"Where there's a will, there's a way". This saying is often repeated to encourage. This is what Hubert H. Quintana seems to say regarding Carrizozo's economic future. Quintana who lives in Roswell, has attended various local meetings. His visit to Carrizozo included the 2-day town planning meeting held on October 23 and 24 at the Rec Center. He was back for a followup preliminary observation meeting on November 5.

The evening of November 5, Quintana was on hand, along with Carrizozo town attorney Bill Payne for a first of three public hearings where they explained grants available from the department of Housing and Urban Development Community Development Fund. Carrizozo is eligible to apply for a grant of up to approximately \$300,000.

St. Rita's parish hall was the location of the first hearing, where input on the needs of the town were voiced by various persons present. Quintana was at Monday's regular town meeting to explain the HUD grant application process to the council. He told the council that citizen views are in order and required. He suggested that the mayor name a citizen Participation

Committee. Quintana will be at the Rec Center on November 17 to discuss a proposed town survey. He will be available at the next HUD hearing scheduled also at the Center for November 20 at 8:00 p.m.

Who is this optimistic Hubert Quintana?

Quintana is an economist development specialist with Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD) which is headquartered in Roswell. As the EDA specialist he works with all the communities in the district, designing economic development strategies, addressing local government needs and supporting SNMEDD goals. At the request of a community, he will provide technical assistance to the community or a community based industry in the development of a loan or grant that will stimulate economic growth. He coordinates the Overall Economic Development Program and the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy for the region's economic re-development effort.

Born and raised in Las Cruces, Quintana attended San Diego State University. He worked for Boys Clubs of San Diego, Inc. for nine years, the

last three as director of the Wm. J. Oakes Boys Club. He was director of Students Incorporated for two and a half years in Las Cruces. (This was a youth employment program for CETA and non-CETA eligible youth.) Quintana served as director of programs operations with the Chaves County Community Action program for two and a half years. He is married and has four children, ages 12, 11, 6, and 5.

The following is what Quintana had to say about SNMEDD, Lincoln County and Carrizozo at the 2-day October town planning session:

Who or what is this strange force known as the S.N.M.E.D.D. that comes shoooping out of Roswell from time to time?

The Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD) is a non-profit organization dedicated to assisting local government in their economic development programs, growth management planning activities and in their grant/loan applications to state and federal funding agencies. The SNMEDD serves the 21 municipalities which exist in Chaves, Eddy, Lea, Lincoln and Otero counties. All 21 municipalities and 5

counties are contributing members of the District and are active participants in the District's planning programs.

Our activity is governed by a Board of Directors and Mrs. Ruth Armstrong of Carrizozo is one of the four Lincoln County representatives

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Town to Try Again

The Town of Carrizozo is again trying for a Community Development Block Grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development. Carrizozo shall be in competition with other small cities in New Mexico vying for some \$3,171,000.00 with a maximum grant possible to our Town of approximately \$3,000,000.00.

Funds can be provided for projects in the areas of housing, public facilities, and economic conditions. The most common projects that have been funded in other communities, include: housing rehabilitation, street paving, water system improvement, sewer line construction and flood prevention. A great deal of emphasis is being placed on projects that would create new jobs or increase the economic conditions in a community. Energy conservation is also being emphasized this year.

The Town Council has authorized a "Notice of Intent to Apply" to be sent to H.U.D. The Mayor has also received a written plan for citizen participation in the entire process. There has been or shortly will be a committee appointed to assist in getting further citizen participation.

There has been one public meeting on November 5, 1980, at 7 P.M. at St. Rita's Parish Hall held where some twenty-three people attended. The primary purpose of that meeting and future meetings is for the people to determine the needs of the Town and to set priorities and recommend to the Town Council just what project funds should be applied for. The Council shall make the ultimate decision whether to apply for a Grant and what particular project the funds will be used if received.

Once the needs and priorities are determined, there will be a home to home survey made to document and justify the project for which the funds shall be applied for. The survey will be done by volunteers and should be completed by Christmas. Mayor Hernandez has requested cooperation from all persons living in Carrizozo in the taking of the survey.

The next meeting shall be held in the Recreation Center on Thursday, November 20, 1980, at 7 P.M. Everyone interested in the needs of Carrizozo is invited and urged to attend.

Says NMSU Economist--

People: Key to Economic Development Success

A group of interested citizens gathered last week to hear preliminary observations from the 2-day meeting of local people held on October 23 and 24. At the November 2 meeting, Dr. Robert Coppedge, Extension Economist from New Mexico State University presented a printed draft of the results of the late October meeting. During the recent Wednesday meeting, Mr. Hubert Quintana, economic development specialist with Southeastern New Mexico Development District (SNMEDD) worked with the group on a proposed community survey form.

Coppedge said that, "Carrizozo economy is dependent mainly on its people. There are limitations to what can be done in the community, but something can be done if people want. People can complain and talk about solutions, but when they become committed to doing something, the results will be forthcoming." The 2-day meeting on October 23 and 24, and the November 5 followup meeting highlighted the fact that Carrizozo does indeed face many problems in its development efforts. However, it was pointed out by Coppedge, that the key to success is people. "The necessary people to do the job are the ones who are interested and willing to work. There

will be problems because some of the influential people are not involved, and attempts must be made to involve these people."

"However, the right people to do the job are the ones willing to do it. Other obstacles to growth can be dealt with once people decide to go to work. Failure to grow is due to people problems, not any inherent weakness in the local economy. Many problems, goals, and objectives are identified in the recent draft plan for Carrizozo's economy. People, however, are the key to making the plan work."

"Another necessary element for improving Carrizozo economy is to organize the economic development effort. Four or five people can do the job. Businessmen can be convinced to come to Carrizozo. Carrizozo has the necessary ingredients, and it has enough people to work on this task. It will just take a decision to spend the time necessary to do the job and to focus on this one issue." Coppedge indicated the question is, "Is it important enough to do? The answer is up to you. Time will tell if you placed a high priority on activities to improve local economic growth."

Dear Hunting Incident Claims Young Mans Life

A Texas deerhunter was jailed Saturday on a charge of involuntary manslaughter after he mistakenly shot his son to death, thinking he was a midnight prowler, Lincoln County sheriff's officers said.

Lincoln County Sheriff Ernest Sanchez said the body of Russell David Blair, 19, of Lancaster, Texas, had "in the vicinity of nine wounds." His father, David Leroy Blair, 42, of Dallas, was held in lieu of \$5,000 bond on an involuntary manslaughter charge.

Blair told the sheriff he opened fire with a .22-caliber pistol Friday night, thinking a prowler was intruding at their hunting camp in the Pine Lodge area of the Capitan Mountains, north of Capitan.

The men had come to New Mexico for the opening of the 1980 statewide firearms deer hunting season, said John Crenshaw, a spokesman for the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish.

Crenshaw said the two were asleep in the back of their pickup camper when the father awoke to some "strange noises."

Blair apparently thought someone was grabbing his ankle and "presumably in some state of panic, he seized a .22-caliber revolver and fired nine shots. He then picked up a rifle and fired several more times," Crenshaw said.

Blair drove the pickup containing his son's body to the village of Capitan where he reported the shooting to Municipal Officer Russell Smith and State Police Sgt. Jack Johnson.

Sanchez said the body was sent to the state Office of Medical Investigation at Albuquerque Saturday. No date was set for a preliminary hearing.

Carrizozo Town Council Gives Go-ahead on CDBG Application Process

A notice of intent to the department of Housing and Urban Development was authorized by the Carrizozo Town Council at Monday's regular monthly meeting. Mayor Hernandez will conduct the public hearings in connection with town's applications for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG).

Hubert Quintana with Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development Division was present to tell the Council that citizen-council input is important to CDBG application. Hernandez will name a Citizen Participation Committee to carry out the program. Quintana will assist the town in presenting a complete application to HUD and be available as "resource person." A survey will be conducted to identify community needs.

The first of three hearings was held at Santa Rita parish hall last week. The second hearing is set for 7:00 p.m. on November 20 at the Rec Center. The final and third hearing will be during the December 8 regular town meeting.

Mary Ellen Payne, Lincoln County Home Economist and Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce member came before the council to give a report of the late October 23 and 24 Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce and Extension Service town economy meeting. She presented the council with an "extremely rough draft which needs considerable amount of refinement." The draft outlined eight areas which were categorized from community input at the late October meeting.

Scott Shafer who was recently re-elected for a second term as Chamber president told the council that the town survey will benefit both the Chamber and the town's CDBG project.

In other related business the council in a resolution recognized the Economic Development sub-committee of the Chamber for its work for the betterment of the town. The council supports and commends the committee for its work in determining the needs of Carrizozo and for planning and setting goals for the town. The council encourages the town to participate in this endeavor. The resolution specifically thanked

Dr. Robert Coppedge, NMSU Extension Economist and Quintana for their assistance to the committee.

A "new" advisory committee for the local airport was named at Monday's town meeting; Hoot Gibson, Dave Wheeler, Bob Hemphill, Ruth Armstrong, Scott Shafer, John Tracey, Doug Jarrard and Dale Good who serves as chairman. The committee was established when Shafer brought to the council's attention that the individuals are interested in the potential of the town's municipal airport. They want to pursue efforts to make the facility usable. The committee will determine priorities and bring them before the council.

Recreation Committee member Sterling Spencer was at the town council meeting on behalf of chairman Morgan Maxwell. After explanation by Spencer, arrangements were council approved to make a change on the management check to

Rec manager, Bill Hasenbuhler. Spencer commended Hasenbuhler on his job performance.

A Rec Committee decision to get rid of three pool tables was disapproved by the council. Sealed bids on hand for the pool tables were disregarded until the council can take a look at the tables and determine if they should be sold. Spencer questioned the function of the Rec Committee. Payne said that the committee serves in an advisory capacity with the council handling expenditures and the selling of surplus property.

With only Trustees Roy Harmon and Ruben Zamora present, other business conducted included the approval of the high bid to Vega Construction for two surplus typewriters and one cash register; the purchase of a jacket for policeman Dave Wheeler, and the occupation license application to Powers Studio, photography.

Forum on Aging Set for C'zozo Nov. 22

There will be a Lincoln County Forum on Aging held at the Carrizozo Recreation Center on November 22, 1980, beginning at 8:30 a.m. The Forum is being sponsored by the Zia Senior Citizens Center of Lincoln County.

President Carter has called for a White House Conference on Aging late in 1981. Prior to that time, a series of forums will be held at the County and District levels to solicit recommendations for state and national policies. Additionally, New Mexico

will be holding a State Conference in April of 1981 to refine the issues and prepare a state report for the national conference.

The County Forum on November 22 represents part of a vital grassroots effort to discuss the issues of importance to older Americans and make recommendations that can change policies so needs are being more effectively met. The issues to be discussed are Economic Well-Being and Income; Health Care; Housing; Comprehensive Social Services; Long-Term Care; Employment; Retirement Policy; Aging Process Research; and Image of Aging.

Older Persons, middle-aged, youth, service providers, agencies, and community leaders are asked to attend and add their viewpoints to the recommendations which will be forwarded to the State Agency on Aging.

strengthen the regional economic base which is responsible for providing jobs to area residents at acceptable income levels. In doing this, we are working towards developing a better quality of life for area residents.

One of the most important functions of the SNMEDD involves the development of community facilities. Included in this category are water and sewer system improvements, recreation facilities, industrial park improvements, public buildings and transportation related investments. The regional planning organization can assist in two ways: assist local governments in planning for major capital improvements programming techniques and assisting local governments in procuring federal and state aid for needed capital improvement projects.

Over the past two days, some 75 items have been identified as problems that are hindering the economic development of Carrizozo. I doubt that any of us are surprised by what you've listed. I think we are all a little overwhelmed by the number, because none of us has taken the time to sit down with paper and pencil and list them before now. Two that did make an impression on me are 1) the feeling that no one takes Carrizozo serious and 2) no one knows where Carrizozo is.

Let me assure you that the S.N.M.E.D.D. staff and Board take you seriously. We are concerned about both your community and economic development problems. We have in the past and will continue to respond to the needs identified by your municipal leaders.

I've known where Carrizozo was for a long time. One of my fondest boyhood memories occurred right here in Carrizozo. My grandfather and I would come to Carrizozo, Captain and the surrounding area to sell chili and vegetables. One Saturday my grandfather had brought along a huge leg of lamb for lunch - I hate lamb. Well, some very nice man's very large dog got in the truck and made off with the leg of lamb. My grandfather was MAD, but I was one happy little fellow. I've never forgotten Carrizozo since. I owe you one. Seriously though, identity is a problem experienced by most small rural communities in America. You have some advantages you should really make use of. You're on a major U.S. Highway crossroads, within a stones throw of a state park, a gateway to mountain recreation and resort areas, and you have a beautiful brochure that tells your story. I think you should work with your city fathers and Chamber so that people know where Carrizozo is and not just pass through it.

Economic Development in Rural America is a historic problem. It's been around since Mody Dick was a guppy. Lincoln County and Carrizozo are prime examples of rural America. You have vast land areas and the largest community in the Village of Ruidoso with a population of less than 5,000. How do you attract industry into an isolated area with a limited labor force? How do you entice commercial interests into a community with a declining population? How do you encourage private investment for an area with limited and widely-spread market? I don't know. There are no easy solutions. There is no federal aid and there is no state aid that is going to turn your economy around tomorrow. But, you've gotta believe, that if you keep searching and trying to resolve the problems you've identified that economic stimulation and growth will occur. It's taken a long time to get where we are now and it'll take a while to turn it all around.

I feel you have made some progress over the past two days. You have identified some problems, developed statements but most important of all, you have set goals and objectives that will resolve some of the problems. For the most part, the discussions have dealt with the negative. You have some real uses in your corner that you need to use. You have an industrial park. There are very few communities your size that have an industrial park to assist in attracting a prospective employer. You have a local development corporation (LDC) that can assist a new business venture with initial location or expansion costs. No community your size in the District has an (LDC) Local Development Corporation and indeed very few cities in the entire state can boast an LDC (Local Development Corporation). Community interest is evident by the 28 people who are here and have participated the last two days. As the fruits of your efforts here become visible more people will become involved. 



Public notice is hereby given that the governing body of the County of Lincoln in regular meeting on the 9th day of December, 1980, convening at 10:00 A.M., will give final consideration to the following ordinance and will hold a public meeting thereon:

ORDINANCE

An ordinance of the County of Lincoln, New Mexico adopted pursuant to Chapter 194, Laws of 1979 relating to animal control and providing County powers over animals running at large; enforcement, seizure and impoundment; redemption, fees, vaccinations; prohibited dumping of live animals, and imposing the penalty for violations and this ordinance.

SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS. As used in this ordinance the following definitions shall apply unless otherwise specified.

OWNER: The word "owner" shall mean any person, group of persons, firm, business or corporation owning, keeping or harboring any dog, cat, or other animal or animals.

RABIES SUSPECT ANIMALS: The phrase "rabies suspect animals" shall mean any dog, cat, or other animal which has been exposed or is suspected of having been exposed to rabies through a bite or any other animal or through contact with any

other animal known or reasonably suspected to be infected with rabies.

RUNNING AT LARGE: The phrase "running at large" shall mean being on private or public property other than that belonging to, occupied, or leased by the owner while not under the actual physical control of the owner after a complaint has been received by anyone charged with a duty to enforce this ordinance.

SECTION 2. ENFORCEMENT: The Sheriff of Lincoln County shall be responsible for the enforcement of this ordinance, and to assist in that enforcement, the Sheriff may designate a part-time or full-time Animal Control Officer who shall be deputized to enforce animal control laws, orders, ordinances and regulations.

SECTION 3. RABIES SUSPECT ANIMAL:

A. Every rabies suspect animal shall be immediately confined by the owner, and the owner shall not permit the rabies suspect animal to contact any person or animal. The owner shall immediately notify the Animal Control Officer or the Sheriff or Animal Control Officer on demand. The Animal Control Officer shall impound every rabies suspect animal at the expense of the owner thereof, unless the owner has made satisfactory arrangement for the quarantine of such animal. No rabies suspect animal shall be released from impoundment or quarantine unless and until it has been certified free from rabies by a licensed veterinarian.

B. No person shall kill a rabies suspect animal nor remove such animal from the County without permission of the Animal Control Officer or Sheriff, except when it is necessary to kill such animal to prevent it from escaping or biting any person or animal.

C. The Animal Control officer of sheriff shall direct the disposition of any animal found to be afflicted with rabies.

D. The carcass of any dead rabies suspect animal shall be surrendered to the Animal Control Officer or Sheriff on demand.

SECTION 4. ANIMALS RUNNING AT LARGE: Any dog or cat running at large may be seized and impounded by the Animal Control Officer or Sheriff. If any dog or cat is not redeemed by the owner within seventy-two (72) hours by the owner paying the reasonable costs of impoundment and care as well as any vaccination, such dog or cat may be humanely destroyed or otherwise disposed of; PROVIDED that a reasonable effort has been made to notify the owner, if known.

SECTION 5. REPORTING OF ANIMAL BITES: Any person bitten by any animal and the owner of any animal biting any person shall immediately notify the Animal Control Officer or Sheriff of the circumstances of the bite and the name, age, sex, and address of the victim and the owner. The Animal Control Officer or Sheriff shall conduct an investigation to determine if the animal has been properly vaccinated for rabies and that the period of rabies immunity has not expired. If such determination cannot be conclusively made, the animal shall be considered a rabies suspect animal as hereinafter defined.

SECTION 6. DUMPING OF ANIMALS PROHIBITED: No person shall dump or abandon any living animal at any location. SUCH DUMPED OR ABANDONED ANIMAL MAY BE SEIZED AND IMPOUNDED IN THE SAME MANNER AS AN ANIMAL RUNNING AT LARGE.

SECTION 7. PENALTY: The violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be a petty misdemeanor as defined by Section 30-1-6, N.M.S.A., 1978 Compilation.




