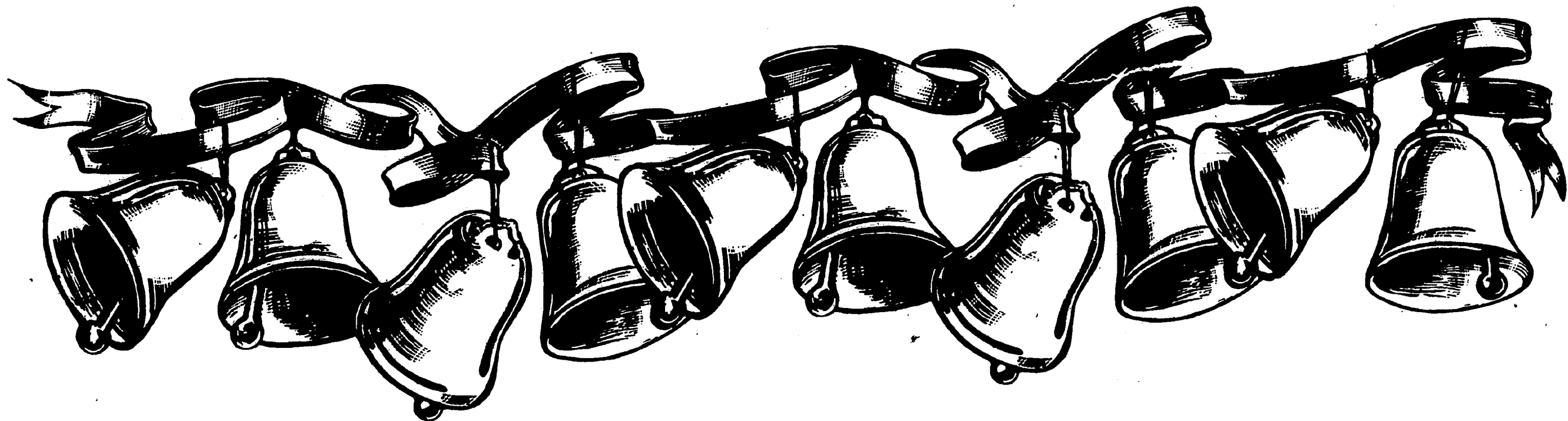
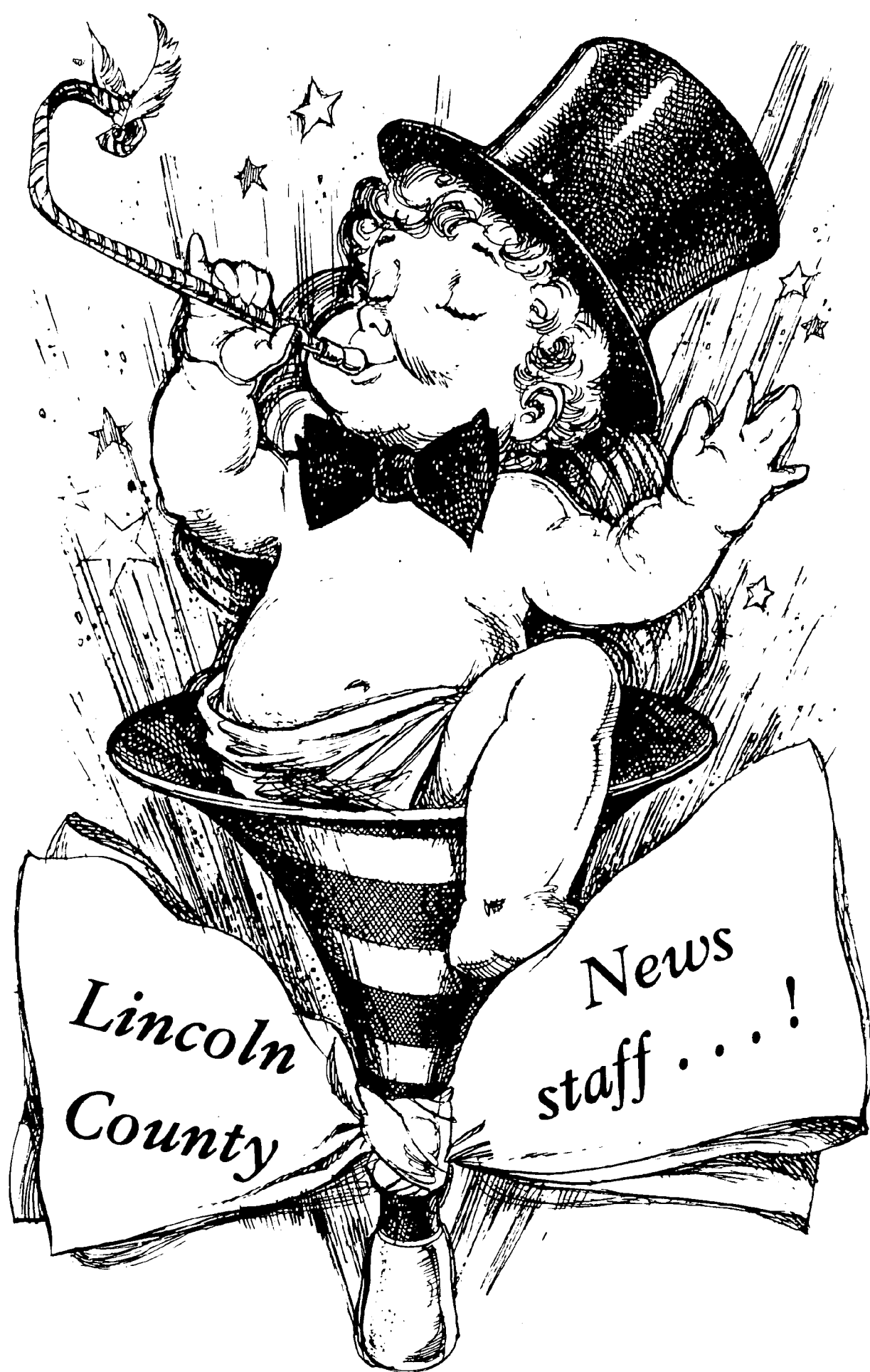

Deke LaMay takes top honors

Deke LaMay, Capitan Senior, took top honors in the United Press International Class A All-State Football team. LaMay was voted to the first-team as center on offense, and first-team defensive team as defensive-end. The Capitan Tiger Senior then was voted as the 'Lineman of the Year' in Class A football.

Two other Tiger players were voted to the first team. James Burch was named to the first-team on the offensive team at the guard position; and Johnny LaMay was named to the first-team defensive unit at lineman.

Other Capitan members were named to the Second-team & honorable mention lists. Named to the 2nd-team offensive team at tight-end was Norvell Carpenter, David Rooks was named to the 2nd-team defensive unit at defensive back. Tracy Maxwell made honorable mention on offense as running back and as linebacker on defense.

Carrizozo Grizzly seniors Ralph Delgado and Larry Beltran were both named to the first-team offense. Delgado being named as receiver and Beltran as place kicker. Named to the

second team offensive unit was Johnnie Herrera. Juniors Joe Curtiss and J.P. Ventura were both named to the second team defensive team. Curtiss at defensive end and Ventura as interior lineman.

Quarterback Chris Ventura of the Grizzlies was named to the second team offensive unit. Ventura was beaten out of the first team unit by Oscar Medrano from Hagerman, who was eventually named as the back of the year.

Ruidoso's hopes for obtaining Bonito Lake water in the near future dimmed Friday with the announcement by Colonel Donald Brown, commander of the 49th Tactical Support Group at Holloman Air Force Base, that it would be 'very premature' to discuss relinquishing the base's rights to the water.

Brown said, however, that the base will offer engineering assistance to Ruidoso.

Holloman, Brown said, is planning to expand its well field beginning in fiscal 1982, but, 'We don't think there's any way for us to pump all of our water.'

The Ruidoso Water Board last month wrote Senator Harrison Schmitt, urging his support of the expansion of Holloman's well field. The board suggested that expansion of the well field could make Bonito Lake water available to Ruidoso.

The board, in the letter to Schmitt, advised him that Ruidoso's growth rate is about eight percent a year and that 'within ten years, our present average supply of water will be only half our need.'

Mayor Lloyd Davis Jr., has said that Ruidoso's trustees are working on plans to build water storage reservoirs and are considering the possibility of drilling new wells.



Elections Set for Feb. 3 . . .

Police Seek Information on BB Gun Sniper/Vandal

Canine ancestry - that is one clue some property owners in Carrizozo have concerning the identity of the unknown holiday grinch who has been destroying residential and business property with BB pellets.

With a second series of BB shot vandalism, town police are now urging local residents for their assistance in information that will lead to the arrest of the person or persons involved in the vandalism.

Town police can be reached by calling 648-2351 or the Sheriff's Department at 648-2342. The name of anyone providing police with information concerning this criminal activity will be kept absolutely anonymous.

The first rush of BB shot incidents occurred in November following Thanksgiving, December 22, Arnold Martin discovered a BB pellet hole at the building on 5th Avenue which belongs to John Harkey and once housed a clothes cleaning business.

Charles Adams of 401 9th Avenue reported to town police on December 27 that the driver's side of a vehicle belonging to Mary Rich was hit by BB shot.

Police Officer Dave Wheeler heard the burglar alarm at White's Attio Store on December 27. On investigation, Wheeler discovered that the window had been hit by vandals again. Owner Frank Montoya was out of town at the time.

December 29, Roy Dow owner of the Gift Gallery on E Avenue discovered BB holes in the east and north windows at his store. He was out of town between December 25 and 28.

Nick's Auto Repair on 11 & E Avenue again experienced BB shot vandalism, this time on the east window of the shop. This incident was believed to have occurred sometime Thursday night, December 25. In November, cars waiting for repairs were shot.

In other activity, Ted Zamora reported that the 14 inch wheel spoke rims from his 1980 T-Bird Ford were stolen while he attended Midnight Mass at Santa Rita Catholic Church. The vehicle was parked across the street at his in-laws. He also discovered a dent on the right side door.

Albert Baca reported to town police on December 29 that someone had forcibly pried off with a tire tool, the front hubcap of his brothers' (Peter) vehicle while it was parked at

Johnnie's Outpost on Central. Employee Les Olson reported on Dec. 26 that a 1975 Chevy parked at Belco Industries had damage to 2 tires, both on the right and in the rear of the Belco owned truck. Police have an idea who is involved in this incident. Suspect's name cannot be revealed at this time, but he left a size 9 tennis shoe print.

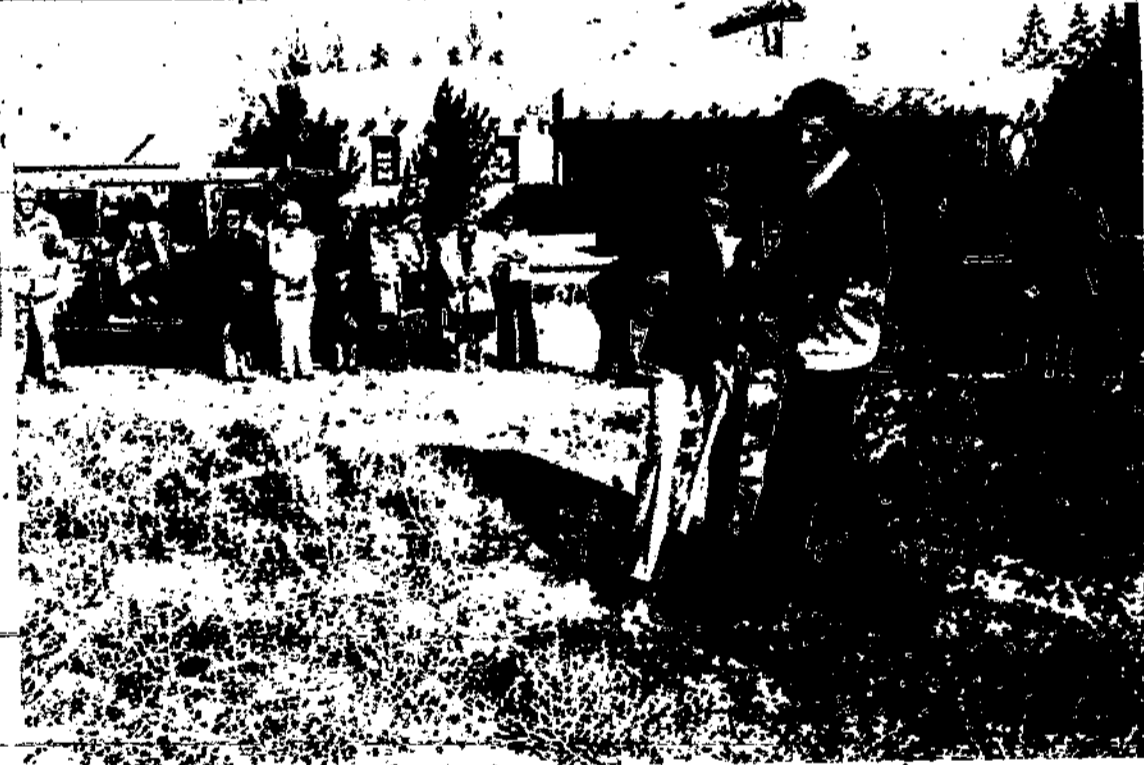

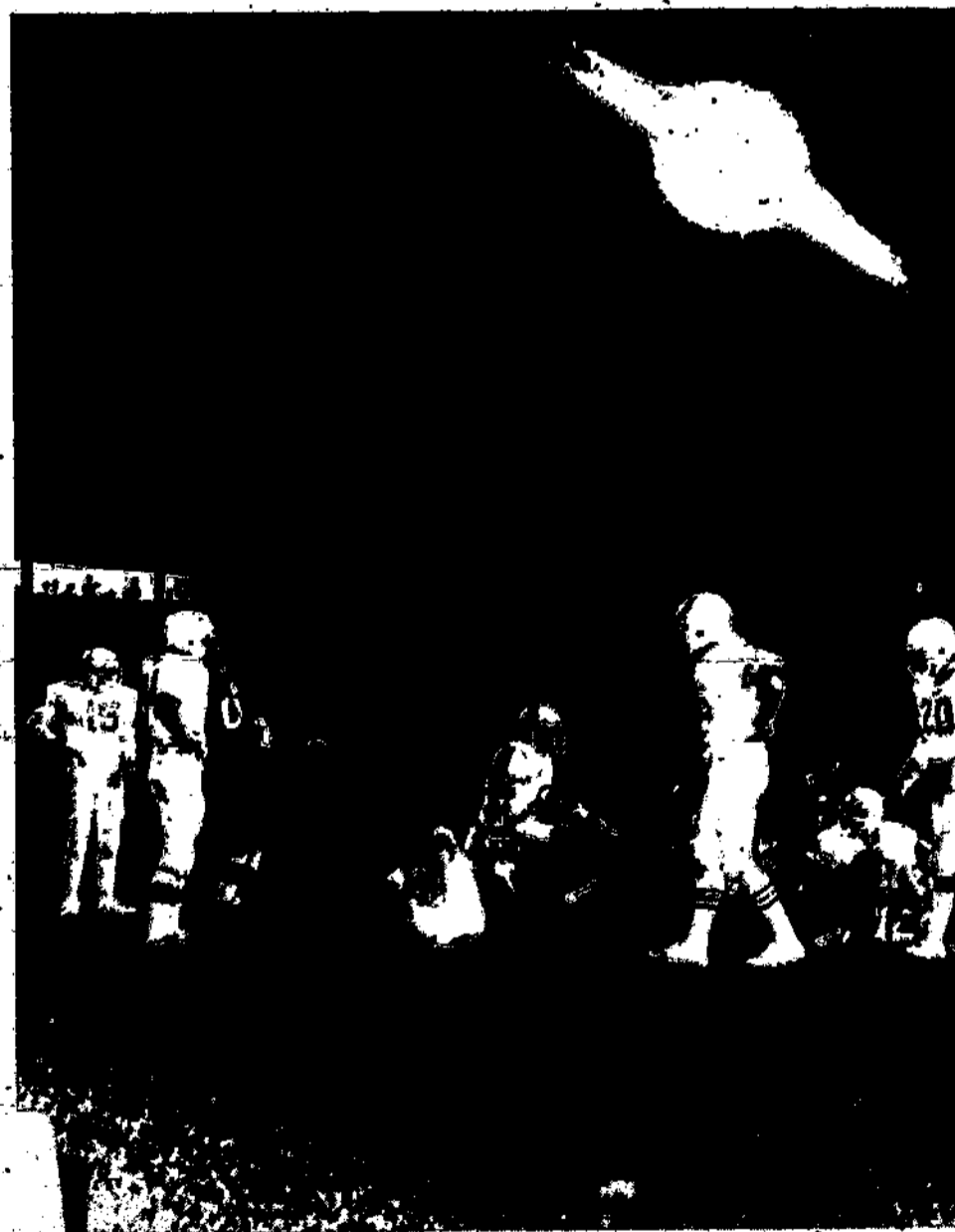
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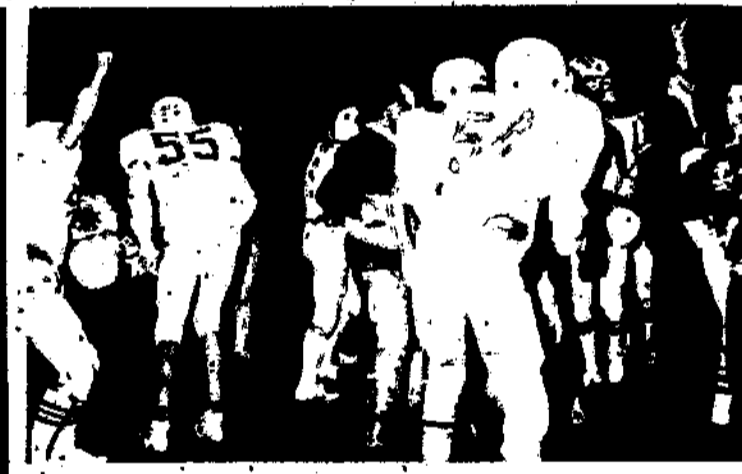

Motor Transportation Division Sets March 2 Deadline

Santa Fe. In 1981, the Motor Transportation Division of the New Mexico Transportation Department will again be responsible for the licensing and legalization of all motor vehicles having a gross weight in excess of 20,000 pounds. This includes all tractor-trailer rigs, all tandem axle dump, tank and flat bed trucks, all other large trucks or vans, and all commercial type buses.

Mexico should contact the Operations Bureau, New Mexico Motor Transportation Division, P.O. Box 1028, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87503, or telephone, (505) 827-2057.

Owners or operators of this category of motor vehicles should immediately submit their 1981 vehicle registration applications to insure receipt of 1981 credentials before the March 2, 1981 deadline. Renewal forms were mailed to previously registered operators during the first week of October, 1980. First-time registrants may pick up registration forms at any Motor Vehicle Division Field Office or any New Mexico Port of Entry.

N.M. Farm & Livestock Bureau Analysis of MX Missile System

The Environmental Impact Statement on the MX Missile System appears to contain some serious flaws according to a preliminary analysis by the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau.

L.E. Pete Davis, president of the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau said today in Clovis that the E.I.S. on the MX System raises many questions for the citizens of Eastern New Mexico and includes several sections that have conclusions that show a gross misunderstanding of our state.

The idea that the withdrawal of 180,000 acre feet of water through 150 to 310 wells from the Ogallala Aquifer would have very little significance is a very questionable statement in water-short New Mexico, Davis said.

Another area the statement failed to address adequately according to Davis is the question of removing private prime agricultural land from production and disturbing thousands of other acres through soil and water erosion.

"Sooner or later this nation is going to face the fact that American agriculture not only feeds this country but also millions of people around the world and we cannot go on and on as we have in the past destroying prime

farm land without having future generations pay the price for such actions," he said.

"The Air Force has said up to 100,000 acres of land would be disturbed during the construction phase but we have seen figures that indicate the 100,000 acre figure is low," he continued.

Davis also said a portion of the statement addresses the question of public schooling and suggests that the impact in this area could be alleviated by establishing mobile schools and using a pool of teachers.

"This would set quality education in Eastern New Mexico back at least two decades," Davis said.

Another area of concern according to Davis is that several federal agencies would have to be utilized to overcome the impacts of the system on local communities.

In fact the E.I.S. indicates to us that a land use planning program initiated and controlled by the federal government would have to be used in the impacted areas of western Texas and eastern New Mexico and this would lead to federal control of the everyday lives of the citizens of eastern New Mexico," he said.

Davis said that his organization is currently undertaking a complete review of the several volumed E.I.S. and that they would be filing statements with the Air Force on the E.I.S.

U.S. Farmers Hit Hard by Disasters

More than \$21 million will be paid to New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas farmers on this year's low crop yields, the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation announced today.

"This was one of the worst years in history for U.S. farmers. In this Region, farmers were faced with everything from hot, dry weather to hurricanes. Every crop we insure and almost every area of the Region was hit by some disaster. Claims have been filed on over 33 percent of our insurance units. With the cost-price squeeze farmers are facing today, the FCIC indemnity many receive is going to be the only way they can continue operating," explained Ben A. Jordan, Jr., College Station Regional Director.

Texas farmers will receive more than \$18 million of FCIC indemnities while some \$2.4 million will go to Oklahoma farmers and over \$400 thousand will go to farmers in New Mexico.

The most heavily damaged crops include cotton, wheat, grain sorghum and peanuts, but substantial payments will also be made on citrus, corn, rice and soybeans.

The government-sponsored program is designed to cover the investment a farmer makes in raising a crop. Since the voluntary program was started in 1938, more than 90 cents of every dollar of premium paid has been returned to farmers in indemnities.

3 cups shredded pared apples
1/2 cup dark seedless raisins
1 tablespoon lemon juice
2 tablespoons grated lemon peel

3 tablespoons Fleischmann's margarine
1/4 cup chopped Planters cocktail peanuts
1 tablespoon sugar

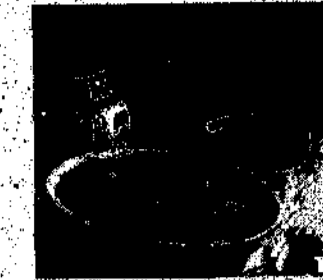

 Right now, while the recently completed deer seasons are still fresh on your mind, is the time to be thinking about any changes you would like to see in next year's big game seasons.
 Jot down these thoughts and bring them with you to one of the five public big game recommendations meetings, scheduled as follows for us Southeastern New Mexicans:
 -January 5 - Alamogordo, 7:00 pm, Commissioners Room, Municipal Bldg., 511 10th Street
 -January 6 - Carlsbad, 7:00 pm,

Carlsbad Public Library Annex, 101 Halagueno
 -January 7 - Hobbs, 7:00 pm, Watson Wall, Room 101, New Mexico Junior College
 -January 8 - Clovis, 7:00 pm, Southwestern Public Service Rm. 500 Pile Street
 -January 9 - Roswell, 7:00 pm, Roswell Public Library, Bondurant Room, 301 North Penn.
 These meetings are designed specifically to give you, the hunting public, the opportunity to provide input for the establishment of New Mexico's hunting seasons and regulations. It also enables you to discuss your ideas and questions with our Southeast Area Game Manager Bruce Morrison, as well as with other Department personnel.
 Every year while checking you hunters in the field, I hear some really good recommendations from you. Upon these times, I encourage you to submit your ideas as formal recommendations, either in writing or by attending one of our public meetings. Yet, when the meetings and deadlines have come and gone, your recommendations were not there.

Last fiscal year records show our six hatcheries to have planted almost 7 1/2 million trout in state waters.
 Of this number, more than 150,000 fish were rainbows stocked in our area winter trout waters during a six (6) month period. Remember, this doesn't include the fish stocked in full time trout waters such as Bonito Lake, Alto Lake, and the Ruidoso River.
 Trout rearing and stocking is not an easy task, nor a cheap one. The present cost of such an operation is \$1.46 per pound of catchable size rainbows (3.3 fish to a pound), or 44 cents per fish.
 Due to this expense, anglers fishing in winter trout waters, just as in year-round trout waters, are required to have a trout stamp, or a trout validation in addition to a fishing license. Therefore, New Mexico fishermen can be proud of the fact that they do indeed support their own sport financially.
 So, when one of these warm, beautiful days like we have been experiencing lately rolls around, grab your rod and reel and head for the lake. Be sure to obtain a current fishing proclamation and read it carefully. It will describe trout water designations, as well as other rules and regulations.
 Remember, the bag limit for rainbows is 8 per day and the possession limit is 16. And, you can only use one rod at a time while fishing in trout waters. Happy fishing and good luck!

4-H Community Pride Projects Approved

This fisherwoman is just one of a large number of anglers that take advantage of Southeastern New Mexico's waters during the winter months.
 Each year on October 1, our certain area waters become classified as 'Winter Trout Waters'. Then, as soon after this date as water temperatures permit, these designated waters are stocked with catchable size (8-10 inches) rainbow trout about every 2 weeks for as long as suitable conditions exist, usually through March. The 'Winter Trout Waters' designation ceases at the end of each license year, in other words, March 31.

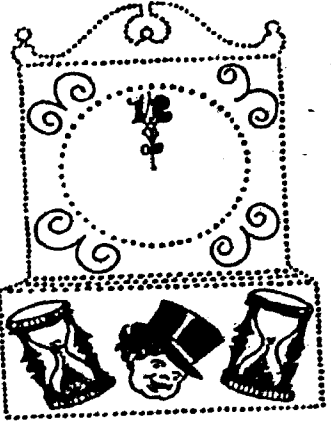
