Rev. David J. Lynch, pastor of the Trinity United Methodist Churches of Carrizozo and Capitan led the entire inter-denominational congregation in song. Under his direction they sang "They Will Know

We Are Christians' with much enthusiasm.

The feature of the evening was the evenings' program consisting of area musical and singing talents. The Miller Family Singers are the nine children of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Miller near Corona and members of the Assembly of God Church in Carrizozo. The Capitan Youth Singers are the youth choir for Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Capitan. Kathy Cope, who sang a solo is the wife of Mr. Jim Cope, pastor of the Assembly of God Church in Carrizozo. A duet was sung by Rev. Ira A. Irvin, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Carrizozo and Mrs. Helen Lock, director of the choir.

Four choirs were in the presentation: Trinity United Methodist directed by Scott Shafer; Capitan Community directed by Rev. Lynch; First Baptist and Santa Rita. Charles

Adams was in charge of the organ prelude and postlude. He is president of the Taeria Foundation, Inc., an inter-denominational church foundation dedicated in service to fellow man. He serves Santa Rita as its Music Director.

Following the concert a reception was held at the Santa Rita parish hall with more singing by the Capitan Youth Singers and the Miller Family Singers.

VoAg Gets Funds

School Districts in Lincoln County will be receiving additional money from the state Department of Education for vocational education equipment.

Representative John Bigbee announced to the NEWS that the Interim Legislative Education Study Committee approved the state Department of Education's plans for distributing special funds for vocational education equipment.

The allocations include \$7,638 for the Carrizozo School District, \$4,678 for the Hondo School District, and \$5,939 for the Ruidoso School District.

Representative Bigbee stressed that the special state appropriation is strictly a one time grant, and is not included in the annual public school support.

He said that most legislators feel that the schools should have been buying vocational equipment out of their regular budgets.

The 1980 Legislature approved a \$1.3 million total in nonrecurring supplemental appropriation to help buy the equipment.

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Mule Ride Formed

RUIDOSO DOWNS, N.M. — Owners of mules of a proper disposition — the mule's disposition — to undertake an overnight trail ride through the scenic Sacramento Mountains, have their chance April 26-27, when the Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinners are sponsoring such a junket.

Trail riders will depart from the Briscoe West property in Ruidoso Downs at 10 a.m., April 26, wind their way up, down and over, mostly over, 11 miles of good trail to the mesa campsite. Riders must pack a trail lunch. Departure Sunday begins at 10 a.m. — if the mule is of a mind to leave then — and continues, in groups, throughout the day.

Atop the mesa there'll be "campfire entertainment" complete with guitar strumming mule-oriented troubadours Saturday evening. Sunday's action includes mule balloon

busting, mule polo, mule barrels and pole bending, to test the mettle of the rider and temperament of the mule.

Riders of horses are not excluded from this overnight adventure. Though they can't compete in any of the mule events, this doesn't mean horse riders can't organize their own competition.

The tab of \$12.50 per person includes dinner Saturday and Sunday breakfast, with Pete Wood as chef. The fee also includes two feedings of oats and hay for all mounts. The dinner menu includes chicken, beef, chili and goat; with traditional chuck wagon fare for breakfast.

Registrations must be made by April 19, including the fee for all riders, to Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinners, P.O. Box 2627, Ruidoso, New Mexico 88345. The Mule Skinners are non-profit, by intent as well as incorporation.

Clean-up Day Set

Litterbugs' — leavings — of cellophane cigarette-pack and candy bar wrappers; soda pop and beer cans; discarded soles shoes and rimless hats that litter Carrizozo will be shoved into 2,000 plastic trash bags the first Saturday in May.

Mr. Scott Shafer, president of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce announced this week that the Chamber will sponsor the Second Annual Clean Up Day on May 3rd. Shafer met April 3 for a special

meeting with members of the clean up committee, who represent other civic clubs and the town of Carrizozo, including the police department. Local organizations are also invited to co-sponsor the event.

Others present at the initial meeting to discuss plans for the clean up day were Mary Thorpe, vice president of the Woman's Club; Dale Housley, Rotary Club; Marvin Rowin, Lions Club; Joe Orsak and Dr. Michael Moreland, town trustees; C.A. Morales, Chief of Police and Mary Ellen Payne, Woman's Club and Chamber member who is chairman of the project.

Like last year, the day's activity will be planned to the smallest details. The School cafeteria was chosen as the central location. Families individuals are encouraged to participate in the clean up, which will feature a noon bar-be-cue. Tickets will be presented that day for bowling, swimming and for the noon luncheon. The tickets will be earned by collecting trash.

Shafer encourages the early donation of money so that the committee can plan ahead. Needed are 2,000 plastic trash bags, door prizes, and food for coffee breaks and for the 12 o'clock luncheon. Checks should be made to "Chamber of Commerce Clean-Up" and may be dropped off at Citizens State Bank, Ruidoso State Bank or given to any committee member.

In addition, merchandise or services for door prizes donated by individuals or businesses will be welcomed. All donations will be acknowledged.

Hazard Reduction Urged

RUIDOSO, N.M. — Reducing the number of natural fuel hazards around your property can greatly increase the odds that your summer or weekend Forest Home will survive a forest fire, according to a COMFire spokesman here.

COMFire is a local citizen's group which works cooperatively with Lincoln National Forest personnel to help prevent forest fires.

Hazard reduction, the COMFire representative said, primarily involves removing fuels which could carry a forest fire to your property. It can be done tastefully, inexpensively and greatly increases the odds that your property can survive a fire. The primary advantage is that it gives firefighters a safe zone from which to stop a fire.

Forest Service District Ranger Stations such as the Smokey Bear Ranger District Station here can provide you with more information on how to make your property more fire-safe.

Highway Dept. Test—

Stripping for 70 & 37

A new road striping paint will be tested by the state Highway Department this spring and summer. The striping project will be done under the sponsorship of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA). The federal agency is funding the entire project.

The paint being tested has an epoxy base which the manufacturer claims has a better resistance to wear and should reduce the need for frequent restriping.

The Highway Department tested the paint on roads in the Ruidoso area last year. According to traffic services bureau chief Larry Larranaga, the paints applied to test sections appears to be holding up well under traffic.

One problem encountered with the new paint is that the drying time is longer than that of paint in regular use. To help overcome this problem heaters will be used to accelerate drying and a heavy cover of reflective beads will be applied to the new striping.

To help prevent motorists from tracking across the newly applied striping, an additional escort vehicle will accompany the striping crew and supplement the signs and warning lights normally used by the crew.

A small amount of striping will be done in the Ruidoso area, but most of the work will be done in the north-central and northeastern part of the state. Striping is scheduled to begin early in April and should be completed by July 1.

As part of this FHWA demonstration project, the roads striped with the new epoxy-base paint will be monitored and the effectiveness of the material evaluated to determine if it should be used on other roads in New Mexico.

Roads in Lincoln County due for the striping are U.S. 70 in the Ruidoso area, and the state road 37 around the Nogal area.

Hondo Dancers Perform

The nationally known Hondo Fiesta Dancers will present the 28th annual Hondo Fiesta April 25 and 26 in the Hondo School gymnasium.

Sixty senior high school students in beautiful costumes perform the many graceful steps of Spanish, Mexican, and New Mexican folk dances.

Mr. and Mrs. Fermin S. Montes of Roswell, founders and instructors of the dance performance group, have named this year's Fiesta the "Fiesta Xchamlico". (Fiesta of the Floating Gardens) Decorations will exemplify the older Mexican history of the Aztec Indians.

Some of the dances to be performed include El Novillero, El

Jarabe Pateno, La Varsoviiana, Jarabe de Valle, El Shotis Norteno, and Jesusita en Chihuahua.

Also the difficult and strenuous Los Matlaches will be danced by the boys and the popular El Jarabe Tapatio, the Mexican Hat Dance, will also be performed by the group.

These nationally famous dancers have traveled and danced in the Festival of Arts in Tucson, Arizona in 1951, the National Folk Festival in Nashville, Tenn. in 1959, and festivals in Mexico City and Acapulco, Mexico.

Casa Manana Progress

Casa Manana, the Carrizozo Woman's Club eight-unit elderly housing project, is under construction at this time. The builder, Beagles Enterprises, anticipates completion on schedule, which is set for June 30, 1980.

The project is financed by the Farmers Home Administration under the Rural Rental Housing Program.

The R.R.H. Program allows elderly and handicapped residents to live in the project and pay a basic rent amount. If the tenant is considered

low income, the tenant will pay only 25 percent of their adjusted gross income toward rent (including utilities with the government paying the rest of the rent).

The Zia Senior Citizens Center will start accepting applications on a first come, first serve basis, one month prior to the completion of the project.

The Center will advertise the date and time of when they will accept applications and there will be no applications taken prior to this time.



J. G. Moore - A Fond Memory

"A quiet man", "an intelligent man", "a friend to all of Lincoln County", "an unforgettable man", "one of the most honest men I've ever known", "a man of few words, but those words were always meaningful".

These are answers to the question asked by many citizens of Lincoln County.

That question was "Who was J. G. Moore?"

Who was J. G. Moore... Many remember him as Lincoln County's first state senator, as the Lincoln County Clerk, as an insurance agent, but more important, as a friend.

Twenty-one years ago in June, J. G. passed away, but his memory remains alive. For those fortunate people who knew him, as well as those who have arrived in Lincoln County since his passing, this article will tell you who J. G. Moore was.

Known as J.G. throughout his life, Jesse Garfield Moore Jr. was born in Florence Alabama, on November 23, 1910. His father was the post master in Florence and later established Moore's Department store, where J.G. began working at an early age.

J.G. and his wife Mildred were married in 1934 and their two daughters were born in Alabama.

J.G. Moore - Lincoln County State Senator

Shelia Elizabeth (Betty), who now owns the Fields Accounting Service in Carrizozo, and Dorothy Ann Straley, District Court Clerk of Torrance County. A son, J.G. Moore III (Joe), a teacher at Shore Crest Private School in St. Petersburg, Florida, was born in Carrizozo.

Following the Depression years, J. G. Mildred and the girls moved to Albuquerque, in 1939, where they managed a restaurant. Only 29 years old, but with an extensive background in Department store management, J.G. was hired to be the manager of the "B & M Mercantile" in Carrizozo in 1940. Mildred and J. G. jointly managed the store from 1940 until 1945 and the family lived in the small apartment behind the store. The mercantile was located in what is now "The Grocery Basket" in Carrizozo. Next door was Alfredo Lopez's Barber shop.

During the latter part of 1943, J.G. took a second job, that of brakeman on the Southern Pacific Railroad. Things in Europe didn't look good to J.G. so he and his friend, Tino Lopez, joined the Navy in 1944. Both passed their physicals and were ready for basic training when J.G. was notified by the Draft Board that due to a new ruling, he was too old to enter the Navy. It was a sad day when he said, "Goodbye" to his friend Tino as he left for the Navy.

This unexpected change resulted in the Moore Family moving to Gallup, where J.G. was employed as the Manager of a Finance Company.

money from \$5 to \$200. J. G. spent many weeks in Santa Fe during these days and the business was run by Mildred and Dorothy. Things were looking well and a home was purchased, their first home owned in Carrizozo.

J.G. loved his fellow man. He enjoyed talking with people and could be found each morning visiting with Tino and Chevo at Rollands Drug Store, while drinking a coke. In the evening, you would see him visiting with one of his closest friends, Albert Roberts, at the Monte Vista Service station.

From his first job as clerk in his Dad's store, to the office of state Senator, there were many ups and downs, and many jobs... However none of these jobs were unimportant to J.G.

He was an avid reader, delving into every aspect of any business he was associated with, learning all he could about it. While he had no formal college training, he continually educated himself through home study courses. There were few topics he could not intelligently discuss in depth.

In 1957, J.G. suffered his first major heart attack. He was told by Dr. Turner, his friend and family doctor, that it would be necessary to slow down.

A second attack in 1958, and much more severe, resulted in the hospitalization and complete rest for a number of months. Then, on June 22, 1959, while at home watching T.V. a third attack took his life, only eight days after he and Mildred celebrated their 25th anniversary.

Following his untimely death, at age 48, his wife Mildred and daughter Dorothy, continued operating the Insurance Agency. In 1963, the Agency was sold to their long time friends, Johnson and Margaret Stearns who has continued to call their business, "The J. G. Moore Agency".

Mildred returned to Alabama in 1969, where she continues to work as a nurse.

"Who was J. G. Moore?" The best answer in the world... He was "my dad", -Shelia Betty Fields

EDITOR'S NOTE: One man in Lincoln County that knew J.G. Moore well was Johnson Stearns. He had little to add to the story.

I think J.G. Moore would have been elected Governor, he was governor material, well thought of by his constituents, his fellow legislators and was familiar with government and what was needed at home. W. Robinson, a columnist for the San Fe New Mexican, wrote on J. G. passing "The diminutive Senator from Lincoln County who stood 12 feet tall in the Legislature." He was a fit representative for our people in the area, and a good friend and neighbor.

While serving Lincoln County as Senator, J. G. 's Insurance business continued to grow. In 1954 he purchased the building next to Figgley Wiggley and introduced a new service, the New Mexico Acceptance Corporation, which loaned amounts of

Life to the early pioneer was a challenge and the colonial housewife's main concern was the welfare and survival for her family. She recycled old clothes into warm bed covers. Our early ancestors initiated a new art form in the process, a craft that Lincoln County

women enjoy today. Like radio broadcaster Paul Harvey and his traveling microphone, I plan to have a "traveling column" in the county this summer. I would like to visit and "talk quilts" with fellow quilt enthusiasts, male or female. I would even like to include neighboring Otero county. By the way, it was a pleasant surprise to find out that the Alamogordo Public Library includes the NEWS in their newspaper rack.

To one person "depression" meant standing in bread lines or walking the streets looking for work. To another, it meant business failure or loss of life's saving in a bank. To the nation it meant economic paralysis. This is what it was like during the "Great Depression" of the early 30's.

In later years, during World War II ration boards used "certificates" for automobiles, tires, typewriters and stoves. The "coupon" system was used for items that consumers bought again and again, like foods, gasoline and shoes. Rationed items in the U.S. included bicycles, fuel oil, and Kerosene. Sugar was rationed the longest. Most rationing ended in 1945.

Last month Pres. Carter told the nation about his anti-inflation plan and appealed to Americans to accept our first real belt-tightening, since World War II. I have operated my household under my own anti-inflation program for years. A consumer survey by a group of business publications sound like WW II all over again, when patriotic Americans were urged to: "Use it up, wear it out, make it do, fix it up or do without."

This has always been my personal anti-inflation move and one that I instill in my children. I've been piecing and patching for years. An example was my Easter "finery" which consisted of a lined bolero style vest, with matching A-line skirt—created out of faded, worn out jeans of the five men in my life, who range in ages of two to forty years. My Strauss original is fashioned in the "crazy

patch" style with seams machine-embroidered.

In the olden days quilting bees served as a means to exchange bits of gossip, like marriages, births and other local happenings. That is why local news columns in weekly newspapers are reminiscent of the quilting bee. While women quilted, the men helped each other to build a barn or a bridge. In the evening all enjoyed a big meal and dance music. Carrizozo's upcoming clean up day in May will be like a giant quilting bee in that the community will join forces to work and enjoy a big noon luncheon. The quilting bee also reminds me of Second Annual Carrizozo Community Easter Celebration last Sunday evening. The music and singing was excellent, the reception goodies were perfect, the fellowship superior. What a delightful way to top a wonderful Easter Day—rubbing elbows with Christians of all churches.

The out-of-towners at the event included the Capitan Youth Singers, the Capitan Community Choir and the Miller children of Ancho, all on the program. Sheriff and Mrs. Sanchez' their daughter Janice were there from Glencoe. Guests of Eileen Lambert were there, Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Burrell of Fairview, Oklahoma. Mr. and Mrs. Andrew R. Leach from Fennville, Michigan were having a wonderful time. They have been in Carrizozo for several weeks helping with Taeria Foundation.

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Thinkin' In Lincoln by Mary Ellen Payne

Onions, will keep from 6 to 8 months if you store them in a cool, dry place, especially if they have been "cured" says the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture (USDA). During March, onions should be one of the better food buys as a result of heavy storage holdings of summer-crops and harvest of spring-crop in Texas. Ideally, onions stay fresh longer at temperatures of 32 to 36 F., just above freezing, and a relative humidity between 60 to 70 Percent. In home storage, it is even more important, to be sure to keep them in a cool, dry place where air can circulate. You can recognize onions that have been cured by tight necks and tough outer scales that are dried until they rustle. Also look for clean, hard and well-shaped onions.

A sulfur-containing volatile oil gives the onion its flavor. The concentration of the oil is determined by the moisture and soluble sulfur compounds in the onion and the area

where grown. White onions, for example, generally have the highest moisture content and thus are milder than the yellow or red varieties. Their higher moisture content makes them more perishable than yellow varieties. To enhance your favorite onion recipe be sure to select the proper variety for its intended purpose. Scallions and chives are best minced raw and sprinkled into an Omelet, over salads or baked potatoes. Red Spanish or large yellow onions are best for baking. Use the small, sweet white onions for boiling and creaming.

ONIONS SAUCE

- 1 1/2 cups minced onion
- 3/4 cup boiling water
- 1 1/2 cups milk, scalded
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Dash paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 2 egg yolks, beaten

Place onion in water. Cook until tender. Drain off liquid. (There should be 1 cup of pulp). Combine scalded milk, onion pulp, salt, paprika and mustard. Cook for five minutes. Combine flour with beaten egg yolks. Gradually beat hot onion mixture into egg yolk mixture. Cook for five minutes. Yield 2 1/2 cups onion sauce.

BEST-EVER ONION SOUP

- 2 Medium sweet, milk onions
 - 2 cups of beef or chicken stock
 - 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire Sauce
 - sal, pepper
 - 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- Thinly slice onions, Sauté in butter. Add stock, Worcestershire Sauce; season to taste. Simmer 15 minutes. Serves 4.

Bobcat Ban to End

The Department of Game and Fish has requested lifting of a federal district court ban against export of bobcat pelts taken in this state during the 1970-80 season.

"We believe we've stannied the objections the court had to management of bobcat populations in New Mexico," said Wain Evans, assistant chief of the department. "The Legislature has given us authority to manage the bobcat, and we've recently completed analysis of a considerable amount of data showing that bobcat populations in New Mexico are in no danger of being over-trapped."

He said computer modeling of bobcat populations in the state show natural fluctuations in the population from year to year. These changes are probably caused primarily by climatic conditions and their effects on the amount of prey available to bobcats, and the effects of prey availability on survival of kittens to adulthood.

"Even the increased trapping pressure of the past few years doesn't seem to have much effect on bobcat population rises and falls," Evans said. "Overall, bobcats are in good shape and the populations here are stable."

BSI Gives Report

In a statement issued earlier today, A.G. Hamilton, President and Chief Executive Officer of Bank Securities, Inc., reported the final audited consolidated financial statements just received for 1979 for the statewide bank holding company reflected an overall net loss after taxes and security losses of \$1,240,335. Hamilton, part of a new senior management team which includes

Robert O. Anderson of Roswell, said that this is \$444,335 more than reported earlier based upon preliminary unaudited figures. The new loss for 1979 is 70 cents per share compared with new income for 1978 of 96 cents per share on an undiluted basis.

Contributing to the loss was the sale of investment securities at the end of 1979 resulting in an after tax loss of \$1,459,267 which the company expects will result in a cash refund of income taxes for prior and current periods of \$1,601,921; proceeds from the sale of the securities were re-invested and the company expects an increased investment yield. Other items contributing to the new loss were non-recurring loan write-offs and capitalization of leases together with high interest rates in 1979.

Bank Securities, Inc. owns eight banks and a statewide trust company with 31 locations throughout the state of New Mexico.

Douglas G. Nichols has been named Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of Security Trust Company. It was announced today by A.G. Hamilton, Chairm of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of Bank Securities, Inc., the parent holding company. Nichols comes to Security Trust Co. from the First City Bank of Dallas, Texas, where he was executive vice president and in charge of the trust department.

Nichols, a native of Sedalia, Missouri, graduated from the University of Missouri with a major in accounting and brings to Security Trust a record of achievement that includes two years with the Federal Reserve Bank in Kansas City, nine years with the Comptroller of the Currency in Washington, D.C., seven years at the Albuquerque National Bank as vice president, in addition to his tenure with the First City Bank of Dallas.

The request that Federal District Court Judge June Green, Washington, D.C., rescind her order against export of New Mexico bobcat pelts is being made through the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and is expected to be in the court system by the end of March or early in April.

Ruling on a case brought by Defenders of Wildlife and Committee for Humane Legislation in an attempt to ban exports of all bobcat pelts taken in the United States, Judge Green had allowed exports from most states but prohibited them from Wisconsin, North Dakota, Florida, Massachusetts, New Mexico and parts of Oregon and Texas.
