## Referendum

### Results Released

The results of the recent vote on the Beef Referendum have been released. Preliminary results of the wide referendum indicate producers have voted against creating a national beef research and information program.

County Administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Stabilization and Conservation Service, which conducted the referendum, said of the 231,032 vote cast, 151,119, or 65 percent, voted against the program. There were 79,913 votes in favor.

Administrator said there were 288,445 producers registered and eligible to vote in the referendum conducted on March 22.

The referendum would have authorized the program would have been used for assessments on beef producers to finance research and information activities designed to develop markets for cattle, beef and products.

The Beef Research and Information Act was enacted in May 1978 and amended in August 1978. It is not becoming effective, however, until three items had been accomplished:

1. Eligible beef producers had to register to vote.

2. At least 50 percent of those registered had to vote.

3. A majority of those voting had to vote affirmatively.

Lincoln County voted 21 votes for and 24 against. Fifty seven persons registered to vote at the Lincoln County ASCS Office.



## San Juan Church to be Restored

The next state-funded restoration project for Lincoln State Monument will be the historic San Juan Church, according to plans prepared by Tom Caperton, director of the Museum of New Mexico's monuments bureau.

A bill appropriating \$100,000 to the monument, sponsored by Rep. John F. Bigbee (Torrence-DeBaca-Lincoln-Guadalupe), was approved by the 1980 legislature. Caperton says those funds will be used to restore the now-vacant building as near as possible to its original condition in the late 1800s.

A grant application for another \$100,000 in matching funds also is pending with the State Historic Preservation Office, which administers federal preservation funds through the Heritage Conservation

and Recreation Service of the Department of the Interior. If approved, that money also would flow into the project.

Caperton describes work to be done on the adobe structure, built around 1885, as a total rehabilitation. Its present condition is one of advanced deterioration.

Exterior and interior walls will be repaired and replastered, windows renovated, and a new roof added. Utility systems, added piecemeal through the decades, will be replaced. Interior furnishings will be refinished, and the church organ will be put in playing condition.

The latest in fire suppression systems, using Halon gas to smother a fire, will be installed. Conventional systems using water often cause as

much damage to historic structures as a fire.

Caperton says area residents with old photographs of the San Juan Church can help with the restoration, since historic photos often reveal original features of building that may have been altered over the years. Residents should contact Ed Raventon, ranger supervisor at Lincoln, who will arrange to have copies made for the project.

The church is the third property in historic Lincoln to be revitalized by the state since the Museum assumed operational responsibility last July 1. The Billy The Kid pageant grounds were upgraded last year, and the Wortley Hotel has been renovated this spring.

## My Time

Here is a letter that you could not find in Russia.

Dear Editor

As to your editorials - Mr. Swickard, I believe you stated America's young men and women who didn't readily jump at the chance to volunteer to serve America in the Armed Forces were "Cowards."

Why should they blindly rush to enlist? You're supposed to learn by your mistakes and benefit by them.

What else was Vietnam, but a horrendous mistake, who cared about the young men who fought, were mangled or died except their own families, sweethearts, and friends. National television finally brought it home to America when the prisoners were released and they began to tell their stories. The veterans are just now being recognized and receiving the benefits they're entitled to.

What of Korea? That was never a declared war - and what of the Cuban Crisis? My husband was stationed at Walker AFB and had his bag packed to go with the B52's that were to fly cover for our men when they landed in Cuba in the "Bay of Pigs" incident. The men landed alright - without the air support Kennedy had promised and then got out the best way they could. One of our best friends was one of the men left on those beaches in Cuba - he lived to tell about it.

I had Uncles in WWI and WWII and the Korean "conflict". My father welded ships at Puget Sound in Seattle, Washington during WWII. One uncle was a POW in WWII and was in the Death March on the Burma Road. The family records date back through all the years and wars to the Declaration of Independence and farther, so it's not a matter of patriotism.

My husband and I have tried to instill that same patriotism in our children. But America is turning into what our forefathers fled from. It doesn't help to compare America with all the other countries and exclaim how much better off we are. We're starting down the same road and it's time for this generation of your people to stand up and fight alright, for I don't call it cowardice when our young men and women stand up and say, "no more - I'm behind them!"

After putting higher and higher taxation, more and more government controls on the people until both parents have to work out of the home to make ends meet and then tell us it's our patriotic duty to encourage our children to go to war and be killed because some country wants to claim some more real estate?

You'll heller "What about the oil," the Persian Gulf, etc. What about it? The years my husband worked in the oil fields, they capped more wells than were pumping.

Maybe if this generation says "no" our Senators, Representatives, and Congressmen will decide they had better return this government of America and quit shoving their propaganda and remember they're in Washington for one purpose, "to represent the people!" If they don't take heed soon, we'll have a generation enlisting alright, in another "American Revolution!"

## N.M. Conference on Families Hearing

The Pro-family movement; pro-religion; love of country; encouragement of native language; exclusion of government interference in family affairs; inflation; anti-abortion; child abuse and lack of discipline in homes and schools. These were some of the topics covered at the March 20 hearings in Carrizozo in conjunction with the New Mexico Conference on Families.

Conducted at the Lincoln County courthouse courtroom, the results of the hearings will be used in developing the major issues and recommendations of the N.M. Conference on Families and if accepted, presented to the White House Conference. The talks were recorded and these along with written recommendations are to be presented at the March 27 District VI meeting in Roswell. The district consists of Lincoln, Chavez, Otero, Lea and Eddy counties. Sandra J. Hays of Ruidoso is delegate from Lincoln County for the district meeting.

In preparation for the White House Conference on the Family each state is holding conferences and encouraging local community conferences on the family. Mrs. Alice King is the Chairman of the N.M. Conference. The Lincoln County chairman is Bobbie LaMay of Carrizozo with a committee composed of Teona Jillson, Capitan; Mary Spencer, Carrizozo; Sue Stearns, Nogal; Lynne Streeter and Ellie Keeton both of Ruidoso. They have been working in cooperation with Lincoln County home economist Mary Ellen Payne. Payne has spoken to civic clubs and church groups to generate interest in and action on conference recommendation.

LaMay presided at the March 20 hearings in Carrizozo assisted by Spencer, Jillson, Stearns and Payne. Carrizozo, Capitan and Ruidoso residents represented the county, including two Carrizozo ministers. It was stressed by the group that it did not want the government to change or alter the definition of the word "family" - which they defined as a husband and his wife, of opposite sex and their children born of or adopted

by this union. They added the "family" also includes persons related by blood or marriage, and the "extended family."

Other subjects were briefly voiced at the county hearings in Carrizozo. Euthanasia (merciful killing); infanticide (killing of newly born children); elderly in nursing homes and homosexuality were mentioned. Opinions on government welfare aid and food stamp misuse was pointed out as were institutions that intentionally profit from drug abusers. The CETA program was defined as was middle-age pregnant women who do not resort to abortion. Breastfeeding was declared as a means to cut inflation. Views on children having children, pregnancy out of wedlock, promiscuity and abortion as a means of birth control were concerns. A program that "promotes virginity" was suggested.

On a national level, six major themes have been developed for the conference by the National Advisory Committee on the conference: Family strengths and supports; Diversity of families; The changing realities of family life; The impact of public and private institutional policies on families; The impact of discrimination; Families with special needs.

Local and county level concerns will be summarized at the district meet in Roswell for state presentation at the N.M. Conference on Families in Albuquerque on May 23 and 24. Priority issues will be selected and recommendation made that will be carried by 12 state delegates to the White House Conference on Families to be held in July.

"One of our goals at the beginning of the year was to get the weight room

Beulah's Shop in Carrizozo is located at 621 South Central, by the post office.



The proposed plan states that during normal operation of the wastewater recovery system, no discharge from the pond should occur, but during breakdowns within the recovery system, discharges up to 0.2 million gallons-day daily average and 0.68 million gallons-day daily maximum could occur. Pond water is reported to have an average total dissolved solids concentration of approximately 7900 mg-1. Ground water in the vicinity of the pond is stated to be at a depth of approximately 16 feet with a total dissolved solids concentration of approximately 18,000 mg-1.

Any interested person may obtain further information from the Ground Water Section, Water Pollution Control Bureau, EID, and may submit written comments to the Director of the EID at the address given above. Prior to ruling on any proposed discharge plan or its modification, the Director of EID will allow thirty (30) days after the date of publication of this notice during which comments may be submitted to him and a public hearing may be requested by any interested person. Requests for a public hearing shall set forth the reasons why the hearing should be held. A hearing will be held if the Director determines there is significant public interest.
