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Judy Bell With Smokey 1950

Legend lives on -- May Marks 30th Anniversary of Rescue

This month will mark the thirtieth anniversary of the rescue of a famous New Mexico Native - Smokey the Bear.

Perhaps the most popular and successful campaign conducted by the federal government, Smokey the Bear found personification in the little burned cub found in the Lincoln National Forest.

The bear cub inspired the Disney-like poster image so well known today. Small wonder, in 1950, the Forest Service was looking for the perfect thing for their fire-prevention campaign. With its roots in the World War II years, the campaign to "Stomp out all fires" grew in popularity as Smokey's image appeared everywhere. It was a campaign so successful that the rate of man-caused forest fires dropped.

But May 1950 in Capitan was hot and very dry, with a steady and sometimes ruthless wind that whipped a spark along the Capitan Gap road into a blaze.

Smokey was found several days after the major portion of the fire had been put out. The fire, which burned 17,000 acres started on the 11th, Smokey was found on the 9th, in axon a burned out tree, "kinda smoking a little bit himself".

Smokey was treated for his burns and kept in New Mexico a month, then he was taken to the National Zoo in Washington, D.C. Rise to fame in a short month was Smokey's fate.

Now, almost four years after the bear's death in Washington, the Smokey Bear Historical State Park and the Village Museum, create a memorial for the bear and what his symbol has become.

The copyrighted symbol, created by artist Rudy Wynn, has earned the U.S. Forest Service over \$1.5 million and has helped operate the agency's fire prevention program.

Smokey Bear souvenirs, such as T-shirts, cups and bowls, coffee cups, car rings, pocket knives and coins exploit the Smokey image, all paying royalties to the U.S. Forest Service.

Smokey Bear aficionados can find these for sale at the Smokey Bear Museum and a display at the Park's interpretive center.

Smokey's remains lie in a well-marked grave within the park, a tribute to the interest from civic groups and private citizens in Capitan along with their congressional representative, Harold Runnel, to get Smokey back to Capitan.

The original Forest Service plan was to have Smokey die quietly at the National Zoo. Smokey had been retired as the official Smokey in May 1975. Word of this got out and the people of Capitan, who had constructed a log museum in 1960, wanted Smokey to come home. It took an act of Congress to get the bear's remains back to Capitan.

Smokey was a prime attraction at the National Zoo, but he was not a run of the mill bear, his keeper said he was more of an executive type and did not beg for tidbits and food from tourists.

Smokey's death in 1976 prompted New Mexico legislation to ap-

propriate money for the park construction. A visitors center, "unlike any before" is the focus of the 3.6 acre park in the heart of Capitan.

Sandy Henson now supervises the park's completion which has been slowed by trickling state funds.

The popularity gained by Smokey seems to continue. The number of visitors at the museum per month has risen over the one thousand mark. And curator Willie Hobbs estimates each visitor spends a dollar.

More state money will be spent this year for Capitol improvement on the park grounds and the old depot which is owned by the state.

Smokey the Bear, is far from dead. The remains of a bear found in the Capitan Mountains are in the park to remind everyone that Smokey the Bear is an idea that can't die.

According to former director of Parks and Recreation, Sam Graft, "Smokey the Bear is now a legend and legends really never pass away."

from the mayors' desk . . .

Mr. Swickard;

I don't know if you are trying to make yourself look good or what - but as far as I am concerned the Chairman of the Recreation Center Board was Mr. Morgan Maxwell and I am sorry to say that you took it upon yourself to act as chairman and Mr. Swickard, that is the reason you all (the Rec. Center Committee) could not agree. What is the use of having a chairman who is trying to do his job but cannot because he is constantly being rudely interrupted??

Yes, you had found a man to fill the position of Recreation Center manager who did not have the qualifications - only that he was a cook and you thought that was qualification enough. Yet you offered the man \$1,000.00 a month (with a 6 month guarantee). You were so involved in trying to get this person hired the fact there is only \$1,700.00 in the fund to operate for 3 months (minus salaries) didn't seem to bother you much. How did you figure on keeping this person on the job at the rate you were going to pay him PLUS a 6 month guarantee??

Mr. Swickard, it seems to me that you were trying to run the Rec. Center in the same way you run your own business. Need I say more??

Wouldn't it seem logical to close the Rec. Center for a short period to get it back into shape for the next season than to let it keep going in the shape it's in now??

I am not writing this to snowball you this close to summer - but you did a pretty good job of cutting down the Council.

You mentioned we (the Council) never went to the Recreation Center - you yourself stated you had seen me there several times. I'll have you know - I know more about recreation than you..

Your committee had never consulted the council regarding any of the problems or otherwise.

As you well know, the town was \$30,000.00 in the hole 4 years ago and we (the Council) managed to bring it out of the red and into the black. The Town has since purchased: a backhoe, new police car, grader, pickup truck for Town Foreman, and garbage truck; completed Industrial park and raised the salaries of town

employees 3 times. We have a new water and sewer project and solar heating system for the swimming pool is in progress. The Fred Chavez minipark was built and equipped. Also the town business is being taken care of by less employees than before and is doing just as good a job.

I would appreciate you getting the facts straight before rumors get out of hand.

Mr. Hernandez, I will take your letter point by point. First I was not trying to make myself look good, I was trying to do something good for the children of our community.

You seem to have put in a lot of time at the meeting when you said that it was because the board was hopelessly deadlocked that you were dissolving the board. We were voting 4 to 1, and I was just one of the four votes in the majority. You have now stated that it was because of me and my actions that you took your actions.

If you had at anytime indicated that you wished me to resign, I would have done so quickly.

In your statement, you did not answer the major objections that I had raised in my first article, so please answer these:

1.) What makes you think I was acting as chairman? How many members did you speak to of the Recreation Committee to decide that I was not doing as I should. Name your sources.

2.) Have you looked at the Recreation Center Board minutes to see if anything was voted on to the contrary?

3.) Did I offer anyone anything in the line of the Recreation Center? You need to name the person that accuses me of this violation.

4.) Did you notify anyone of your intentions to act, so that public comment could have been secured.

Also, explain the comment that I was rudely interrupting someone so that the board could not get its work done. Again tell us where you got this information. If I am anything, it is that I am a gentleman. I allow everyone to speak their mind. Tell us publicly who said I was rude, and why you believed them.

Now about the man that I was recommending for the position of manager, a person that withdrew his desire to help until you got your act together. I can see that you did not listen at all to what I said at the meeting. The man in question worked at the Carrizozo Recreation Center for three years with Joe Light. On the machines, at the front desk, and in the snack bar. He knows the Recreation Center and how to operate it.

He also graduated from the one year program at TVI in Albuquerque in Culinary Arts. That is the management and operation of a food business.

He then spent four years at the Hilton Inn in Albuquerque as a banquet and special chef, not just a cook. That is a lot of recommendation. He is now going to college at UNM in Business Management but would have come down and helped us out.

The man in question was the only person that I talked to in the screening process that even came close to all of the areas needed at the center.

This is something that I would know since I am there at the center every day, and you Mr. Mayor I have not seen you there during regular hours in many months.

Next, your figure of \$1,700 bothers me, since that was not the information that I had at the time. We were told at our meeting just five days earlier that we had somewhere around \$8,000 in that account by Town Clerk Christine Chavez. I agree that is not enough, but Mr. Mayor, we were working on making the center pay for itself. You don't make money while you are closed.

You next made fun of the fact that the Lincoln County News is having a tough time making it with this recession going strong. It is very rude of you to mention this. Most of the businesses in Lincoln County are just hanging on and hoping for something better to happen. I, like them, am feeling the pinch of inflation. In the last year (April '79 to April '80), my supplies have increased in price 700 percent. The Compugraphic paper that I type this column on the the newspaper has gone from \$4.00 a roll two years ago, to \$7.50 a roll last year, to \$48.50 a roll right now. Your comment may have been funny to some, but I doubt to any that are in business for themselves.

Next, we have just now gotten the foot traffic into the center up somewhere around four fold, and now you are going to close for three months. Not very smart.

And not good for the kids, what are they to do? They carried some bowling and swimming passes, was that just a joke on them?

And just what needs to be done at the Center that it must be closed for three months? You have not been there, and you do not know!

All in all I was not so much cutting the Council down, as pointing out that you, Mr. Mayor, did not act properly. You should have notified me as to what the special meeting was about. Several members of the Council admitted to me that they knew what was up. The town clerk knew, but the members of the Recreation Board did not.

You are a public official, you must act like one. You must make the meeting truly public. The town attorney told you that you could not dissolve the Recreation Committee without giving the Public time to talk about it. Instead you chose to use a

loop-hole in the ordinance and remove all of the members, so as to do away with the committee. That does not

inspire any confidence in you and the Council.

We, the public, have the right to have a say in the way that the town business is conducted. If people had known what you were intending, I am sure that there would have been a full house. You slipped the meeting by the public. Yes, it was posted at the town hall that the Recreation Committee was going to meet with the Town Council. But you knew what was up, and you didn't tell us, so that we could have had interested people there to speak their mind. I can see that you do not want to hear what the public thinks.

You are the Mayor of Carrizozo. We have trusted you with that position. You were not elected Mayor, though, and you should remember that fact. Therefore, you should do everything in your power to inspire the confidence of the people.

If you are not prepared to act like a public official, in the public trust, I believe your resignation is in order. And one more thing. I can not let you get away saying that you know more about recreation than I. Let us publicly see your credentials.

I have run the Carrizozo Swimming Pool in 1973, 1974, and 1977. I worked part-time in recreation in Alamogordo while going to high school, and got my Senior Lifesaving there; I worked for the Methodist Church at the Wesley Foundation in Las Cruces in the Outreach Recreation program while going to college.

I am a certified New Mexico teacher, and I student taught at Albuquerque High where I started the Table Tennis team. I am rated nationally by the United States Table Tennis Association (1947) and the team from Albuquerque High won the State Championship with ten High Schools competing.

Also right now I am giving free Karate lessons to people of the community and specially kids, when I could be charging for the lessons. I am a certified instructor and the school I come from is the Alamogordo School of Karate, Mr. John Hardin, owner and head instructor.

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

Open letter to all parents:



Soil Stewardship Theme: 'The Judgement of Nature'

The Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District will join in the nationwide celebration of Soil Stewardship Week to take place on May 11-18, according to an announcement by Chairman Gary Hightower.

The theme of this year's celebration is "The Judgment of Nature." It's focus is especially appropriate as the United States considers the current condition of its soil, water and related resources, said Hightower.

"Through nature, we are linked with the past and committed to the future," it is said in the 16-page "Judgment of Nature" reference booklet, which presents thoughts for consideration not only during Soil Stewardship Week, but throughout the year. Nature is defined in the publication as the continuing system of life created by God.

"Nature is neither fixed nor static; it is a continuing process and inherently dynamic . . . it rewards care and constructive attention, even as it penalizes negligence and deliberate damage," the booklet states.

"The loss of some 3 million acres of productive agricultural land each year through urbanization and other uses, the decline in productivity of the topsoil as the result of destructive erosion, and continuing pollution of the nation's waters is serious cause for everyone's concern," the sponsors believe. Participation in Soil Stewardship Week activities offers an opportunity to reflect on the nation's natural resource problems and consider actions to resolve them or reduce their impact.

The National Association of Conservation Districts has sponsored Soil Stewardship Week in the United States since 1955, in cooperation with the nation's nearly 3,000 soil and water conservation districts. 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


Dear Editor,


