School Improvement Program Goes Before Voters

On Tuesday, Feb. 3, the qualified voters of the Carrizozo Municipal School District No. 7, Lincoln and Socorro counties, will get the opportunity to vote on the proposed financing of a Carrizozo School renovation program. The renovation program will be made possible through a \$215,000 school bond election and a Two Mill Public School Capital Improvements Tax Levy. Voters will also be voting for two school board positions.

The Board of Education in reviewing the educational program of the Carrizozo schools has determined that in order to provide adequate facilities for our students presently enrolled, the following remodeling projects are necessary:

1. Rewiring of entire High School Buildings (Safety and Electrical Code)
2. Replacement of all interior and exterior doors, locks, and frames (Security and Fire Code)
3. Window replacement throughout the building (Safety and Energy Conservation)
4. Remodeling Girls and Boys Hallway Bathrooms (Sanitation and Plumbing Improvements)
5. Handicapped Accessibility (Architectural Barriers Code)
6. Science Lab remodeling (Instructional Program Improvements)
7. Office area remodeling (Security)
8. Passive solar heating system (Energy Conservation and Leak Prevention)
9. New Hallway Floor (Safety and Building Appearance Improvement)
10. Foam Roof Installation (Energy Conservation and Leak Prevention)
11. Addition of Fire Alarm System (Safety)

12. Old Gym Dressing Room remodeling (Activity Program Improvement)
13. Vocational Program Equipment Replacement (Instructional Program Improvements)
14. High School Entrance Appearance Improvement
15. Sports Facilities Improvement
16. Addition of Solar Hot Water System (New Gym) (Energy conservation)

The financing program will consist of the \$215,000 and the Two

Mill Public School Capital Improvements Tax. This tax will produce about \$9,800 for each of three years and will be matched with approximately \$26,100 from the State of New Mexico Public School Capital Improvements Fund.

Should the cost of the remodeling program exceed the amounts available from the Bond Issue and Capital Improvements Levy the Board of Education will then apply for Emergency Capital Outlay Funds from the State of New Mexico (in

order to qualify for this money both the Bond Issue and the Two Mill Tax Levy must pass.)

The repayment schedule adopted by the Board of Education will include both the Bond Issue payments and the Capital Improvements Tax. This eight year schedule will require a tax increase of approximately \$6.50 per \$1,000 Assessed Valuation annually.

The tax increase will be shown in the November 1981 tax notices, no change for this year. Property tax relief proposals have been announced

at the state level. It is expected the tax relief proposals to be submitted to the 1981 legislature by the governor will include the elimination of the \$8,925 operating levy for school districts for residential property owners. Should this change be accepted by the legislature, no tax increase will be necessary for residential property owners.

Anyone living within the boundaries of the Carrizozo Municipal School District who is a registered voter in Lincoln or Socorro Counties is eligible to vote on this important issue (Voting is not restricted to property owners).

The polling place will be at the Lincoln County Courthouse, in Carrizozo, and absentee voting will be taken care of at the Office of the Superintendent (deadline for absentee voting in person is 5:00 pm, January 30). The polls shall be open between 8:00 am and 7:00 pm.

Commissioners Discuss CSB Concerns With Charlie Lee

Newly-elected state senator Charlie Lee was present at last week's Lincoln County Commissioners meeting. Lee asked for county concerns and suggestions since the legislature was about to meet.

Among the concerns the commission expressed that they would appreciate any influence Lee would have in the area of Camp Sierra Blanca (CSB), the minimum security camp in Fort Stanton.

The commission told Lee that they are concerned that the sheriff is not informed by CSB on who the inmates are, their charges and 'walk-offs'.

Lee has been appointed to the senate's judiciary committee and he said he might be in position to look into the matter.

Since the commissioners meeting on January 6, a check at the Sheriff's Department by the NEWS has revealed that Sheriff Ernest Sanchez has received an inmate population log this month. The log listed 42 inmates at CSB, with a record of name, number, age, offense, ethnic group, county of commitment, and home town. The log is sent every 3 months.

E.B. Gutierrez, superintendent at CSB contacted the NEWS this week stating that the commissioners have never requested how often they want the inmate report sent in to the Sheriff Department.

Transfers to and from other minimum security facilities and the state penitentiary occur often, and Gutierrez said he and Sheriff keep in weekly contact. The two men agreed that a 3 month account of CSB inmate population was sufficient because of the fluctuation.

Gutierrez said that the last contact he had with the commission was about a year ago in Capitán when Commissioner John Allen Hightower and other people were appointed to an advisory panel in regard to CSB. Gutierrez told the NEWS he intends to meet with the commissioners at the next regular meeting, to determine what they had in mind.

Other business conducted by the commissioners at their January 6 meeting included the re-appointment of Thomas 'Cotton' McKnight as chairman for the commission.

The lease agreement for the gravel pit with the Forest Service, north of Capitán was approved.

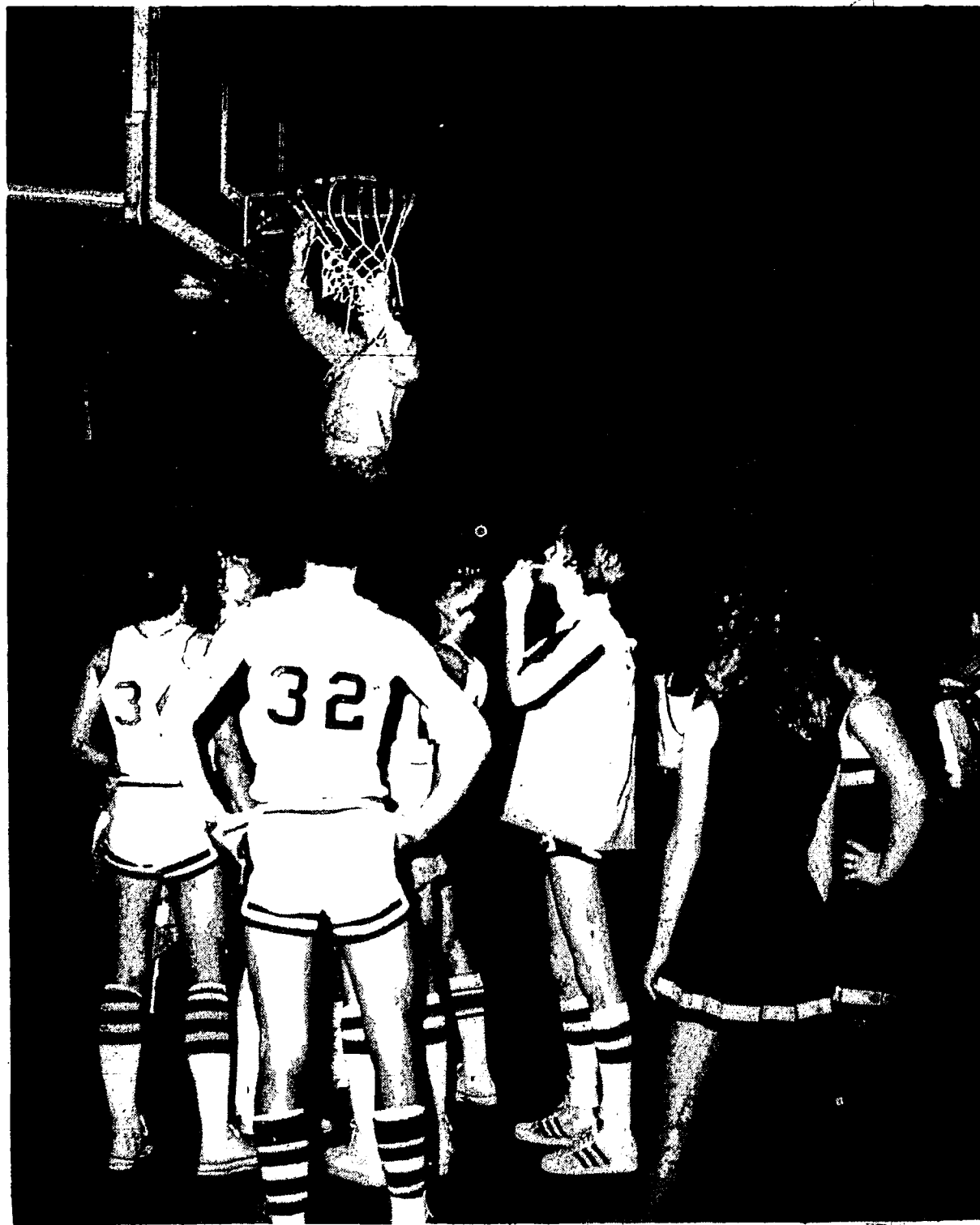
Paul Wetzel, also of White Oaks has been charged in connection with the incident.

Trustees Approve Outdoor Recreation Loan... on condition!

The Carrizozo Town Council at last Monday's regular meeting approved a \$40,000 loan borrowed to temporarily finance the Recreation Area, which includes the golf course, playground, tennis court, baseball field and two lakes.

A trip to Santa Fe in December 1980 was council approved for a grant, which was not awarded. Mayor Manuel Hernandez, Town Attorney Bill Payne and Henry Vega, the facility's supervisor came back from the meeting with news that an interest-free loan of \$40,000 could be borrowed. The loan would provide operating funds for 6 months and give the town time to seek permanent funding.

Hernandez said he needed the council's go-ahead last Monday evening, one way or another. Paperwork stated that repayment would be semi-annually spread over a period of 3 years. He said the payment would be met with money available by not replacing the position vacated by Carol Schlarb when she was promoted to town clerk.

Trustee Ruth Armstrong said that she is not against keeping the outdoor facility area open, but that if an equal loan in the amount of \$40,000 was borrowed for local industry, airport or various other needs, it would be equally if not more advantageous to the community. The large audience in attendance gave their opinions on the matter, most of it unfavorable. Their main concern and reason for being their was the Rec Center situation. The audience questioned the need for the town to go into debt for an area used by county residents and located 1 mile out of town. They felt the council's concern should be aimed at the indoor recreation facility in town.

Al Romero, Department of Finance and Administration recommended that the town accept the loan. It has been brought out that a lease would not maintain the outdoor facility in its present condition and the leasing route is not favored.

Hernandez said legislative action looks promising for solving the facility's money problem. He announced that a meeting was scheduled the following day at the Four Winds with Senator Charlie Lee, and representatives Maurice Hobson and John Bigbee, who would be giving a talk on views on proposed tax legislature. Rep. John Mershon joined Hobson and Lee at the January 13 meeting last Tuesday. Bigbee was unable to be there.

Motion was made to go ahead with the \$40,000 loan, with Armstrong adding that it be amended to read that the town would accept the loan on the condition that it would be paid back only "when we had to." It was insinuated during the loan discussion that the loan might not have to be paid off.

There was standing room only at last Monday's town meeting due to the concern about rumors surrounding the dismissal of Bill Hasenbuhler, as Rec Center manager, closure of the center and the volunteer assistance presently running the facility in the absence of Hasenbuhler.

The audience represented civic clubs, including the local Girls Scout troop which displayed protest signs regarding the center's closure. Among the group were members of the Carrizozo Library Association, the Recreation Committee, and bowling league team members.

Emotions ranged from humorous to serious at the tension-filled meeting. Nepotism, personal vendetta, political motives, faulty town leadership and contradiction accusations were implied or openly questioned, often followed with clapping and cheering by the majority of the crowd.

For the past several months members of the library association had gathered and catalogued books for a library scheduled to open in 2 weeks in the former TV room of the Rec Center. A CETA worker has been obtained for library work. There was concern by library supporters, about future of the proposed library.

leagues: Monday 40, Tuesday 32, Wednesday 32, Thursday 25, and Saturday 20. The council was urged by bowling enthusiasts to keep the Rec Center open.

The major part of the audience commended the management capabilities of Hasenbuhler, questioned his firing and stressed how beneficial the center was for the old and young in the community.

Hernandez responded by telling the people that the center is not closed and that league bowling continues with donated help until a decision regarding the facility is made. He stated that several persons were interested in the idea of leasing the center. The mayor informed the library association that he has made a key for them so they can continue their plans to operate their service. It was questioned by the library people if federal funding would still be feasible if the center was not under the town management.

Hernandez said he dismissed Hasenbuhler because of continued disobedience of warning that he not make any purchases unless approved by the council or the mayor. Hernandez also criticized Hasenbuhler for not buying groceries wholesale. The Recreation Committee was not contacted for their opinion on the dismissal of the center's manager.

Hernandez said he was told to watch Hasenbuhler's center expenses closely and that an \$800.00 heating repair bill which was not authorized was out of line. Hasenbuhler said he had the permission from the Rec Committee to carry out the work on the heating system. It was not clarified last Monday if the heating situation occurred before or after Hasenbuhler was to be monitored on a day-to-day basis, a decision which came out of a special meeting with the council and Rec Committee.

The mayor asked the council for their vote on re-instating Hasenbuhler to the center management position, as the audience demanded or relieving him of his duties. Trustee Richard Vega suggested an executive session for this matter of business, but it was Hasenbuhler's choice to remain in open session.

Armstrong and Roy Harmon voted for keeping Hasenbuhler as manager. Ruben Zamora and Vega voted against. Hernandez broke the tie by siding with Zamora and Vega.

Because of further interest of the audience to discuss the Rec Center's future, Hernandez scheduled a special meeting at the town hall for Monday, January 19 at 7:00 p.m.

In other business, the council heard an airport progress report given by Scott Shafer, member of the local airport advisory committee. Shafer told the council that the committee had met the first week in January with Mr. Bob White of the State Aviation Administration. White gave a favorable opinion on the airport improvements and commended town policeman Dave Wheeler and his wife for dedication to their airport duty.

Shafer said that fuel, full time attendant, runway, hanger and a car are the most important items for an airport. He said it would be prudent for the town to install a hanger if they couldn't find anyone to do it. He told the council that the committee has obtained temporary sources to supply them with oil and fuel. The council agreed to earmark \$1,500 for aviation fuel, filter and oil purchases. The investment would generate revenue back to the town. Pilots will be informed of a Carrizozo stop through an FAA map.

The council agreed to pay a registration fee so that Wheeler could attend a seminar for airport managers in Albuquerque.

The lengthy town meeting included giving all town employees with the exception of the town clerk, a \$40.00 "across the board" salary increase. Carol Schlarb, who was promoted to the clerk position requested that her salary be upped to \$656.66 as the former clerk received. The council agreed to give Schlarb a \$100.00 increase and the rest after a 3 month probation period.

Local Student Enters Journalism Contest

Robert Montano, a Carrizozo High School sophomore, has announced plans to enter the Student Press Law Center's (SPLC) First Amendment essay contest. Entries must examine some aspect of freedom of expression, including such topics as: fair trial-free press, book censorship, closed judicial hearings, gag orders, free speech for unpopular minorities, government precensorship or student press rights. The judges may select two grand prize winners. The student author of each winning entry will be offered a \$1,500 scholarship to intern with the Student Press Law Center for three months.

Twenty-four leading national education and journalism organizations have joined to sponsor the national student journalism competition on the value of free speech and a free press in America. The purpose of the competition is to encourage young people to write, read and think about the importance of freedom of expression.

The competition is an outgrowth of the First Amendment Congress - a national meeting of several hundred representatives of the media, the bar, the public and the education establishment who convened earlier this year to explore ways the public and press can join to protect and defend this basic constitutional right.

After learning from George Gallup, Jr. that 78 percent of Americans polled do not know what the First Amendment is, the delegates resolved to increase efforts to educate the public, with an emphasis on reaching young people. Through this competition, the sponsors hope to use the student media to educate youth about the meaning of and the importance of the First Amendment.

Montano chose press-versus-courts as the subject-matter of his entry for the SPLC essay contest:

WHO'S RIGHT? PRESS-vs-COURTS

Since the mass production of newspapers and magazines, both the courts and the press have experienced a series of difficulties. The controversy of whether the courts should or should not allow the participation of both the public and the press is evident in just about every area dealing with the judicial courts, and the Supreme courts. Should the courts shut out the press?

The constitution guarantees the people freedom of the Press. When this right was put into the constitution, it was thought that it would serve a purpose and that was to insure the freedom to publicize and inform the public of something that will affect them.

A majority of the judges, who have closed their doors to the public, say that writers pose a threat in in-

fluencing the jury to a point on decision. Yet the sixth amendment guarantees the right to a public trial, if also guarantees the right to a fair trial. So if this is true, and the press is indeed influencing the jury in their decision, does it then give the right to shut out the press?

Looking at the first amendment of the constitution, it refers to the Freedom of expression. The question asked here would be if the courts orders would be in violation of this Constitutional right?

But are the judges' comments just an excuse to keep the writers out? Or are they true words of concern for the defendant?

In selecting a jury both the prosecuting attorney and the defending attorney have a choice in selecting a 12 person jury, whether it be 8 men 7 women, or 6 men 6 women or any other combination. What ever the case may be, a jury is started fresh, keeping in mind only those facts presented in court. Why then, do judges press the theory that writers influence the jury.

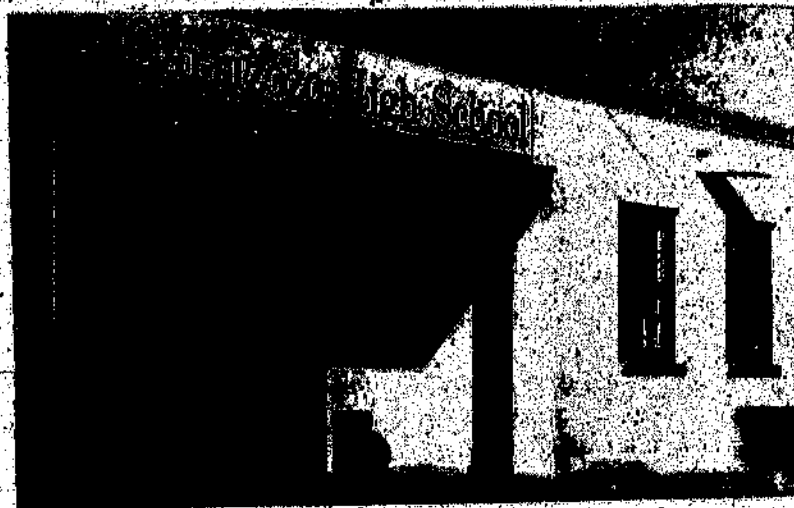
There are many who will agree and disagree on behalf of both parties. The constitution gives us the right to print, yet Justice Potter Stewart said "The constitutional right to attend a criminal trial."

Subsequently there are no real answers to who is right, and who is wrong. The only positive answers that may be given here, is that the newspapers and magazines will continue to write, as the constitution permits them to, and the courts will attempt to continue a behavior that will deprive the people of the right regarding to the Freedom of the press!

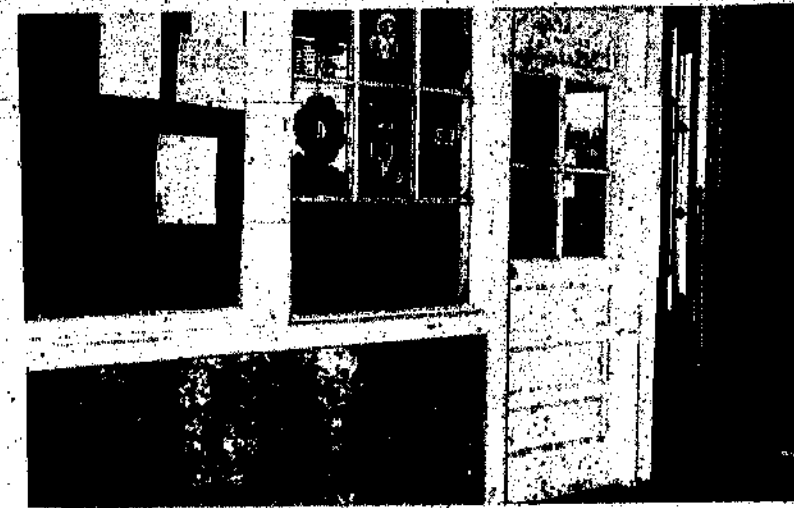

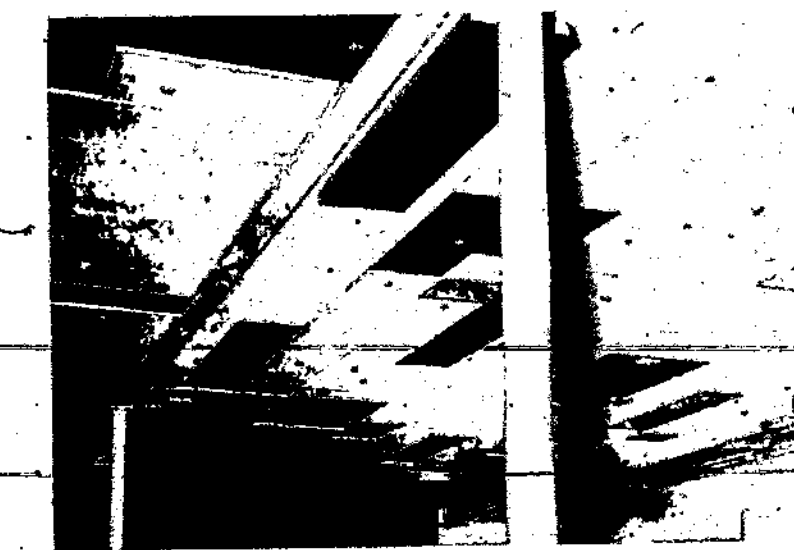
The Carrizozo High School entrance appearance will be 'due for some improvement, which will include 'Handicapped Accessibility'. The entries and all rooms with ex-

The old gym dressing rooms ceilings are in bad need of repair, and will be replaced.

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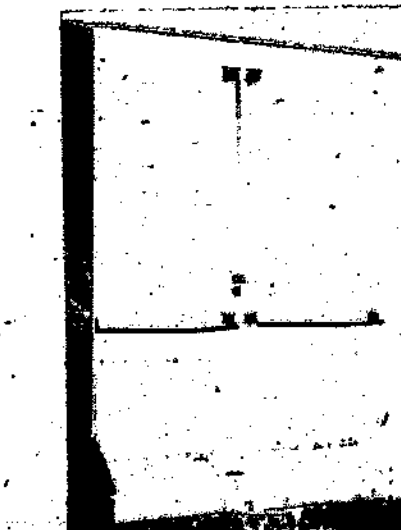

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following letter was sent to Mr. Pat L. Huey by State of New Mexico Superintendent of Public Instruction, Leonard J. DeLayo:

Dear Mr. Huey:

As a recognized leader in education in New Mexico, you have been selected to represent your profession and your nation on an official People-to-People Mission to the Orient and to the People's Republic of China. I hope that you will be able to arrange your schedule to take advantage of this opportunity.

The New Mexico School Administrators and Board of Education Leaders People-to-People delegation will be visiting Tokyo, Hong Kong, and the following cities in the People's Republic of China: Peking, Tientsin, Shanghai and Canton. This delegation will be exclusive and private; each delegate will pay his or her own way.

This is not a federal program; therefore, we shall be meeting people from all phases of education, as well as the many facets of contemporary Chinese industrial and business developments. We will be able to compare methods-procedures, and conduct frank exchanges of views and thoughts, as we become acquainted with people where we visit. Special briefings are presently being requested with a staff member of the American Embassy in the People's Republic of China.

I have been named to serve as the leader and spokesman for this delegation. Although the project relates in no way to my position or work, and only my free time will be

devoted to the formation of this delegation, it has been cleared, endorsed and officially sponsored by the Dwight D. Eisenhower People-to-People International organization. This will be an informative and meaningful mission, dedicated to peace and understanding between people.

Founded in 1956 by the late President Dwight D. Eisenhower, the People-to-People Program was conceived to foster better understanding between people of the world. For 27 years, the program has been providing Americans with an opportunity to travel in a congenial group with similar occupational or professional interests.

The New Mexico School Administrators and Board of Education Leaders Delegation will depart from Los Angeles on June 27, 1981, and return on July 11, 1981. Your all-inclusive cost from the moment of your departure Los Angeles, is currently only \$3,907.00 per person. Participation must be limited, and it will be determined in the order in which registrations and deposits are received. Our maximum membership quota is 31, and we expect to have the delegation filled within 10 days after you receive this letter. Upon learning of your interest, I will see that complete information is sent to you.

Please advise me of your decision immediately.

Two Day Horse Breeding Short Course At Roswell

A two-day short course for area horse breeders will be Friday and Saturday, Jan. 30-31 at Roswell, New Mexico, according to Joe E. Armstrong, moderator for the short course program and animal science professor at New Mexico State University.

The short course is sponsored jointly by NMSU Cooperative Extension Service, the NMSU Horse Advisory Committee, and the Buena Suerta Ranch near Roswell.

Morning sessions on both days will be at the Sally Port Inn, Roswell, and afternoon, laboratory sessions will be at the Buena Suerta Ranch.

Friday morning's session will concentrate on health and nutrition of the broodmare, and management of a broodmare breeding program. The Saturday morning program focuses on the health and nutrition needs of stallions, and management of a

stallion breeding program.

A special panel discussion is also scheduled for 8 pm Friday. It will cover pasture breeding, thorough breeding, and several veterinary medicine subject areas.

The Saturday afternoon session at the Buena Suerta Ranch will feature a stallion parade of the ranch's top breeding stock, and a clinic on artificial insemination breeding techniques for horses.

Pre-registration fee for the short course is \$50, which includes luncheon both days and the Friday evening meal. Late registration is from 8 to 8:45 am Friday, and the late fee is \$60.

Registration is being handled by Bill Thompson, Chaves County Extension agent, Box 1353, Roswell, New Mexico 88201. People who plan to attend are responsible for their own motel reservations.

Alfalfa Conference Planned At Roswell

An alfalfa conference that will cover various phases of alfalfa production and research in New Mexico will be Thursday, Jan. 22 at the Sally Port Inn in Roswell, New Mexico.

The conference is sponsored jointly by New Mexico State University, NMSU's Cooperative Extension Service, and the New Mexico Farm Bureau. Registration begins at 8:30 am.

Topics to be discussed on the program include alfalfa insects, weed control, fertilization, diseases, breeding, harvesting and marketing.

Included in the alfalfa breeding discussion will be disease and insect resistance, seed production, and alfalfa performance with less than adequate moisture.

The new Alfalfa Advisory Committee, formed in November, 1980 to make recommendations and give advice on the needs of the alfalfa industry in New Mexico, will meet Friday, Jan. 23 at the Extension building in Roswell.

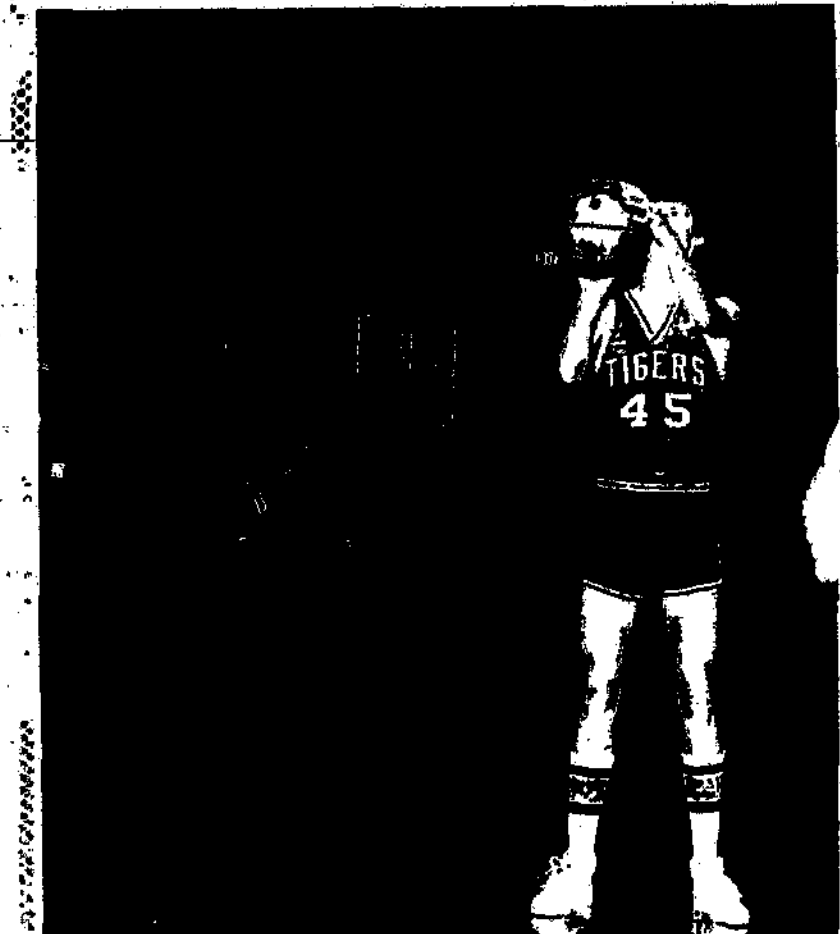

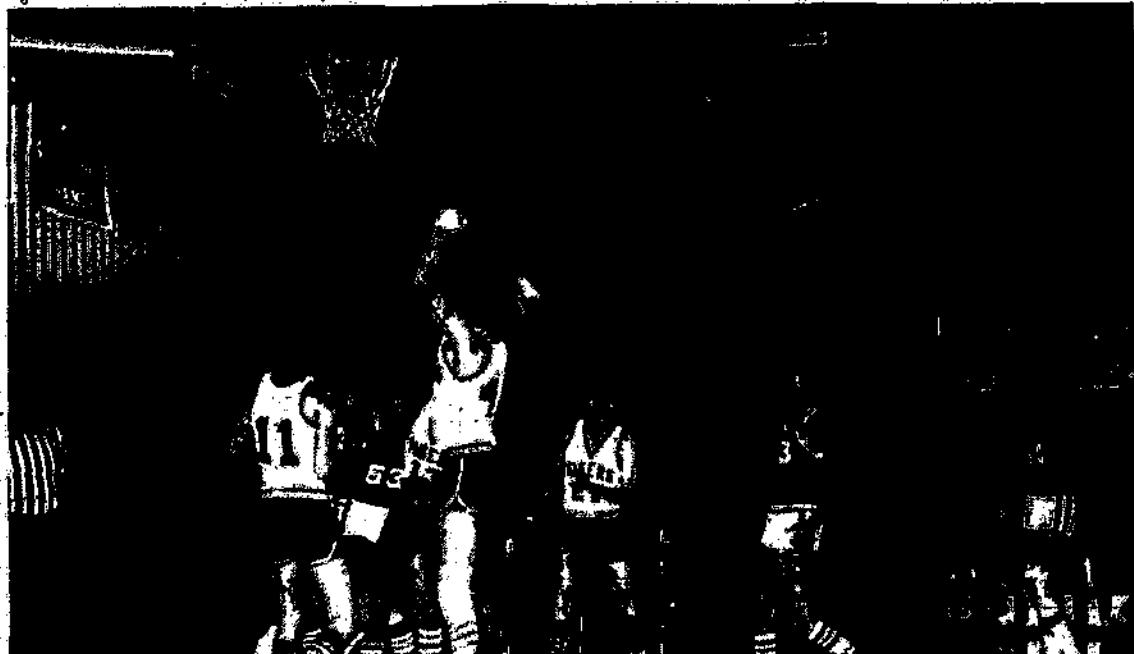

The Judges of Election shall be Joan Means (Presiding Judge), Cecilia Ortiz and Ruth Wilson, and the Clerks of Election shall be Zillah Watson and Rachel West; all being the same persons who will conduct the regular school board election to be held on the same day.

Section 4. Absentee voting will be permitted as authorized by Sections 22-6-21 through 22-6-24, NMSA 1978. Applications for absentee ballots may be obtained from the office of the Superintendent of Schools, at the Office of the Superintendent, 800 D. Avenue, in Carrizozo, New Mexico; but at 5:00 pm on Friday, January 30, 1981, the Superintendent is required by statute to destroy unused absentee ballots, so completed applications must be returned to the Superintendent prior to such time. The absentee voters' polling place will be located at the office of the Superintendent of Schools, at the Office of the Superintendent, 800 D. Avenue, in Carrizozo, New Mexico.

Section 5. In order to vote, qualified electors of the District must have previously registered with the County Clerk of Lincoln County or the County Clerk of Socorro County (depending on the county in which the elector resides), as provided heretofore.

Section 6. Voting shall be by voting machine, except for absentee voting which shall be by paper ballot. At least one voting machine shall be used at the polling place for the single consolidated precinct.

Section 7. Notice hereby is given that the Board will meet in open special session in the District's Conference Room in the Superintendent's Office, 800 D. Avenue, Carrizozo, New Mexico, at 8:00 pm, on Tuesday, the 3rd day of February, 1981, to determine the results of such election (i.e., with respect to such school board election public school capital improvements tax election and school bond election being held at the same time) and take other action relating thereto.

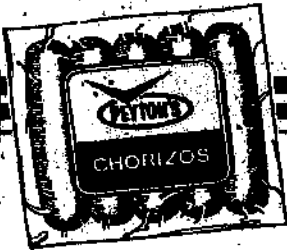

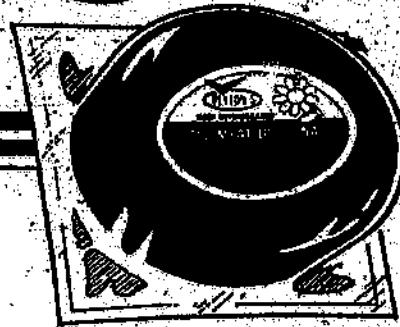
