The Carrizozo PTA will host a Candidate Forum in the school cafeteria on Monday, October 27 from 7 to 9 p.m. The occasion will be a non-partisan event open to all candidates for political office and will be an opportunity for all members of the community to meet and talk with these candidates. There will be no planned speeches or presentations, and the public is encouraged to come and stay as long as is necessary to view these citizens seeking public office. Refreshments will be served. This event is being hosted by the Carrizozo PTA as part of its on-going program of school-community service.

Lincoln County Democratic headquarters will open at 10:00 a.m. Saturday October 18, 1980. The location is Woodridge Real Estate - at the Y on highway 70 across from Gibsons in Ruidoso.

The candidates will be there and refreshments will be served all day. Everyone is invited.

On election night, Nov. 4, 1980, there will be an election watch night at the headquarters. An election scoreboard with county, state and national results. The public is invited.

Nurse Practitioner and Doctor Join Dentist at Carrizozo Health Center

Carrizozo Health Center is once again busy with activity - people helping people to get well or stay healthy. Medical care for this area is now being provided by a family nurse practitioner, Rosemary Zink and Michael O. Stone, Ph.D., M.D. of Ruidoso. They join Dr. Dale Goad, dentist and Cheri Goad, his dental assistant.

The Goads and Mary Hernandez, Center receptionist is all that remained last June when Dr. Craig Nelson, a National Health Service Corps physician completed his one-year contract and moved on.

Stone, a practicing physician in Ruidoso for the past three years has office hours at Carrizozo Health Center on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon. Zink, under the supervision of Stone, will be based in Carrizozo full time. She, like the dental staff, will also be serving the Corona clinic one day a week on Tuesday.

Zink has been employed with Project Hope in Nicaragua, Columbia, Ceylon, Brazil, Guatemala and Jamaica. Community health and education with Project Hope has also located Zink in the state of Arizona. For three years she headed the nursing department in the pediatric section of the S-S Hope, working in South America countries.

Originally of Pennsylvania, Zink holds a bachelor's degree in nursing from Gwynedd - Mercy College in Pennsylvania, and a masters in public health from Tulane University in New Orleans, Louisiana.

Stone, whose Ruidoso practice is located at 119 El Paso Road, has lived in New Mexico off and on for 15 years. He attended UNM Medical School just before his residency, after finishing a two-year post doctoral research fellowship for the American Cancer Society. He holds a Ph.D. in biochemistry from Tulane University where he taught Physical and organic chemistry.

He moved to Lincoln County after completing a three-year residency in family practice in Virginia. Stone's business manager is his wife, Guindal. They are the parents of two - Pamela, a junior at Ruidoso High School and Allyn, a 7th grader at White Mountain Mid School.

The Stones arrived early this past Tuesday at Carrizozo Health Center, along with E. Susan Mallis, R.N., Stone's Ruidoso office nurse, to begin holding office hours. His office receptionist, Oretta Nichols was unable to come this week from Ruidoso, so Mrs. Stone filled in for her, Mallis and Nichols will accompany Stone in his weekly two-day practice in Carrizozo.

Stone, certified by the American Board of Family Practice, is also a clinical associate with UNM's School of Medicine preceptor program which sponsors 'Primary Care Curriculum' funded by the Kellogg Foundation. Medical students in Primary Care

Curriculum are under participating physicians for five months. This allows students to get a better idea of family medicine, especially in rural areas.

Boyd Manges, second year UNM Medical School student accompanied Stone to Carrizozo this past Tuesday, along with his Ruidoso staff. Tuesday was also the day that the director of Primary Care Curriculum, Scott Obeshain of Albuquerque was in Carrizozo where he visited with Manges and Stone to discuss their work. Obeshain, Medical Education Assistant Dean Undergraduate, said that Primary Care Curriculum is a separate track of medical schooling at UNM.

Primary Care Curriculum originated with Manges second year medical class with 10 students in the program around the state, including one in Capitan under Dr. David Rouleau. There is also a second class of 15 Primary Care Curriculum students throughout the state who are in their first year of medical study.

The primary concern of Kellogg Foundation is health, education and rural areas according to Obeshain, Primary Care Curriculum is a new concept, unique to New Mexico, Obeshain added.

Carrizozo Health Center, which is a satellite of St. Joseph Hospital of Albuquerque, had been without medical service for the last four months. St. Joseph Hospital, and the Carrizozo Health Center Advisory Board were instrumental in securing the services of Zink and Stone. The medical staff will be funded in part by the county's current mill levy. Expansion of the service may be possible if a new mill levy is approved by county voters in November.

Carrizozo Health Center Advisory Board members are Eileen Lindamood, Reverend David Lynch, Father David Berge, Truman Billingsley, Mary Rich, Jack Magee and Bettye Dean all of Carrizozo; John Allen Hightower of Ancho; Kathy Williams and Geraldine Perkins both of Corona. Board member Joan Means of Carrizozo is chairperson of the advisory group.

At Monthly Meeting---

Bookmobile Okayed

Lincoln County Commissioners Thomas P. McKnight, Ben Hall and John A. Hightower at their meeting last week approved the annual contract with the New Mexico State Library for bookmobile service to the county.

Chairman McKnight moved to approve the contract, which states that the County will provide the New Mexico State Library the sum of \$1,400. The contract in considered the Library's sale and final billing. The money goes into a fund for the purpose of purchasing materials for the library service.

The library is to keep the county informed of its schedules and activities. At the end of the fiscal year, the library is to report on the materials acquired and the services performed.

The commissioners approved the low bid at \$19,036 for worker's compensation insurance with Goodell, Reed, & Glass Inc. of Roswell.

County manager Truman A. Billingsley said that last year's insurance cost \$15,000 with Pertec, Parks and Associates Inc. The reason for the increase is that one of the Road Department employees is still collecting and one of the Sheriff's Deputies was killed.

The used backhoe bid was awarded to Border Machinery Co. of El Paso for the low bid of \$9,950.

The Backhoe will aid road department employees in cleaning cattle guards. Guy Henley, Road Superintendent said that at present time it takes three men with picks and shovels to clean them out.

Because of the unfavorable results from a previous policy, where landowners were in charge of cattle guard cleaning, the commissioners agreed that the county would now maintain the county's cattle guards.

The commission moved to change the cattle guard policy and to start cleaning the cattle guards on the main traveled roads and all the rest when the road department can find time.

Henley, told the commission that he has some junk iron that he could trade for usable railroad rail for cattle guards. The commission agreed that it would be alright for him to trade.

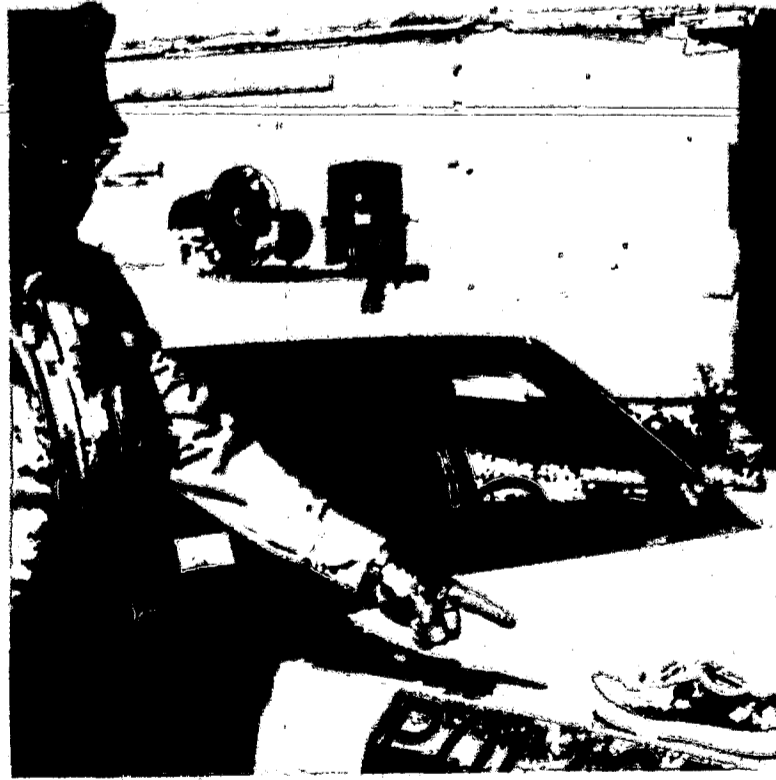
Devil Bill Adams of Capitan has completed a 20 hour refresher course for EMTs. McKnight asked if anyone is qualified to start an I.V. Billingsley replied that there is someone in Corona, someone in Carrizozo and two in Capitan. The problem is finding a course and finding a doctor that will back them and add them on to his insurance.

The ambulance service, budgeted according to last years operation has spent more money than expected because of additional use and over due maintenance. Collections have only totalled \$5,366 since the 1st of July.

The commissioners tabled indefinitely the Arabella Livestock Association request of an electric fence for predator control. The request required \$4,000 for labor.

POLICE REPORT

Central Package Liquor Store owner, Albert Hernandez, Sr. with his expertise in tracking wildlife aided town police in the search for the subject who broke into his business October 7. The subject was eventually arrested and charged with larceny over \$100.00 and burglary.

Footprints from a sneaker (tennis shoe) found around the entrance and exit sites of the offense lead to the solving of the theft which occurred between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and midnight on October 7.

A metal object was used to rip off the lock in the vacant apartment connected to the package store, where entry was gained to the premises. An area in the apartment leading into the business's beer storage was damaged in an unsuccessful attempt to get into the liquor area.

A hole was then made on the sealed door that once lead from the apartment into the store. The subject crawled through the entry hacked out.

Stolen goods were taken out from the store through the drive-up window.

The theft was discovered early October 8 when the beer cooler and the drive-up window were found open by Mrs. Albert Hernandez, Sr. Town patrolman Dave Wheeler responded to the call.

\$181.00 worth of merchandise consisting of Miller beer and cigarettes and \$300.00 worth of damages to building were totalled. Finger prints were found where the subject ripped off materials to reach the store. Chief of police C.A. Morales sent print copies to the state lab for comparison.

James Clinton Renny 23, was arrested Wednesday, October 8 at 4:00 p.m. in connection with the offense. He was arraigned before Judge S.M. Ortiz on October 9. Bond was set at \$2,500. Renny was bound over to District Court and remains in the county jail.

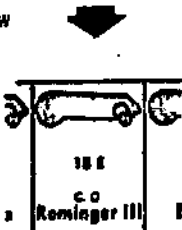

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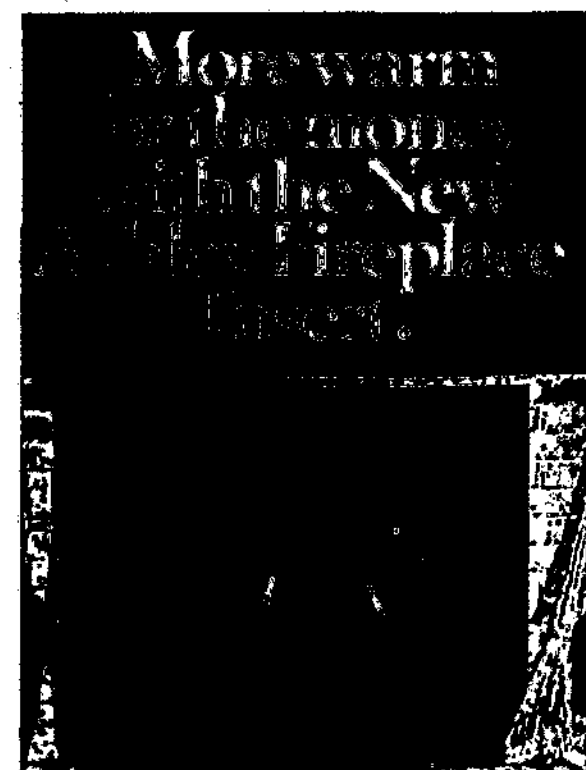

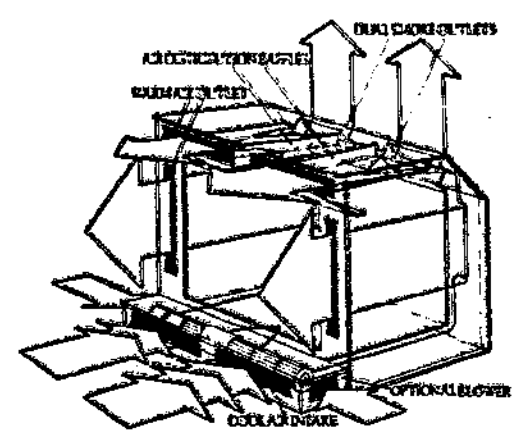

ALAMOGORDO, NM - The Lincoln National Forest's fall color show will be the main attraction for Forest visitors this weekend, with aspens and maples the featured attraction.

Scenic drives and hikes have been recommended by ranger district recreation personnel.

On the Smokey Bear District, take a scenic drive up State Highway 532, the ski area road. Fall colors should peak within a few days. Aspens, maples and oaks are plentiful in this area.

The District reports Three Rivers Campground and Cedar Creek Picnic Area are the only two facilities remaining open. They are receiving light use. Bonito Lake is full and fishing pressure is light. Streams are running normal, and all roads are open. Trails are in good condition and fuelwood areas are open.

On the Cloudcroft District, visit Bailey Canyon. To get there, go west from Cloudcroft on U.S. Highway 82 about a mile and one-half, turn right onto Forest Road 206. The access from Highway 82 is steep and not suited to low clearance vehicles or those pulling trailers. The public is reminded that Bailey Canyon is within an off-road-vehicle restricted area. The canyon has many undeveloped camping and picnic areas, with pine trees, aspens and oaks.

By turning west on Forest Road 162, you may enter upper La Luz Canyon, which also has many good undeveloped camping sites and picnic areas. There is no water, though, and whatever you pack in, please pack out.

The District reports Saddle, Apache and Upper Sleepy Grass Campgrounds closed for the season. Silver, Pines and Deedhead are open, though, and receiving moderate use.

The annual High Rolls Apple Festival will be this weekend, featuring homemade apple pie and apple cider. Roads on the district are in good condition and dry, but construction work is still in progress on State Highway 24 south of Cloudcroft.

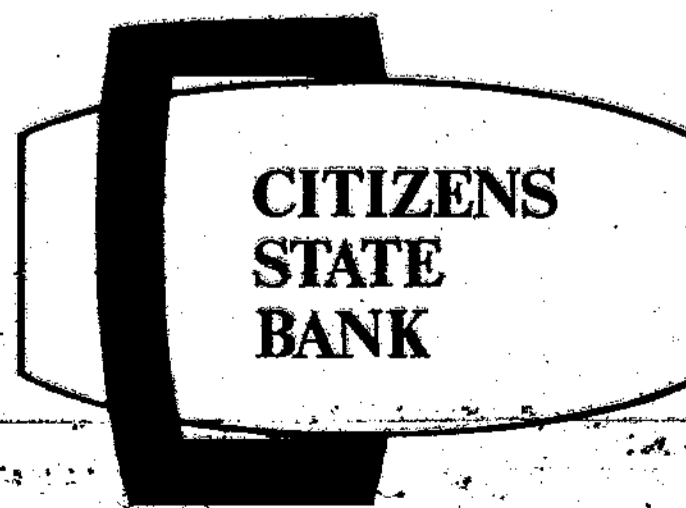

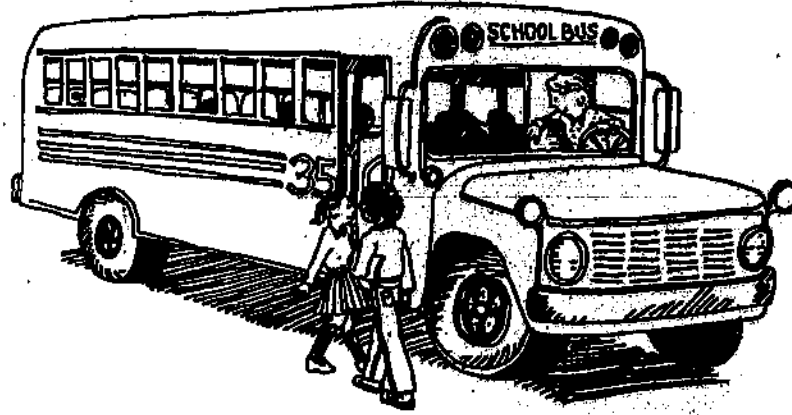

School Bus Safety Week



October 12-18

The week of October 12-18, 1980 has been proclaimed School Bus Safety Week in New Mexico.

According to Captain J.E. Sylling Jr., State Police District Commander, Governor King, in signing the proclamation, urged all "citizens to exercise constant courtesy and caution" when in the vicinity of a school bus to protect our children.

"In New Mexico, over 125,000 students are transported to and from school each school day in approximately 2,000 school buses. These buses travel over 24.5 million miles each year," said Captain Sylling.

School buses have established an outstanding safety record, but are not immune from accidents. Statistics show that most school bus accidents occur while the bus is loading or unloading students. Many of these accidents are caused by motorists who do not obey the school bus stop law.

flashing red lights are required by law to stop at least 10 feet from the school bus."

"Drivers in New Mexico should also be aware that the penalty for violating this law will not only result in a fine, but will cost the motorist six (6) points against their driving record," said Captain Sylling.

Captain Sylling explained that many motorists evidently are not familiar with the school bus loading and unloading law. "In New Mexico," said Captain Sylling, "we use an 8-lamp school bus light system." He went on to explain how the system works. "As a school bus approaches a loading or unloading area, alternately flashing yellow lights will be displayed at the top of the bus. As in other traffic situations, the flashing yellow lights are a warning to motorists of a potential hazard. When a school bus is stopped to load or unload students, alternately flashing red lights will be displayed. Again, as in other traffic situations, red flashing lights mean stop. Motorists approaching a school bus displaying the

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 1 A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 10, SECTION 7 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PROVIDE FOR FIVE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS IN CERTAIN CLASS B COUNTIES.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 10, Section 7 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"A. In those counties having a population of more than one hundred thousand, as shown by the most recent decennial census, and having a fiscal full assessed valuation in excess of seventy-five million dollars (\$75,000,000), the elected board of county commissioners shall consist of five members. The county shall be divided into five county commission districts which shall be compact, contiguous and as nearly equal in population as practicable. One county commissioner shall reside within and be elected from each of the five county commission districts. Change of residence to a place outside the district from which a county commissioner was elected shall automatically terminate the service of that commissioner and the office shall be declared vacant.

County commissioners serving on five-member boards of county commissioners pursuant to this section shall serve terms of four years, and after having served two consecutive terms, shall be ineligible to hold any county office for four years thereafter.

Provided, that in the first general election immediately following the adoption of this amendment, two county commissioners shall each be elected for a term of two years, two county commissioners shall each be elected for a term of four years and one county commissioner shall be elected for a term of four years, thereafter, each county commissioner shall be elected for a term of four years.

B. In those counties having a population of less than one hundred thousand but more than sixty-five thousand, as shown by the 1970 decennial census, and a fiscal full assessed valuation in excess of two hundred million dollars (\$200,000,000) but less than four hundred fifty million dollars (\$450,000,000), according to final assessed valuation for 1978 certified by the property tax divisions of the taxation and revenue department, the elected board of county commissioners may consist of five members, if a majority of the voters in the county voting thereon, according to the procedure established by law, approve the creation of a five-member board. Upon the creation of a five-member board, the county shall be divided by the incumbent board of county commissioners into five county commission districts which shall be compact, contiguous and as nearly equal in population as practicable. One county commissioner shall reside within and be elected from each county commission district. Change of residence to a place outside the district from which a county commissioner was elected shall automatically terminate the service of that commissioner and the office shall be declared vacant.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 2 A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 12 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO BY ADDING A NEW SECTION 15 TO PERMIT CERTAIN LARGE SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO HAVE SEVEN SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS ELECTED BY DISTRICTS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12 of the constitution of New Mexico by adding a new Section 15 to read:

"In those local school districts having a population of more than one hundred thousand, as shown by the most recent decennial census, the qualified electors of the district may choose to have a local school board composed of seven members, residents of and elected from single member districts.

If a majority of the qualified electors voting in the district election vote to have a seven-member board, the school district shall be divided into seven local school board member districts which shall be compact, contiguous and as nearly equal in population as possible. One school board member shall reside within and be elected from each local school board member district. Change

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 3 A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 2, SECTION 11 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO LIMIT THE RIGHT TO BAIL IN CERTAIN CIRCUMSTANCES.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 2, Section 11 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"All persons shall be bailable by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses when the proof is evident or the presumption great and in instances in which bail is specifically prohibited by this section. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted.

Bail may be denied by the district court for a period of sixty days after the incarceration of the defendant by an order entered within seven days after the incarceration, in the following instances:

A. the defendant is accused of a felony and has previously been convicted of two or more felonies, within the state, which felonies did not arise from the same transaction or a common transaction with the case at bar;

B. the defendant is accused of a felony involving the use of a deadly weapon and has a prior felony conviction, within the state. The period of incarceration without bail may be extended by any period of time by which trial is delayed by the defendant. An appeal from an order denying bail shall be given preference over all other matters."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 4 A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 5, SECTION 1 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW STATE EXECUTIVE OFFICERS TO SERVE TWO CONSECUTIVE FOUR-YEAR TERMS IN A STATE OFFICE, EXCLUDING INCUMBENTS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 5, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state auditor, state treasurer, attorney general and commissioner of public lands, who shall, unless otherwise provided in the constitution of New Mexico, be elected for terms of four years beginning on the first day of January next after their election. The governor and lieutenant governor shall be elected jointly by the casting by each voter of a single vote applicable to both offices.

Such officers shall, after having served two consecutive terms in a state office, be ineligible to hold any state office until one year has elapsed except that the lieutenant governor may be eligible to hold the office of the governor.

The officers of the executive department, except the lieutenant governor, shall during their terms of office, reside and keep the public records, books, papers and seals of office at the seat of government.

Upon the adoption of this amendment by the people, the terms provided for in this section shall apply to those officers elected at the general election in 1982 and all state executive officers elected thereafter."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 5 A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 2, SECTION 11 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO CHANGE THE REQUIRED NUMBER OF SIGNATURES NEEDED TO PETITION TO REQUIRE THE CONVENTION OF A GRAND JURY.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 2, Section 11 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"No person shall be held to answer for a capital, felony or infamous crime unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury or information filed by a district attorney or county clerk or other officer authorized by law to file such charges when in actual service in time of war or public danger. No person shall be so held on information without having had a preliminary examination before an examining magistrate, or having waived such preliminary examination.

A grand jury shall be composed of six members, not less than twelve, as may be prescribed by law. Citizens only, residing in the county for which a grand jury may be convened and qualified as jurors by law, may serve on a grand jury. Consensus necessary for the filing of an indictment by a grand jury shall be prescribed by law. Provided, that each commissioner shall be eligible to hold any county office for four years thereafter.

Provided, that in the first general election immediately following the adoption of this amendment, five county commissioners shall each be elected for a term of two years, two county commissioners shall each be elected for a term of four years and one county commissioner shall be elected for a term of four years, thereafter, each county commissioner shall be elected for a term of four years.

B. In those counties having a population of less than one hundred thousand but more than sixty-five thousand, as shown by the 1970 decennial census, and a fiscal full assessed valuation in excess of two hundred million dollars (\$200,000,000) but less than four hundred fifty million dollars (\$450,000,000), according to final assessed valuation for 1978 certified by the property tax divisions of the taxation and revenue department, the elected board of county commissioners may consist of five members, if a majority of the voters in the county voting thereon, according to the procedure established by law, approve the creation of a five-member board. CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 6 A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 4, SECTION 10 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO INCREASE THE REIMBURSEMENT OF LEGISLATORS FOR EXPENSES INCURRED IN PERFORMING THEIR DUTIES.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 4, Section 10 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Each member of the legislature shall receive: A. as per diem expense the sum of not more than sixty dollars (\$60) for each day's attendance during each session, as provided by law, and twenty cents (\$.20) for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of government by the usual traveled route, once each session as defined by Article 4, Section 5 of this constitution.

B. per diem expense and mileage at the same rates as provided in Subsection A for service at meetings required by legislative committees established by the legislature to meet in the interim between sessions; and

C. no other compensation, perquisite or allowance.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 7 A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 10, SECTION 7 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PROVIDE FOR FIVE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS IN CERTAIN CLASS B COUNTIES.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 10, Section 7 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"A. In those counties having a population of more than one hundred thousand, as shown by the most recent decennial census, and having a fiscal full assessed valuation in excess of seventy-five million dollars (\$75,000,000), the elected board of county commissioners shall consist of five members. The county shall be divided into five county commission districts which shall be compact, contiguous and as nearly equal in population as practicable. Change of residence to a place outside the district from which a county commissioner was elected shall automatically terminate the service of that commissioner and the office shall be declared vacant.

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12 of the constitution of New Mexico by adding a new Section 15 to read:

"In those local school districts having a population of more than one hundred thousand, as shown by the most recent decennial census, the qualified electors of the district may choose to have a local school board composed of seven members, residents of and elected from single member districts.

If a majority of the qualified electors voting in such a district election vote to have a seven-member board, the school district shall be divided into seven local school board member districts which shall be compact, contiguous and as nearly equal in population as possible. One school board member shall reside within and be elected from each local school board member district. Change

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 9 A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 14 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO CHANGE THE REQUIRED NUMBER OF SIGNATURES NEEDED TO PETITION TO REQUIRE THE CONVENTION OF A GRAND JURY.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 14, Section 14 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"No person shall be held to answer for a capital, felony or infamous crime unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury or information filed by a district attorney or county clerk or other officer authorized by law to file such charges when in actual service in time of war or public danger. No person shall be so held on information without having had a preliminary examination before an examining magistrate, or having waived such preliminary examination.

A grand jury shall be composed of six members, not less than twelve, as may be prescribed by law. Citizens only, residing in the county for which a grand jury may be convened and qualified as jurors by law, may serve on a grand jury. Consensus necessary for the filing of an indictment by a grand jury shall be prescribed by law. Provided, that each commissioner shall be eligible to hold any county office for four years thereafter.

Provided, that in the first general election immediately following the adoption of this amendment, five county commissioners shall each be elected for a term of two years, two county commissioners shall each be elected for a term of four years and one county commissioner shall be elected for a term of four years, thereafter, each county commissioner shall be elected for a term of four years.

B. In those counties having a population of less than one hundred thousand but more than sixty-five thousand, as shown by the 1970 decennial census, and a fiscal full assessed valuation in excess of two hundred million dollars (\$200,000,000) but less than four hundred fifty million dollars (\$450,000,000), according to final assessed valuation for 1978 certified by the property tax divisions of the taxation and revenue department, the elected board of county commissioners may consist of five members, if a majority of the voters in the county voting thereon, according to the procedure established by law, approve the creation of a five-member board. Upon the creation of a five-member board, the county shall be divided by the incumbent board of county commissioners into five county commission districts which shall be compact, contiguous and as nearly equal in population as practicable. One county commissioner shall reside within and be elected from each county commission district. Change of residence to a place outside the district from which a county commissioner was elected shall automatically terminate the service of that commissioner and the office shall be declared vacant.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 10 A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 5, SECTION 1 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW STATE EXECUTIVE OFFICERS TO SERVE TWO CONSECUTIVE FOUR-YEAR TERMS IN A STATE OFFICE, EXCLUDING INCUMBENTS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 5, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state auditor, state treasurer, attorney general and commissioner of public lands, who shall, unless otherwise provided in the constitution of New Mexico, be elected for terms of four years beginning on the first day of January next after their election. The governor and lieutenant governor shall be elected jointly by the casting by each voter of a single vote applicable to both offices.

Such officers shall, after having served two consecutive terms in a state office, be ineligible to hold any state office until one year has elapsed except that the lieutenant governor may be eligible to hold the office of the governor.

The officers of the executive department, except the lieutenant governor, shall during their terms of office, reside and keep the public records, books, papers and seals of office at the seat of government.

Upon the adoption of this amendment by the people, the terms provided for in this section shall apply to those officers elected at the general election in 1982 and all state executive officers elected thereafter."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 11 A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 14 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO CHANGE THE REQUIRED NUMBER OF SIGNATURES NEEDED TO PETITION TO REQUIRE THE CONVENTION OF A GRAND JURY.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 14, Section 14 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"No person shall be held to answer for a capital, felony or infamous crime unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury or information filed by a district attorney or county clerk or other officer authorized by law to file such charges when in actual service in time of war or public danger. No person shall be so held on information without having had a preliminary examination before an examining magistrate, or having waived such preliminary examination.

A grand jury shall be composed of six members, not less than twelve, as may be prescribed by law. Citizens only, residing in the county for which a grand jury may be convened and qualified as jurors by law, may serve on a grand jury. Consensus necessary for the filing of an indictment by a grand jury shall be prescribed by law. Provided, that each commissioner shall be eligible to hold any county office for four years thereafter.

Provided, that in the first general election immediately following the adoption of this amendment, five county commissioners shall each be elected for a term of two years, two county commissioners shall each be elected for a term of four years and one county commissioner shall be elected for a term of four years, thereafter, each county commissioner shall be elected for a term of four years.

B. In those counties having a population of less than one hundred thousand but more than sixty-five thousand, as shown by the 1970 decennial census, and a fiscal full assessed valuation in excess of two hundred million dollars (\$200,000,000) but less than four hundred fifty million dollars (\$450,000,000), according to final assessed valuation for 1978 certified by the property tax divisions of the taxation and revenue department, the elected board of county commissioners may consist of five members, if a majority of the voters in the county voting thereon, according to the procedure established by law, approve the creation of a five-member board. Upon the creation of a five-member board, the county shall be divided by the incumbent board of county commissioners into five county commission districts which shall be compact, contiguous and as nearly equal in population as practicable. One county commissioner shall reside within and be elected from each county commission district. Change of residence to a place outside the district from which a county commissioner was elected shall automatically terminate the service of that commissioner and the office shall be declared vacant.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 12 A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 4, SECTION 10 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO INCREASE THE REIMBURSEMENT OF LEGISLATORS FOR EXPENSES INCURRED IN PERFORMING THEIR DUTIES.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 4, Section 10 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Each member of the legislature shall receive: A. as per diem expense the sum of not more than sixty dollars (\$60) for each day's attendance during each session, as provided by law, and twenty cents (\$.20) for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of government by the usual traveled route, once each session as defined by Article 4, Section 5 of this constitution.

B. per diem expense and mileage at the same rates as provided in Subsection A for service at meetings required by legislative committees established by the legislature to meet in the interim between sessions; and

C. no other compensation, perquisite or allowance.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.
