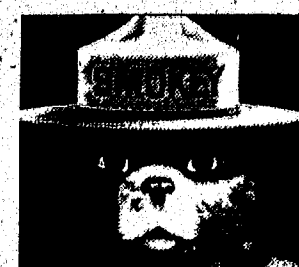

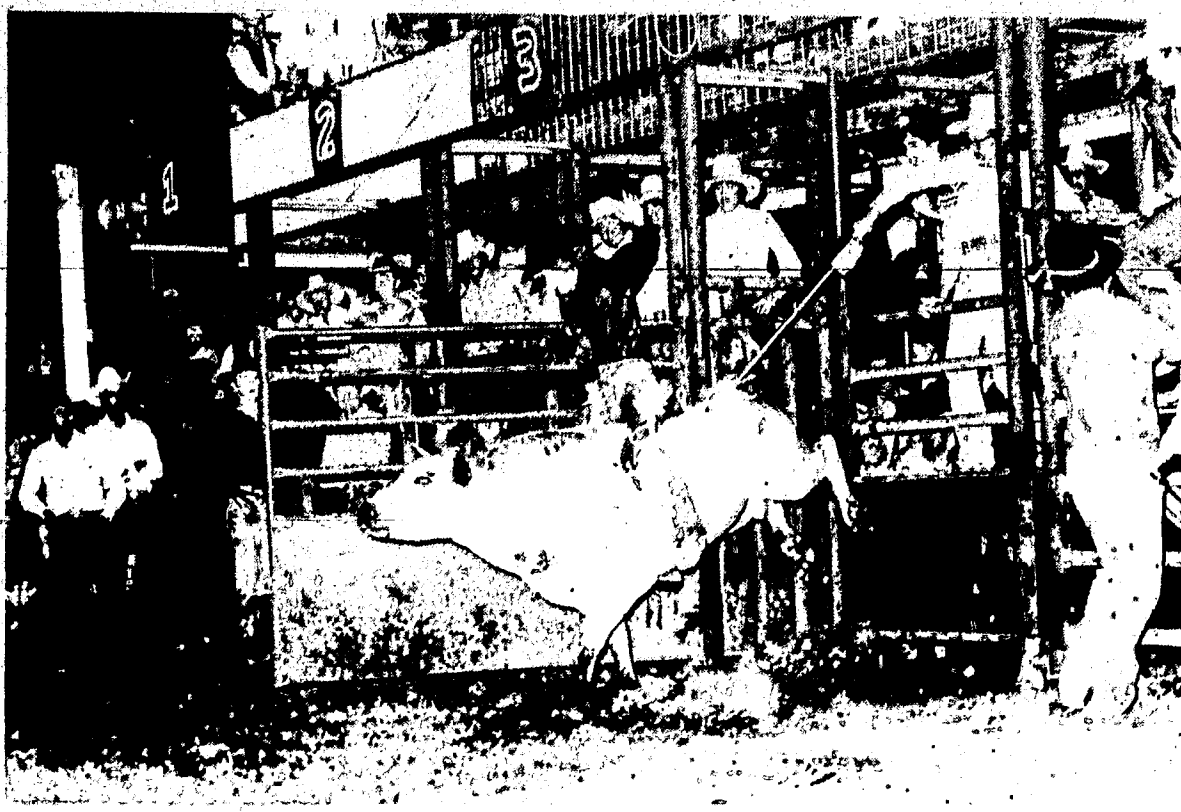

Area Cleaned by Superior Oil Company



RUIDOSO, N. M.—If you look real close, just off Trail No. 19, three or four miles up the South Fork Rio Bonito in the White Mountain Wilderness, you might see a tree stump on the bank of a little stream that's just a shade taller than the others.

That stump is about all that's visible following a multi-thousand dollar molybdenum core drilling operation in the Lincoln National Forest Wilderness area. The operation was recently done by the Superior Oil Company of Tucson.

Forester Earl Blann, of the Smokey Bear Ranger District on the Lincoln, reported that Superior did an excellent job of site cleanup and restoration, adding that, "No trash, fuel, grease, oil spill, drilling mud, or drill chips could be found."

Superior's Robley Berry, who was in charge of the environmental permitting, said the credit for the care taken not to pollute the wilderness area while the drilling was actually under way should go to Leland Machen of the Joy Drilling Co., who headed the drilling crews.

"Machen is one of the most careful and conscientious drillers we have ever worked with," Berry commented, explaining that the driller has worked in several other wilderness areas. He added that Machen and his crews were especially selected for the White Mountain project because they genuinely care about keeping the wilderness area clean.

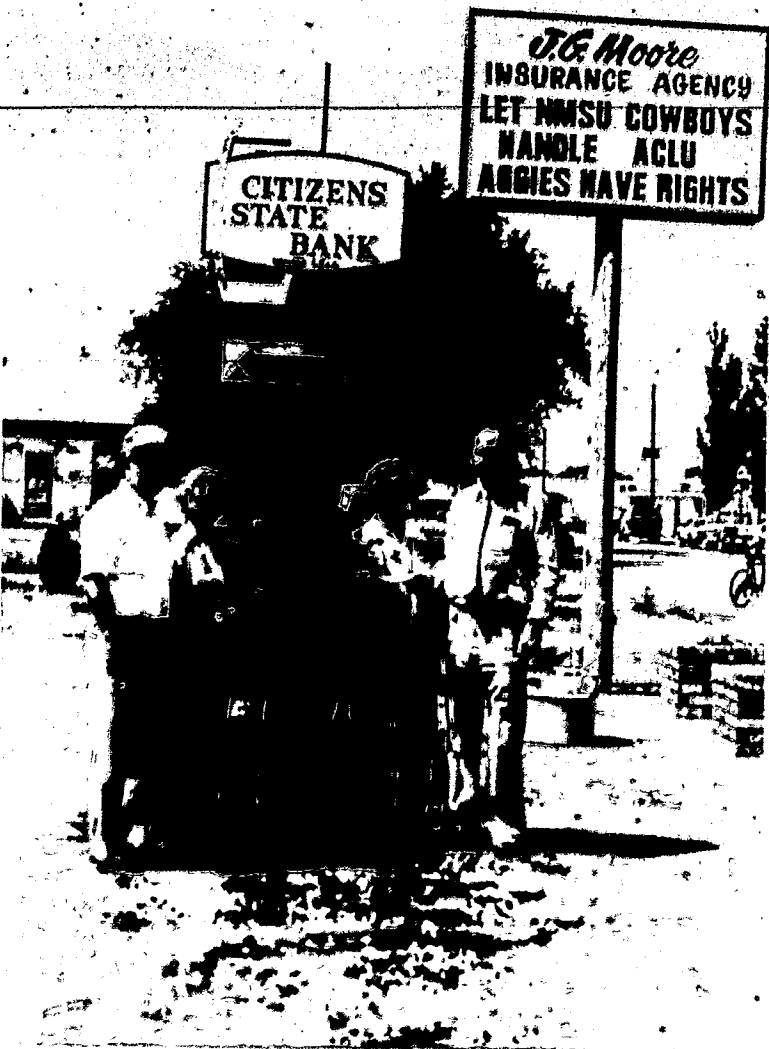

Johnson Stearns, President of the Citizens State Bank announced this week that property presently occupied by J G Moore Insurance Agency & Carrizozo Cable TV has been purchased by the bank. A new building of approximately 5,000 square feet will be erected where the insurance building and cable TV office now stand.

The present bank building occupied by Citizens State Bank since 1935 and prior to that back to 1917 by the First National Bank will be razed and a new parking lot installed for the convenience of bank customers, and facilitate movement of customers using the new bank facilities on to businesses on 12th Street.

Johnson says he is sure proud to see this happening, the people of

Lindsay Named Chairman

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital is proud to announce that Mrs. Wesley B. Lindsay has been named to head the 1980 Fall Bike-A-Thon Campaign in Carrizozo.

In making the announcement, Clifford Damstrom, St. Jude Director for the Southwest, stated that "We are proud to have such a dedicated person for this important job."

"St. Jude Children's Research Hospital is the largest childhood cancer research center in the United States, and it is the first research center dedicated exclusively to the research and conquest of catastrophic diseases of children, such as cancer and other life-threatening diseases," stated Damstrom. "Scientists and physicians, working side by side at St. Jude, have succeeded in rewriting medical textbooks. When St. Jude accepted its first patient in 1962, the survival rate for children diagnosed with acute lymphocytic leukemia was less than 5 percent. Today, the disease free survival figure for children in long-term remission has grown to 80 percent. Cancer treatment procedures originated at St. Jude are now being used to treat children throughout the United States and in other parts of the world. Such progress has brought world-wide acclaim to St. Jude."

"Children come to St. Jude for one purpose: A chance to live," Damstrom stated. "But no one has ever been charged for medical treatment. Yet medicines and treatments are extremely expensive. St. Jude has always been supported

by the public, and we must continue to rely on public support to help finance the research and patient care programs. Over 70 percent of our 26 million dollar budget must come from public support. This is why this Bike-A-Thon is so important."

Danny Thomas, who founded St. Jude Children's Research Hospital because of a vow, stated its purpose clearly: To wipe catastrophic diseases of children from the face of the Earth.

"Since Thomas opened the research center in 1962, his dream of conquering cancer and other diseases that destroy our children has been brought closer to reality," stated Damstrom. "Thomas is still extremely active in pursuing his goal and he inspires all of us in this cause."

Appaloosa Trials Begin September 6th

The 18th annual Appaloosa World-Wide Futurity at the 1980 New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque will have an approximate purse of \$184,000.

That was the word today from Bob Hickman, spokesman for the Appaloosa breeders.

He said the trials for the futurity would start at 10:30 am on Saturday, September 6.

He said that there would be 87 eligibles for the meet, the largest field ever.

He said the ten horses with the top times would be in the futurity finals, planned on Saturday afternoon, September 13, and the race would probably be the seventh one.

Hickman added that the ten next fastest horses would be in the consolation race on Friday, September 12, and that it would probably be the fourth race of the afternoon.

There will be pari-mutuel betting on the trials and the futurity finals and consolation races.

The 43rd annual New Mexico State Fair - The Biggest Show in New Mexico - will be held in Albuquerque September 10 through 21, with the 17-day racing meet and quality horse shows starting September 6.

HOME BUYER CLINIC

Timely Protection
Home buyers on occasion will ask whether a new title search and new owner's title insurance are necessary each time real estate ownership changes. The experience of a couple in a southwestern state provides an impressive answer.

Five months after completing purchase, this couple was notified that a note secured by a deed of trust on their property was unpaid. The McAuliffe couple had no prior knowledge of this debt, which was incurred by the previous owner of the real estate to finance home improvement work.

The title search of public records before completion of the real estate purchase did not disclose the existence of the unpaid note because of a mistake in the indexing of records at the court house. Under the owner's title insurance obtained by the couple at time of home purchase, the title insurer paid the full amount of the home improvement debt—releasing the lien and clearing title to the property without a financial loss to the insured.

Regardless of the length of time a previous owner may have held title to a home, it is entirely possible that serious problems during that period, divorce, bankruptcy, agreement to a road easement across property, and a money judgment against the real estate are just a few examples. Timely protection for the new buyer of a home is available through new owner's title insurance.
