is working under Jenny Kelly, the Center's director. Both women are very excited about the group home. Greer will be working with three Developmental Disabilities Technicians. The staff is to begin extensive training next week. The portion of the New Horizons Center that is to become the group home is undergoing repairs and adjustments to make the facilities more "home like"

At the present the group home is running on a very limited budget. There are many items needed to help transform the former hospital into an environment similar to a home. Any information concerning donations to the group home may be directed to Greer at 648-2120.

Some of the needed items include bath linens, small plants in planters, twin bedspread, small metal waste baskets, chairs, an area rug, portable TV, desk lamps, kitchen canister set, card table, dining table

and eight chairs, small dresser, cork bulletin boards, chalk board, plastic tablecloths. Items need not be new "just in good condition, and Greer adds, "these donations are tax deductible."

The group home has plans to conduct an open house for the community when the facility is ready and staff and clients are settled in. Greer stated that the board of directors are to be thanked for the many hours they spent in the long progress of seeing this facility become a reality. The staff of the group home hope that the support of the community continues.

Raynene Greer is extremely excited about the group home and "starting from the ground up." From LaS Cruces, she has a BS degree in social work and has worked with

Developmental Disabilities program for three years in various capacities. Her background includes three years

experience in group home work. She was also a nutritional program planner for several years.

Greer has a nine-month-old son, Zeke Jacquez. Her mother, Edan Greer makes her home at Casa

Mazana, near her daughter. Greer likes the ideas of living in a small town.

We are seeing the Iranians beating us over the head with our own laws and legal system.

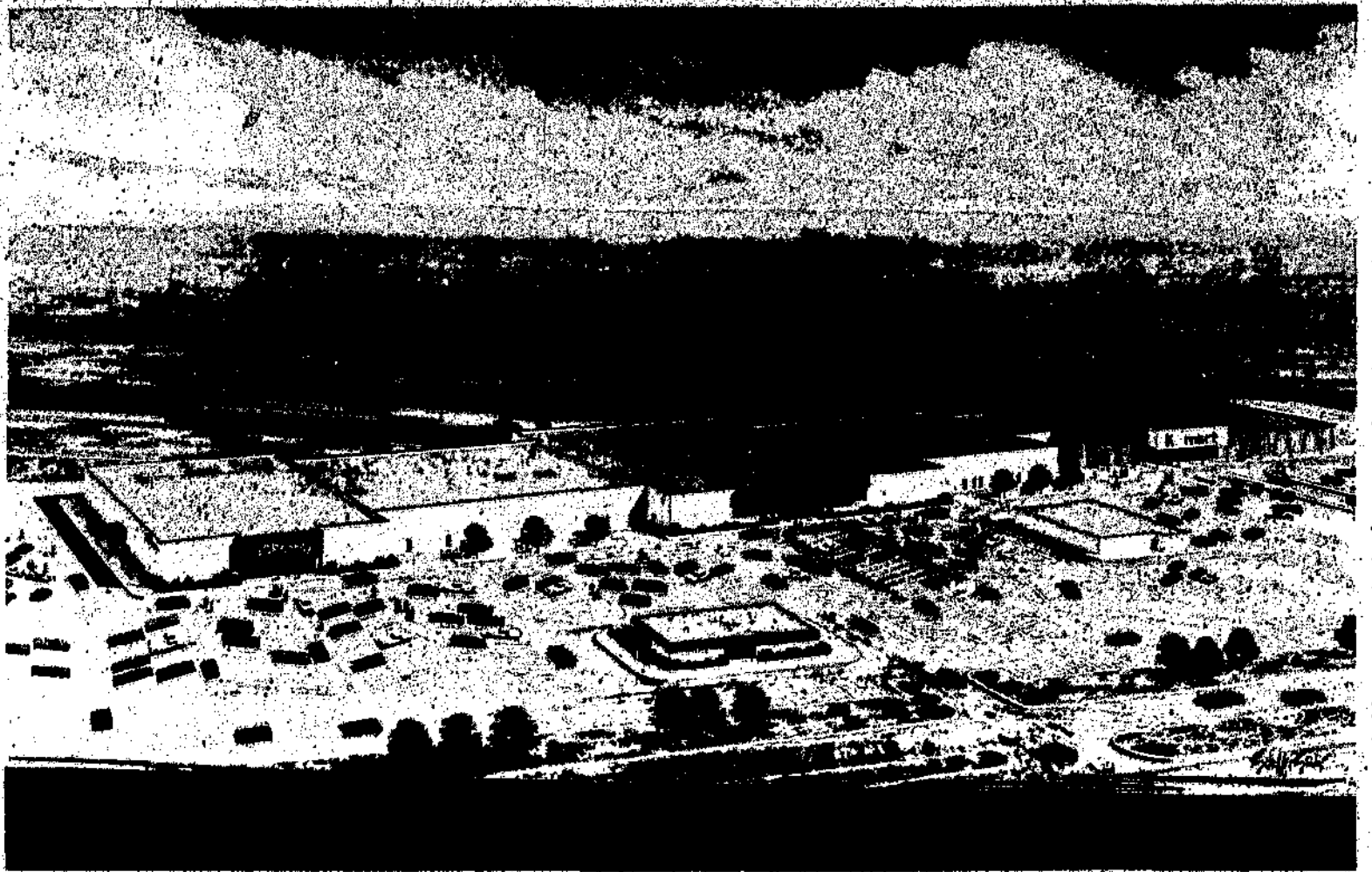
It reminds me of the story about the boxer.

## New Shopping Mall in Alamogordo

Plans for an enclosed regional shopping center in Alamo, occupying 34,500 square feet, the J.C. Penny department store will carry a full line of fine jewelry, leisure and active sporting goods, home entertainment-electronics and decorative home furnishings - in addition to a core of Penny traditional fashion merchandise. The J.C. Penny Company is the nation's third largest retailer.

As a soft-line department store, the 25,000 square-foot Bealls department store will feature nationally-advertised brands of men's, women's and infant's ready-to-wear, shoes, home goods, cosmetics and accessories. Based in Jacksonville, Texas, Bealls currently operates a chain of more than 100 stores in the Southwest. The Alamogordo store will be the fifth in New Mexico for Bealls.

As for the architectural design of White Sands Mall, earth and sky will play a major role with the use of tile flooring in natural earth tones, wood trim and numerous planting areas. Skylights will offer a wide expanse in major court areas, allowing for the natural light to filter into the mall.

The focal point will be the center court area, located at the interior crossing of the two main mall wings.

Seating and arboretum areas will be included in the center area. In addition to the major department stores, White Sands Mall will offer 80,000 square ft. of retail space of local, regional and national specialty shops. Leasing emphasis will be placed on the following areas: women's and men's ready-to-wear, shoes, jewelry, cards and gifts and food & beverage, unisex clothing and sporting goods.

Presently, plans are underway for a cafeteria, theater and a major drug operation also to be included in the mall.

Sited to open in August 1981, the 223,000-square-foot center will be built around the existing K-Mart department store, located on U.S. Highway 54 and 70 on the north side of Alamogordo.

In remarks prepared for the luncheon, Stuckey said, "The development will provide the Alamogordo community and the surrounding area including Lincoln County with the type and variety of shopping available only in large metropolitan markets. The mall will also bring to the area 300 to 350 job during the construction period and 250 to 300 permanent jobs after the opening."

Stuckey added, "Construction plans for the center are being finalized this week, and construction bidding will begin this month, with actual construction scheduled to commence in September."

Joining Stuckey were representatives from the three major department stores that will anchor the new center: Scott Johnson, manager of the existing K-Mart store; John Smith, district manager for the J.C. Penny Company, & Royace Beall, president of the Bealls Brothers department store.

Plans call for the addition of a new K-Mart entrance opening onto the mall. The 56,000 square-foot White Sands Mall store will continue to offer shoppers a full line of items which K-Mart is nationally known. K-Mart is the world's second largest retailers.

## Sense and Nonsense . . .

This year's recession has made the federal budget extremely tight and it's unlikely that Congress will pass this kind of a tax break until we look carefully at its cost. But we are introducing it now so this approach can be fully discussed, with an eye toward getting it passed, perhaps next year.

First, and most important, the legislation would allow beleaguered American taxpayers the opportunity to save hard-earned dollars and use the money to buy a home or to provide higher educational opportunities for their children.

Second, it will provide a source of long-term capital which is sorely needed for small business and industry to move ahead with new innovations in technology.

It provides a specific focus on the twin problems of home ownership and education, while we are attempting to solve the larger problems of inflation and low productivity. It's the kind of bill that addresses the problems of middle income families.

We want to be sure our kids can afford a new home - and a better life in the 1980's and 1990's.

Sending a child through college and buying a home used to be an easily-achievable part of the American dream. But that dream is fading fast. Because of the inflation and taxing policies the federal government has followed over the last 30 years, it's becoming more and more difficult to save enough to buy a house or to educate our children.

As a father with three in college, I'm well aware that, even with a good salary, it's almost impossible to make ends meet. And I never thought I'd have to worry about my children owing their own home.

Recently I joined in sponsoring legislation that will give a tax break to those who are saving to buy a new home, or send their children to college. Called the House and Education Savings Account Bill, it would allow an individual a tax deduction of up to \$1,500 a year if the money is set aside in a special account for a down payment on a house.

Tax deductions of up to \$1,000 for each child would be allowed if the money were put in a savings account for their college education. These savings accounts would be similar to Individual Retirement Accounts and contributions to the accounts will be allowed for 10 years.

### Food Preservation Fillers...

The proper container is a must if you want frozen foods to look, taste and smell good. NMSU Extension people suggest rigid containers of glass, plastic or heavily waxed cardboard for liquids. For dry pack vegetables, fruits, meats, fish or poultry, use bags or sheets of moisture-vapor resistant polyethylene or heavy-duty aluminum foil.

The refrigerator-freezer combination with the freezer at the bottom may be cooling back say NMSU Extension people. Consumers who bought combinations with the freezer at the bottom back in the '60's and '70's are now ready to replace their units and they still want the freezer at the bottom.

Don't leave fresh fruit to ripen in direct sunlight, say NMSU Extension people. Indirect light in open air at room temperature is best. Then when the fruit is fully ripe, it should be refrigerated immediately and used as soon as possible.

Vaught said the department has adopted uniform procedures for recommending license to the commission, and that several other cases are pending.

Streams are low and Bonito Lake is being fished heavily. State Highway 532 is now open and the surfacing work on Highway 37 is nearing completion.

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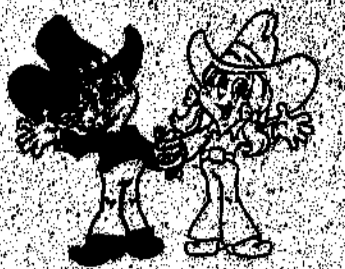

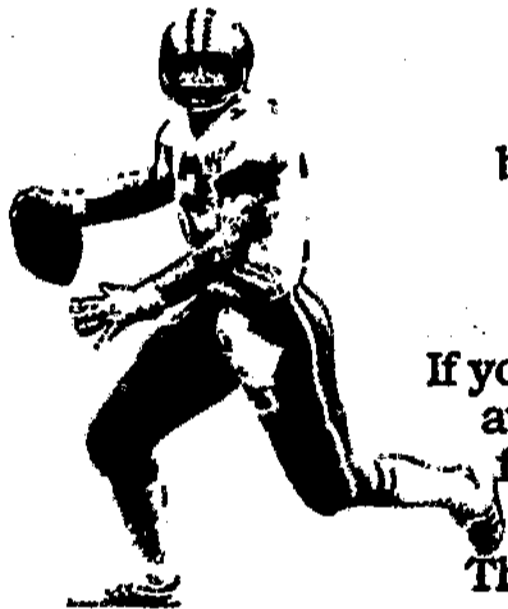

Box 968, Crown Building 725 St. Michael's Drive, Santa Fe, NM 87503; telephone (505) 827-5271.

American Mineral Recovery Inc., R.E. Lubojacki, owner, P.O. Box 968, Carrizozo, NM 88301 proposes to discharge 12,000 gallons per day of precious-metal mill waste water into an unlined lagoon located on the floatation process mill site approximately 3/4 mile south of Carrizozo, T17, R10E, Section 11, Lincoln County, NM. The ground water most likely to be affected is at a depth of 107 feet with a total dissolved solids concentration of approximately 700 mg-1.

Bokum Resources Corporation, P.O. Box 1833, 142 W. Palace Ave., Santa Fe, NM 87501 proposes a modification to its approved discharge plan (DP-100) for its proposed discharge of uranium mill effluent to its Marquez Uranium Mill tailings disposal site located in T13N, RAW, approximately one mile east of the Village of Marquez in Sandoval County, NM. The approved discharge plan is for approximately 2,200 tons per day of tailing solids and 2,700 tons per day of tailing liquid to be transported by pipeline and deposited in unlined trenches excavated into weathered and unweathered shale. The ultimate level of the tailings in the trenches will be below the surrounding land surface. Free water which accumulates in the trenches is to be pumped to a series of excavated evaporation ponds lined with compacted weathered shale. The proposed modification is the postponement of certain studies and also the postponement of the preparation of the revised reclamation plan which depends on the results of these studies, pursuant to discharge plan approval condition number 16. The ground water most likely to be affected is that in the shallow alluvium of adjacent water courses, and has a total dissolved solids concentration of approximately 2,000 mg-1. The Company estimates that the depth to ground water from the base of the excavated trenches is greater than 300 feet and that the minimum distance from the base of the excavated evaporation ponds to the nearest ground water is greater than 100 feet.

Cebolleta Land Grant, P.O. Box 307 Seboyeta, NM 87033, Robert Padilla, Chairman, proposes to

discharge 4,500 gallons per day from the Village of Moquino, and 30,000 gallons per day from the Village of Bibo, of domestic wastewater into two total retention ponds located proximal to each village, in Valencia County, NM, T11, R5W, Sec. 21 and T11, R5W Sec. 20, respectively. The depth to ground water most likely to be impacted is estimated to be approximately 50 feet at both sites with a total dissolved solid concentration approximately 650 mg-1.

Chem-Tech Minerals Engineering Research and Development Corporation, Harold V. Killgore, P.O. Box 86, Winston, NM 87943 proposes to discharge tailings to a lined tailings pond from a gold and silver ore flotation mill located in Turkey Creek, north of Winston, Sierra County, NM in Section 22, T10S, R9W, N.M.P.M. The tailings will have pH of approximately 7.6. The estimated flow could range from 16,000 to 24,000 gallons per day. The ground water most likely to be affected is reported to be at a depth of approximately 160 feet with a total dissolved solids concentration of 340 mg-1.

Mobil Oil Corp., Box 5444, Denver, CO 80217 proposes to operate a pilot test of in situ uranium leaching at its Mounment Project located approximately 2 miles east of the town of Crownpoint, Section 28, T17N, R12W, McKinley County, NM. It is proposed to inject approximately 75 gallons per minute of alkaline leach solution via injection wells into ore bearing sands in the Westwater Canyon Member of the Morrison Formation, at a depth of approximately 1950 feet below the land surface. The leach solution will be recovered via a production well centered between the injection wells. The discharge plan includes a description of the pilot test, which is proposed to have a 18 month leaching period followed by a 10 month restoration period, a proposed water quality monitoring program and a contingency plan to correct any excursion of leachate. The ground water most likely to be affected is at a depth of 1950 feet and has a total dissolved solids concentration of approximately 270 mg-1.

Mobil Oil Corporation, P.O. Box 5444, Denver CO 80217 proposes a modification to its approved discharge plan (DP-20) for its pilot test of in situ uranium leaching at its Crownpoint Project located approximately 5 miles northwest of Crownpoint in Section 9 T17N, R13W, McKinley County NM. The approved discharge plan is for the injection of approximately 75 gallons per minute of leach solution via injection wells into ore bearing sands in the Westwater Canyon Member of the Morrison Formation at a depth of approximately 1970 feet below the surface and the recovery of the leach solution via production wells. The discharge plan includes a description of the pilot test, which is to have a 14 month leaching period followed by 8

months restoration, water quality monitoring program and a contingency plan to correct any excursion of leachate. The proposed modification is an adjustment in the monitoring program. The ground water most likely to be affected is at a depth of approximately 1970 feet and has a total dissolved solids concentration of approximately 300 mg-1.

City of Santa Fe, Arthur Trujillo, Mayor, P.O. Box 909, Santa Fe NM 87501 proposes to discharge 65,000 GPD of domestic sludge from the proposed new Airport Road Sewage treatment plant, 32,500 gallons per day will be dried on evaporated drying beds, stockpiled, and later applied onto 160 acres of the city park grass covered areas as fertilizer and soil conditioner. The remaining 32,500 gallons per day of the 2 percent solid solution will be injected into the ground at a loading rate of 4.9 inches per year onto 156 acres of land located immediately south of the proposed Airport Road Sewage treatment plant, T16N, R8E, Sections 10 and 15, Santa Fe County, NM. The ground water most likely to be affected at the sludge injection site is at a depth of approximately 130 feet with a total dissolved solid concentration of approximately 400 mg-1.

Any interested person may obtain further information from the Ground Water Section, Water Pollution Control Bureau, EID, and may submit written comments to the Director of the EID at the address given above. Prior to ruling on any proposed discharge plan or this modification, the Director of EID will allow thirty days after the date of publication of this notice during which comments may be submitted to him and a public hearing may be requested by any interested person. Requests for a public hearing shall set forth the reasons why the hearing should be held. A hearing will be held if the Director determines that there is a significant public interest.

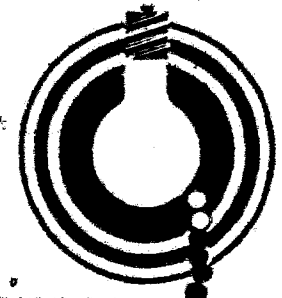
