## News Briefs...

A new addition to the Carrizozo Mid-School and High School program has been the recent acquisition of a TRS-80 Micro-computer. Within days after the District purchased the equipment for use in the Math and Science programs, Mrs. Donna Clark, daughter of Mrs. Doris Maxwell, donated another TRS-80 to the schools, primarily for use in the District's Special Education "gifted" program. Students have already been busy learning to program the two computers, as well as doing arithmetic, algebra, reading and spelling under the direction primarily of Dr. Robert Shanitz, High School Math instructor. Other uses for this equipment are envisioned for the vocational programs, as well as in scheduling and other areas of student instruction.

District Attorney Steve Sanders informed the NEWS Tuesday that he strongly endorses Constitutional Amendment No. 3. The amendment proposed will be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection in Tuesday's General Election.

A brief analysis of Constitutional Amendment No. 3 would: Permit a District Court to DENY bail for a period of 60 days after the incarceration of a defendant if the accused defendant has a past record of conviction for two or more felonies or for one felony and is accused of a felony involving the use of a deadly weapon.

The sixty-day period may be extended for any period of time by which the trial is delayed because of a motion for continuance made on behalf of the defendant. An appeal from the order denying bail is given preference over all other matters.

Sister Gail Stackpole and Mr. Wally Ferguson will be representing the Carrizozo Schools at the District School Board meeting in Alamogordo Thursday, October 30. Comprised of school districts throughout southern New Mexico, the District holds two meetings a year. Carrizozo will be putting in a bid for the Spring 1981 meeting, hoping to host the get-together, first in Carrizozo in many years.

Lieutenant Governor Roberto Mondragon, vice-chairman of the State Board of Finance today announced the Board's unanimous approval of an emergency loan in the amount of \$90,570.40 to the village of Ruidoso Downs. The short-term loan was made to enable the village to clear its liability to the Burns Construction Company for construction of a flood damaged bridge. Testifying on behalf of the loan request, Mr. Bill Reeves of the State Planning Division explained that the Village of Ruidoso Downs is awaiting receipt of Federal Disaster Funds to pay burns construction company. A delay in receipt of the total funds due to a computer error on the federal level has prevented the village from meeting its deadline for payment to the contractor. Burns construction company has filed suit against the Village of Ruidoso for the balance due plus interest and attorney's fees. The Board of Finance loan will enable the village to make immediate payment to the contractor and avoid further legal cost and proceeding. The loan will be repaid in full as soon as federal funds are received. Action of the board of finance came at its October 21 meeting in Santa Fe.

### At Town Planning Session--

## Local Community Problems Pinpointed

A number of concluding comments have been made by a number of the 35 different citizens who were in attendance during the two day meeting. It appeared that communication between various individuals and groups in town may have opened to the point where progress toward mutual problems can be made. A general feeling that immediate action must be taken on some of the Town's most pressing problems, including community appearance and lack of positive community attitudes was brought forth.

A positive outcome of the planning sessions was the pinpointing of four specific problems which will be addressed immediately by four work groups named during the event. One problem scheduled for immediate attention is the lack of some types of skilled tradesmen, for which services local citizens have to go out of town to purchase. A Chamber of Commerce effort is slated to begin soon in recruitment of additional skilled tradesmen.

A follow-up meeting is scheduled for January to examine progress toward objectives developed this past week, and to do additional short and long term planning. Additional information for interested citizens who were unable to attend the October 23 and 24 meetings is available through the Chamber of Commerce and the County Extension Service.

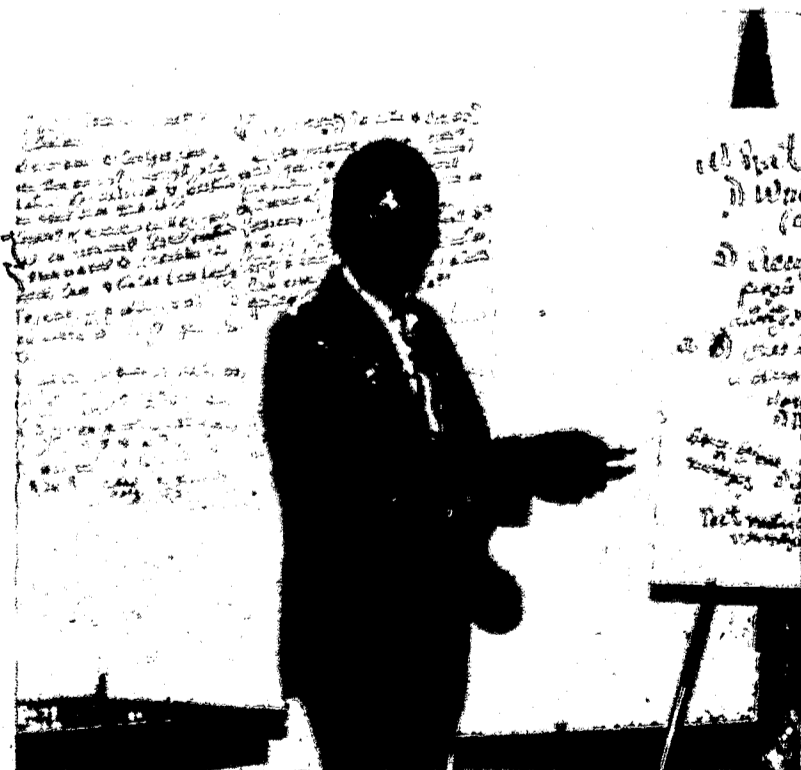
The Carrizozo Recreation Center was the site for Carrizozo's economic planning sessions held October 23 and 24 sponsored by the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce. A group of 27 community leaders representing local business industry, public agencies, the Town Council, the schools, civic groups and other inter-

ested citizens, joined staff members of the NMSU Cooperative Extension Service and the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce in the two-day session.

The meeting had among its purposes the identification of local community problems hindering economic development. Following the

identification of problems - 75 were identified in all - an extensive action planning session developing goals, objectives, and means to achieve objectives was held.

The sessions, with the best attendance at the gathering of its kind in years, ended Friday morning with a note of enthusiastic optimism. While eight major problems areas were focused on, the problems didn't seem unsurmountable to the group. As Dr.

Bob Coppedge, NMSU Community Development Director, noted, any of these problems are capable of resolution if people want badly enough to put in the effort to solve them.

Aiding Coppedge was Mr. Hubert Quintana representing the Southeastern New Mexico Development District. During his Friday morning presentation, Quintana brought to the groups attention a variety of funding sources available to assist in the solution of numerous community problems.

Town Councilman, Mr. Roy Harmon brought out during Friday's session the new unit housing projects slated for Carrizozo later this year. Town attorney Bill Payne has been very active in bringing this need housing and is currently looking into fund applications available for existing housing rehabilitation.

### James J. Weldon Write-In for D.A.

James J. Weldon, public defender, of Alamogordo said he would be taking a leave of absence from his job with the state in order to conduct a write-in campaign for the position of district attorney. "After talking to a number of people and after weighing the difficulties that are involved in a write-in campaign," he said, "I have decided that I will allow my name to be proposed to the voters as a write-in candidate." Weldon will be opposing the incumbent DA Steve Sanders.

## Board Commends American Legion

The board of education at their October 21 regular meeting reviewed and adopted new personnel policy. The question arose about married students and pregnant unmarried students. Board members shared their views on the subject. Under 'Code of Ethics of the Education Profession', Commitment to the student - "In fulfillment of the obligation to the student, the educator - (8) Shall not on the basis of race, color, creed, sex, national origin, marital status, political or religious beliefs, family, social or

cultural background, or sexual orientation unfairly; (a) Exclude any student from participation in any program. (b) Deny benefits to any students. (c) Grant any advantage to any student." Other areas of discussion were: notification of employment status; tenure; leaves and absences; and personnel record keeping. Grievance procedure and staff evaluation are clearly defined in the personnel policy. A school policy revision committee has been going over the Board Policy

Manual since September 1979. Gail Stackpole is the board representative; Superintendent Dr. Jim Miller, Jr. represents the administration and faculty representation is Jim Florian and Jane Erwin. Mike Gaines has joined the faculty in the committee. They will continue their work on all sections of the manual and present before the board for review and adoption. The annual Chamber drive continues through the month of November. The two captains and their teams will elicit membership from business people as well as individuals. Betty's team: Dale and Cherri Goad, Bill and Mary Ellen Payne, Choncho Morales, Mary Lou Nickels, Jack Magee, Sister Jan Gebel and Rene Burton. Ruth's team: Pat and Jackie Vigil, Carolyn and Jim Cantrell, Scott Shafer, Carlyn Ladd, Viola Fenter, Charlotte Ridgely and Fr. Dave Bergs.

The two team captains have a contest going as to what team brings in the most memberships. Betty (Fields Accounting) and Ruth (Muselina, Inc, Realty), both civic-minded business women have a December 2 deadline, when a winning team will be revealed. The losers will host a special dinner for the winners.

A chamber of commerce is an association of business 'people' and individuals who promote the interests of its members and of business in general. Chambers of commerce work to bring new industry to their communities. They also furnish information about their communities that may help those planning to move into their area.

Carrizozo's Chamber of Commerce is located at 404 South Central Avenue in the building that once housed the town hall, next to the fire department. Mary Rich Real Estate and Taeria Foundation are also found in the Chamber location. The former town hall and adjoining buildings were all renovated and made into attractive additions to the community.

Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce has been active locally in many projects throughout the recent years.

Some of the activity prior to 1980 that the Chamber has sponsored has included a Belco Industries anniversary luncheon, flower barrels, Carrizozo brochures, beautification drive and town clean-up, Chamber banquet and Country Club dance, teachers' reception, industrial development and western rural development workshops.

During the same period of time the Chamber co-sponsored the People's Market Place, Carrizozo's Zoning and Town-plan, desalination program, grant for swimming pool solar heating, Aspacade events - golf tournament and White Oaks picnic, Carrizozo Health Center and Sun Duchess.

More recent Chamber activities (1979-80) have included heading the second annual People's Market Place in conjunction with Santa Rita's Catholic Church Fiesta. Other projects undertaken by the Chamber were an industrial development credit course seminar, Town clean-up teachers' reception and Corona parade float.

The Chamber co-sponsored the appointment of two Industrial Development Committee members to the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission. (The Industrial Development Committee is a branch of the Chamber). 1980's Sun Duchess was also co-sponsored by the Chamber.

The Lincoln County Ranch Tour which the Chamber co-sponsored this summer is still very fresh in the minds of members who assisted other organizations in the all-day and into the evening project. Dust, barn smells, sunburn and bumpy country roads were happily endured as area residents played host to city 'dudes' during the successful tour of three ranches in the vicinity.

The Chamber's latest achievement was last week's 2-day town planning sessions held at the Rec Center. The Chamber with NMSU Cooperative Extension Service sponsored the October 23 and 24 sessions. 1981 will be a big year for the Chamber when

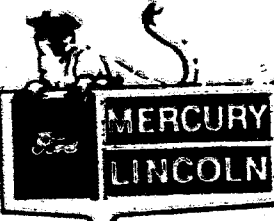

## Recipe of the Week--

### Hazel's Mississippi Mud Cake

As a new feature of the Lincoln County News, recipes from Extension Homemakers Club members will be featured. This week's featured recipe is from Hazel Arthurs of Hondo.

Mrs. Arthurs is President of the La Junta Extension Club at Hondo and also a member of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Extension Club. She has been a valley resident for many years. She taught Home Economics at Hondo High School until her retirement several years ago. A native of Pennsylvania she returns there to spend many of her summers. She has many hobbies, including crocheting and bargello needlework. Her main interests are her brother who lives with her in their Hondo Valley home, and

her many friends all over Lincoln County.

#### Hazel's Mississippi Mud Cake

- 4 eggs
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup (2 sticks) butter or oleo, melted
- 1 1/4 cups flour
- 1/4 cup cocoa
- 1 tablespoon vanilla -1 1/2 cups flaked coconut
- 1 1/2 cups pecans (whole or pieces)
- 1 jar marshmallow creme

Mix above together by combining eggs and sugar in mixer at high speed

for 5 minutes. Combine melted butter or margarine, flour, cocoa, vanilla, coconut and nuts. Combine the two mixtures. Bake in well greased and floured 13x9x2 inch oblong pan at 350 degrees for 30-40 minutes. Take cake from oven. While still hot, put 1 (7 ounce) jar marshmallow creme over top of the cake.

**frosting for Mississippi Mud Cake**  
-1/2 cup (1 stick) margarine (or butter) melted  
-6 tablespoons milk  
-One-third cup cocoa  
-1 tablespoon vanilla

Mix above, spread on cooled cake. Cut into 2 inch squares to serve.

## NOTICE TO ALL BICYCLE OWNERS AND RIDERS

The Town of Carrizozo will now enforce the bicycle license code according to the following Sections of the New Mexico Uniform Traffic Code, for the year 1961.

### 12-8-12 LICENSE REQUIRED.

A. No person who resides within this municipality shall ride or propel a bicycle on any street or upon any public path set aside for the exclusive use of bicycles unless the bicycle has been licensed and a license plate is attached thereto as provided in Sections 12-8-13 through 12-8-16.

B. Any bicycle owner who resides within this municipality shall be required to secure and display a license for the bicycle within ten days from the date upon which the ownership is acquired. (+)

### 12-8-14 LICENSE APPLICATION.

A. Application for a bicycle license and license plate shall be made upon a form provided by the City and shall be made to the POLICE DEPARTMENT.

B. An ANNUAL LICENSE fee of \$1.25 shall be paid to the City before the license is granted. (+)

### 12-8-15 ISSUANCE OF LICENSE.

A. The police department upon receiving proper application for a license is authorized to issue a bicycle license which shall be permanently effective.

B. The police department shall not issue a license for any bicycle when he knows or has reasonable ground to believe that the applicant is not the owner or entitled to the possession of the bicycle.

C. The police department shall keep a record of the number of each license, the date issued, the name and address of the person to whom issued, the number of the frame of the bicycle for which issued and a record of all bicycle license fees collected. (+)

### 12-8-23 PENALTIES.

Every person convicted of a violation of any provision of Sections 12-8-1 through 12-8-23 shall be punished by a fine of not more than twenty-five dollars (\$25), or by imprisonment for not more than twenty-five days, or by removal and detention of the license plate or decal from the person's bicycle for a period not to exceed thirty days or by any combination thereof. (+)

All bicycle owners will have up until January 1, 1961 to license bicycles for 1961 failure to do so will result in the above penalties.

Wilson and in the right, center). The tall stumps will grow into deformed trees which will eventually have to be cut down anyway, and because they do not decay properly, they become harbors for insects and diseases.

## 1,000 Christmas Tree Allotment for Smokey Bear District

The annual Lincoln National Forest personal Christmas Tree cutting program will begin soon, even though forest officials are concerned about damage to the forest resulting from the program in past years.

This year a program will be conducted like the program last year, except that fewer trees will be available. To cut your personal Christmas Tree on the Forest, you must have a permit. Permits cost \$1.00 and can only be obtained by mailing a completed application form and the fee to the Lincoln National Forest Supervisor's office in Alamogordo. Permits will be issued on a strict, first-come, first-served basis.

Forest Supervisor James R. Abbott said that a total of 5,150 trees will be included in the program this year, with each ranger district on the

Forest having an allotment of trees based on the trees available in their individual areas. The Smokey Bear District, at Ruidoso, will have 1,000 trees; Cloudercroft will have 2,000; Mayhill will have 650; and 1,800 will

be available on the Guadalupe District at Carlsbad. 2,450 of the trees on the Mayhill and Cloudercroft Districts will be pine or fir and the rest will be either pinon pine or juniper.

Christmas Tree Permit applications will be available November 3 at Chambers of Commerce and retail stores which want to help with the distribution program. Should any retail store want to distribute the applications, it may request to do so at the Forest Supervisor's Office in Alamogordo. Processing of the

permits will begin on Nov. 17 and trees may be cut as the permits are received. No trees may be cut after December 24.

"If the Christmas Tree program is to continue, it will be because the program participants cared enough to help the forest management make the program an asset, rather than a liability," Abbott said.

He added, that digging up your Christmas Tree is permitted this year, and in the future, might be the only type of Christmas Tree program allowed by the Forest. Group permits for cutting Christmas Trees are also available; instructions for group application can be found on the application form. Trees taken under a group permit must not be resold.

No commercial Christmas Tree cutting permits are being issued on the Lincoln this year.

AN ORDINANCE CREATING A CRIMINAL CODE FOR GENERAL OFFENSES PERTAINING TO PUBLIC ORDER AND SAFETY, PROPERTY, PUBLIC MORALS, MINORS, NUISANCES, ANIMAL CONTROL; MAKING COMMISSION OF THESE OFFENSES UNLAWFUL; PROVIDING PENALTIES; AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREOF.  
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF CARRIZOZO:

**CHAPTER ONE**

1-1-1 TITLE: This Ordinance (Chapter One, Sections 1-1-1 through 1-1-7; Chapter Two, Sections 2-1-1 through 2-1-24; Chapter Three, Sections 3-1-1 through 3-1-11; Chapter Four, Sections 4-1-1 through 4-1-5; Chapter Five, Sections 5-1-1 through 5-1-9; Chapter Six, Sections 6-1-1 through 6-1-6; Chapter Seven, Sections 7-1-1 through 7-1-9) is called and may be cited as the "Criminal Code Ordinance on General Offenses" for the municipality of Carrizozo, New Mexico.

**1-1-2 DEFINITIONS AND RULES OF CONSTRUCTION:** (Provides for

many definitions and Rules of Construction).  
1-1-3 AMENDMENTS: Any amendments to this Ordinance shall be adopted as ordinances as required by State law, and when passed in such form as to indicate the intention to make the same a part thereof, shall be incorporated into this Ordinance so that reference to it as "the Criminal Code Ordinance on General Offenses", shall be understood as including such amendments.  
1-1-4 PENALTY: Any person found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not more than three hundred (\$300.00) dollars or imprisoned for a period of not more than ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, and each day this Ordinance is violated shall constitute a separate offense; provided, however, that a specific penalty is provided therefore in any particular and individual section of this Ordinance, then the specific penalty shall prevail.

1-1-5 SEVERABILITY: Should any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance, for any reason, be held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this Ordinance.
