Emergency Feed Program Extended

The Emergency Feed Program (EFP) has been under way in Lincoln County since August, according to Allen K. Trammell, County Executive Director for the Lincoln County ASC Committee.

The Emergency Feed Program feeding period was to have ended Oct. 31, but the Lincoln County ASC Committee has extended the program. In some areas of the county the recent rains came too late to permit development of sufficient forage. The new feeding period has been set at Nov. 1-May 15, 1981.

The Program has been authorized to provide financial assistance for purchasing livestock feed in quantities larger than the livestock owner normally would purchase. To be eligible for assistance, the person must have suffered a 40 percent loss in feed normally produced for such person's livestock. To apply for assistance during the feeding period of Nov. 1-May 15, a Lincoln County livestock producer's range conditions must be at least 40 percent below normal as of Nov. 1.

ASCS county personnel are currently making on-farm visits to verify the information furnished by

the EFP applicant. Spot-checking is required to assure that the program is being offered as specified in the enabling legislation. Spot-checking will also include the verification of sales receipts of feed purchases from feed dealers and individuals selling feed.

The amount of EFP assistance is based upon the amount and cost of feed purchased. Applicants are required to furnish original or carbon copies of feed purchase receipts to the county office before any payments are made.

An applicant may lose all program benefits for three years and be subject to Federal and civil fraud statutes and up to \$10,000 in fines if feed receipts are altered or false data is supplied to obtain program benefits for which the person is not entitled.

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

Carrizozo School News...



The Carrizozo Schools will be sponsoring a team of students who will participate in the regional Special Olympics this coming Spring in Alamogordo. The Special Olympics is a year-round program of sports and recreation training, coupled with athletic competition for all special education students and handicapped adults. Not all of the Special Olympics activities are suited for every child because each person has a wide range of abilities and limitations. There are 14 special Olympic sporting events. Some of these events include basketball, bowling, skiing, soccer, swimming and track and field.

New Mexico Special Olympics has experienced a tremendous amount of growth since 1968. This growth has been made possible by thousands of volunteers who believe in children and what children can contribute to society.

The State of New Mexico is divided into eight areas with volunteer directors overseeing the programs in their districts. In most of the towns in New Mexico, there are local Special Olympic training programs that are conducted

throughout the year. The training culminates with the Area Games in Alamogordo next April. Some individuals and teams will then go on to the State competition in late May or early June.

The Carrizozo Clinic will be volunteering time to assist with physical exams for Carrizozo students participating in the Special Olympics.

The Carrizozo PTA will be meeting on Thursday, November 11, 1988 at 7:30 p.m. All parents and teachers are encouraged to come. On the agenda are election of officers and program plans for the 1989-90 school year.

(NOTE: this is the first in a series of four articles on the Parent-Teacher Association - PTA. The articles will discuss the national state and local associations - their goals, accomplishments, and history)

Every year, millions of people receive a PTA membership card, which certifies their membership in the National PTA, one of its state branches, and a local parent-teacher association. These PTA members are a cross-section of America, including housewives, ranchers, educators, office workers, miners, and construction workers - men and women from all walks of life. They are as different as people can be, but they share at least two things in common: a compelling concern for children and their schools - and a belief that the PTA is a way through which they can make their concern count.

Today in the United States, there are 30,000 parent-teacher associations similar to our local association in the Carrizozo Schools. The membership of all local PTA units total in excess of 6,300,000 concerned parents and teachers. What can these adults working together accomplish for the

education of children? When parents and teachers communicate successfully, the children are more likely to be successful in school. Hence, it is the aim of every parent-teacher association to bring parents and teachers together in an informal, friendly atmosphere. Not only is the atmosphere an important goal of the PTA, but also is the promise of parents-teachers working together, with mutual trust, toward strengthening the educational system.

How does the PTA go about accomplishing these goals? Read next week's article for a look at the organization and plans of the PTA.

On a recent Sunday the little town of Lincoln, whose historical reputation was built around a war and an outlaw, was - paradoxically - the site of an outstanding musical concert performed by a gifted pianist, Lynn Werner. Mrs. Werner's program, entitled "The Big Black Piano" was performed on a square Steinway grand which the Lincoln County Heritage Trust recently had restored.

The piano, built in 1860, is located in the parlor of one of the Trust's museums in Lincoln which shortly after the turn of the century was the home and office of Dr. Earl Woods, a country doctor who practiced in Lincoln for many years.

Eventually, the Trust purchased the instrument from an estate in Santa Fe, and relocated it in its present home.

During the restoration procedure, when the action of the piano was removed for repair, the piano technician, Ed Wyatt, pointed out three signatures on various parts inside which indicated the individuals who participated in the building of the instrument.

In its solid rosewood case, the elegant Steinway sounded as beautiful as it must have when the

last signature was penciled in at its completion during the period of the close of the Civil War.

Members of the audience agreed that the doctor's old house with its gracious furniture and other appointments was the perfect setting for the lovely music which was presented around a story written by the artist's husband, John Werner. The program included a wide variety of music, and concluded with several classical pieces which put the skills of a pianist to the test. Mrs. Werner excelled them with perfection.

Mrs. Werner, of Roswell, who is presently studying for her doctorate in music at Texas Tech, is the daughter of the late Edgar J. Phillips, and Mrs. Edgar Phillips (Hattie), also an accomplished musician, who resides in Lincoln.

Recipe of the Week-- by Lorene Caywood

Our recipe of the week is from a talented artist who lives in Carrizozo. Lorene Caywood belongs to the Carrizozo Extension Club. Lorene has been an artist for years and is now teaching many students. She is the Superintendent of the Art Division at the Lincoln County Fair. She is District Chairman of the Cultural Arts division for the New Mexico Federated Woman's Club.

Lorene has shown her art work in many shows and has taken a large number of awards. A vivacious and young grandmother, she shares her talents with her family and community. Lorene's husband, Larry, works for the town of Carrizozo. From the Lincoln County Extension Club Cookbook we would like to share her recipe for--

the flour mixture and brown sugar into drippings in skillet, stir to make a smooth paste. Add orange juice and 1/2 cup water to make a gravy. Pour over chicken. Cover, bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.

- CHICKEN VEGETABLE CASSEROLE**
- 1/2 cup flour
 - 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon pepper
 - 1 teaspoon paprika
 - 1/2 cup salad oil
 - 2-3 pound chicken, cut up, ready to fry
 - 1 can Veg-All
 - 1 (3 ounce) can mushrooms, drained
 - 1 tablespoon brown sugar
 - 1 (6 ounce) can frozen orange juice, thawed

Combine flour, salt, pepper, paprika in plastic bag, add chicken pieces - three at a time. Shake. In skillet, brown chicken pieces in hot oil until brown. Remove and place in a 2 quart casserole dish, add Veg-All and mushrooms. Stir in 2 tablespoons of



Lincoln National Forest News

ALAMOGORDO, NM - Application forms for the annual Lincoln National Forest Christmas Tree Cutting Program were distributed to more than 30 locations throughout West Texas and Southeastern New Mexico last week. They will be available to the Public on November 9.

Folks who want to cut their personal Christmas Tree on the Lincoln this year are advised to get an application form and mail it in with the one-dollar fee as soon as possible, a Forest spokesman said. About 8,000 trees will be available in the program this year. Permits to cut them will be sold only by mail, on a first-come, first-served basis.

Application forms mailed to the Forest Supervisor's Office in Alamogordo will be processed, as they arrive, beginning November 17. Applications received after all of the available permits are issued will be returned to the sender, along with the fee. Trees may be cut or dug, after a permit is received, through December 24.

In addition to Forest service offices at Ruidoso, Cloudcroft, Carlsbad, Mayhill and Alamogordo, the application forms will be available to the public at J.C. Penney Stores in El Paso and Las Cruces. They will also be available at Lane's Sporting Goods in Hatch; chambers of commerce at Amarillo,

Alamogordo, Artesia, Carrizozo, Clovis, El Paso, Hobbs, Jal, Lovington, Las Cruces, Lubbock, Midland, Odessa, Portales, Roswell and Socorro. They will be available at Post Offices at Bent, Boles Acres, Holloman Air Force Base, La Luz, Loving, Mesalero, Orogrande, Radium Springs and Tularosa.

Winter arrived early on the Lincoln last week, with record low temperatures in some locations and up to eight inches of snow. Fuelwood areas on the Cloudcroft Ranger District were closed following the snowfall Monday night, but were to re-open as soon as weather and road conditions permitted.

All Forest visitors and fuelwood gatherers are urged to call the district ranger office in the district they plan to visit, before they leave home, for the most current news on weather and road conditions. The district telephone numbers are: Smokey Bear

at Ruidoso, 257-4095; Cloudcroft, 682-2351; Guadalupe at Carlsbad, 885-4181; Mayhill, 687-3411.

Last week at Smokey Bear, Three Rivers Campground was the only facility remaining open. It will be open all year, Borito Lake and streams are at normal water level and fisherman were scarce. All roads were open and all fuelwood areas were open.

Cloudcroft reported all facilities closed and roads snowpacked and icy. Sitting Bull Falls Picnic Area was open on the Guadalupe District, and repair work was still in progress on the washout near Robinson Draw on Forest Road 540. Fuelwood areas were open.

At Mayhill, James Canyon Campground was receiving moderate use; fishing was light on the Rio Penasco, roads were snowpacked and icy and fuelwood areas were open.

New Mexico Game And Fish News

The New Mexico Department of Game and Fish has announced it will have some of its officers assigned to specific locations throughout

Southeastern New Mexico on November 6 to accommodate hunters wanting validation changes.

On Thursday, November 6, officers will be at the following locations from noon to 6:00 p.m.

These are:
Ruidoso - Ruidoso Police Department.

Alamogordo - Alamogordo State Police Complex.

Carrizozo - Court House - Sheriff's Office.

All hunters validated for the stratified big game season must have ONE of three "D" validations indicated on the license. Any validation changes must be made no later than the day before the start of the hunt period for which your license was originally validated.

All such changes must be made only by Game Department personnel with the use of special stamps.

Conservation Officers available for Reestratifications

SANTA FE, N.M. - Game and Fish Department officers will be available Nov. 6 in more than 40 towns statewide to change deer hunt stratification dates for hunters, according to Bill Montoya, assistant director of the department.

Game and Fish offices will also be open during regular working hours, Monday through Friday, in Santa Fe, Raton, Albuquerque, Roswell and Las Cruces.

Montoya urged hunters who need their deer licenses reestratified to a different hunt period to take advantage of the Nov. 6 schedule, as conservation officers will be in the field most of the month and could be difficult to locate for last-second changes before deadline.

State Game regulations divide the November rifle seasons for deer into three hunt periods - D-One, Nov. 6-9; D-Two; Nov. 12-16; D-Three, Nov. 19-23 - and hunters are allowed to pick any one of the hunts. License vendors code the licenses at time of purchase, but the hunter whose plans change at

a later date can pick a different hunt period and have the license changed.

Changes in hunt dates can only be made by Game and Fish employees using special stamps, Montoya said, and must be made before deadline. Deadline is the day before opening of the hunt period the license is coded for.

"Deadline for changing from D-One is Nov. 7, from D-Two is Nov. 11, and from D-Three is Nov. 14," Montoya said, "but hunters who wait until the deadline day to find a Game and Fish employee to change the license may be out of luck. Out-of-office are often going out of town and keeping odd hours due to night patrol and other types of work typical of the deer season."
