Center Control Changes

Mayor Manuel Hernandez said at a special meeting last Tuesday that in the five years he has been on the Carrizozo Town Council the Recreation Committee "members come and go" and disputes arise among them often.

Hernandez said that "for the benefit of the Town, the Rec Center and the public" that the Recreation Committee should be dissolved. Action was taken by the council to discontinue the volunteer service.

The special meeting was called by Hernandez because he had received complaints about the Recreation Committee and that they can't agree on hiring a manager for the Recreation Center.

Morgan Maxwell, chairman of the committee up until Tuesday said that local applicants "have not been suitable" and that the committee differ in opinion on the out-of-town applicants.

Town Attorney Bill Payne stated to the board at that time that the Board of Trustees could not do away with the Recreation Board without public notice, which had not been done for this meeting.

Payne offered the board an alternative of removing all of the members of the board, since that would curtail all of the Recreation Committee's actions if they did not have any members.

It was then moved by Ruben Zamora and seconded by Dr. Moreland to remove the six present members, Morgan Maxwell, Mike Swickard, Philip Payne, Gilbert Archuleta, Joe Schippers and recently appointed Dale Housley because of their "inability to agree".

Before a vote could be taken, Recreation Board Secretary-Treasurer, Mike Swickard asked the board if they would listen to arguments about this. The board hesitated, but finally agreed to listen to comments from the four members of the six-man-board that were at the meeting.

Swickard explained to the board that the person that they seek as manager of the Center must "wear four caps and be very good at it," referring to four areas an applicant must be skilled in. He said the committee qualifications call for knowledge of bowling, alley management, of culinary arts, recreational promotion and business administration.

He pointed out that the snack shop of the center could be a good source of revenue and that the entire facility is beneficial to the youth of the town. Swickard has been offering local youth free karate classes at the center.

Swickard stated to the Town Council that the vote of the Recreation Board had been 4 to 1 and that they were not hopelessly deadlocked. In fact, the board had voted 5 to 0 on several measures.

"The Problem", said Swickard, "was going to be resolved by May 31st."

Swickard went on to explain that the board had re-opened application on April 24th, for a period of two weeks because the present applicants did not completely fit the needs of the Center. On May 8th a decision would have been made.

Swickard finished his comments with, "This all was put to me tonight, and I have not had time to think about your action much, but Gentlemen, what makes you think you can do a better job than the Recreation Committee?"

In the closing statement, Swickard pointed out the none of the present Town Council go to the recreation center at all. "At least I am there every night helping the kids of this community for free, I don't believe you know anything about recreation at all," Swickard added.

Despite Swickard's attempt to convince the council to keep the present recreation committee, or appoint another committee, the board voted to suspend all of the present members, not to appoint any more, and to take over control completely of the Recreation Center and the Golf Course.

There had been speculation among local residents on the continuance of the financial support provided by a generous benefactor, Jackie Spencer. The Carrizozo Golf Course and Recreation Center remain in existence because of her annual donation bestowed in quarterly portions.

Hernandez early in the meeting suggested that they "do away with the Recreation Committee" and let the council take charge since they do the "paper work and handle the money end of it."

Golf Course Superintendent Henry Vega, who has been helping out with the Center's management, was given full authority to oversee the facility until a manager is hired.

Vega stated at the meeting that the center would be open only on Thursday nights so that the Thursday Men's League can finish. After that, the center's future is uncertain.

Replacement of the prison facility is expected to take \$5 million of Capital Outlay money. Only 22 school districts, as opposed to 40 last year, have applied for money this year. Capitan is eligible for money provided they are bonded to full capacity. The school is presently 104 percent.

The Board approved the 1980-81 proposed budget with the grand total of \$2,523,982.

The resignations of Mike and Sandra Ritz were also accepted.

Clifton was set to gathering title binders and clearing the way to exchange 6.2 acres of Forest Service land for 2.9 acres of Capitan School property.

Board Faces Problems

Cornell Construction Co., recipients of the Phase One Capitan High School project may find a delay due to the law concerning the number of feet from a state highway a school can be.

The Capitan School Board awarded Cornell Con., with base bid of \$442,327, the contract with the first alternate. Alternate one, \$48,762, omits the science furniture and equipment from the cost of the base bid, leaving the contract at \$793,565.

The subcontractor on the science equipment was at question, failing to fulfill the prior ten-job record required by the school specifications. The architect had accepted the subcontractor on a verbal trust but had not received the necessary information. Jerry Lake suggested the School Board take Alternate One and there will be no rebid on the science furniture.

"I made the mistake and I'll try to rectify it," Lake stated.

The problem now lies with the law concerning the number of feet from a state highway. The rule lists a school must be at least four hundred feet away from a state highway. Since the Capitan Schools already have a gymnasium within 400 feet of Highway 280 the Board felt the State Board of Education would waive the ruling. A verbal approval was given before the drawing began. No waiver had arrived at the time of the Board meeting, giving the members of the Board concern about the 90-day limit on the contract. Lake assured them he would get a 15 day extension if necessary. Superintendent Clifton will go before the state board May 1 to get the waiver.

Because of all these problems no legal awarding of the \$793,565 project will be made until okay comes from Santa Fe.

Problems were the main theme of the April meeting as the Board found themselves very close to court over not allowing mentally retarded students attend Capitan Schools.

State and Federal Laws require all school age children be given free and adequate education. All is the catch word and conserve, a center for legal defense of special education children, has informed Capitan School if they do not accept eight students from Fort Stanton, the school will face suit.

This has faced the Capitan Schools for three years. Previously, the administration felt they had not received adequate information to evaluate the students for proper placement.

The decision will not go to the State Hearing Office. Capitan schools may have to create a special program for these students.

The lack of facilities is no excuse under federal law, Superintendent Clifton explained. The special needs of the special education students, such as psychiatric counseling and nurses to administer medication, must also be met by the school.

Larger school districts are also faced with accepting the special education students. But the large number of such students allows for a bigger program, with special funds to finance them. Capitan Board and the school administrators felt the special education requirement will put Capitan and all other small school districts in a bind.

The public law allows for mainstreaming these students with appropriate age groups.

Clifton received and revised the 1980-81 budget with an increase in transportation costs with total money based on the present 350 students.

The \$850,000 coming from Capital Outlay for phase one of the High School will remain the cash balance and can be used only for the high school facility.

Any money received from capital outlay this July will increase the general operational budget.

Clifton reported the chances for Capital Outlay money are very good this year. He will propose \$2,500,000 for Phase II of the high school, but expects to get less than half of that.

Mary Thorpe, Dr. Moreland, Choncho Morales, Ruben Zamora, Dale Housley, Beulah Moore and Joe Orack. Money and door prize donations by merchants and individuals are an important part of the event. Mary Ellen Payne is the chairman of this second annual clean up day.

This past Tuesday the schools distributed forms to the students asking for their participation at "Clean Up Carrizozo Day". It was requested that each helper bring 5 (five) large strong plastic trash bags. Maps will be given to adult

leaders of the area they are to clean and a group of young people assigned to help.

Sister Jan Geba will be in charge of first aid for the clean up. If anyone has a base station contact Mary Ellen Payne. A CB hookup is needed.

The clean up will also involve the pick up of large items such as tree limbs and other large trash. Pick up will be made on Thursday and Friday, May 1 and 2 by calling City Hall 648-2861. The New Horizons Center will be participating in this part of the clean up effort.

Society Discusses Ft. Stanton

—Between 1000 and 1500 AD "from the great Athapescan hive in the northwest of Canada", came the nomadic Apaches, who by 1700 had driven out the pueblo dwellers in this area.

Having expelled the Pueblo Indians, the Mescalero Apaches occupied this southwest quarter of New Mexico so jealously for the next one hundred fifty years that it was avoided by prudent Spanish and Anglo Americans alike.

Sheep herders from the villages of Manzano and Torreon on the eastern slope of the Manzano Mountains near Albuquerque, long subject to Indian raids, decided it was worth the risk to hazard Mescaleros on their own ground, in the upper Tularosa Basin and on the slopes of the Jicarilla, Sierra Blanca, and Capitan Mountains. The Mescaleros permitted these herders to graze their flocks in Apache domain simply because it brought nearer a supply for plunder.

As these herders and their families arrived and stayed in increasing numbers, the Mescaleros, feeling threatened, attacked them repeatedly.

These raids by Apaches, considered by prospering merchant-traders and territorial officials to be savages standing in the way of progress, were not to be tolerated. So military steps were initiated to deal with the Indian problem.

In March, 1855 the location for a fort was selected nine miles above future Lincoln town, and construction began. It was named for young Captain Henry Whiting Stanton, fresh from West Point, who had been killed by the Apaches during the January reconnaissance high up in the neighboring Sacramento Mountains. The presence of Fort Stanton encouraged more settlers.

The preceding was part of the narration of the presentation at the Lincoln County Historical Society meeting last Saturday evening, April 26.

Have you ever wished you could somehow take a trip back in time, a trip into the past so that you could see how things really existed and how people lived?

Members and friends of the Lincoln County Historical Society were able to take such a trip through a

program in the form of a script that depicted the history of Fort Stanton. The following were part of the program, with Nora Henn as narrator: Don Wall (Lt. Walter Finley); Lisa Cantrell (Mima Wright); Carolyn Cantrell (Sofie Pool); Barbara Jeanne Branum (Lydia, wife of Lt. William B. Lane); Walter Henn (Dr. Daniel Appel and Samuel A. Russell); Dr. Howard Tate (Confederate Corporal York).

Readings from books, letters, a diary and other sources written by individuals who lived in Fort Stanton between 1853 and 1866 were a major part of the script and included the story of Corporal York, as told by Tate. The Confederate soldier was Tate's great-grandfather.

Fort Stanton was established in May, 1853 on Rio Bonito, to control the Mescalero and White Mountain Apaches. In August 1861, the fort was abandoned and partially destroyed by its garrison following the invasion of New Mexico by Confederate troops from Texas. The original fort was two miles south of the present Ft. Stanton. The post was occupied by the Confederates for a few months, then abandoned again as they retreated back to Texas.

In the fall of 1862 Ft. Stanton was occupied by Union Forces under the command of Col. Kit Carson. In 1863 it was moved to its present location and permanent structures were erected. These are the buildings that the visitors may see today.

Ft. Stanton was abandoned and turned over to the Interior Department on August 17, 1896. In 1899 it was turned over to the Public Health Service to be used as a Marine hospital. In June 1953, Ft. Stanton was turned over to the State of New Mexico for use as a tuberculosis sanatorium, then later converted to a hospital for the mentally retarded. At

present it is also being used as a minimum security facility for the New Mexico Penitentiary, known as the Camp Sierra Blanca Honor Farm. Although Ft. Stanton has been in continuous use since 1855, and has had a number of different owners and uses, many of the original buildings are still standing today.

Eve Ball, book writer from Ruidoso was present at the Lincoln County Historical Soc., meeting and fellow members were pleased at the announcement that her latest book, "Indeh, An Apache Odyssey" will soon be released. Ball is an authority on Indian history, and her book represents a lifetime's work. A date and location will be announced later for a program and signing party to be held in her honor.

The Lincoln County Historical Society with Barbara Jeanne Branum presiding, met at Fort Stanton's Administration Building. Refreshments were served by the generosity of the staff. Mr. Mark Delgado, Fort Stanton administrator said that anyone wishing copies of the old photos that he had on hand that evening, should get in touch with him.

Quilting Bits by polly

Patchwork quilts are coming back as folk art. Patchwork involves thrift and artistry. Although called 'quilts' this type of bed covering can be tied or tacked with yarn after assembling the top and basting to batting and lining. Patchwork quilts can serve as sheet, blanket and bedspread and facilitates bed making.

The revival of needlework enjoyed today is one of the oldest crafts in the world. For thousands of years needles have been used to make beautiful articles for personal and home use, from delicate embroidery on clothing to tapestries for walls to bed coverings.

Last Saturday, history buff Marge Bodwell of Alamogordo, worked on a needlepoint project during the meeting of the Lincoln County Historical Society. A member of the organization, Marge listened attentively to the program presented that evening at historical Fort Stanton.

Prior to the start of the meeting Marge told the ladies near her that doing needlework at meetings makes her a much better listener. Those around her agreed that needlework does make a person an alert participant at meetings.

So far Marge has made four needlepoint chair covers. She plans to cover six Victorian chairs. When Marge finishes her project she will have an exquisite example of needlepoint, which is an ancient form of embroidery. Although needlepoint is not in the line of quilting, embroidery is incorporated in quilting. Embroidery decorates the crazy quilt and is also used on quilt top blocks for flowers, animals and other outlines.

One morning last week as I studied my quilt patterns over my second cup of coffee, my son Michael said, "Mom, I can't do this". Without asking he had found a threaded needle and was trying to mend a rip in his pants—while they were on him. I felt like a negligent mother as I watched my second grader try to fix his pants so that he could be on his way to school.

So this is what I did: I showed him how to mend his pants. First I had him remove his pants so that he could work on them better. As I explained the process I could tell that he liked to stitch. When he came home from school he was eager for his first lesson on quilting.

The children of Peru use bright-colored yarns to work the 'chain stitch' on local homespun wool woven by the women. The sale of stitcheries make it possible for the children to buy shoes and school supplies. Although I do not intend to have Michael work his way through elementary school, I realize that stitchery can be fun for children. It develops appreciation of color and texture. Stitchery is valuable in developing creativity in children. (By the way Michael is a boxer and has many trophies to prove this he is skilled in the "manly art of self-defense".)

QUILTING BEE TALK - A silver from a dry bar of soap will make a good marker on a quilt top. It will wash out later....Coloring books are a great source for embroidery patterns....Iron the seam away from the light patch when you stitch a light patch to a dark patch. It won't show through....Did you know that Magdalena, N.M. realized a ten-year-old dream - a community library? An old Santa Fe depot was turned into a library. Magdalena women made a quilt to provide more funds for the new library.

Just before leaving the Lincoln County Historical Society meeting last Saturday I met Harriet McGinnis. She accompanied Hattie Phillips to Fort Stanton. They both live in the Lincoln area. (Hattie writes Lincoln news for this newspaper) Harriet and I got to 'talking quilts'. She recently completed a multi-color tied comforter. When asked what pattern she used, Harriet laughed and replied, "...hit and miss!"


