For Ft. Stanton, C.S.B.---

Sewer System Approved

Lieutenant Governor Roberto Mondragon, Vice-Chairman of the State Board of Finance, today announced the Board's approval of the Fort Stanton and Camp Sierra Blanca

sewer system. \$445,000 was appropriated by the 1980 New Mexico Legislature for construction of a sewer system at Fort Stanton and Camp Sierra Blanca. Plans and

specifications are complete for the lagoon type system which will be situated so as to allow the use of the effluent for agricultural purposes. All documents have been submitted to the appropriate agencies for review and approval. Approval of the board of finance came at its September 23 meeting.

In other action, the board of finance approved the construction project for a recreation building and swimming pool at the Fort Stanton hospital and training school. Both the 1979 and 1980 legislatures appropriated funds for the project which totals \$542,562.35. Plans and specifications are now complete and have been submitted to the proper agencies for review and approval. The swimming pool will be contained within a 9,112 square foot metal building which will also house male and female locker rooms, recreation room, laundry and storage, two staff offices, a whirlpool and patio. The pool will be heated by an active hot water solar system.

Carrizozo's Municipal Airport grounds will be the location of Saturday's Bike Rodeo which starts at 10:00 a.m. Bikers will meet outside the new gym at school. The Rodeo Stresses bike safety and teaches the young participants the necessary skills in operating their bicycles on public roads. The Rodeo helps the participants to become more aware of the danger and fun of bike riding.

serious or even fatal." All those who participate in the Bike Rodeo events will receive a certificate and a safe drivers license for their bike. This license is not required to operate their bikes but the program is vital to their safety.

Richardson sincerely hopes that all parents will take an interest in this program and that they will support the officers in charge.

"After all it's your responsibility to see that your youngsters receive proper instruction in bike safety and the mistakes he or she make will reflect on you as a parent," Richardson says as a final note.

The Carrizozo Bike Rodeo on October 4 is an event in cooperation with the public school, Lincoln County 4-H and Carrizozo Police Department. Town policeman Jack Richardson is heading the Rodeo.

Says Richardson, "It came to my attention as a police officer, that the young bike riders in our town had not been instructed in a recognized bike safety program in several years. The youngsters who now operate bikes on our public streets were noticeably unsafe and were causing accidents all over town."

One accident involved a bike rider and a motorcycle. The biker had pulled in front of the motorcyclist causing a collision. The biker was injured. The cyclist aided him off the street but then took off without word or name. "As you can see, both operators were at fault and did not abide by the safety rules set down by New Mexico State Laws for their protection," Richardson said.

"These accidents may seem minor, but who can say the next one that happens may involve your child or young person and may be very

Plants Seized

Carrizozo Police Department along with the assistance of Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, conducted a search on Saturday, September 27 on the residence of a local man, Freddie Padilla.

The search resulted in the seizure of the following: Four (4) pots with suspected marijuana, one (1) wheel filter, four (4) pot pipes, one (1) can baggies - contents suspected marijuana, one (1) bottle of suspected marijuana seeds, one (1) 'roach' clip, one (1) envelope with suspected marijuana.

Charges of Possession of Marijuana less than one ounce were filed on Padilla who lives on 10th Street and his sister Teresa.

The Padillas were sentenced on September 26 by magistrate judge S.M. Ortiz on charges of controlled substance, Possession Prohibited. They are to spend ten (10) days in jail and pay \$100.00 fine each.



Carrizozo Edges District Foe Mountainair 21-18

The Carrizozo Grizzlies behind their best offensive effort of the season, fought their way to a 21-18 win over district foe Mountainair Friday night.

Carrizozo broke on top early in the first quarter after linebacker Jon Aguilar recovered a Mustang fumble at the Mountainair thirty-yard line. On the second play quarterback Chris Ventura connected with split end Ralph Delgado on a seventy yard touchdown pass play with 7:17 showing on the clock. The Grizzlies made it 8-0 when kicker Larry Beltran picked up a bad snap from center and passed to Randy Hollis in the end-zone for the two-point conversion.

The host Mustangs quickly countered, however, with a twelve play drive of their own and scored with 2:48 left in the first stanza. Their try for the typing two-point conversion went for naught and the Grizzlies retained the lead at 8-6.

The second quarter saw the Grizzlies mount a scoring threat behind the running of wingback Larry Beltran and fullback Jon Aguilar. Beltran gained thirty-four yards and Aguilar twenty-six yards on the drive that finally stalled on the Mountainair twelve yard line, when a pass from Ventura on fourth down was dropped in the end zone.

The penalty plagued Grizzlies got

themselves in deep trouble in the latter part of the quarter when on three successive plays three flags were dropped on the Carrizozo offense. After a clipping penalty, a holding penalty, and an off-side penalty the Grizzlies found themselves at their own four yard line. Carrizozo gained nine yards on the next three plays and finally punted out of trouble on fourth down. First half came to an end with Carrizozo holding on to their 8-6 lead.

Carrizozo rode the passing arm of quarterback Chris Ventura in the second quarter for their second score, with a second and eleven situation on the Mustang forty-three yard line Ventura connected with tightend Steven Payne on a thirty-one yard pass play that carried to the Mountainair twelve yard line. Fullback Matt Ferguson bulled into the end zone after a ten yard run by Larry Beltran set the Grizzlies up at the Mountainair one yard line. Kick for P.A.T. was wide. Grizzlies 14 - Mountainair 6, 2:08 left in the third quarter; with the fireworks still to come in an action packed fourth quarter.

Mountainair got things going by scoring early in the fourth quarter with 10:30 remaining, on a long run by their fleet footed quarterback, who ran it in from about thirty-five yards on a keeper. But the Grizzlies again

failed their attempt to tie the score by stopping their big fullback short of the goal line on the P.A.T. try. Score remained 14-12.

The ensuing kickoff saw the Grizzlies starting at their own seventeen yard line, but two consecutive clipping penalties put them back at their own four yard line.

Quarter back Ventura then righted things for the Grizzlies by scrambling forty-eight yards to the Mustang forty-eight yard line. After a couple of running plays Ventura hooked up with Beltran on a twenty-six yard pass play down to the Mustang nineteen.

After driving to about the six-inch line the Grizzlies called on fullback Matt Ferguson, who fumbled into the end zone on third-and-goal, but tightend Steven Payne recovered in the end zone for the touchdown. Larry Beltran then booted the ball through the uprights for the conversion and the Grizzlies were up by nine, 21-12.

Mountainair managed to score again with :49 left in the game, but it was not enough to overcome the Grizzly nine point lead. The two point conversion failed for the third consecutive time. Score 21-18. Carrizozo took possession of the ball at the Mountainair forty-nine after an on-side kick was unsuccessful and managed to run out the clock. The

win vaulted the Grizzlies into a tie with the Capitan Tigers, who were idle last week, atop the District 1A race with identical 1-0 district records.

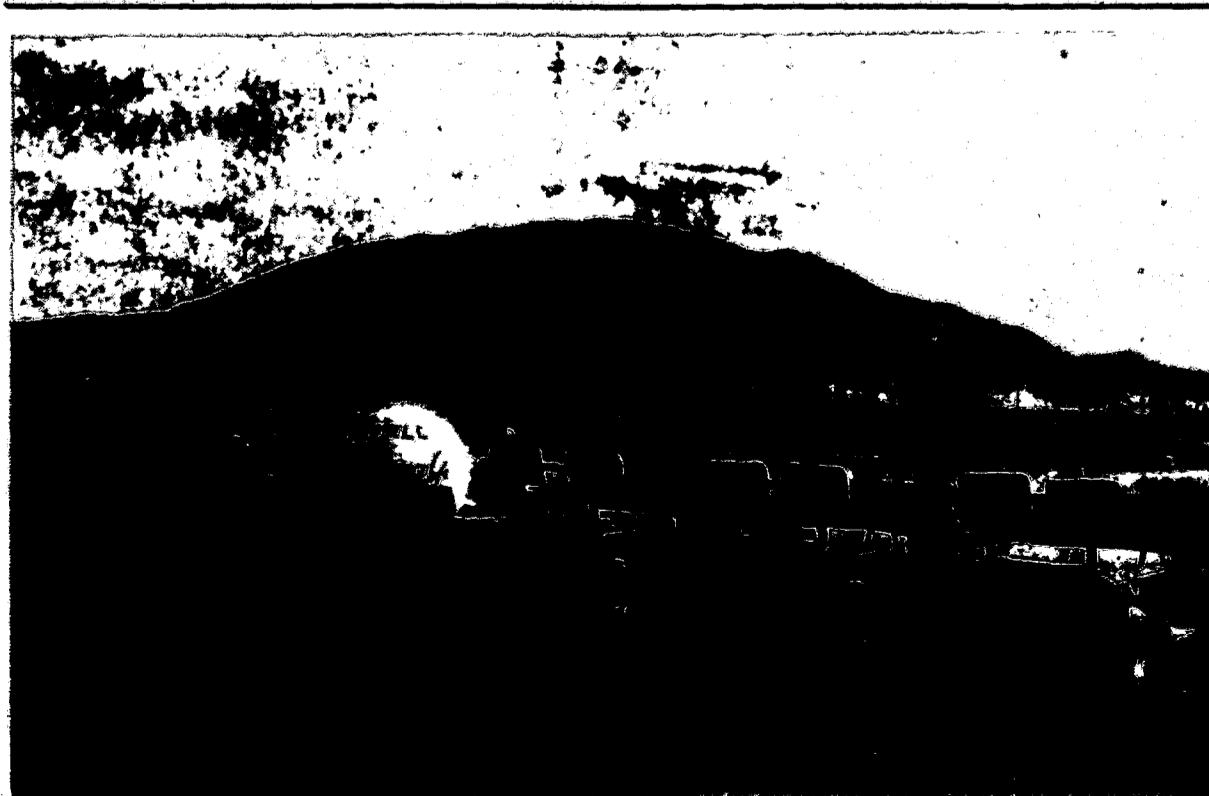
