



## 40th Annual Meeting--

# Camp Meeting Set for 16th to 20th

Nogal Mesa in Lincoln County will hold its 40th Ranchmen's Interdenominational Camp Meeting, July 16 through the 20th.

In our complex modern American existence, the simplicity of gathering with friends who foster no ulterior motives of avarice, self-importance, or political influence, makes Camp Meeting the place to renew a reverence for life—the simple life, the way our pioneering forefathers did.

Camp Meeting is a place where families share the awareness of our great American blessings of freedom in the natural beauty of the forested mountains. With the help of the preachers' words, voluntary choral music, and simple Christian faith, you will enjoy the unique experience of truly western hospitality and friendliness. There is the fun of games, hay

rides, and bon fires too.

Martin E. Marty, one of our most influential religious professors says, "Successful living is a journey toward simplicity and triumph over confusion. The route of this journey often reorders our lives."

If you journey to Nogal Mesa, you will hear the preachers this year, Wayne Stockstill of Lancaster, California, Dan Wright of Crane Texas, Paul Biggs will again direct the music and choirs. The officers in charge of running the camp are Wall Wilson, Johnson Stearns, and Bob Carrizozo, and Opal and Lamoyne Peters of Capitan. Camp managers will again be Rick and Randy Steele.

Chloe Peters and Glenda Armstrong will conduct Memorial Services Saturday afternoon for those who have passed away during the

year. The 1980 theme will be, "The Rose That Bloomed Beyond the Wall." Anne Ferguson and Margo Lindsay will direct the young people from Carrizozo, Corona, and Capitan in the dish-washing brigade.

Lincoln County ranchers and their families will see to the setting up of more than 600 camps on the 23 acres and the preparation and serving of more than 7000 meals. Homer Fillingim chairs the youth group and Wanda and Lewis Deyo will oversee the children. A fenced area with sponsors is provided for pre-school children and plans are for the erection of a shelter for them in memory of our late centenarian, Molly Boah.

For those attending for the first time — there is camping space available at no charge for those

participating in the services. You must furnish your own camping equipment. Water, electricity, and rest rooms are provided. Expenses for meals are defrayed by free-will donations. All persons are asked to register at the booth for the purpose. Youngsters must be sponsored or accompanied by adults. Dogs should be left home as they bark or roam, often disturbing others.

The tabernacle and dining halls give roof shelter, but jackets and rainwear are essential for chill evenings and summer showers. The altitude is 7000 feet. A nurse is present for minor physical handicaps. Certain camp rules are posted for the comfort and convenience of this totally non-commercial gathering.

If camping is not possible, everyone is welcome to attend daily services. Meals are served chuckwagon style at 6:00 a.m. to 8:00, 12:30 and 6:30 p.m. Tavernacle services are at 11:00 a.m., 3:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. Group prayer meetings are held at 8:00 p.m. A bell is rung 5 minutes before each meal and service. A fun campfire ends each day.

Ministers of all faiths are requested to offer assistance in counseling and Bible Schools. If you like to sing, join the volunteers for choir practice.

Booklets are available telling the history, experiences of the founders 40 years ago, and general information about the Nogal Mesa Camp Meeting. The registrars will answer any questions, settle any problems of accommodation, and try to make your stay enjoyable.

The grounds can be reached by the Lincoln National Forest road turning off US 380 at the sign, about 5 miles west of Capitan and 15 miles east of Carrizozo; or by the road at the Nogal Mesa sign off State Road 37. Further information may be obtained from Johnson Stearns, Citizens State Bank of Carrizozo, NM 88301.

No reservations are necessary. The first meal will be at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday evening, July 16, to be followed by the first service at 8:00 p.m. The Camp Meeting will close the last service Sunday, July 20, to be held at 8:00 p.m.

The final workday will be Saturday the 19th, to complete all preparations for one of Lincoln County's outstanding summer events.

## Lost Boys are Found Safe

After spending the night in the Capitan wilderness ten-year-old Lon Johnson and ten-year-old Gary Allison were found in "good health" according to Lincoln County Sheriff's Department.

The boys, both residents of Roswell were camping with their parents on Seventh Cabin Canyon, north of Capitan and near Five Lodge. The boys were last seen at 12 noon on July 4 and found on the 5th after 6:00 p.m. They were found two and a half miles from where the families were camping.

White Mountain Search and Rescue coordinated the search. Socorro Search and Rescue, US Forest Service, Mounted Patrol, Lincoln Sheriff Department and Ruidoso's REACT team assisted in the search. In addition three helicopters were used; two from Holloman Air Force Base and one from the Forest Service based in Capitan.

In other county police activity, Deputy Sheriff Jay McSwane flew July 9 to Sequen, Texas to pick up a prisoner who was under Lincoln County Sheriff's warrant. Jack Curless Page, 40, Hondo Valley is charged with issuing worthless checks over \$3,500.00.

Capitan village police officer Randy Spear arrested Richard Avina 21, for assault on July 3. Avina is out on \$300.00 bond.

Freddy Paralia 37, and wife Ida Paralia 3 were booked on "de-tax" on July 3 and released next day. Carrizozo town policeman Dave Wheeler was the arresting officer.

Deputy Sheriff for the Bonita area, Jim Stuart arrested Stephen Ralph Ross 31, on DWI charges. He was released on a \$200.00 bond.

July 5, a Ruidoso youth was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Bobby Barnes on larceny charges. The juvenile was released to the custody of his brother.

Following an anonymous call to the Sheriff's office, a 60-foot tent stolen from the Valley of Fires State Park was recovered. The tent property of the county Extension Department was to be used by the Lincoln County Ranch Tour event and was stolen the night before the tour and found near the Carrizozo landfill.

Carrizozo town foreman, Emilio Beltran reported to town police on July 3 that a CB radio from a 1966 Dodge Pickup was damaged and piled from inside the town truck. Value of the damage totaled \$60.00. Beltran also reported earlier that gas was stolen from a town vehicle parked at the town yard. This incident occurred over the 4th of July weekend.

On B Avenue an 8 track player, tapes and case worth \$0.00 were stolen from a parked vehicle, as well as gas from two vehicles parked in the resident's yard.

A resident at 1023 C Street reported to town police that he discovered a 5-ball Roman candle on his bed. An open window was discovered. Children were seen playing with fireworks in the vicinity.

George Ramirez was charged with assault and battery. The incident occurred at the Nike Bar.

Other Carrizozo town police activity included the theft of a battery and tool box from 711 B Avenue; gas theft from a vehicle parked at 910 A Avenue; break in at the Fina Gas Station's soda machine; breaking and entering on house across from the old City Garage. A guitar and a small TV were discovered missing.

## Museum

### Garners Grant

The Museum of New Mexico has been awarded a \$43,785 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities to research and plan historic interpretation programs at Lincoln State Monument.

The grant is for a one-year period, ending in July, 1981. It will be matched by the museum with in-kind services for \$34,686, for a total project cost of \$78,471.

The project will assemble a research team to investigate the roles played by various ethnic and economic groups in the growth of Lincoln as a ranching and commercial center in the 1800s.

From that research a plan will be developed to accurately present Lincoln's history to the public.

Programs to be considered are an orientation center, audio-visual presentation, brochures, guidebook, outdoor signs and re-creation of interiors in historic buildings.

Lincoln today is a quiet village of about 80 residents. It gained notoriety in the 1860s for the violent clashes that took place over economic control of the area, with Billy the Kid and Sheriff Pat Garrett playing prominent roles.

Since the 1930s several historic properties in Lincoln have comprised the Lincoln County Monument, administered by the Old Lincoln Memorial Commission. In 1978 supervision of 13 buildings and sites passed to the state museum through legislative action.

Leading the research team will be Dr. Michael Warner, who holds a PHD in southwestern history from the University of New Mexico. He has recruited a team of technical consultants in such areas as military history and frontier architecture of assist in the research.

## Freeman Elected to Board

Internationally prominent banker, Gaylord A. Freeman, has been elected to the Board of Directors of Bank Securities, Inc. The announcement came today from Robert O. Anderson, Chairman of the Board of the statewide bank holding company.

A graduate of Dartmouth College and Harvard Law School, Mr. Freeman was awarded an Honorary Doctorate by the latter institution in

1962. He joined First National Bank of Chicago in the thirties and worked up through the ranks to retire as Board Chairman in 1976. Mr. Freeman's stature in banking had led to service on the Boards of Atlantic Richfield Company; Banker's Life and Casualty Company; Northwest Industrialists and Baxter-Travenol Laboratories.

Mr. Freeman is presently Vice Chairman of the Aspen Institute for Humanistic Studies and is a Trustee of the MacArthur Foundation. The new BSI Board Member maintains a residence on the G-Bar-F Ranch in Lincoln, New Mexico.

## Senator Schmitt Calls for Flexibility

In a Senate speech today, U.S. Senator Harrison "Jack" Schmitt called upon the Department of Agriculture to exercise greater flexibility in helping New Mexico eradicate its grasshopper infestation.

Schmitt noted that the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service is responsible for assisting states in the elimination of major infestations.

"New Mexico," said Schmitt, "is currently experiencing a major outbreak of grasshoppers and the Governor has declared disaster areas in 16 of 32 counties of the state. In response to criticism of the lack of uniform standards for the grasshopper spraying programs and complicated spraying blocks in Nebraska last year, APHIS has imposed impossibly rigid standards upon the program. It is demanding blocks be sprayed to less than 10,000 acres and that they be a specified shape. This ultimatum comes from Washington and does not even allow the local APHIS representative to make modifications in the program, let alone state agriculture officials. The implementation of totally inflexible standards, in many cases, bars the program from effectively achieving its purpose."

After speaking to Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland, Schmitt reported that the Department will send a representative to New Mexico

on Monday to evaluate the program for potential changes. "However," Schmitt noted, "there is no indication that this will provide the funding required under law for those blocks of land which are

under 10,000 acres and therefore fall to meet APHIS' narrowly defined criteria."

Schmitt indicated that he would continue to push the USDA if provide this financial assistance.



**Lions Elect New International President**

**NEW MEXICO OUTDOORS**

Ask any group of people what poaching is and most of them will tell you correctly that poaching is "to take game or fish illegally." Next, ask these same people what Operation Game Thief is and only a few of them can tell you that OGT is New Mexico's stop poaching program.

It is both surprising and disappointing to discover that a large number of people are not aware of this program, despite its having just celebrated its third birthday in June. The program went into effect in June of 1977 as a result of an intensive study of poaching conducted in 1976. The study revealed our state could be losing as many as 34,000 deer, and up to 3,000 antelope per year to poaching. Just as shocking a discovery was the fact that the public would not report wildlife violations they observed.

Needless to say, the results of the study greatly alarmed the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, as well as that of the State's numerous wildlife interest groups. After much thought and consideration from all concerned, including input from the public, OGT was born. Although this stop poaching campaign was patterned after a very successful "Crimestoppers" program, it was the first of its kind to address its efforts toward wildlife violations and on such a broad scale as an entire state.

A toll free number was obtained, a reward fund was established entirely with donations, and a statewide six member citizen board to administer the fund and rewards was formed.

Persons having information concerning a wildlife law violation can call toll free 1-800-432-GAME and give all the information possible pertaining to the case, eg. - names, addresses, ages, descriptions of vehicles and suspects, license numbers, type of violation, when and where it occurred, etc.

The caller does not have to give his name or testify in court. Instead, the caller will be given a unique code name. If the information given results in a citation or arrest for that offender, the caller will be eligible for a reward of at least \$25.00 for big game cases.

and at least \$100, for small game and fish cases. Once the case is made, the Department will publicize the caller's unique code name, requesting him to call the toll free number again so the arrangements for the reward payment can be made.

Is the program working? The answer is a very positive yes. From June 1, 1977 through May 1, 1980 Operation Game Thief has resulted in 316 citations or arrests, with a conviction rate of 90 percent.

The apprehended violators have paid \$51,780.00 in fines and \$28,560.00 in civil assessments.

The reward fund has paid \$28,500.00 to callers leaving a balance of \$16,048.28 in the fund.

The primary animal involved in the closed OGT cases have been deer, 108. Next is elk at 51. Other cases involving raptors, fish, antelope, bear, mountain lion, javelina, turkey, and game birds have also been made.

Of every 4.5 cases in which an investigation is warranted stemming from an OGT call, one results in an arrest or citation.

It is an interesting note that a considerable number of callers eligible for their rewards have refused the (donating them back to the reward fund), and that a large number of these cases would probably never have been made if not reported by concerned individuals.

Operation Game Thief does work as some wildlife law violators can already testify. To continue to work, it needs the financial and moral support of everyone who cares for wildlife.
