The regular meeting of the town of Carrizozo board of trustees met Monday, February 9. Mayor pro-tem Ruth Armstrong conducted the meeting in the absence of Mayor Hernandez. Some agenda business was tabled until the trustees ask for the advise of town attorney, Bill Payne, who was not available.

An agreement was to have been signed last Monday, giving Lincoln County Arriba, Inc. control of the management of the Carrizozo Recreational Park, which includes the golf course, little league park, tennis court, lakes and playground, the Carrizozo Recreation Center and the swimming pool, located at Spencer Park. Representatives of Arriba were not present at the town meeting. A special meeting regarding Carrizozo's recreational compound has been scheduled for February 16 at 7 pm.

Before signing the agreement, the \$40,000 borrowed by the town for the Carrizozo Recreational Park will be discussed by the town with Arriba at the special town meeting. The town clerk deposited \$30,000 in savings and \$10,000 in checking after the loan was received.

The non-profit corporation, Lincoln County Arriba, Inc. met last Sunday. Arriba approved the agreement, adopted by-laws and formed a number of committees. It was hoped that the agreement would soon be approved and signed by the town.

Howard Shanks presided at Sunday's Arriba meeting. Other officers who were present - Bill Payne, vice president, Johnson Stearns, secretary and Margaret Stearns, treasurer. The board consists of 25 county directors, to be announced later.

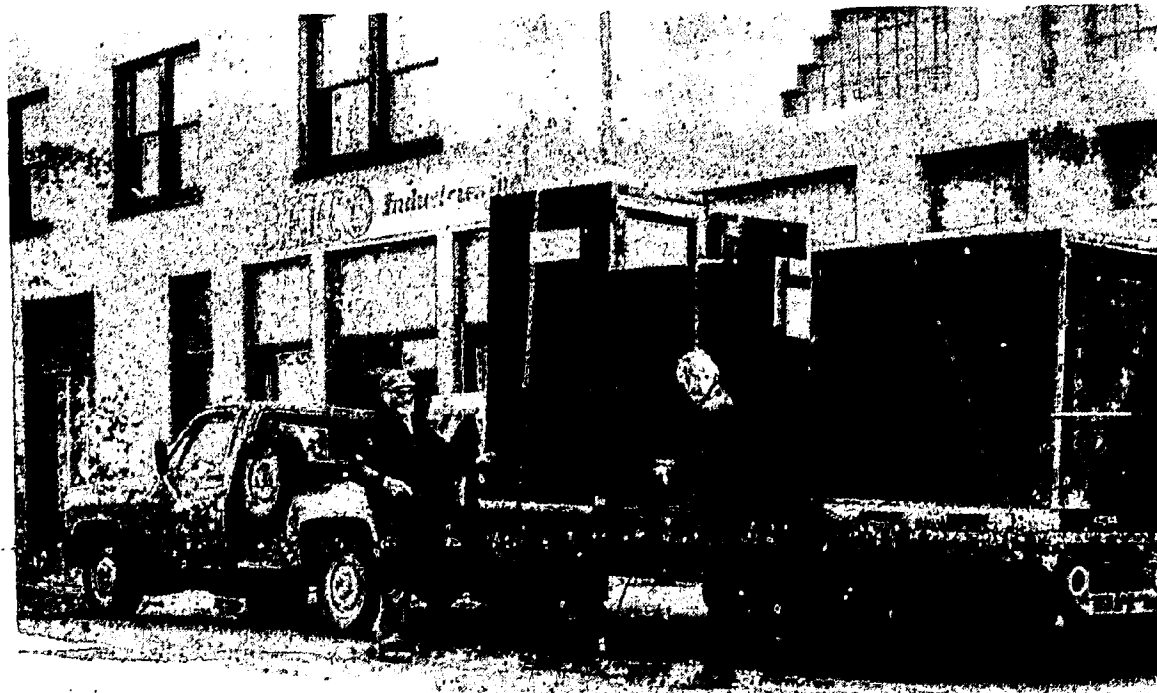
Armstrong read a letter from Nick J. Pappas, executive director of South Eastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SENMEDD). It is the opinion of SENMEDD that Carrizozo's pre-application for a

grant addresses critical housing and community development needs and SENMEDD recommends HUD's approval of the request. The proposed housing rehabilitation project, if final approval is granted, will provide direct benefits to low and moderate income individual and families residing in the community.

In other town business, the trustees approved the employment of Dave Vermillion as police officer. Edward O'Brian resigned last week. Vermillion is a former Lincoln County

Sheriff's Deputy and has been employed by Carrizozo Police in the past.

The police report for the month of January shows that Units No. 1 and No. 2 were driven a total of 3,551 miles and used 321 gallons of gas. In January, town police made or answered a total of 133 calls. Twenty-four citations were issued (Morales - 17; Wheeler - 2; O'Brian - 5). Two criminal complaints were made, vandalism was investigated, eight arrests were made and two accidents were investigated.

Thomas J. Chisholm was born August 2, 1889 in Lorenzo, Mississippi. Effie Pinkston was born Christmas Eve 1892 in Henderson, Texas. The couple married on February 21, 1911 in Vicksburg Mississippi, where they made their home.

Mr. Chisholm retired after 52 years as a railroad man in Mississippi. "Lady", as he affectionally nicknamed his wife, was a

secretary to a superintendent of education. The Chisholms moved to Carrizozo on August 15, 1965. Following his retirement in 1959, Mr. Chisholm pursued his talent in woodwork. The couple's home at 403 10th Street is filled with the beautiful pieces of furniture that he created.

"Lady" is equally creative with her hands. One of her master pieces is a picture of a rooster which she designed with painted seeds. She was very active in community and church work up until three years ago when Mr. Chisholm required extra care following surgery.

Chisholms are members of the First Baptist Church. They have a daughter, Catherine Eaker, a retired Carrizozo elementary teacher. Catherine, who lives near by, is devoted to the care of her father, like her mother. The Chisholms have a son, Angus W. "Billy" Chisholm who resides in Buffalo, N.Y. There were two other sons, Sidney who died in infancy and T.J. Chisholm who died in his 30's. T.J. and "Lady" have three grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

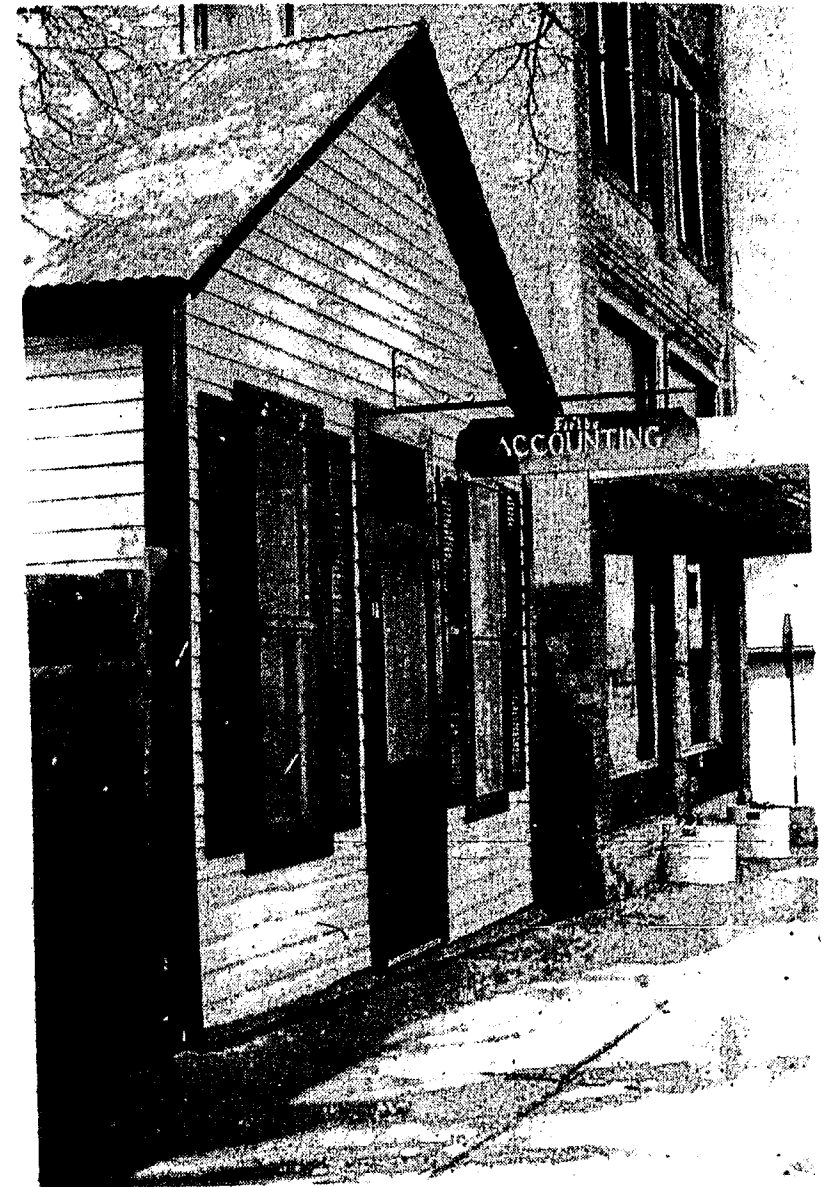
In observing their 70th wedding anniversary, Mrs. Chisholm says, "We're the luckiest people in the world." She said that like every married couple they have their disagreements.

Fields Accounting Location brings Back Memories

A little frame building at 1202 Central has come alive after sitting dormant for over 60 years. On January 10th, Betty Fields opened the door and invited the public in to view the new home of 'Fields Accounting Service'.

History on the building is vague, although Carrizozo's unofficial historian, Albert Roberts, estimated the year to be 1906, when Dr. Melvin Paden built it to house his pharmacy. Upon completion of his two-story hospital and pharmacy next door (now the Gift Gallery), Paden leased the little building to the first telephone company in Carrizozo.

Roberts' sisters, Alma and Carrie were telephone operators in the early 1900's at this location. The telephone office remained in this building until about 1918 when it moved to larger quarters on what is now 12th Street. The manager of the phone company, Mr. McQuillan maintained the little frame building as his living quarters for several years thereafter. Since approximately 1920, no one has used the building for any length of time, although a few people have lived there briefly.

Betty leased the building from Roy Dow who operates the Gift Gallery. Renovation on Betty's building started in July, 1980. Interior paneling, painting, ceiling, etc. was done by Linda Koni of Carrizozo, who also painted the exterior. The unique wooden screen door was built by local resident, Joe Ventura. Signs were designed and made by Jack Richardson.

The interior is a blend of browns, with paneling on all walls. A pen and ink sketch of the building as it ap-

peared before restoration, is on display. The sketch is the work of Jerry Peckinpough, Carrizozo mid high teacher.

Two very important items are seen on Betty's desk. One, a small globe calendar and the other a barometer were used by her father, J.G. Moore, in his many years in business in Carrizozo.

Betty is no stranger to Carrizozo. She grew up in Carrizozo, attending school from 1941 to 1953, when she graduated. After her marriage in 1953, she left and has lived throughout the U.S. and Europe.

With a bachelors degree in accounting, a masters in business administration and a doctorate in business, she is well qualified to assist county businesses. Presently the little office is bustling with area residents getting their income tax forms prepared.

The office hours of 10 am to 4 pm certainly don't reflect only a part time interest in the business. Betty can be found at numerous places from 7 am to 10 pm and 4 pm to 6 pm, as she maintains the books for several businesses during these hours. The abbreviated hours of 10 to 4 are for income tax clients.

This month, Betty volunteered to give talks to senior citizens through the Zia Senior Citizens Center in Carrizozo and it's satellite in Corona. Betty's presentation was about the advantages of tax rebates to the elderly.

Carrizozo has long needed a professional accountant and now local and surrounding area residents have one who plans to be here for many years.

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION ANNOUNCES ACCREDITATION CHANGE

The New Mexico State Board of Education, meeting January 19-21 in

Santa Fe, has announced an accreditation change for the Carrizozo Municipal Schools. In moving from being "conditionally" accredited to being "fully" accredited, the Carrizozo Schools removed a number of citations existing since February 1979, the date of the District's last review by the Department of Education. A number of New Mexico accreditation procedure which examines districts in-depth every six years. A shorter accreditation review is conducted each Fall through a self-report by the District.

There's no cut-off time for enjoying nature and good eating. Many Americans are reluctant to give up the out of doors they so dearly love so they extend their outings to those wonderful Saturdays and Sundays during Indian Summer. This is the time for enjoying football or hockey, soccer, hiking or driving to nearby picnic areas for a view of the fall foliage. The air is invigorating and appetites are hearty so take along an easy to prepare vegetable-pasta casserole made from broccoli and canned beef ravioli in rich tomato sauce. It's bound to please the cook and satisfy those Indian Summer appetites.

- EASY RAVIOLI VEGETABLE CASSEROLE**
- 2 packages (10 oz. each) frozen chopped broccoli
 - 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
 - 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
 - 1 medium clove garlic, crushed
 - 1/4 cup red or green chopped peppers
 - 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
 - 2 cans (15 oz. each) Chef Boy-a-Dee (R) Beef Ravioli in Beef and Tomato Sauce

Cook broccoli according to package directions; drain well. Add Parmesan cheese and mix well. Sauté onion, garlic and peppers in butter until lightly browned; combine with broccoli. Place Ravioli in saucepan over low heat; stir occasionally until thoroughly heated. Add half of the broccoli mixture to Ravioli; serve half for garnish. Arrange in shallow or 1 1/2 quart serving dish. Garnish edge with the remainder of the broccoli. Serves 4-6.

Afterwards, you'll want to serve Spirited Coffee and Bananas Teacher, the sweetest finale, topped with ice cream.

SCOTCH GLAZED CORNISH HENS

- 1 cup sliced mushrooms
- 1/2 cup sliced green onions
- 1/4 cup chopped parsley
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 2 cups cooked rice
- 1/2 cup sliced smoked ham
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon rubbed sage
- 4 Cornish game hens (about 3/4 pound each)
- 1/2 cup orange marmalade
- 1/4 cup Teacher's Scotch
- 1/2 cup Teacher's Scotch
- 1/2 cup Teacher's Scotch

In skillet, brown mushrooms and cook onions and parsley until tender in butter. Stir in rice, ham, salt and sage. Use to fill cavities in hens. Truss. Arrange on rack in roasting pan. Bonus

for 4 Year Enlistment

ALBUQUERQUE, Jan. 21, 1981 - The U.S. Army has now increased the cash bonus offer of \$4,000 to \$5,000 for young people who enlist for four years in certain combat arms job specialties.

Effective Jan. 20, 1981, all jobs in the armor and infantry fields as well as critical jobs in field artillery pay the increased bonus, said Lieutenant Colonel Thomas Schatzman, commander of Army recruiting activities in New Mexico and West Texas.

A soldier who qualifies for the \$5,000 critical skill bonus and scores in the top half of the Armed Forces Qualifications Test would also qualify for the new free Veteran's Educational Assistance Program (VEAP) which pays \$14,000 for a four-year enlistment which would be a \$19,000 combination of cash bonus, less tax, payable upon completion of special training, and the future education money.

Although women are restricted from direct combat roles, there are many other critical job specialties opened to both men and women with cash bonuses of \$1,500 to \$4,000. Free VEAP offers in lesser amounts also apply to special two and three year enlistments.

WILDLIFE NEWS

The low temperatures we New Mexicans have been experiencing lately may not be any indication, but believe it or not, spring is just around the corner. NOW is the time to get ready for spring.

Spring is a beautiful time of year in this state, and when it comes each year it brings with it, besides strong winds, many forms of life.

If you are one of the millions of people in the world that like to have plants and wildlife around your dwelling, you can have both with just a little pre-planning and by following a few guidelines.

First though, let's consider the variety of wildlife in our state and the basic needs that wildlife require.

If you have spent any time in New Mexico at all, you have probably observed a variety of wildlife ranging from a tiny kangaroo rat to a large, impressive bull elk, or black bear.

Our variety of life forms can be attributed to the wide variety of climatic zones in the state's 121,666 square miles. Elevations range from a low of 2,817 feet above sea level at Red Bluff in Eddy County to the high of 13,160 feet above sea level at Wheeler Peak in Taos County.

The higher elevations are accompanied by cooler temperatures, and damper conditions than are the lower elevations.

All of these climatic varieties enable New Mexico to brag of having six of the seven life zones found in North America. These are the Hud-

sonian, Arctic, Canadian, Transition, Upper Sonoran and Lower Sonoran Zones.

Our geographic location allows us to share the biotic communities of the Rocky Mountains, the Great Plains, the Mexican Plateau, the Chihuahuan and the Sonoran deserts.

The wildlife, regardless of size and stamina, that live in these various environments all require four basic elements in order to survive. These are food, water, cover, and shelter.

The need for the first two elements, food and water would be obvious. However, you might be confused as to the difference between cover and shelter.

Cover can generally be thought of as an element which provides wildlife protection from natural enemies and weather. Shelter often refers to the areas where wildlife can reproduce and beat their young in safety.

Each species requires its own combination of these four elements, but a given habitat usually provides enough of an assortment of these combinations to support several species in a common environment.

If you have been wanting some of those animals that live near you to come into your yard, think about the four requirements - food, water, cover, and shelter - that the species you are interested in need.

Provide their needs in a comparable form as to what they require and you will be pleasantly surprised with your own refuge.

Should you need help in planning for wildlife around your house, contact me and I will try to provide you with a copy of the National Wildlife Federation's "Invite Wildlife to Your Backyard".

Attendance at Lincoln State Monument for 1980 was nearly the same as 1979.

CAPITAN MUNICIPAL SCHOOLS Revised Income Guidelines

Capitan Municipal Schools today announced its policy for Free and Reduced Price Lunch (free and reduced-price meals, free milk, as applicable) for children eligible for such meals-milk served under the National School Lunch, School Breakfast, and Special Milk Programs (as applicable).

If there is a change in family income due to reasons such as unemployment, or there is a change in family size, parents and guardians are urged to contact school officials. Such changes may qualify students for free or reduced price meals and free milk (as applicable).

Additional copies are available in the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentations of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable state and federal criminal statutes.

Foster children, placed by a state agency, may be eligible for free meals and milk (as applicable). Meal applications should show the foster child as a family of one. Income should be shown as that amount received from the state for the support of the child.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

Under the provisions of the policy, Glen Crane, Principal will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official he may make a request either orally or in writing to Richard Clifton, Superintendent, P.O. Box 278, Capitan, N.M., Tel. 354-2238 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

Parental conferences may be called to verify information on applications prior to formal hearings.

Each school and the office of the Capitan Municipal Schools has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.
