

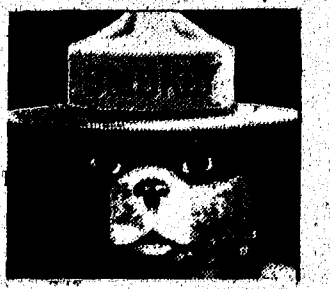

Lincoln County Commission Approached for its' Support

Johnson Stearns of Carrizozo's Citizens State Bank went before the Lincoln County Commission last Tuesday in regard to the money situation with the Carrizozo Recreation Area.

Stearns said he would now like to suggest that the commissioners endorse their support by letters requesting that the State Legislature make the Recreation Area part of the Valley of Fires State Park.

In other business the commissioners: — Moved to hold an October 28 public hearing to adopt an ordinance on animal control.

He has been helping the town in the search to find funding for the facility when Spencer donations run out the first of the year. Stearns told the commissioners that he is not concerned for the Rec Center which is hoped to be self-supporting. His concern is with the outdoor recreation site which includes the golf course, baseball diamond, tennis court, fishing lake and playground.

"Will you agree to that John Allen?", Stearns asked.

— Approved contract for Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital sprinkler system to Casco Fire Protection Systems, Inc. of Albuquerque, low bidder at \$15,400.

The three commissioners agreed to write letters to State Representatives and Senators urging that the State make the Carrizozo facility a part of the state park system.

— Appointed Dr. James Miller, Jr. of Carrizozo and Mr. Howard Shanks of Capitan to the Planning and Zoning Committee.

— Employed Mr. Devil Bill Adams of Capitan as EMT Consultant. Adams will conduct two refresher courses and an 80-hour EMT course.

— Approved the Alto application liquor license transfer from Inn-Credible, Inc. to Dorgan-Smith Enterprises.

— Moved to hold an October 28 hearing for a Nogal mobile home ordinance.

— Tabled the request by the Arabella Livestock Association for an electric fence for predator control.

Rotary District Governor Visits Carrizozo Rotarians

Mr. Marvin Rohovec, District Governor of District 552, Rotary International, and his wife, Lucy, were in Carrizozo on September 11 and 13 for the Carrizozo Rotary Club's Club Assembly on Wednesday night, and the Club's regular noon meeting on Thursday.

The Carrizozo Rotary Club was founded in 1959 with 21 charter members, meeting at that time at the Village Inn in Carrizozo. At present the Carrizozo Rotary Club has 22 members, with hopes of installing several new members in the immediate future.

At the club Assembly, held at the Four Winds Restaurant, Carrizozo Rotarians and their wives discussed Club business with Gov. Rohovec, focusing on the Rotary International Youth Exchange, in which the Carrizozo Rotary Club hopes to participate next year.

Statistics of Rotary's tremendous world-wide growth are impressive, but Rotary's accomplishments through the years defy expression in figures. The fellowship created, the improvement in the conduct of business and professions, the playgrounds provided, the crippled children helped, the student loans granted, the community-betterment undertakings, the increased understanding among nations the countless other achievements of Rotary Clubs, and the activities of the Rotary Foundation, all must be considered when viewing the progress of Rotary.

Rohovec spoke at the Thursday noon meeting of the Carrizozo Rotary Club on the subject of fundamentals of Rotary. He pointed out that Rotarians sometimes get so involved in club, community and international service that they forget such fundamentals of Rotary as attendance at meetings, proper classification of members, proper record keeping, fellowship among members, programs, and membership development.

The qualifications to be a Rotarian — an adult male of good character and "good business" or professional reputation who has a position in an executive capacity with discretionary authority and engaged as a proprietor, partner, corporate officer or manager of any worthwhile business or profession.

Rohovec, a retired administrator of N.M.S.U. at Alamogordo, and a member of the Alamogordo Rotary Club, was in Carrizozo as a part of his duty to visit, during his year in office, every Rotary Club in District 552, composed of 52 clubs in New Mexico and part of West Texas, including El Paso. The District Governor's yearly visit is designed to help local Rotary Clubs exchange information with the District Governor and receive assistance with any problems being experienced.

The Recreation Area cost half a million dollars to build and is worth a million dollars now, Stearns stated. It requires \$55,000 plus, a year to maintain. The town cannot handle the facility alone.

Carrizozo Town attorney Bill Payne had once before been before the commissioners, without much success, requesting that the facility be taken over by the county.

Chairman, Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight said he, "liked having it (Recreation Area) close by. You've got my support as one commissioner." He will support the idea if money becomes available.

In his request in seeking county support, Stearns said, "You just don't drive down a highway and find something like that." He sought the support of the commission for the Recreation Area for the welfare of the county, "to keep it, so people can enjoy it."

Stearns said that the facility, "is used by everybody in the county."

Commissioner John Allen Hightower said, "I haven't used it, and I live in the county."

McKnight said, "not anyone of us want to see it go down the drain". He said the commission has more requests than money. Revenue Sharing has been spent for the year. His main objection to the town's original idea of the county taking over the facility is the using of property tax money.

HEALTH HINTS!

CHIROPRACTORS: What they can and can't do for you

What is chiropractic?

Chiropractic was founded in 1895 on the theory that many human disorders are caused by "subluxations" (misalignments) of spinal vertebrae. These subluxations cause irritation to nerves which, in turn, causes various musculoskeletal and internal ailments. By making specific manual adjustments to correct subluxations, a chiropractor tries to relieve nerve irritation and to return the organs to proper function. Chiropractic is often called "drugless" medicine in that neither drugs nor surgery is used.

Chiropractors are referred to as Doctors of Chiropractic (D.C.s) (a degree conferred after completion of a minimum two-year undergraduate and a four-year graduate program in a chiropractic college that offers many of the courses given in medical schools), and are licensed in all 50 states as health-care practitioners. Last year they treated nearly 10,000,000 Americans.

The chiropractic diagnosis. Most modern chiropractors do not limit the cause of disease to subluxations, but recognize such other causes as germs, trauma, tissue degeneration, genetic, nutritional and psychological factors and environmental influences.

When a patient comes to a chiropractor, a complete physical exam is done. The D.C. uses X rays and other diagnostic tests, and does an analysis of the spine to locate subluxations.

A responsible chiropractor will refer to physicians-patients he cannot treat himself, including ones with broken bones, infectious diseases and conditions such as diabetes, pneumonia, heart disorders and cancer, which require surgery or use of drugs.

What chiropractors treat. Chiropractors deal mainly with spinal ailments involving bones, muscles and ligaments, including low-back pain, sprains, whiplash, arthritis, rheumatoid conditions and bursitis. They also treat such nerve-related ailments as neuralgia and sciatica and such internal disorders as asthma, sinusitis, headache, simple hypertension and certain functional digestive problems.

Some chiropractic services are covered under Medicare and Workmen's Compensation and are included in Medicaid, Blue Shield and other private health plans in most states. Chiropractic care is also an allowed medical deduction on income-tax returns.

"Save Our Park"

The park and recreation area located approximately one mile east of Carrizozo, N.M. in Lincoln County, New Mexico on Highway 200 may face abandonment unless some source of financing is found to keep it in operation.

The ninety acre park and recreation area consists of a nine hole golf course, rated as one of the best in New Mexico, a fishing lake which is kept stocked by the New Mexico Game & Fish Department, a playground, tennis courts lighted and lighted little league field and a large picnic area.

Built in 1972 with money supplied by the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation and matched by the Bancroft Foundation at a cost of approximately \$340,000.00, the whole park facility is enjoyed by youngsters and elders alike. The golf course registrations during July 1968 showed over 400 from Ruidoso mountains area, over 100 from Otero County, 100 from Carrizozo and numerous players from around the country who, in traveling through this section of New Mexico, discovered this beautiful oasis on Highway 200. Many travelers park their RVs overnight or several nights so that their families may enjoy the park.

The Bancroft Foundation has generously supplied the operating money each year since 1972, amounting to approximately \$75,000.00 annually, which together with the green fees from the golf course keeps the park operating in top condition. However, Carrizozo authorities have been notified that this funding will cease at the end of 1980 and the last check for operations will be received this month.

Probably valued at around one million dollars for the entire complex, it is an asset to the county and state in that it provides rest and recreation for a multitude of people, not only from within Lincoln County and other counties close by but travelers and visitors alike have found this beautiful park located in a rather isolated section of New Mexico a welcome stop-over on their journey.

Unless there is another Bancroft Foundation somewhere or other entity that would benefit tax-wise by paying up the operating money each year to save this beautiful park area or unless the state legislators, county commissioners and city councils from the town in Lincoln County are able to figure out a means whereby operating money is forthcoming, then the outlook for the park's continued existence is pretty dismal. To abandon this beautiful park and recreation area that is truly an asset to the county and state, when it is bought and paid for, would seem to be imprudent and a deprivation to thousands of people who make use of these facilities now as well as by future generations.

Perhaps it could be incorporated together with the Valley of Fires State Park, also providing overnight camping privileges and other facilities for the tourists and visitors to this area. Somehow, someday, we must not let it be abandoned.
