\$300,000 Due Carrizozo For Housing Rehabilitation and Storm Drainage

A full application for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) assistance will be submitted by the Town of Carrizozo. The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) informed Mayor Manuel Hernandez that a CDBG grant application for \$300,000 for housing rehabilitation and storm drainage be submitted by May 1, 1981.

Over a period of seven years, the town of Carrizozo has tried 6 times to obtain a CDBG grant. "In the past when a municipality is invited to submit a full application that means their going to be funded," says town attorney Bill Payne who has been a main force behind the quest for the needed funds.

All pre-applications received were grouped according to the Competition Category of funds and rated in accordance with HUD's National Rating System. With HUD's invitation to submit a FULL application for CDBG assistance, Carrizozo's request will soon be realized.

Herbert H. Quintana, Economic Development Specialist with Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District will be in Carrizozo this Friday to go over application forms with town officials.

Quintana has worked closely with the town in their latest small cities CDBG grant try. Quintana proposed a citizen participation plan. He suggested that the mayor name a citizen's committee. Public hearings were held last November and December.

The grant money will be used for housing rehabilitation and storm drainage south of the railroad tracks. Guide lines on who is eligible in that part of town to apply for aid has not been firmly established. Low interest loans or no interest grants will be available. Residents with low and moderate incomes will be considered.

More citizen input meetings are still to be held and committees formed before any money is loaned or granted to residents.

American Red Cross active in Lincoln County

Over the years, American Red Cross has made Lincoln County a much safer place in which to live

when one considers the hundreds of people who have benefited from the first aid and water safety programs.

In 1977-78 fiscal year Red Cross responded to over 38,209 disaster incidents, one every 16 seconds! 95,809 families assisted at a cost of \$33,088,238. In New Mexico the disaster expenditures reached close to \$40,000 in response to 14 disasters.

Vital statistics for Lincoln County are available from Marion Spencer, Lincoln County Red Cross chairwoman.

—First Aid: 51 courses taught, which include Basic First Aid, Standard Multimedia, Standard First Aid and Personal Safety, Advanced First Aid and Emergency Care, CPR-Basic Life Support. (490 Certificates awarded)

—Water Safety: 77 courses taught, which include Beginner, Advanced Beginner, Intermediate, Swimmer, Advanced Lifesaving. (104 Certificates awarded)

Accidental Shooting reported by Hunter of 'Small' Game

While shooting mice under a mobile home located near Hwy 380 and the Indian Divide, the gunman's foot got in his way. The mouse hunter reported to the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department that a .44 magnum loaded with snake shot was responsible for the damage to his foot.

He drove himself to the Carrizozo Health Center for treatment of the accidental shooting injuries. He was later transported to Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Memorial Hospital.

Joe Armstrong reported to county police on March 19 that a chain saw

was stolen from the back of his 1979 Ford pick-up. Offense could have occurred when he was parked at Johnny's Outpost or in White Oaks.

A juvenile in connection with the same incident, was fined \$50.00 and \$10.00 court costs for charges of minor in possession of alcoholic beverage while driving a motor vehicle. A 6-month probation includes the restriction of pleasure driving.

The fourth man Glenn Trujillo 18, was fined \$50.00 plus \$10.00 court cost in the charge of allowing self to be served alcoholic beverages.

During the week of March 8-13, Mammie Williamson of Carrizozo joined the other ten New Mexico Special Olympians and more than 700 other Special Olympians from every other state in the United States and seven countries to participate in the Second International Winter Special Olympic Games at The Village of Smuggler's Notch and Stowe, Vermont.

A full five-day program of athletic competition plus clinics, demonstrations, and recreational activities was provided to the Special Olympians. The making of new friends and the competition against Special Olympians from all over the world was an experience that will never be forgotten by any of those that attended the Games.

This was the first time Mammie had ever traveled outside the state of New Mexico and it was her first experience to ever fly in an airplane. This was also the first year Mammie had ever attempted Nordic or cross-country skiing. She learned how to cross-country ski in January at the New Mexico Winter Special Olympic Games at Angel Fire. In Vermont, she placed 4th in the 1 kilometer race and 5th in the 100 meter race.

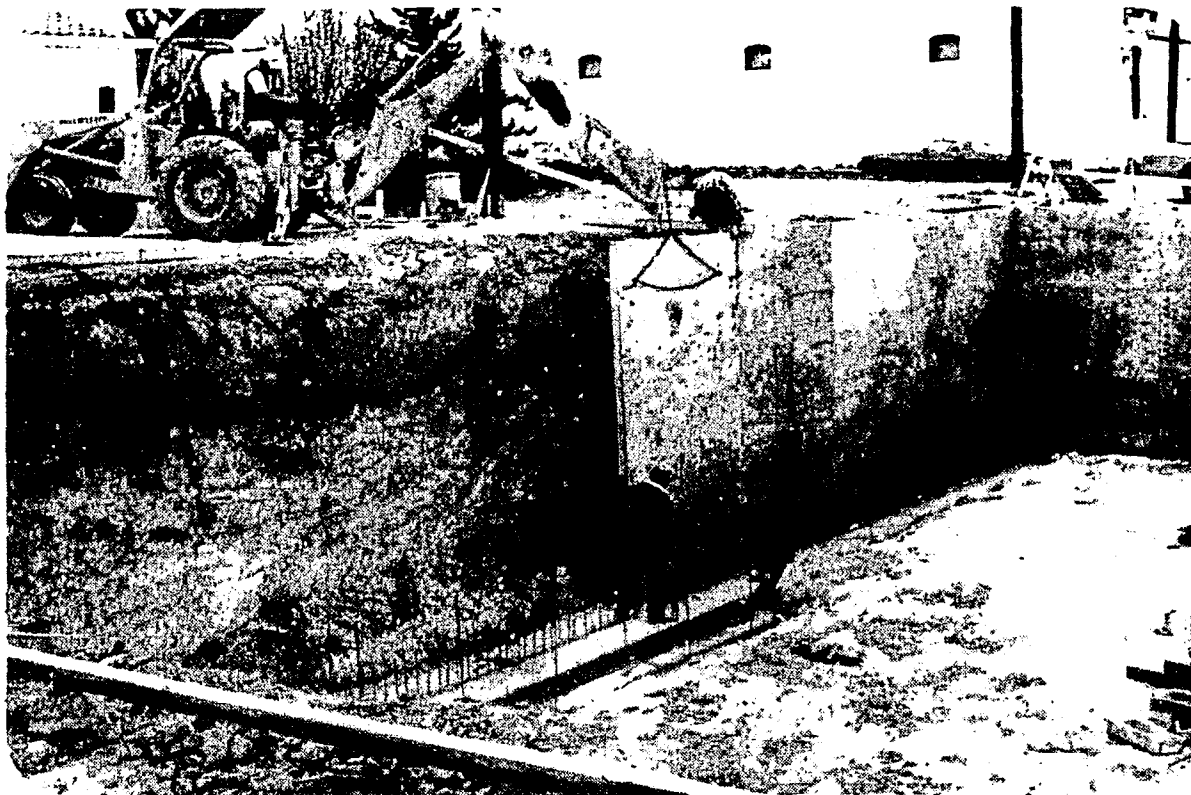

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- Congressman Joe Skeen today announced the awarding of nine grants totaling \$5,057,580 for cities and counties in New Mexico by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The largest of the grants was to the City of Gallup. It was in the amount of \$2,250,000 to finance a three-year housing rehabilitation project there.

Other grants included \$100,000 to Farmington for a battered women's shelter; \$424,000 to Mora County for water system improvements; \$447,580 to Socorro County for housing rehabilitation; \$600,000 to Mesilla for the paving of dirt streets. \$446,000 to Dona Ana County for water system improvements; \$125,000 to Hatch for water system improvements, \$300,000 to Carrizozo for housing rehabilitation and \$365,000 to Deming for housing rehabilitation.

April deadlines have been set for area farmers seeking to insure their crops under the federal crop insurance program.

"An April 15 deadline applies to cotton producers in Chaves, Eddy and Quay counties; to corn producers in Curry county and to cotton and corn producers in Lea, Roosevelt and Union counties."

"An April 30 deadline will apply to grain sorghum producers in Curry, Lea, Quay, Roosevelt and Union counties and peanut producers in Roosevelt county," said Dan Shelden, Federal Crop Insurance Corporation district director.

A government sponsored program, FCIC is available on a voluntary basis. It is designed to protect a producer's annual crop investment from unavoidable natural hazards like wind, hail, drought and insects.

Information and applications can be obtained from any local insurance agent now handling the program or from the FCIC office in El Paso.

Mrs. Carol Schlarb was named chairman of a Bike-a-thon in Carrizozo by Ann Marie Rutherford, President of the New Mexico Chapter Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

Mrs. Schlarb will be conducting the Bike-a-thon to raise funds which will support research and care for those affected by cystic fibrosis.

Cystic fibrosis (CF) is an inherited disease of children, adolescents and young adults. Presently there is no cure for CF. The basic cause of the disease is not known, and CF continues to be the number one genetic killer of children and young adults.

By conducting state-wide events such as the Bike-a-thon in Carrizozo much needed funds will be raised to continue the work in research to find the unanswered questions regarding cause, cure and prevention of CF.

"THINKIN' IN LINCOLN"

The ancients considered celery primarily medicinal. The Abyssinians used pillows filled with celery leaves as a headache treatment.

Any curative powers aside, celery, like the apple, is another one of nature's toothbrushes. When eaten raw, celery helps clean your teeth to prevent tooth decay. It also contributes small amounts of iron, calcium and vitamin C, and is a good source of chlorine, which is needed in the maintenance of normal heartbeat.

Celery is in plentiful supply in March, according to U.S. Department of Agriculture Marketing specialists.

Use it for the classic appetizer, stuffed celery. Or practice your stir-fry technique with Celery Stir-Fry Magic. Use it to bring texture to salads, such as Orange Nutty Salad.

What food is available every month of the year, is greatest for snacking and is nutritious? Oranges provide an economical package because you can use the whole fruit, the peel or shell, the juice or "meat".

This season with a record harvest from California and Arizona, there will be plenty of navel oranges to go around for snacking and meal planning.

Navel oranges are excellent for slicing, sections and eating out-of-hand because they are seedless and easy to peel. To use oranges and celery try Orange Nutty Salad.

ORANGE NUTTY SALAD
3 to 4 oranges, peeled, cut in bite-size pieces

1 red apple, unpeeled, cut in bite-size pieces
1/2 cup (0.12 L) sliced celery
2 tablespoons (30 mL) brown sugar

juice of 1/2 fresh lemon
1/4 cup (113 g) coarsely chopped walnuts

1/4 cup (0.06 L) raisins

In bowl, combine all ingredients except nuts; chill. To serve, stir in nuts. Makes 4 servings (about 3 cups).

Willingness to learn more than is required is one reason that a local hairdresser took the advantage of enrolling in an advanced hair training course. Hairdressing skills are developed by experience and continuing education.

Rita Narvaez, of Carrizozo, employed at Erma's Beauty Salon was in Tucson, Arizona this month, where she attended a 3-day 'Jingles' advanced hair training course. Jingles, headquartered in London, England, has a base company high in the Empire State Building in New York City. Jingles send their artistic hairdressing teams on tour all over the U.S., Canada and Australia. Among the cities on tour recently were San Diego, Los Angeles and Arizona, where Rita enrolled for the course.

The Jingles teaching method involves a feel for line and technique, as well as care and control. The emphasis is on an individual approach. England's Don Frances was the instructor for the men and women hairdressers who joined Rita in Tucson for 3 days of learning the Jingles hairdressing techniques. Frances is one of several hair stylists and platform artists employed by Jingles to tour cities and countries, teaching individualized hair cutting and other tricks of the trade.

Under the direction of Frances, Rita and other hair stylists, some owners of shops, learned the cutting, braiding, plaiting and twisting techniques in today's latest hair fashions - fashions that emerge from the internationally known Jingles salons.

Frances demonstrated his hairdressing talents on 'demos' (live demonstration models). Under the supervision of Frances, a Douglas, Arizona shop owner and Jingles student gave Rita a new hair style.

Local Hairdresser attends course in Arizona

Rita's hair style was acquired by employing the combination-cut method. Rita and her fellow students worked on their new found cutting techniques on demos provided by Frances. The course was held at the Advanced Beauty College in Tucson. Frances told his Jingles students that the personal touch in hairdressing is becoming more important as customers become more individualistic. Professionalism in hairdressing is dealing with different customers and by viewing the craft as an art expression.

Cutting is the most important part in hairdressing. There are many types of cuts: level length, graduation, layering, combination, inverted, internal, and beveling. During the Arizona Jingles course, Rita viewed first hand the technique used to create the 'punk style' cut. This cut originated from the street kids in London - young people who rebelled against the establishment.

The rebels voiced their opinion by being different. They 'chopped' away at their hair, colored it odd colors, dressed peculiar. Their music was labelled 'punk rock'. Clothes designers and hair stylists picked up this punk style and 'cleaned it up'. The fashion presentation made it appealing to the general public.

During the Jingles course, other areas of hair dressing that Rita observed and was familiar with was the braiding and twisting of hair. Plaiting has been in fashion for several years. For a woman who occasionally wants to look different, it gives a look of elegance.

Rita is a member of the National Hairdressers and Cosmetologists Association (NHCA). Alert to progressive and innovative ideas, she has gathered experience in every aspect of hairdressing by participating in all types of hairdressing events. A graduate of Dona Ana Beauty College in Las Cruces, Rita is on her 4th year at Erma's Beauty Salon. She has attended cosmetology workshops and seminars in Alamogordo, Albuquerque and Roswell. These events all feature hair style shows. Rita has participated in two Alamogordo hairstyle shows using her own Carrizozo models.

PORTALES - If for some reason a taxpayer cannot file his tax return by the due date, an automatic two month extension of time to file is available. To get the extension, the Form 4868, "Application for Automatic Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return" must be filed with the IRS service center where the tax return is filed. The Form 4868 must be filed by April 15, the same due date for filing returns. A copy must also be attached to the tax return when it is filed.

On the Form 4868, the taxpayer must estimate his tax for the year and pay any tax due when he files the application for automatic extension. There is a penalty for paying your tax late which could apply if it is not paid with the Form 4868.

If an individual has filed the Form 4868 and finds that he cannot file his return within the two month automatic extension period (by June 15), he may apply for an additional extension of time. Additional extensions are not granted automatically - only if a very good reason exists such as an extended illness of the taxpayer. To request an additional extension individuals should file a Form 2688, Application for Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return or send a letter specifying the reason for the request. This request is also filed with the IRS service center where the tax return is filed.

Because additional extensions are not granted automatically, taxpayers should request theirs well before the two month automatic extension has expired. In the event they are denied, they will have time to file by the end of the automatic extension period.

The Internal Revenue Service will notify individuals as to whether their additional extension has been granted. If it has, the notice must be attached to the return when filed. If it is denied, the return must be filed by the automatic extension due date.

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Public Viewing of Shuttle Possibility

WHITE SANDS - MISSILE RANGE, NM, Mar 19 - Northrup Strip on White Sands Missile Range has been designated by NASA as the alternate landing site for the space shuttle Columbia on its first orbital test flight planned for next month.

The Columbia's primary landing site is at the NASA Dryden Flight Research Center, Edwards AFB, Calif. At this time, there is still every indication the Columbia will land in California.

In the event the Columbia does land at Northrup Strip, NASA and the U.S. Army are planning to allow the general public to visit the landing site on weekends after landing and view the orbiter as it is being prepared for return to Kennedy Space Center, Fla. The public viewing program will be scheduled on one and possibly two consecutive weekends (Saturday and Sunday) following the landing.

The Northrup landing site is located in a remote area of WSMR some 45 miles north of the missile range headquarters.

An estimated 4,500 persons each day, who request and receive tickets in advance, will be permitted to view the shuttle.

Access to the Northrup Strip viewing area will be by Army and charter bus only, with departure from the WSMR main post area. No private vehicles will be permitted access to the viewing area.

Tickets for public viewing will be issued free of charge on a first-come, first-served basis. They may be obtained by sending a stamped, self-addressed envelope to the following address:

Space Shuttle Tickets
Public Affairs Office
White Sands Missile Range,
NM 88002.

Each request must be limited to no more than six tickets. Special instructions will accompany tickets issued.

The tickets will be color-and number-coded for the day and time of viewing. Weekend departure times from the WSMR main post area will be at 8 a.m., 11:30 a.m., and 3 p.m. The round trip will take about three and one-half hours. Parking for private vehicles will be provided near the bus loading point.

Private chartered buses may, with prior approval, be allowed to join the Army bus convoys, at scheduled departure times from the WSMR main post area, to and from the viewing site. Passengers on these buses will not require special tickets. An Army escort will be provided for each chartered bus.

Arrangements for chartered buses should be coordinated in advance with the Public Affairs Office at White Sands Missile Range, telephone (505) 678-1184 or 678-1135.

It should be noted that, due to NASA schedules, plans could change regarding the public viewing. Specific viewing times will be confirmed after an actual landing occurs, and the public will be advised through local radio, television and newspapers.

The landing, either in California or New Mexico, is expected to be covered by all media, including radio and television.

special day with us.

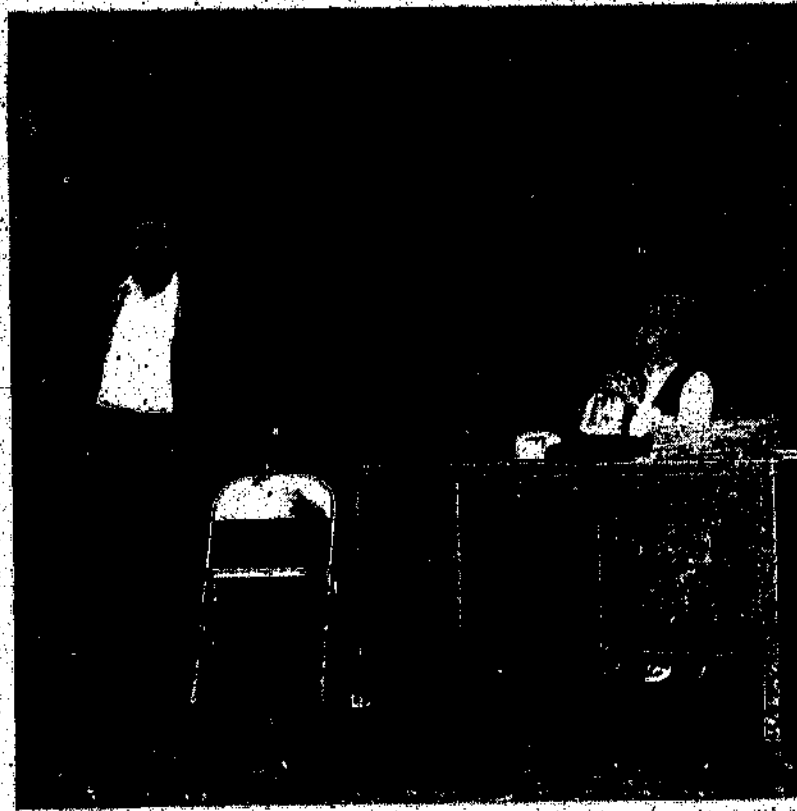
The entertainment was provided by George James and his son Olan, who fiddled while his father played the guitar. We thank them both for an excellent show.

green with a miniature center and senior citizens outside the doors. The cake from Carrizozo was a 25 pound delicacy created by Ramona Ortiz of

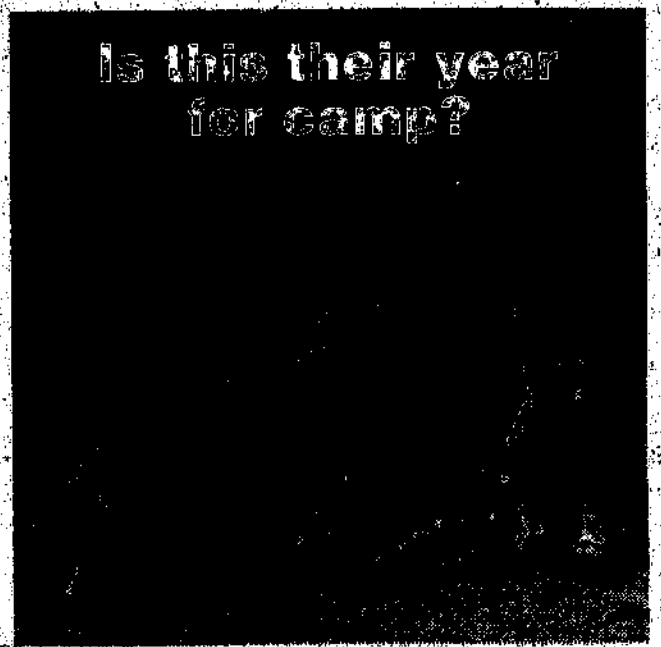
Carrizozo. It was trimmed in blue and red with a floral arrangement and a green candle symbolizing Corona's first anniversary.

Lincoln National Forest News

ALAMOGORDO, NM - Downhill skiing conditions at the Sierra Blanca Ski Area in the Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest were listed as excellent at mid-week, with all lifts and trails open. Weekend skiers are urged to call 257-9001 for current conditions.

Elsewhere in the District, as in ranger districts farther south, the snow was melting rapidly. There was not enough snow for snowmobiling, cross-country skiing, sledding or tubing. Smokey Bear fuelwood areas were open, but roads were muddy in some areas. Winter camping and backpacking activities were limited, with higher elevations snow covered. Three Rivers Campground is open and Cedar Creek Picnic Area will open April 1.

At Cloudcroft, the snow was melting rapidly. Ski Cloudcroft was

open, but expected to have to close soon. The number to call for current Cloudcroft skiing conditions is 612-2587. Cross-country skiing was fair to poor, snowplay areas are closed, and fuelwood areas are closed. The fuelwood areas will reopen when the roads dry out, but that was not expected before the weekend. Silver Campground is open for winter, but there is no water and no fees are being charged.

The Rim Trail is closed for one mile south of Alamo Peak to Atkinson Field and will probably be closed for two more months. Bailey Canyon Road is closed. Highways are clear, but secondary roads on the district are muddy.

Guadalupe Ranger District, at Carlsbad, fuelwood areas are open, but wet in some areas. Visitors are urged to be aware of changing

weather conditions. Sitting Bull Falls was receiving light use last week and trails are wet in some areas. Roads are also wet in some areas, and some intermittent road construction is in progress on Forest Road 67, the Rim Road.

Over on the Mayhill Ranger District, fuelwood areas are open, fishing is good in the Penasco River and Bear Canyon Lake, and the James Canyon Campground is receiving light use. Roads are dry.

Submitted with preliminary plat shall be one (1) set of computer printouts showing mathematical boundaries and acreages of:
 - a. Subdivision boundary and,
 - b. Each lot in the subdivision.
- Section 1-3-4: Require all roads in proposed Types I, II, and III subdivisions be paved by double penetration.
- Section 1-4-23: Require Community water and sewer systems in Type I and II subdivisions.
- Section 1-4-24: A soil survey overlay shall be required for all types subdivisions.

The proposed amendments also shall correct clerical errors now contained in the subdivision regulations.
A complete set of proposed amendments may be obtained from the County Manager's Office.

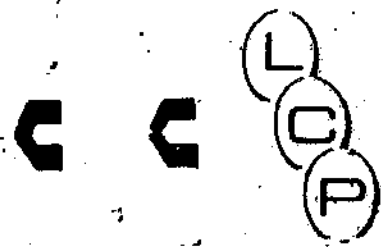
