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C'ozzo Town Meeting --

Vega, Armstrong on Town Council

Early in last Monday's town meeting, Carrizozo town attorney, Bill Payne swore in Richard Vega as trustee to fill one empty position. The last item of business on the agenda was Payne's swearing in of Ruth Armstrong to the last position available. The council now has all positions filled, Roy Harmon and Ruben Zamora are the other trustees.

Business conducted between the two swear-ins included the council's approval of the Rec Center's TV room as a library as requested by the Carrizozo Library Association. The Recreation Committee which was to meet next evening would determine other arrangements.

Payne informed the council that an 18 unit HUD housing project has been approved for Carrizozo. HUD is also constructing 16 units in Capitan and 50 in Roswell. All units will be administered and maintained by Region VI Housing Authority, of which Payne is a board member.

In his personal interest for town development, Payne has been instrumental in finding ways for the needed housing in Carrizozo. He said at Monday's meeting that the 18 units for Carrizozo include 6 - one bedroom, 6 - two bedroom, and 6 - three bedroom units. Construction will be located at two sites where sewage, paving and curbing exists. The housing will be for low income people.

Site locations do not include part of the town south of the rail road tracks. The "fancy term" given as a reason for not locating the housing in this area has to do with this portion of the community having a "high minority impact." Payne said this area could use the housing and he could not fully explain why construction would not be in this area.

The council moved to have the mayor sign the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission agreement. Dale Goad and alternate SBAC appointee, Ruth Armstrong were present. Both agreed that Carrizozo will get economic impact wherever the location for the proposed regional airport is established. They will cooperate with the other commission members and existing plans. Payne had available four county volumes of SBAC technical data on airport needs.

Economic Development Specialist, Hubert H. Quintana from

Roswell was present to advise the council to attend an October 11 meeting in Santa Fe concerning funding for a well and a sprinkling system. Quintana said the well request posed no problems but the sprinkling system would entail some "heavy questions."

Payne, who went before the last Lincoln County Commissioners meeting to see if the county would take over the recreation area, which includes the golf course, said that he was "not discouraged, but encouraged" by the response by the county when approached with the proposal. Two commissioners were for the idea, "if and when the money was available." Payne told the town council, "One commissioner did not believe in spending tax payer's money for 'this sort of thing,' Payne added.

The Carrizozo recreation area is used by all county residents as well as out of county and out of state people. The facility has a baseball diamond, tennis court, fishing lake and a playground in addition to the golf course. The town cannot handle the facility alone. Payne said, "This area will not return to the desert. It's not hopeless."

Hernandez said at Monday's meeting that he and council members have been seeking funding for the town's recreational facilities. Hernandez has been collecting 'letters of support' from clubs, banks and surrounding towns. The letters will be presented to the legislature when they convene in January. Hernandez met with RCD people at a Capitan meeting and has been to Santa Fe to the State Parks and Recreational Division in his effort to find a solution for funding the recreation area.

Phillip Ortiz was nominated to fill the position which Bud Payne had on the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association. He joins Wayland Hill and Dale Lakfay from Carrizozo and Capitan association members. Prior to the appointment, Hernandez read a letter requesting that Payne be re-appointed to the association.

Bonnie Shepperd went before the town trustees to request a waiver to allow her to continue her garage sale

Beat Texico 8-0

Grizzlies Win Season Opener

The Carrizozo Grizzly football team playing what first-year-coach called a "real team effort", rallied in the closing seconds of Friday night's game and defeated powerful Texico 8-0 in their season opener.

With both teams being unable to mount any sustaining drives in the first quarter of play, the game quickly turned into a defensive struggle. The Wolverines got the best of it in the second quarter of play, and drove inside the Grizzly twenty-yard-line three different times.

But each time the Grizzly defense turned the home team away without letting them put any points on the scoreboard. Defensively the Carrizozo team held Texico, a very quick team, to less than 100 yards total offense, sacking the quarterback three times for losses. Defensive lineman David Zamora, linebacker Jon Aguilar and defensive back Moises Sambrano were cited for their excellent defensive work. Zamora had eight unassisted tackles and Sambrano had two interceptions and a fumble recovery, while Aguilar had one quarterback sack plus getting to the Texico runners behind the line of scrimmage on several occasions.

In the second half the offenses seemed to pick up for both teams, but were unable to cross each others goal-lines. With a little over two and a half minutes Sambrano intercepted an errant Texico pass and turned the ball over to the Grizzly offense. Quarterback Chris Ventura then hit splintered Ralph Degado with two successive passes. The latter putting the Grizzlies at the Texico five-yard line. It took the Grizzlies two downs to hit paydirt, with fullback Matt Ferguson going over following the blocks of halfback Aguilar, guard Johnny Herrera and tackle John Paul Ventura, with the scoreboard showing 59 seconds to go in the final quarter. The Grizzlies other fullback Randy Hollis added the two-point conversion on the exact same play a few seconds later.

On offense both Hollis and Ferguson Plus signal caller Chris Ventura were

cited for their fine efforts. Of the first victory of the '80 season, Grizzly coach Koller was quoted as saying "it was a complete team effort." It should also be noted that the backing the team received from all the people that made the more than 200 mile trip was something that had been lacking for the past few years. It was really something to witness, to see that the

visiting had more people in the stands than the home team, and were easily the loudest of the two.

The Grizzlies go after their second win of the season this Friday, 7:30 p.m., in the home opener against the Truth or Consequences JV team. This replaces Vaughn on the schedule, which dropped their entire 11-man football schedule along with Melrose.

Since 1920 --

Carrizozo Woman's Club Celebrates 60 Years Of Service

The Carrizozo Woman's Club was organized in 1920 and has been a leading force in the organization and development of the community since that time. One of the early projects of the club was to finance the construction of the club building which was built in 1930. At the present time, we are in the process of renovating the building, which has the traditional southwestern adobe style of architecture common to New Mexico.

Since the beginning the Woman's Club has been extremely active in community development. In the fifties, the woman's Club was successful in its fight to have a city sewer system put in and to have a swimming pool constructed using money available for youth programs at that time. Later the Club built Spencer Park and worked on a bond issue for the present County Courthouse. Using great foresight and realizing the natural splendor and beauty of the lava beds west of Carrizozo, in the Malpais. They succeeded and the roadside park became the first such park in the state of New Mexico. In the early 1960's after an epidemic of hepatitis removed from the village and were successful in doing so. Other projects included an iron sign over the entrance of Spencer Park, and making the Malpais a state park called the "Valley of Fires" state park.

Realizing the value of the youth recreation program in the community, the Woman's Club established a recreation center which was called Muffler's Hall. This

venture was so successful with the youth of the community that money was raised and a new Carrizozo Recreation Center was built.

At one time, the present Zia Therapy Center was a center for the elderly and the Woman's Club was deeply involved in the conduct of that program. Committees were formed which conducted activities for the elderly every week. The Club also bought a piano and donated it to the Elderly Center.

Another community project which took many years and much hard work on the Club's part was the improvement of Evergreen Cemetery which included the ironwork sign above the entrance, the underground watering system, the evergreen trees located there, and the general improvement of the cemetery. This project was completed in the early 1970's.

In the middle 1960's local business women who were also in the Carrizozo Woman's Club began to work toward the development of an industrial park. These same persevering women continued with the help of others who were also interested to work on the industrial park, getting what state and federal assistance was available and we can happily report that in 1978 the Carrizozo Industrial Park was dedicated with much public fanfare. Three federation prizes were won on the Industrial Park development.

Improvement of the looks of the business section of Carrizozo occupied the interests of the Club in the early 1970's and members worked

hard to encourage business people to improve the fronts of their buildings and stores. The backdrop and fountain beside the Carrizozo Hardware Store was constructed during this time and won a state beautification award with a cash prize.

Other activities which illustrate

the interest of the Club in the betterment of the community and surrounding area include having the White Oaks Cemetery dedicated as a historical monument. Governor McDonald, the first governor of New Mexico, is buried there. During the dedication, the Woman's Club

members hosted a successful reception at the Hoyle House in White Oaks which is also listed with the Historical Society in New Mexico. For many years the Club sponsored a Dental Clinic in Carrizozo and when the clinic closed, the Club furnished money and provided transportation

to out-of-town dentists for those in the community who could not afford dental care. Just recently the Club has been instrumental in supporting the return of a dentist to the community and helping to raise money for the local Health Clinic. When the local PTA disbanded in the late 1960's, the Club took up the responsibility for giving a scholarship to a local student each year. In 1976 the amount of the scholarship was doubled and in 1978, it was doubled again and two scholarships were awarded.

When the Chamber of Commerce could no longer sponsor the Sun Dutchess to the Sun Carnival in the early 1960's, the Woman's Club quickly jumped at the opportunity to sponsor a young woman at this exciting event, which we continue to do.

Woman's Club was the initiator of the People's Market Place, a fiesta-type of activity for area people to bring arts and crafts or for local organizations to set up booths for the selling of food and wares. This idea originated as a part of the 1976 Bicentennial and its purpose was to bring the people together again in spirit for the good of the community and county.

In addition, the members of the Club again expressed their interest in the youth of the community and helped to open, renovate and operate the old Lyric Theatre. We contributed over \$500 for the purchase of a movie projector for the theatre. Feeling that the youth were isolated from career opportunities available to them in

president, Linda Hensley, parliamentarian and Mary Therpe, Club President.

large communities in the state, the Club members organized and conducted a Career Education Workshop as a part of the mini-course program at the school for the 6th-8th graders in the spring. This program has continued for three years.

Accomplishments also include donating to the "Children in Need of Shelter" program, becoming involved with a Crisis Line for Lincoln County, and doing extensive repair work to our club building which in itself is a landmark for our community.

The Zia Senior Citizen's Center is sponsored by the Woman's Club and is one of the most active centers for a town of this size in the State of New Mexico. Another successful center has been opened in Corona. The Zia Center, in turn sponsors the weatherization program for low-income housing.

One of our most successful achievements, so far, has been the nationally awarded senior citizen complex, Casa Manana. Winning 4th place out of 10,415 entries world-wide in a Community Improvement Program sponsored by the Sears Foundation, it is the only senior citizen complex in the nation owned and operated by a Woman's Club.

The club will hold their 60th anniversary meeting, Thursday, September 18. The event will honor the older club members within the community.

The club encourages all women in the community to join the club and participate in all its projects.

Rec. Committee Approves Library Assoc. Request

The Carrizozo Recreation Committee met Tuesday evening, September 8 at the Rec Center with Morgan Maxwell presiding.

The meeting included the committee's approval for use of the center's TV room, adjoining the bowling lanes, as a library. The Carrizozo Public Library Association went before the town council the night before for permission for use of the building. The town council agreed with the request and left the details up to the Rec Committee.

Bill Hasenbuhler, who manages the Rec is in favor of the library. Town mayor, Manuel Hernandez said at Monday's town meeting that a library would add to the center's activities and would promote business. The TV will be moved to the lunch counter area at the Rec.

The library association had been seeking a building to house their books and begin serving the community, but lacked funds for renting a building. Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District which helps municipalities in establishing business and cultural areas is assisting the association in obtaining funds. The RC&D is supporting the group in their search for money. The Southern Pacific has donated two box cars for library use.

Board of directors on the Carrizozo Library Association are Sister Adele Stommel, Mary Thorpe, Lynn Miller, Don Wall and Dale Goad, who is replacing Basil Lawson.

In other business the Rec Committee said Rec Center participation is doing well and commended Hasenbuhler, who was present.

Regarding the quest for funding the town's recreation area which includes the tennis court, baseball diamond, fishing lake, playground and gold course, the committee made plans to meet with the state official in a couple of weeks for financial advice.

The county will again be approached for their support on different ways that they could be of help. The committee discussed the mill levy and gross receipts tax as a possible means for funding the recreation area.

The committee members discussed the recent fire damage at the golf course, located within the town's recreation area. Henry Vega, superintendent of the facility told the committee that six of the 16 golf carts that were in the shed that caught fire have been salvaged. Vega said one more golf tournament is on schedule.

In addition to Maxwell, who heads the Recreation Committee, other members are Dale Housley, Cheri Goad, S.M. Ortiz and Sterling Spencer, all who were present at Tuesday's meeting.

business out of her home until she can obtain a building. The town attorney said that a neighbor has complained twice. Sheppard has a license, but the area is zoned for residence. Payne said the council needs to enforce the ordinance or give Sheppard a waiver.

It came out at Monday's meeting that the complaining neighbor also operates business out of his home, dealing in coins, jewelry, antiques and slot machines. Sheppard added, "I sell as out clothes," and that neighbor's business involves thousands of dollars worth in diamonds.

The council granted a year's waiver to Sheppard.

CDS Inc. contractor, Richard Cahill was present to inform the council that the water project south of the rail road tracks has been finished and will be ready for final inspection. The rains delayed the completion.

The council accepted the following bids for surplus town equipment: \$200.00 for 8 camera covers, Johnson Stearns; \$664.00 for 18 missile crates, Maxwell Ranch; \$86.00 for mounted prayer and truck bed, S.M. Ortiz; \$10.00 for an international wagon, Cooms Gallegos. A bid of \$28.00 for a 4-door Ford vehicle rejected.

In other town business: -The council will look into the request to close a portion of the alley between Citizens State Bank and J.G. Moore Insurance Agency. The bank will construct a new building and parking lot where these two businesses exist.

-The town purchased 10 cubic yards of black top for street repair. -Hernandez appointed Vega to the police department. Vega will pursue two grants in this area. Zamora oversees street works.

-The council will inform Roy Dew that the town is not responsible for the storage fee of Ben Morrison, former town airport manager.

-The council signed a resolution that stated that county agree to give the town \$1,400 for the swimming pool for the past season. Hernandez told the trustees that the pool leak has been found. The county has loaned the town equipment for repair of the problem.


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



Fed Funds Exhausted

The Cancer screening clinic initiated by Southwest Health Care Corporation has continued as a community service by the local physicians who generously donate their time.

The federal funds for Southwest Health Care Corporation have been exhausted and the medical community remains aware of the need for the screening to be available but with a change in criteria.

Lincoln County has 1,188 Medicare applicants and 2,992 persons, this combined population, 26.9 percent of the county has an income of less than \$4,000.

It is these individuals the physicians feel the clinic should be addressing. The program is intended as a screening, preventative, educational process for retirees, senior citizens, those individuals who have not seen a physician for more than a year, or those financially unable to afford a visit to the physician's office. The program promotes a "state of wellness" and is not a treatment center.

Once a person is seen at the clinic

and establishes a preference for a physician, he/she should return to that provider for continuing care. The clinic is not for those with a regular physician or a place to seek a second opinion.

We encourage people from the Hondo Valley, Nogal, Carrizozo, Fort Stanton, Alto, San Patricio as well as the other smaller communities to make appointments and exhibit a need for the clinic to continue.

Wait, fishermen, don't put your gear away for the winter yet. According to our most recent fishing report, angler success is picking up at different waters across the state.

Therefore, now is a perfect time to travel to your favorite fishing water. You should find plenty of elbow room at these areas now that school has started and dove season has begun.

Looking at the "Fishing Report," some of my favorite fishing waters that are producing fine catches of fish are as follows:

SOUTHWEST AREA
Elephant Butte: Trotting for catfish at the north end of the lake is producing good results for fishermen using cut baits. White bass and crappie are being taken on live minnows during the early morning and late evening hours. Some black bass are being taken using light-colored lures.
Snow Lake: A large number of 8 to 10 inch trout are being taken by bank fishermen using fireballs for bait. The road from Beaverhead to Snow Lake is muddy.

Quemado: Bank fishermen are having their best luck on marshmallows and fireballs. Those fishing from boats are taking their trout on worms. Several large fish have been caught.

SOUTHEAST AREA
Pecos River: Fishing has been

good for catfish and small white bass in almost the entire stretch of river from Ft. Sumner to Red Bluff Lake. Best luck has been on live minnows. The water is clearing.

Summer Lake: Fishing is excellent for 10 to 14 inch walleye with worms and minnows being the best bait. Fishing is fair for catfish and white bass. Some 3 to 5 pound northern pike are being caught by those trolling near the dam.

Bonito Lake: Fishing is good with most anglers catching some fish. Several limits of rainbows have been taken using jalapeno flavored cheese for bait.

Ruidoso River & Penasco River: Pressure is light. An excellent time to catch some good browns on bait and spinners.
Needless to say, these are just a few of the waters to choose from. And, every fisherman knows (or should know) that success can vary on a week to week, day to day, and even an hour to hour basis.

Nevertheless, with the weather and water temperatures finally cooling down and the summer fishing crowds subsiding, fishing should be good and should remain that way through October for most species.

So, instead of replacing the spot your fishing rod has occupied with your shotgun, make room beside it. You will have good opportunity to use both in the months to come.

3. Respect the vehicle space of a motorcycle and its position in traffic. Avoid crowding or passing a motorcycle in the same lane. When you do pass, allow as much space for a motorcycle as you would for another car.
