

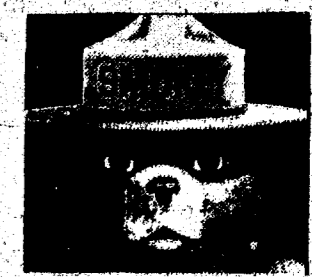

News Briefs

Corona has a new telephone system which will hopefully be in effect soon. The man in charge of this system is Dexil Rold, an experienced man from Colorado. He has been with rural telephone lines in California and Colorado for many years, so he should be able to take care of Corona's telephone system very easily.

He will bring a new kind of system to Corona and that system is an underground telephone line instead of on poles. He plans to do all this with a government loan, which will make it financially feasible. The underground line has some advantages over pole lines like bad weather and ice making the lines sag. This makes long distance calling very difficult or impossible.

Dexil plans to give the people who don't have phones a chance to get them at a very low cost. This means they will only have to pay so much a month to have a telephone. Also there will be private lines instead of party lines so everyone can talk at once. So Corona seems to be getting a much improved and better system of communicating with each other at varied distances.

The Retired School Employees of Lincoln County will meet at 2 p.m., Thursday, September 11 in the REA Building in Carrizozo. Lynde Samelson and Juanita Bush of Ruidoso will conduct the business meeting. The Carrizozo retired teachers will be hostesses.

The final day set by law on which a candidate may officially withdraw his name from the general election ballot is Tuesday, September 2, 1980. In addition, all nominations by political parties to fill vacancies on the 1980 general election ballot (for any reason other than the death of a candidate) shall be certified in writing with the proper filing officer no later than Tuesday, September 9, 1980, at 5:00 p.m.

Further information concerning candidate withdrawals and replacements may be obtained from either the Bureau of Elections in the Secretary of State's office or the county clerk.

Grizzlies open at Texico, Tigers at Cloudcroft--

1980 Class 'A' Football Goes to New Format

Class A football enters the new decade with a new look in 1980. There are two districts this year instead of four and there are only eighth teams competing instead of the 11 which played last year.

District 1A will consist of Capitan, Cloudcroft, Reserve, Carrizozo and Mountainair.

District 2A has only three teams, defending state champs Hagerman, state finalist Texico, and Tatum.

Only 11 people showed up to the first practice at Melrose and the Buffaloes will not field a team this year.

Navajo Mission and Vaughn both dropped their Class A football status. Here's a glance at the Class A teams:

DISTRICT 1
Coach Jerry Koller is pretty pleased with the size of his Carrizozo Grizzlies. David Zamora, offensive-defensive tackle, will play his senior year at 6-foot-1, 230 pounds. He will be joined on the line by 215-pound junior

John Paul Ventura. Quarterback Chris Ventura will be running both the Slot T and Wing T offenses. As many as six backs will be seeing plenty of action for the Grizzlies including fullbacks Randy Hollis and Matt Ferguson, both juniors, Jon Aguilar, sophomore and Larry Beltran, senior at tailback; and Gabe Samora and Robbie Bobbs at wing backs.

The defense will be a split-4. There are 16 returning lettermen.

First year coach Mel Holland has about 10 starters returning at Capitan. The Tigers will have senior David Rooks at quarterback and will work out of the Pro I. Fullback Tracey Maxwell, 6-0, 106, will be a key as will center Deke Lamay, 6-3, 180. The defense will play out of the 5-2. Capitan has a bunch of fine looking sophomores and could surprise if any of them come through.

Coach Eddy Coleman's Cloudcroft Bears don't have a lot of experience or size but he feels there's enough talent to put his team in the thick of the race. Senior Dwayne Stanbrough, a 6-3, 215-pound tackle is back as is Tom Freeman. Freeman, 6-0, 188, hurt his knee last year. Quarterback Johnny Castanon (5-10, 140, junior). The Bears helped kick-off the 1980 year last week when they met the Lordsburg Class AA team and came out on the short end of a 42-0 score. They will be looking to improve on that when they get into district play.

Coach Tom Summerlin has only about eight lettermen returning off last year's state semifinal team at Mountainair. Delfino Luera returns at tackle and his eighth grade brother Steven will play fullback. Oscar Meddes, who ran for 615 yards last season, is another returner. Senior Gabriel Padilla, who hasn't called the signals since eighth grade, will be the quarterback and will run the Slant T. The Mustangs will use the Oklahoma 52 on defense.

Little is known about the Reserve Mountaineers except that Coach Ed Trotter will still have his team running from the old Single Wing offense and use either a 5-3 or 5-4 defense. This could very well be the darkest horse team of the district.

DISTRICT 2
Carey Chambers has taken the coaching duties at Hagerman and he has a bit of tradition to hold up. The Bobcats have been state champs since 1977.

Quarterback Oscar Medrano (5-10, 150, senior) will be in charge of a multiple offense including the Pro I. Hagerman will run a 37 defense. The line will be tough on both sides. Tackle Jim Bob Miles (6-0, 218), guard Greg Barbe (6-1, 210), center Victor Reveles (5-11, 180), sophomore Albert Garcia (5-10, 165) and senior Martin Garcia (6-3, 227) will make their presence felt in the trenches.

The Texico Wolverines will be relying on more finesse than muscle this year. Gary Mitchell, a senior, and Todd Gorles, a junior, will compete for the quarterback job. Senior Herbert Bibbs (1,900 yards rushing last year) will be joined by his little brother Willie in the backfield. Another Bibbs, Earl will play flanker this, his sophomore season. Texico will run a pro set offense and a 5-2 defense. The Wolverines will start the season by hosting the Carrizozo Grizzlies this Friday.

The Coyotes of Tatum will run a split back year on offense and a variation of the Split-5 on defense. Center-defensive tackle Steven Stroud (6-0, 170) will play a key role as will lineman Ricky Ritzerson (6-10, 186), who is back off an elbow injury. Running back Kevin Bonds (600 yards last year) is coming off an injury and James Herrera (600 yards) will be the other starting back.

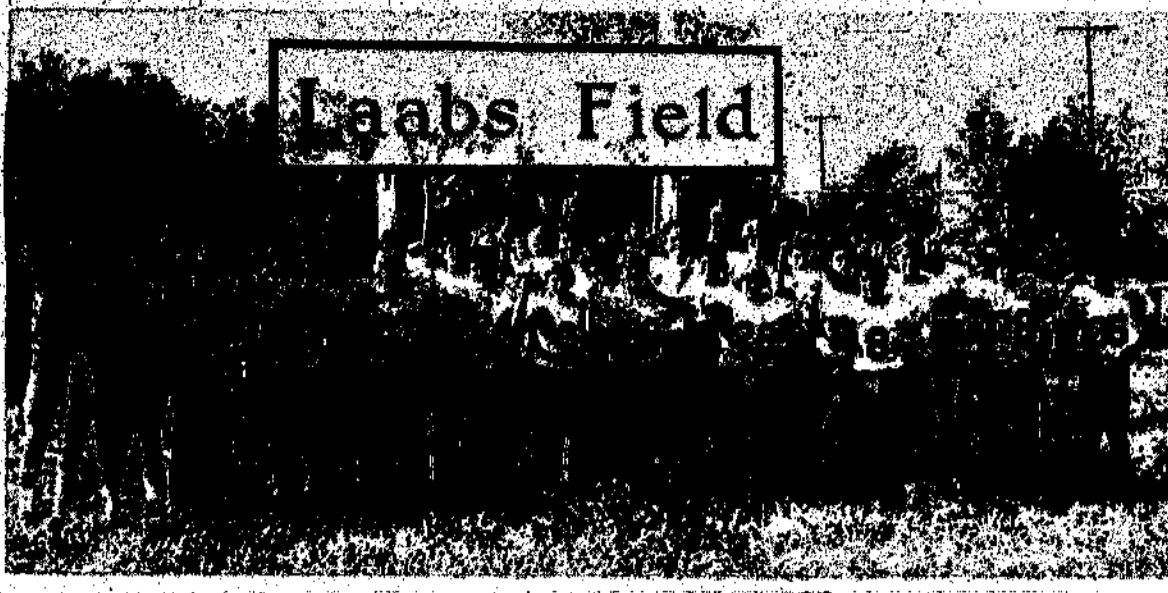

Great Plains Conservation Program Extended thru 1991

In June, a bill extending the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCC) from December 31, 1981 to September 30, 1991, became law.

The new legislation, Public Law 96-263, will increase GPCC funding from \$300 million to \$400 million and will raise the yearly cost-share limitation from \$25 million to \$50 million.

"This is a positive step to insure that farmers and ranchers throughout the Great Plains will have added incentive to apply conservation

measures on their land", Ray T. Margo, Jr. said. Margo heads the USDA - Soil Conservation Service (SCS) in New Mexico.

Under GPCC, the landowners in New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, Wyoming, North Dakota, South Dakota and Montana can speed up soil and water conservation work by signing agreements for 3 to 10 years. The contracts guarantee cost-sharing by the government to apply and maintain conservation measures.

Contracts have been written for about half of the land eligible in the 10 states. "New Mexico has about 44 million acres that could be eligible for the program, and we have about 20 million acres covered," Margo added.

The Soil Conservation Service has administered GPCC since the program began in 1964. Through the program, working together with local conservation districts, SCS has given technical and financial assistance to 55,000 Great Plains farmers and ranchers in treating critically eroded farmland and rangeland and making appropriate land use changes.

Over the next 10 years, SCS and conservation districts hope to help even more Great Plains farmers and ranchers plan and install the most effective conservation practices on their land.

"The hazardous climate and easily eroded soil in the 10 Great Plains States require lasting protection of soil and water resources", Margo said. "The drought of the 1970's and the situation this summer are reminders that we must adequately protect the Plains from wind and water erosion to reduce the likelihood of another disastrous Dust Bowl".

"Despite a good record of success for work done under the GPCC, much work remains in order to combat serious droughts and persistent erosion problems", Margo concluded.

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INTRODUCING —

The 1980-81 Carrizozo Grizzlies

The following was taken from the Alamo Daily News football edition and thought our readers might enjoy this fine article on the 1980 Grizzly team:

"They are ready for a change," says first year head coach Jerry Koller of his 1980 Carrizozo Grizzly football squad. "They went 0-8 last year. They want to win, they want to turn things around!"

Koller says his Grizzlies have some quickness and pretty good size. He had a turn out of 32, and added 10 to 15 more before the season opener on September 5. Among those coming out are 18 returning lettermen-nine from the offensive unit and nine from defense.

Offensively, the Grizzlies will resemble the Alamogordo Tigers in style, running out of the Slot T, with a 60-40 run to pass ration initially. Koller notes, however, that "if the defense will give it to us, we will throw. Our quarterback is a good passer." He admits that the 60-40 ration may reverse itself during the season.

The Center slot will most likely go to 6-1, 177 pound senior Phillip Payne. Payne did not see action during his '79 campaign due to injuries. Right guard will be senior Johnny Herrera, who played center last year. Herrera, a 175 pounder, is rated by Koller as "possibly one of the best linemen this year. He is a good blocker and has good quickness." Top candidate at left guard is Johnny Bob Stearns, a 155 pound junior. According to Koller, Stearns is not in the same category as Herrera, but is learning and had good pulling techniques.

At right tackle will be 6-2 215 pound John Paul Ventura who played guard last season. Said Koller of Ventura, "he could be one of our strongest linemen." The left tackle assignment is up in the air. Koller was hoping 231 pound David Zamora, one of last year's lettermen, would come out and compete for that slot. (Which he has). Top candidates for tight end are Steven Payne, a 6-2, 195 pounder and 5-10, 170 pound Joe Curtias. While both have equal blocking power, Curtias is rated to be a little quicker and with better hands.

The leading prospect at split end is Ralph Delgado. At 5-11 and 153 pounds, Koller says Delgado runs good patterns and shows good potential for downfield blocking. He also has excellent hands.

Quarterback will be 6 foot senior Chris Ventura. Koller describes his quarterback as having good foot movement, as being a good passer and as being a take charge kind of guy, adding that Ventura is beginning to handle the ball real well.

Randy Hollis and Matt Ferguson are running neck and neck for fullback. Hollis, at 175 pounds, is a strong runner and a better than adequate blocker that needs a little work in that department. Ferguson is 10 pounds lighter and appears to Koller to be a better blocker, with both having equal speed.

Senior Gabe Samora is looking good at slot back. The 5-6, 160 pounder runs good pass patterns and is a good, steady blocker on the corners and has good quickness. Robbie Bokke, also a senior, is a little guy but appears to be the fastest player on the team. Says Koller of the slot back candidate, "He's not a bad blocker for his size."

Jon Todd Aguilar, who lettered at tight end last year, is being given a good look as a running back for 1980. "He has good speed and is a good, heady runner, a smart runner," Koller noted. Also receiving con-

sideration is senior Larry Beltran who is reportedly a good, strong runner.

Koller will use a split front four defense his first year at the helm of the Carrizozo Grizzlies—the same basic defense as that used by Alamogordo. "I think it fits these kids real well," said Koller.

At left defensive end will be Steven Payne whom Koller calls strong and big. Top two candidates at left defensive tackle are Johnny Herrera and David Zamora. Herrera has good quickness, while Zamora, not as quick, is the stronger of the two. The remaining defensive tackle berth goes to John Paul Ventura who is rated at 4.9 in the 40. Koller claims Zamora is a candidate for all state honors and points out the speedy tackle could also play in the backfield. Mike Edwards, a 6-1, 206 pounder is making the transition from inside tackle to defensive end, and is getting pushed by Joe Curtias for that job.

The banger linebacker job going to Jon Todd Aguilar. "I'm really sold on this kid," said Koller. "He will be a candidate for all-state and as a senior for the all-star game. He doesn't clown around. This is a good sophomore. He's a good kid."

The left inside linebacker job has two candidates fighting it out for starting roles—Todd Lindsay who lettered at offensive tackle, and Joe Curtias. Lindsay has good quickness

and reacts well with the flow of the ball, but Curtias has a good strong upper body and moves quickly with the ball. Johnny Bob Stearns and Matt Ferguson are battling it out for right inside linebacker, and coach Koller indicates it is a close race.

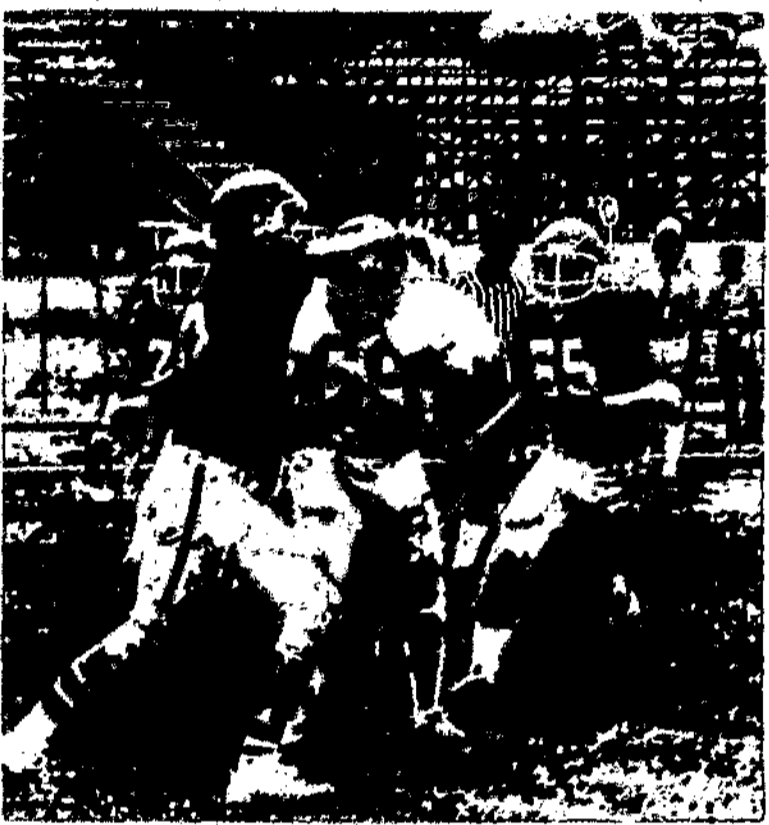

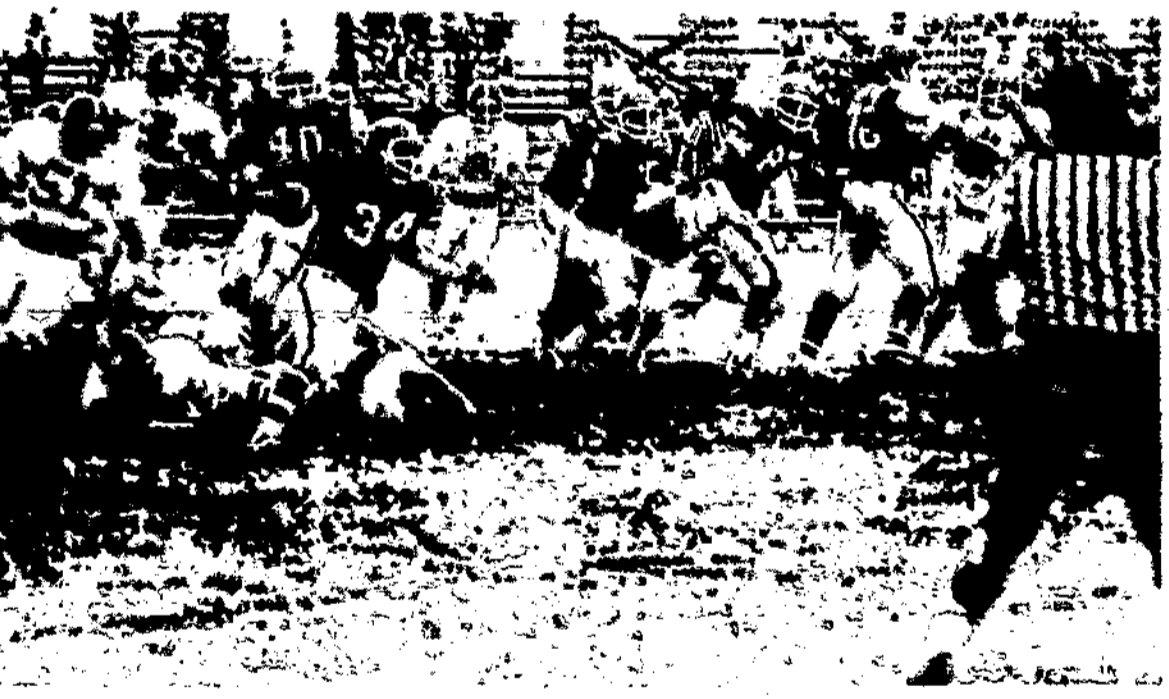

Charles Dickerson of Fairacres has been named as the auctioneer for the popular Al Schwartzman Junior Livestock Sale planned at the 1980 New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque.

This year's sale-in which the top 100 ribbon-winning animals (36 calves, 36 lambs and 36 burrows) from the State Fair go on the auction block-will be held on Saturday, September 20, starting at 9 a.m.

For several seasons, the Greater Albuquerque Chamber of Commerce has backed the sale by assisting in lining up the buyers. Mahlon Love will be representing the chamber in this task, as he has done for several years.

Harvey Jones of Corrales, long a booster of the auction, will be sales manager this time around.

The sale, which has been an integral part of the junior competitions at the fair for the past 38 years, last year grossed a record \$127,456.15.

A total of 644 animals have been entered in junior livestock competitions for the forthcoming 1980 New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque.

Entry officials said this figure will probably be increased because some junior exhibitors have an extension of the deadline, due to the lateness of their county fairs.

The total so far includes 97 steers, 29 breeding beef cattle, 263 lambs, 38 breeding sheep, 190 burrows, 3 breeding swine and 25 dairy cattle.

The tally - which is expected to increase by fairtime-is less than last year's record 1048 animals in junior competition.

Earlier it was reported that a total of 2773 animals had been entered in open shows for this year's fair, which was below the 1979 record year.

Manager Bill Humphries said that the summer's heat and drought, plus economic conditions, probably accounted for the decline in number of entries.

"This summer's long heat spell really hurt a lot of ranchers all over the country and especially here in New Mexico," he said.

The Junior Baking Contest in the Women's Center at the 1980 New Mexico State Fair is limited to youths between the ages of 10 and 15.

Professional photographer Robert W. Hall has been superintendent of the photography department at the New Mexico State Fair since 1972.

There are competitions for ten varieties of geese in the popular poultry show at the 1980 New Mexico State Fair.

The New Mexico State Fair is offering \$44,440 in purse money for the All-Star Rodeo in Tingley Coliseum. This amount, coupled with entry fees, brings the total money payment to winning cowboys to more than \$150,000.

There are 110 competitive categories for model railroad enthusiasts in the Hobby Show at the 1980 New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque.

All candidates for New Mexico State Fair Queen stay at the fair's Youth Hall during the week of competitions.

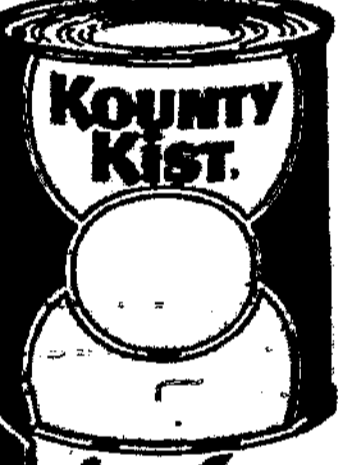
