## Carrizozo School Board

### Bond Issue and Mill Levy for Public Consideration

The Carrizozo Board of Education will soon begin educating the public on the details of a bond issue and a mill levy, both of which will appear on the ballot in February of 1981. The board at last week's regular meeting recognized the need for extensive renovation of the high school building, as well as some major repairs needed on other school buildings. The cost for this work can not be handled on the operating budget, therefore the board after much consideration, decided to go with the bond issue and a two mill levy.

Mr. Paul Cassidy with Quinn and Co. Inc. of Albuquerque was the one at the board meeting to explain the process for getting a bond issue on the school election and presented time tables for different possibilities for payment of the bonds. Cassidy was hired by the board to be their financial advisor.

Board Chairman Sterling Spencer turned over the meeting to Cassidy who assisted the board in passing the necessary legal resolutions to make the election possible. Among the duties of Quinn and Co. is the publication of Spanish and English information on the bond issue and bid advertising.

The February ballot will also include the election of two school board members. The positions of Ray Wells and Wally Ferguson are open.

Superintendent Jim Miller told the board that he and Helen Lock, his administrative secretary had attended a Public School Finance meeting in Albuquerque. The meeting had been scheduled before the Legislature met so that school districts could decide what their needs were and make requests. A 12 to 15 percent increase in the over all budget was unannounced as a request at the finance meeting. Capitol outlay will be increased from \$25.00 per child per mill to \$50.00 per child; 14 percent increase for student transportation; and \$21.00 per student to \$30.00 per student for text books were among the reports that Miller brought back from attending the Albuquerque meeting.

Rick Bush, middle school teacher told the board about his science class activities. Bush said because of lack of funds for field trips he has been inviting people in different areas of the science field to visit his classes. A nuclear physicist from Los Alamos was in Carrizozo last week to tell students about his work. Upcoming visiting speakers will include a herpetologist. Bush briefs his students prior to the arrival of the speakers. The board was pleased with Bush's efforts to inform the students that "science is not limited to desk work."

Miller and board member Sister Gail Stackpole attended the October 30 District Board meeting in Alamogordo. Carrizozo will be the site of the 1981 Spring District Board meeting which will include a banquet and program for southeastern New Mexico board members.

Stackpole told the board last Tuesday that at the Alamogordo meeting, board members had presented four minutes favorable talks about their schools. She also gave an unprepared talk about what she considers good progress at Carrizozo schools. This feature of the district school meeting inspired Stackpole to write an S.O.S. (Support our School) message to the NEWS to encourage people to speak up on significant improvements about Carrizozo schools. She requested that S.O.S. messages be made to the school or the NEWS.

This month Stackpole was in Tularosa to attend their school board meeting to conduct a survey as given out by the State Board Association. The project was to observe other boards at work and learn from each other. Results of the survey were mailed to the State office. This was an attempt by the association to obtain input from board members about other projects sponsored by them. Pat Huey, Capitan school board member was scheduled to attend Carrizozo's board meeting last week. He was unable to be present to conduct his survey.

The board nominated Mr. Robert Hemphill, mid-school math teacher and Mrs. Myrtle Williams for a scholarship for the advancement in an educational career. The scholarship was advertised in the American School Board Journal and brought to the board's attention by Stackpole.

Miller informed the board that the State Department was to be at the school Tuesday, November 25 to review the Special Ed program. Miller had contested last Spring's state rating of "conditional". He expressed

to the board that he hopes the new review this week will change the rating to "accredited."

In other business the board:

-accepted the resignation of head cook, Karen Wisner.

-recognized the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce for the November 16 reception at the fire in the honor of school faculty and staff.

-tabled the consideration for adoption of the new instructional policies in order for the board to study the policy changes further.

According to Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce literature there is evidence that descendants of early Spanish and perhaps even the Indians worked gold deposits in the White Oaks area long before the discovery which led to the birth of White Oaks. "It is likely", the leaflet continues, "that White Oaks would be a thriving little town today if the influential citizens of the 1890's had been less greedy. The White Oaks and El Paso Railroad was planned to connect Santa Rosa and El Paso passing through White Oaks. The citizens were so sure that the railroad must necessarily pass through White Oaks that they refused to donate right of way to the railroad; they were wrong. The railroad by-passed White Oaks; Carrizozo was born and White Oaks died."

"hospital" today...rather not describe that place...no DAWA (medicine)...we get no papers or mags...have only kerosene lamps...I first came here in '43, but can truthfully say that we're much worse off then even then in full WWII....After 1 month I'd closed my trousers belt 2 notches up...country's preparing for elections soon, I'd rather not talk about the campaigns....I love: todos y todas. Espero que alquien me escribira. Mucho carino - Joseph Sys, w.I."

## Eyes Deal for HAFB's Bonito Water

# Ruidoso Turns to Sen. Schmitt for Help

The Ruidoso Water Board, formed by the village trustees to investigate the local water supply, has been checking into possible new sources.

The board, upon completion of the water study being conducted by Boyle Engineering, as commissioned by the trustees, will use that study as a basis for recommendations as to how to insure a reliable source of supply water for Ruidoso.

The board, after considering possibilities of obtaining gallons from Bonito Lake, wrote the following letter to United States Sen. Harrison Schmitt:

"This letter is to urge your fullest support in our efforts to solve what has become a critical problem in obtaining an adequate supply of water for the Village of Ruidoso. Our present consumption of water averages about 1,000,000 gallons per day. This is approximately the same amount as our system can supply during a year of average precipitation. This alone would make our situation very precarious; however, we are also growing at a rate of over 8 per year, so that within 10 years our present average supply of water will be only half our need. Even at this date, should we have a year of extreme drought (this occurs about once every 10 years) our situation would be, both for our comfort and our economy, a disaster.

"Needless to say, we are actively engaged in pursuing every possible solution. One potential source lies in drilling new wells, and we are following professional engineering advice in a drilling program from which we expect some measure of success. However, we are advised not to be optimistic; this is poor country for good aquifers and new wells at best can probably only ameliorate the problem.

"Increased raw water storage for peak demand in the summer, which is also our driest period, is a necessity. This relates primarily to our largest source of supply, Eagle Creek. There is in place a reservoir of about 80,000,000 gallons, Alto Lake, which represents about one month's supply of water in an average summer month. We are now engaged in such action as will bring about the optimum use of Eagle Creek. Another reservoir, of as yet undetermined size, will give us the maximum benefits of the spring snow melt and rainfall. But, here again, Eagle Creek is a small stream which sometimes, even in the spring, is virtually dry. Would we be able to conserve all of it (about 1400 acre feet per year per average), this supply would not be adequate within five years to meet the increased demand of Ruidoso, Captain, and Fort Stanton, all of which share this source. "Conservation is certainly an op-

tion. We have in the past and will more stringently in the future curb the use of the water in times of short supply; but this can only be of limited help. Our average per capita consumption is only about 200 gallons per day, about the national norm; and this average takes no account of the tremendous influx of temporary residents, especially in the summer. There is not a lot of fat to trim; yard and garden irrigation is not a major factor here. Even restrictions on population growth, which may be a future necessity, cannot avert the present pinch in our supply. Well over half of the developed land in our city limits is vacant; and the village is legally obliged to supply water to those who choose to build on their property. There is a large future demand already built into our growth structure.

"There does seem to be one possible solution which could make all the difference in the determination of our future, and it is in this regard that we seek your help. On Nov. 4, the members of the Ruidoso Water Board met with representatives of Holloman Air Force Base who were knowledgeable of their water situation. Their delegation was headed by Col. Donald Brown, whose principal advisor was George Dunn of the Corps of Engineers. From this information-seeking we learned of one potential source of relief. The Rio Bonito is now a major source of water supply for both Alamogordo and Holloman AFB, each party owning the right to 1,449 acre-feet of this right, which represented slightly less than one third of their total water use, the remainder of their supply being from wells. Because their well field is heavily used and unfavorable engineered (two of their three wells are only 600 feet apart), Holloman has taken steps to seek additional well water in the procurement of a 4,500-acre tract of land about five miles south of their present active field. It

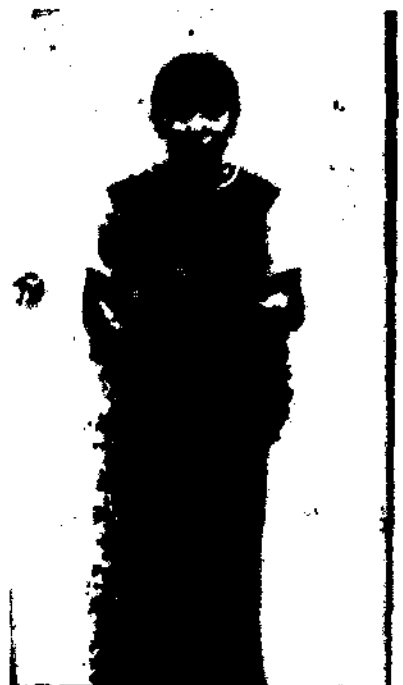
has been their plan to develop this field for several years, as soon as requests for funds for this project are approved. Drilling such test wells as would determine the potential of this new field should not be expensive, and to have it fully operative would probably cost less than \$1,500,000. Should their field perform as it is hoped and expected that it might, Holloman Air Force Base would have a comfortable adequate water supply with no real need for the Bonito source.

"It does seem to us that piping this water some 94 miles from this immediate area, where the need is so great, the resources so limited, and the developmental expenses so great, to another area where there is a potential untapped source of ground water (Perhaps in great quantity) is bad arithmetic. We respectfully request that you initiate such governmental action as will allow the exploration of this 4,500-acre well field; and, pending its adequacy as a new source of water for Holloman, transfer to us this vital water right to the Rio Bonito. The addition of 1,449 acre feet of water to our reserve would approximately double our supply; it would be immediately useable, with only the installation of a single pump, this eliminating a possible crisis situation; it would give time to plan and construct such reservoirs as would maximize recovery from other sources; and it would, by being returned for use to its basin or origin, benefit this entire area.

"Your essential effort in this matter could profoundly effect the future of Ruidoso and Lincoln County and would most assuredly effect the gratitude of its citizenry.

### 'Recipe of the Week'

Cookies and candy are traditional for the Christmas Holidays. This week we are featuring a cookie recipe provided for us by Jan LaRue who is a member of the La Junta Extension Club.

Our thanks go to Jan for this recipe for:

- DATE BARS
- CRUST: 1/2 pound margarine, 4 cups flour, 4 tablespoons light brown sugar. Mix together, press on cookie sheet, Bake 10 minutes at 375 degrees.
- FILLING: 2 cups light brown sugar, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 cup chopped nuts, 1 cup coconut, 1 pound dates, 4 beaten eggs, 2 teaspoons vanilla. Mix and pour over Crust.
- add marachino cherries: Bake at 375 degrees 25-30 minutes. Cool. Cut in 1/2 inch squares. Sit powdered sugar on top. (A favorite with the men).

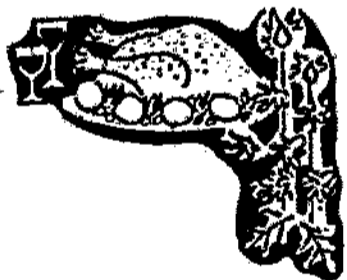

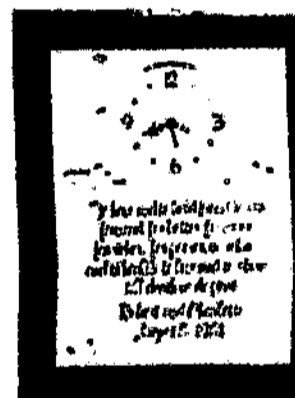

## Great Plains Conservation Program Workshop Dec. 4th

A workshop to discuss the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) will take place December 4th at the Roswell Inn from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

"Last June, Congress extended the GPCP for another 10 years thus providing the opportunity to make the program more responsive to local needs. We want to hear from people who have been involved in the GPCP to find out if changes are needed in the program to better serve their needs," said Ray T. Margo, Jr., head of the USDA's Soil Conservation Service (SCS) in New Mexico.

For the past 24 years, the SCS has operated the GPCP as a cost-sharing effort to assist landowners in applying conservation measures on their farms and ranches. The new legislation which extended the GPCP increased allowable funding nationwide from \$300 million to \$600 million and raised the yearly cost-share limitation from \$25 million to \$50 million. "New Mexico has about 44 million acres that could be eligible for the program, and we have about 20 million acres covered," Margo added.

## Lake Lucero Auto Caravan November 29th

An auto caravan to Lake Lucero, a part of the area that is the source of the white sands, is scheduled for Saturday, November 29, 1960. The caravan is limited to 30 cars and reservations are required. Interested persons should call monument headquarters at 437-1058.

The trip will begin at 9 am at the Small Missile Range road intersection with U.S. Highway 70-82, 25 miles west of monument headquarters, located between the green and white mileposts 174 and 175. Park Rangers and military police will brief the group on regulations that apply during the trip. The caravan will proceed over paved roads through the White Sands Missile Range to the trailhead to Lake Lucero. About two hours will be spent at the lake area to allow time for a one-mile conducted walk, for photography, sightseeing and lunch. The caravan will return to U.S. Highway 70-82 by 1 pm.

Participants will need to be at the Small Missile Range gate promptly by 9 am because they cannot enter through the gate after the caravan leaves for the lake. All persons should come prepared with enough gasoline, a spare tire, drinking water, stout walking shoes, suitable dress for the weather, sunglasses and a lunch. Persons are also reminded that Lake Lucero is a primitive area without sanitary facilities of any kind. Cameras are encouraged for use at the lake area, but may not be used while passing through the missile range.

# Lincoln National Forest News

State Forester, Raymond R. Gallegos, would like to take this opportunity to announce that application forms for the 1981 New Mexico Tree Seedling Program are now available. Mr. Gallegos would like to emphasize that the program

provides seedlings to landowners at a very reasonable cost. The seedlings must be used for conservation purposes, i.e.: erosion control, reforestation, windbreaks or Christmas tree planting. There are two types of seedlings

available; bareroot deciduous and containerized conifer (evergreen) seedlings. Species of deciduous trees available through the program are: Green Ash, Hackberry, Lombardy Poplar, Russian Olive, Native Plum and Narrowleaf Cottonwood. Russian

Olive and Lombardy Poplar are excellent for use in windbreaks. Hackberry and Green Ash are well suited species for the southern half of the state, and are good windbreak species. Species are coniferous trees

available are: Arizona Cypress, Afghanistan Pine, Austrian Pine, Colorado Blue Spruce, Douglas Fir, Ponderosa Pine, Scotch Pine, and White Fir. Arizona Cypress, Afghanistan Pine and Austrian Pine are very adaptable to the southern one third of the state and are recommended for windbreak planting. Afghanistan Pine is a good Christmas tree species. All three do well in arid climates such as found in southern New Mexico.

Arizona Cypress and Afghanistan Pine can be planted on alkaline soils. These species should not be planted at elevations above 4,500 feet as they are susceptible to cold weather.

To be eligible to participate in the program, landowners must own at least two acres. A minimum of 100 bareroot seedlings must be purchased. The cost is \$23.00 per hundred. Containerized seedlings are \$42.00 for 98, which is the minimum order.

For best selection of tree species; applications should be received by January 15, 1981. Applications for trees under the seedling program may be obtained by writing the Department of Natural Resources, Division of Forestry, P.O. Box 2167, Santa Fe, N.M. 87503 or by calling 827-3182.

On the Guadalupe District, Sitting Bull Falls is receiving light use, and deer season is open, but hunters aren't having much luck. Forest Road 540, near Robinson Draw, has been repaired. Roads on the District have had a lot of snow on them and are wet. Hunters have been urged to stop at the Queen Research Station on NM 137, about two and one-half miles past the Guadalupe Work Center turn-off, where a Forest Officer will inform them about area conditions and recommend which roads to use. The District reported eight inches of snow in the mountains and about four inches in Carlsbad.

At Mayhill, James Canyon Campground is receiving heavy use, fishing is light on the Rio Penasco, and roads are muddy and snowy. Hunting season is still in progress, and with eight inches of snow during the past week, fuelwood areas are

The program is designed to assist a large number of research projects, rather than to provide full support for a few. Grants are awarded in various amounts up to \$4,000.

In addition to the NWF fellowships, which have been awarded for the past 23 years, the Federation has since 1971 also awarded joint fellowships with the American Petroleum Institute for studies involving petroleum and the conservation of resources. The deadline for the NWF-API fellowship is also December 31.

## New Mexico Game & Fish News

Anyone who hasn't already turned in his or her application to cut a personal Christmas Tree on the Lincoln National Forest had better do so within the next day or two, or all the available permits may be gone, according to a forest spokesman.

The Spokesman said almost 4,000 permit applications had been received by Monday morning; when processing of the applications began. The applications have been coming in at the rate of about 300 a day, since they became available to the public on November 3. "We expect to have our full quota of 5,000 by the end of the week," the spokesman said.

Permits will be issued this year to cut a total of 5,150 trees in the Forest's four ranger districts. They cost \$1 each and are limited to one per household.

Rapidly-changing weather for the past week makes "check before you leave home," the best advice for hunters, fuelwood cutters and Christmas Tree cutters planning to visit the Lincoln National Forest this weekend.

Fresh snows and temperatures down to zero have made most Christmas Tree and fuelwood areas inaccessible. In some cases, they have been closed until roads become passable, but conditions vary. Forest visitors are urged to check with the district ranger office in the district they plan to visit before they leave home, for the current weather and road conditions. Their telephone numbers are, Smokey Bear District at Ruidoso, 257-4095; Cloudercroft District, 682-2531; Guadalupe District at Carlsbad, 885-4181; and Mayhill District, 687-3411.

At Smokey Bear, Three Rivers Campground is the only facility open. Streams are running at normal levels, Bonito Lake is low and fishing season ends November 30. The third regular deer hunt is in progress and Sierra Blanca Ski Area is hoping for a Thanksgiving opening. There are icy spots on shady areas on Forest Roads, and six inches of fresh snow in wilderness areas, where trails are icy and snow-covered.

At Cloudercroft, campgrounds are closed, but Lower Sleepy Grass will be re-opened when the weather permits. Secondary roads are snow-packed and icy, but U. S. Highway 82 is clear. New Mexico Highway 24 still has patches of snow on it. Trail conditions are poor, with just enough snow to make it hard to walk, and not enough for snowshoeing or skiing. All fuelwood areas are closed except No. 15, but it may be closed soon.

With the cool weather fast approaching, many of us will start thinking about trapping furbearers to make some extra spending money or perhaps even to make a living. This trapping season brings with it some new regulations, promulgated by the Department of Game and Fish. Why stricter controls on trapping? Simply because more and more people are participating in the business and it must be controlled to prevent damage to the resources and to private property.

The new regulations and the reasoning behind them are as follows:

1.) Each trap or snare set for the capture of wild animals must be permanently marked with either the trapper's name and address or a user-identification number issued by the Department of Game and Fish. This number will allow the Game Department Officers in an Area to identify every trap set as to who is using it. It will also assist the local police in tracing loss of stolen traps. This number may be obtained by calling either the Santa Fe Office of the Department (827-2458) or our Roswell Office (682-2581).

2.) No steel trap with an outside jaw spread larger than 6 1/2 inches may be used in making a land set. This will prohibit small furbearers from becoming injured without being caught in larger traps. It will also help in preventing large animals (mountain lion and bear) from being caught in traps set for smaller furbearers.

3.) No land set may be placed within 1/4 mile of an occupied dwelling without written permission of the dwelling occupant; no land set may be placed within 1/4 mile of established public campgrounds, roadside rest areas, picnic areas, or boat launching areas; and a land set may not be set within 25 yards of any Forest Service or Bureau of Land Management system trail designated by the Agency on a map provided by that agency, nor within 25 yards of any public road partially or wholly maintained with public funds. These regulations will prevent the accidental injury to people and pets in areas where the non-trapping public tends to congregate.

4.) It is illegal to place, set, or maintain any steel trap within 25 feet of visible bait. "Visible Bait" means the flesh, hide, fur, carcass, viscera, or feathers of any animal which is so placed that it is visible at any angle of observation. This

restriction does not apply to a trap flag that is suspended at least three feet above ground. A "trap flag" is any suspended attractant made from materials other than parts of mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians, or fish. This regulation will prevent the accidental trapping of hawks, owls, and eagles, a big problem in parts of New Mexico.

5. It is illegal to retain alive in captivity any furbearer taken in a trap or snare. The purpose of this regulation is to prevent the retention of injured furbearers as pets, as these animals are wild and may cause injury to those trying to make pets out of them.

The old restrictions also still apply. Every trap must be visited once every 48 hours and ALL captured wildlife removed. Legally protected mammals and birds must be released or the game Department notified of their capture in order that the injured ones may be treated. All trappers 12 years old and older must possess a current Trappers License, costing \$5.25 for residents.

Now, to give you a quick update on the bobcat situation. The Department will be tagging bobcat pelts for those trappers who provide us with the lower jaw of the animal trapped. Presently, this applies only to those bobcats trapped during the 1980-81 season. These bobcats trapped during the 1979-80 season are still illegal to export and those will not be tagged.


